## PAGEANT TUESDAY NIGHT ON COURT-HOUSE LAWN SHOULD BE AN UNUSUAL AND VERY INTERESTING SPECTACLE

LARGE NUMBER OF PEOPLE INVOLVED IN THE DIFFERENT SCENES. A GREAT DEAL OF PREPARATION NECESSARY

The Pageant, set for 8:00 o'clock Tuesday night at the Courthouse, promises to be one of the most unusual and unique features ever attempted in a community celebration. It's going to surprise some of the folks in the number of people in the various casts, the costumes employed, the scope and beauty of the scenes. Great credit for working up the outlines and details is given Mrs. B. F. Guthrie by the General Manager, Mrs. Homer Wilkinson, who states that without Mrs. Guthrie's vision and energy in rehearsal the affair could hardly have been gone through with. Eleven scenes are depicted in this spectacle and a real treat is

in store for the spectators Tuesday night. Hereford will be closed up tight Tuesday afternoon, with the exception of the drug stores, which were not asked to close as it was felt they were needed in handling the crowds. While a few of the local citizens will be away, the great majority will remain for the home celebration and many visitors from Castro, Farmer, Oldham, Randall and adjoining counties are expected. The parade committee is especially anxious that every unit in the line of march get started early Tuesday morning so that no delays occur. The proposition of endeavoring to secure the 1923 convention and sale of the Panhandle Hereford Breeders Association, adopted by the local breeders association last Saturday, was endorsed by the Chamber of Commerce at the weekly luncheon Monday at the Stockman's Cafe. It was voted to aid the breeders in every possible way in going after the convention and then in retaining it if it is secured.

A letter from Secretary Palmer of the South West Trail was read, thanking Hereford for the reception and entertainment given the delegates assembled here recently. A request from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that this organization write to the Santa Fe railway in support of applications for better grain rates was complied with and the Secretary instructed to write the letters. The Fourth of July preparations were reported and the hospital committee, now at work, reported progress to date.

## INVITE PANHANDLE HERE-FORD BREEDERS ASSOCIATION TO MEET HERE IN '23

LOCAL BREEDERS MAKE IMPORTANT DECISION. INVITATIONS, GIVING FACTS, TO BE ISSUED MEMBERS IN NEAR FUTURE

One of the most important meetings ever held by the Hereford Breeders Association was that last Saturday afternoon at the courthouse when three vital steps were taken to aid in the development of the association work for this section. The three decisions made were: (1) to invite the members of the Panhandle Hereford Breeders Association to hold their 1923 convention at Hereford; (2) to change the constitution of the local association, letting down the membership residence bar and allowing any reputable breeder, wherever located, to become a member with the purchase of a share of stock in the Pavilion; (3) to include calves, stuff in the sales to be held hereafter. Besides these three things the meeting discussed the annual picnic this year and solicited entries for the sale to be held here next spring.

The Panhandle Association has always met at Amarillo, but has been badly handicapped on account of lack of proper sale facilities. The executive committee has just sent out a mail call for members to say where they will hold the 1923 meeting and sale Saturday if it was determined to bid for this meeting, telling the members over the Panhandle of the fine Sale Barn and Pavilion at Hereford, and assuring them of proper entertainment and accommodation. It is proposed to ask the

Chamber of Commerce to aid in putting over the project and to help with the entertainment if the convention is secured. It is felt that the acquisition of this important convention here would not only mean a lot to the Panhandle Association but to the local industry as well. A committee, consisting of Secretary W. Bradley, W. E. Dameron and Seth B. Holman, was appointed to draft the invitation.

The change in admission of members regardless of their residence was made so as to enlarge the usefulness of the association and to secure more cattle for the annual sales. It is believed that quite a number of prominent breeders from outside this territory will be glad to avail themselves of the opportunity offered.

The addition of calf stuff to the annual sales will mean a great many more buyers from out of town and more interest generally. It is believed,

in all probability the annual picnic will not be held this year until some time in August, owing to everybody being busy, but the exact day and details were left to a committee, now on the job.

Secretary Bradley reported that so far forty six heads of registered stuff has been secured for the 1923 sale of the local association, with several more here yet to see. It is hoped to secure a maximum of sixty head. The exact date of this sale was not decided upon Saturday, as it was determined to first wait and see where or not the Panhandle convention came here, in which event, the dates would have to be arranged so as not to conflict.

## THE REAL PROBLEMS

"We need another James Whitcomb Riley to write a parody on this Senatorial contest," said Clarence Ousley. "You remember his poem, 'Little Orphan Annie,' with the refrain, 'The Gobble-uns n' git you if you don't watch out.' My opponents are discussing all sorts of irrelevant questions."

"According to Thomas and Strong the liquor traffic will get us, though the eighteenth amendment to the constitution, unchangeable except by the people, outlaws the manufacture, sale and transportation of intoxicating liquors."

"According to Henry and Mayfield—the one openly and the other secretly—the Catholics, the Jews, or the negroes will get us, though we are 75 percent Protestant, 95 percent Gentile and 90 percent white. I don't wonder that Catholics and Jews are resentful."

"According to Culberson the Ku Klux will get us, though they are not dominant in 25 counties and the Congress of the United States could do nothing if they were 100 percent voting strength."

"And I can tell these candidates that they are doomed to be sadly disappointed in the Ku Klux and the anti-Ku Klux vote. There are a lot of good men in the society and a lot of good men opposing it but they are not going to be governed in their voting by fraternity or church affiliation, by religious or racial prejudice. I am happy to find that appeals to cliques or groups no longer avail in this great state. The man who makes them invites and deserves defeat."

"These are mere political goblines raised by politicians who think the people are children to be frightened by ghost stories. They insult the intelligence of the electorate."

"There are some real problems before us. The failure of my opponents to discuss them is evidence that they do not perceive the problems or do not

understand them. Perhaps I do not understand them; at least I see them and I am trying to find their solution by discussing them with the people."

"The four great problems before us are foreign trade, ample and flexible credits, transportation and tariff taxation. There are some other problems, both international and domestic, and I do not undervalue them, but these are the problems of greatest moment at present. I shall not take much time in discussing transportation because the candidates are all of one mind in opposing the overlordship of the federal government and are committed to recovering as much of state power in rate making as is humanly possible in a situation of acknowledged complexity."

"I wish particularly to direct your minds to the foreign situation which involves the sale of our products and the collection of debts due us; to the credit situation and the need for a system of finance that will enable us to produce and market our crops without burdensome interest charges or depressing congestion; to the inequity of a tariff system that puts its burdens upon consumers and confines its inevitable benefits to manufacturers."

"We are facing a prospect of fair prices for the yields of this year. Let us see to it that our foreign markets are open, that our financial accommodation is ample, that our profits are not absorbed in taxes that inure to the benefit of manufacturing regions. Let us be done with old issues that are settled beyond revival and put our minds upon new issues that effect us in our daily lives as laborers, as farmers, as merchants and bankers. Let us see how national policies will affect our business. Our liberties are fairly safe, our spiritual welfare is in the keeping of our churches, but our prosperity is a matter of our own industry, our own intelligence and sound economic statesmanship."

"The European war is over; we all supported the President; we were all loyal and active in our several spheres—Culberson in the Senate and the rest of us out of it. Neither he or any of us deserves any credit for doing our patriotic duty. The man who claims a reward for serving his country in the Senate or out of it is a beggar. What is his fitness for the next task before us? That is the question. The United States Senate is the workroom of the nation's hired men and the only true qualification for admission, besides integrity, is the ability to labor at the nation's tasks."

"It is the economic aftermath of the European war that now confronts us—the business collapse, the industrial and commercial crisis, the distress of our families, the payment of our debts, the recovery of prosperity."

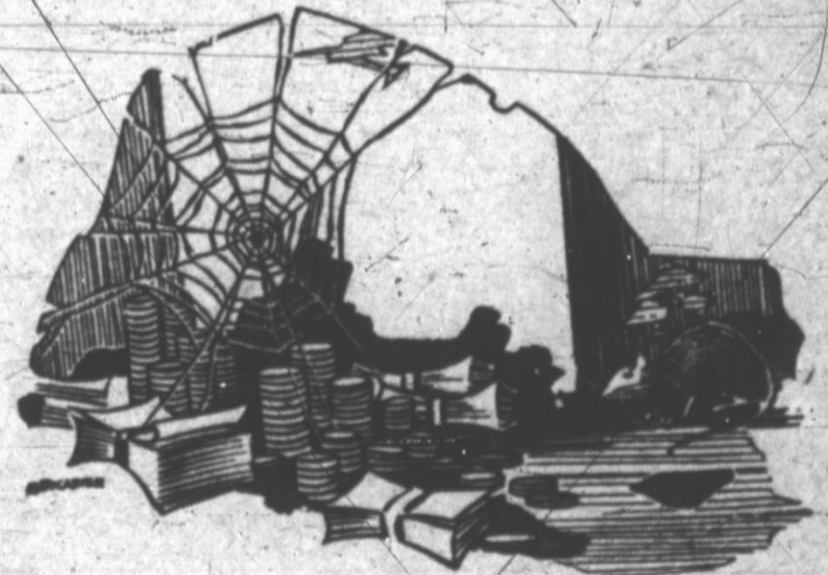
