Guilty verdicts in a felony theft case were returned by 12 jurors Tuesday against Glenn Randell Jr. in the 69th Judicial District Court of Mike Metcalf. The case was being tried at the Deaf Smith County Courthouse.

THE JURY CONVENED in private quarters twice to reach multiple guilty verdicts as it had to decide the outcome of a recent theft case here and to determine whether the defendent was the same man who committed two earlier crimes in Hale County. At about 4:50 p.m., the jurors delivered Metcalf guilty verdicts on the earlier crimes which classifies Randell as ar habitual criminal.

Criminal District Attorney Andy Shuval, prosecutor in the case, said that the jury's decision of guilty under the Habitual Criminal Act mandates a life prison sentence for Randell. The defendent decided to take the legally authorized 10-day waiting period before sentencing. Metcalf set formal sentencing on Oct. 19.

At about 2:30 p.m., the jury recessed to return a guilty verdict against Randell for knowingly and intentionally, with intent to commit theft, enter a motor vehicle without consent of the owner. Randell was charged with the Feb. 24, 1976 break-in of a pick-up owned by Wayne Roberts of Hereford.



Pound Rallies Back

LONDON (AP) - The British pound rallied by nearly 3 cents, to \$1.6675, on foreign exchanges today after Britain's Chancellor of the Exchequer, Denis Healey, announced he would seek \$3.9 billion in credit from the International Monetary Fund IMF.

Healey decided on the move after Tuesday's 41/2-cent drop in the price of sterling, to a record low of \$1.6360.

Bell Wants No Competition



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
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The Hereford Whitefaces willbe a nine-point underdog when they meet the Amarillo High Sandies this Friday night according to th latest Harris Rating System poll.

Ali Disputed Winner; Foreman Bout Coming?

NEW YORK (AP)- Muhammad Ali, the winner and still heavyweight champion of the world, will go into a huddle with himself during the next few days and ponder two alternatives affecting his remarkable ring career.

At age 34, his skills diminishing, should he be content to retire on the negative note of his widely disputed 15-round victory Tuesday night over challenge Ken Norton?

Or should he try for one last, glorious hurrah- a repeat triumph over the hard-punching George Foreman- with a guaranteed price that could reac reach \$10 million?

"I been thinking seriously of retiring," the weary champion said today, as he lay sprawled on a table in the visiting lock room at Yankee Stadium

"I've whipped everybody I should whip. I got more nothing to prove. I am the champion. I keep saying maybe I ought to quit and spend more time with my kids.

Ali has five. Don King, the Rockefeller Plaza ring entrepreneur who staged multi-million- dollar promotions involving Ali in Zaire, Africa, and The Philippines, came into the hectic dressing room and sat beside the prone titleholder. They talked in low and significant whispers.

"To enhance boxing's credibility, it is necessary now to call on the awesome punching power of George Foreman, King said. "He deserves another shot. I think an Ali-Foreman return bout would exceed hany extravaganza" yet staged in the boxing game."

> .1 The big onetime Cleveland numbers king said he has been discussing prospects of such a

fight with Herbert Muhammad, Ali's Muslim business manager, and he has been encouraged by the response.

"I don't like to fix a figure but it could be a \$10 million windfall for Ali and a big payday for Foreman," King said. "I have made contact with serveral foreign governments who are interested in the promotion-Turkey, Syria and Nigeria. Montreal, the Olympic capital, also is very interested." The prospective date is sometime vithin the next three months.

Talk of a return bout with Foreman, whom he knocked out Oct. 30, 1974, in Zaire, quickened the interest of the somber Ali.

"I say I been thinking about retiring," he hedged. "But maybe in a few days when my back don't hurt so much and my hands don't feel so sore I will change my mind. So I don't want to make a snap decision right now."

Meanwhile, less than 100 yards away, over in the dressing oom of the baseball Yankees. Norton, the defeated challenger, was venting his frustration on all within ear shot.

Slot Machines Maintain Good Income for Las Vegas Residents

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)- You still get 18 nickels for three lemons on the slot machines here, but more people are losing to the one-armed bandits than ever before.

The 9.2 million tourists and conventioneers who visited Las Vegas last year spent more than \$2.2 billion, a sum that would make this town the 87th largest corporation in American were it a company. Of that amount, the wheels, cards and dice that gyrate around the clock separate the visitors from more than \$770

Despite economic slowdowns, fuel shortages and steadily rising prices, the gross income of casinos here has risen an average of 15 per cent annually since 1970, making their total gambling take the last six years more than \$3.3 billion.

. The winning streak hasn't gone unnoticed. Hotel and casino owners are embarked on Vegas Chamber of Commerce, salls the biggest building room

It's hard to argue with him. The Aladdin Hotel has just finished a \$60-million expan-

Nevada is the only state where gambling is legal and prostitution is county- optional. In 1931, a law known as the "Wide-Open Gambling Bill," provided for state taxes on casinos' gambling revenues.

The first paved highway between Los Angeles and Las Vegas was built in 1934, and Southern Californians began to sample the town's delights in ever-increasing numbers. By the end of World War II the town that had begun as a railroad junction 40 years earlier was beginning to show signs of the tourist mecca it is today.

Las Vegas boasts more than 36,000 hotel rooms. The 'average" visitor stays in one for 3.5 days and spends between \$50 and \$60 a day, not counting Frank Scott, president of the gambling.

Democrats are beginning to take some public notice of federal investigations into alleged misuse of campaign funds during President Ford's congressional campaigns and Ford's golfing trips with corporation lobbyists.

Democratic presidential nominee Jimmy Carter, at home for a rest in Plains, Ga., has avoided direct comment on the investigations and, until Tuesday so did other Democrats.

But Carter's running mate. Sen. Walter Mondale, and party chairman Robert Strauss both offered comments on the Ford investigations Tuesday.

Mondale, in Toledo, Ohio, said Ford has been "ducking and hiding" from questions about the investigations. And Strauss chastised GOP vice presidential candidate Bob Dole for suggesting that the probes were political in nature.

The special Watergate prosecutor's office is investigating the records of Ford's home district GOP organization in Kent County, Mich., reportedly looking into allegations that Ford, while in Congress, illegally diverted campaign contributions to personal or improper use, "laundering" the money through local party organizations.

In addition, the Securities and Exchange Commission reportedly is investigating golfing trips made by Ford as a congressmen. Those trips were paid for by the U.S. Steel Corp. The White House said

Tuesday that Ford had made trips to corporate golf courses while in Congress, but Ford press secretary Ron Nessen declined to comment when asked if Ford had, as a congressman, converted camppaign funds to his personal use.

Ford has not personally mentioned the investigations and has not been available for questions. Ford remained at the White house on Monday, meeting with foreign dignitaries, setting the scene for his next debate with Carter on the subject of foreign affairs.

At Tuesday's briefing session, Nessen disclosed that Ford had played golf on courses operated by Firestone Tire. Bethlehem Steel and Alcoa

EDDYVILLE, lowa (AP) Government is getting more complicated these days for small towns like Eddyville. So town officials joined six other communities and hired a traveling city manager.

"These seven cities got together and realized they were all about the same size and may have similar problems," said Gene Vatter, who serves as city manager for the town ranging in population from 192 to 970.

'After about a year, they realized that just getting together wasn't solving all the problems," he said. So they sought help from their regional planning council and hired Vatter for \$15,000 a year.

In addition to working on problems where part-time city officials have no expertise, Vatter coordinates programs between the towns, such as joint purchases and equipment shar-

ing.
"They can also share

personnel," Vatter said. "If skilled personnel are available for water treatment and liquid waste, there is no reason these personnel can't be shared by more than one city.

"It gives these small cities the power of a much larger city when they group together like

Eddyville Mayor Robert Richards says Vatter is well worth the money to his community, population 970, especially in finding federal grants to help the town operate.

"We hired a new city maintenance man" with federal money Vatter found, Richards

"Now he's working on revenue-sharing for us. He seems to think he can get \$1,000 to \$2,000 more a year," Richards said. "This year he is going to cost us about \$700. If this revenue-sharing goes through, he'll more than pay our

share towards his salary." Richards said Vatter has

Manager Shared By Six Cities drawn up city ordinances for Eddyville and worked on the community's budget.

Vatters' seven towns, which also include Blakesburg, Lucas, Lovilia, Melrose, Russell and Williamson, are located mostly in a two-county area of southeastern lowa, but he still spends much of his time traveling.

"Usually, I'm driving about 3.000 miles a month going to the cities that are located from six miles to 20 miles apart," he said.

Gun Smuggling Increases Along Rio Grande Border

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP)-Politics, profit and American store owners who "choose to look the other way" spawns the high-caliber gun smuggling operations along the Rio Grande, says Asst. U.S.

attorney Charles Lewis. Guns are bought legally in the United States, says Lewis, and transported illegally into Mexico where buyers are eager to do business in either dollars or

'There is a pure profit motive, of course," he said Monday. "Dealers on both sides of the border make money and the political climate in Mexico, especially during an election year, give smugglers a big market.

"The left-wing guerrillas in the mountains want the guns to battle the Mexican army and the wealthy, conservative landowners want the guns to guard their homes and lives."

Lewis believes the problem starts with the licensed American gun salesman.

"If you sold guns and the same person came into your store every week and bought two or three M-1 rifles, wouldn't you get a little suspicious?"

"We haven't been able to get

to the primary source of the smuggled guns -- that's the licensed gun dealer. They choose to remain ignorant about the buyers in their store."

Although officials are hesitant to estimate the amount of gun running along the Rio Grande, two recent cases give an insight as to the quantity and quality of the firearms.

"We ran two separate surveys involving hundreds of ammunition dealers along the border." said Lewis. "Both surveys showed the number one dealer was the Villa Verde Store in Brownsville.

"But you look in the Yellow Pages under ammunition," Lewis said as he flipped through the phone book, "and you don't find the store listed. You look unger guns and you don't find

Yet this store was selling a million rounds of ammunition a month and 90 to 95 per cent of it was going to Mexico. You know if somebody was buying that much ammunition, they have more than a few guns."

The co-owners of the store, Ignacio Reyes and David Dominguez, were found guilty of falsifying Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms reports. The pair was find \$3,000 and given

three-year probated sentences. "They were falsifying the

names and addresses of Mexican purchasers," said Lewis. "So when U.S. officials reported the purchases to the Mexican government, the correct buyer could not be traced.

"That case involved only one store," said Lewis. "When you consider the hundreds of stores along the border, then there must be one hell of a lot of guns in Mexico.

'Another case in McAllen involved the confiscation of about 100 guns, he continued. 'Most of them were .22, .38 and 30 caliber semi-automatics which could be converted to fully automatic in about 15 minutes by someone who knew what he was doing."

Lewis said the types of guns popular with the Mexican buyers are the AR-15, the M-1 and M-1 Enforcer.

"The AR-15 was developed for use in Vietnam," said Lewis. "It uses small bullets that have a tremendous impact yet it can be fired for hours. It has no kick.

"The M-1 used to be the standard U.S. Army weapon and the MI-Enforcer is a small gun with a pistol handle yet the rest of the weapon looks like a rifle. It's about 15 inches long. It's an assault weapon.

"I can't think of any other use for that gun other than to kill

Confusion Feared On Water Issues

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas voters were urged Monday to back Amendment No. 2 on the Nov. 2 ballot as a \$100 million effort to clean up Texas waters. Josiah Wheat, Woodville, chairman of Texans for Clean Water, cautioned voters also not to confuse the \$100 million clean water bond issue with contro-

versial Amendment No. 1. "We are concerned that opposition to No. 1 could have an adverse effect to No. 2," Wheat told a news conference. Wheat's group is not taking a position on No. 1.

Amendment No. 1 would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$400 million in funds for water projects. A group of environmentalists would be 'open ended and uncontrolled' authority for the board. Some have said it would be used to transfer water from one part of the state to another.

Amendment 'No. 2 would allow the state to issue an additional \$100 million in bonds to help cities and towns improve their sewage treatment facilities. An original issue of \$100 million was approved by voters

RIO GRANDE CITY, (AP)-Starr County is trying to rid itself of drug dealers before its gets hooked.


The Starr County grand jury asked Texas Atty. Gen. John Hill for help in investigating the problem brought to the limelight by three recent gang-land-style slayings reportedly linked to drug trafficking.

Hill, after meeting with the grand jury and Starr County Dist. Atty. Arnulfo Guerra, responded to the plea by the dope-plagued county sending Asst. Atty. Gen. Neal Duvall and Special investigator Don Lee to this Rio Grande Valley county which shares a border with Mexico.

"The people of Starr County have to realize we must stop this situation from spreading," said Guerra. "The murders really woke up people. Everyone turns the other way until they find a body in their backyard."

Guerra also said the drug dealings have "permeated every aspect of the govern-

Hill said the investigation would "extend into organized drug trafficking, possible official corruption and general breakdown of law and order in Starr County."




