# **Expensive Statistic Error** Covered Up Four Years

WASHINGTON (AP)- A controversy over an alleged multibillion-dollar error in a vital statistical indicator of economic strength in stirring the U.S. Census

The error, alleged to have been covered up for nearly four years, conceivably could have led to faulty government and business decisions by badly understating the backlog of unfilled orders at the nation's factories.

As a consequence of believing orders were weaker than they really were, manufacturers may have cut production and hastened the descent into the recession of late 1973 and 1974.

If correct, the allegations by a bureau statistician would suggest the economy was stronger than the statistics showed both before and through the recession.

John Kendrick, Commerce Department chief economist, promised a statement on the allegations shortly.

The controversy was set off by John Bullock, a survey statistician economist. He said in an interview that his repeated requests, through channels, for a public warning about the so-called M-3 series, which measures the backlog, were

Bullock. 29, said the figures were understated by perhaps 50 per cent or more. He claims that errors have obscured the recovery's degree of dependence on a backlog of already existing orders.

The errors, Bullock said, are the consequence of a systematic bias resulting from faulty estimates and statistical adjustments, that have accumulated at a 4 to 5 per cent rate over 14 years. He said he uncovered the defect

Attorneys called 11 witnesses to testify Thursday in the Clifford Morris Walton murder trial, in which jurors are expected to decide a verdict today in the 69th Judicial District Court of Judge Mike Metcalf. It is being conducted at the Deaf Smith County Courthouse

The two woman and 10 man jury was to receive the case today. Testimony began at 9 a.m. and concluded at 5.35 p.m. Thursday. It began again today at 9

WALTON IS ON TRIAL from the 1 cb 20, 1975 slaying of his son Clifford I Walton, 22, who died from two wounds to the stomach area from a 32 caliber pistol. It occurred following an alleged fight between the two persons, who were both reportedly drinking alcoholic beverages that day.

Prosecutor Andy Shuval, criminal district attorney, and defending attorneys Mack Tubb and Rex Easterwood filled the court record with numerous objections. most of which were decided in favor of the prosecution. Shuval is being assisted in the trial by Schalan Atkinson, assistant district attorney

Testimony was slowed-paced through out most of the day as its climax was reached when Art Burton, chief deputy for the county sheriff's office, was allowed to read a statement from Walton over the objections of Shuval. It was the second of two statements introduced into evidence. The first one, which Walton did not sign, was presented early in the trial by the prosecution even though its validity was questioned by the defense.

The first purported confession of Walton was taken shortly after he and his wife were brought to the sheriff's office. There, Deputy Sheriff Reuben McGilva read Walton his legal rights and showed him a statement, on which the deputy wrote that the defendent "refused to

Also, Jay Spain, Hereford fire marshall, was present and testified that Waiton wrote on the statement that, "I killed him, that's all." Spain was at the office to bring McGilvary his gun.

A HEARING WAS HELD without the presence of the jury to decide the validity of the first reported confession and the extent of the defendent's voluntary motivation to sign it. Easterwood had objected to the confession's form and substance. The Judge allowed the statement into the court record.

The first statement was taken from 10 30 11 35 Feb. 20, 1975 with the other one being process later. Burton typed and took down the second statement from about 11.30 p.m. that day to about 12:15 p.m. Feb. 21, 1975.

In it. Walton said a pickup truck owned by the Waltons was stuck in neighbor Clyde Weber's yard next door. A fight broke out between the senior Walton and his son while they were trying to get it unstuck. Then, the younger Walton went home and the defendent said his son started hitting his mother with no reasons stated for the action. Weber saw them fighting earlier that night and said "they fought often." even though he thought it

was in fun-The gun, a .32 Smith and Wesson revolver then "came into it." The defendent said he tried to take it away from his son and "It went off." The statement further revealed that the son went into the living room and sat down in a chair. His mother told the defendent that their son was shot in the stomach and needed help. Walton then called the sheriff's office successfully after four or five attempts

Burton described the house as a 'mess' with mud spread throughout parts of the residence, located on La Posta southeast of Hereford.

WEBER, THE NEIGHBOR confirmed most of the same story except with more detail. He said the senior Walton came to his back door, and the deceased came to the front door, both seeking help with the stuck pickup truck.

He sent his step son Danny Joe West out to try and help with the truck, but he returned shortly and told his step father that the two Waltons were figthing. The senior Walton had since gone around the house to the truck in the front yard.

Weber said the defendent had "been drinking some. The older Walton then walked home and the Walton son was able to drive the truck home. That is where the other action took place.

Weber explained that Walton had called him for help with the younger Walton after he was shot. Weber's

# Arafat Refuses Syrian Cease Fire Proposal

BFIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Palestinian leader Yasır Arafat today rejected Syrian terms for a cease-fire, and Syrian tanks and heavy artillery renewed a four-day offensive, slamming into the Palestinianheld towns of Bhamdoun and Aley in the mountains east of Beirut.

Lebanese Christian commanders cooperating with the Syrians said Bhamdoun is now facing Syrian tanks to the

northwest, north and east. "A push into Bhamdoun appears imminent," said one.

Two thousand rockets poured into Aley, Bhamdoun, 12 miles east of Beirut, is the forward post of the guerrillas and their leftist Lebanese allies. Aley, 10 miles from the capital, is the biggest summer resort in Lebanon and headquarters for the leftist-querrilla mountain defenses.

### Registration **Ends Today**

Today was the last day to register to vote for the Nov. 2 general presidential election according to the Deaf Smith

County Tax assessor-collectors office. Since the first of this year about 1,560 new voters have registered and the recent registration deadline has caused much more activity in the county office than is

usually experienced. State law requires voters to be register 30 days in advance of an election. Registration can be conducted in person or by mail. Mailed in application need to be postmarked no later than today.

A spokesman for the tax office said that forms are available at several local church and retail establishments. These need to be filled in and brought to the tax office, located on the first floor of the Deaf Smith County Courthouse.

Forms are furnished at the tax office for those needing them. The only information needed is a person's social security number.

On the Nov. 2 ballot, presidential candidates Jimmy Carter, Democratic, and Gerald Ford, Republican, will be listed. Other candidates could be listed such as Eugene McCarthy and Lester Maddox of the American Party.

Other significant political races on the ballot will include the contest between Lloyd Bentsen, Democrat, and Alan Steelman, Republican for a seat in the U.S. Senate Democrat George Mahon, congressman from the 19th Congressional district is pitted against Republican Jim Reeese of Odessa.

Several amendments will be listed on the ballot including one to-raise the bonding level for the state's water . development by \$400 million.

WASHINGTON (AP) - As the 94th Congress works to wind up its work, the Senate is facing the threat of a filibuster that could kill legislation extending the deadline for auto makers to meet tough exhaust standards.

Sen. Jake Garn's pledge to talk all night and into next week to prevent a vote on the bill could delay final congressional adjournament. Both the House and Senate hoped to conclude business today and adjourn for the year to allow time for some political campaigning

### Swine Flu Shots Begin

America "rolled up is sleeves" today for the first swine flue shots, the largest immunization program in the nation's history. But some state health officials said they were uncertain when and whether they would get all the vaccine

The national Center for Disease Control said the first shots would be given "officially," at a health fair in Indianapolis, but they were scheduled also for at least one other state. Patients at Waltham, a Boston suburb, were to i the first of the vaccine in Massachusetts.

### -Utility Pays Fines

DALLAS (AP) - Texas Utilities Co. has agreed to pay \$200,000 in state pollution fines for two lignite-fired generating plants in East Texas.

Texas Utilities Vice President Trent Root said company customers, some four million strong, would not see their, rates increased because of the fines. He said stockholders would absorb the cost.

A spokesman for Dallas Power & Light; a Texas Utilities subsidiary, said the \$25 million in equipment being installed as part of the agreement will be a cost passed along to customers.

"It should be pointed out that the drinking water in those Panhandle cities hasn't changed... k's the same water people have been drinking, and thriving on, for a hundred years. The only thing that has changed about the water situation is the Federal Drinking Water guideline, which is steadily changing, and will change enough in 1977 to require a score of Panhandle cities and towns to install expensive treatment facilities to

remove the fluoride salts from their

drinking water. "Until recently, at least, it has been quite fashionable for cities which didn't have fluorides in the drinking water...and wanted to emulate Hereford and eliminate tooth decay...to add fluorides to the water supply. In some cities, where there were strong John Birch Society elements, this caused quite a flap, since the Birchers viewed it as some sort of Communist plot.

"If all this sounds pretty ridiculous, we suggest that you take it with a grain of salt...but, unless you want to violate Federal Drinking Water Standards yourself, make that sodium chloride, not sodium fluoride for goodness sake!"

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

Calder's universe


Displaying more than a half century of artist-sculptor Alexander Calder's creations, New York City's Whitney Museum will present a new texhibit, "Calder's Universe," scheduled to open in October. Containing nearly 200 of the famed artist's works in almost every category of art, the exhibit will remain on display until February, 1977 before moving on to Atlanta, Minneapolis and Dallas.

Calder, who once summed up his artistic inspiration by simply stating, "I want to make things that are fun to look at," revolutionized many people's attitudes toward abstract art with his distinctive style and approach. Not content with the usual canvas or marble, Calder experimented with silk screen murals, window displays, water fountains and has even painted a jet. One of his dioramas, "Circus Performance," seen at right when Calder was creating it in 1929, will be in the show. He has worked with a variety of materials, including wood, porcelain, cloth, bone and plexiglas. A necklace fashioned from leather in 1926, below, will also be included at the Whitney. Below the necklace is "Double Cat," carved from wood by the artist about





Especially noted for his expressive mobiles which he described as "dancing on air," Calder's "Hanging Spider," far right, will be on display, too. The 51-inch high creation of wire and sheet metal was made in 1940. At lower right is "Cow," simplicity itself is rendered from wire and imagination, circa 1929. The Fost and Carter presidential election campaigns are publicly financed this year. They are forbidden from accepting private donations if they take the public money. Private -contributions to presidential hopefuls were permitted in the primaries.

## Spokesman Says Watergate Section Hasn't Been Written

NEW YORK (AP)- Richard M. Nixon has not yet written the section of his memories dealing with the Watergate scandal and therefore a published report that he will maintain that he is innocent of any wrongdoing in he affair is "false," spokesman for Nixon says,

In its Wednesday editions, The New York Times quoted knowledgeable publishing sources in Europe and the United States as saying that Nixon would depict Watergate as a partisan battle, with himself as the victim of enemies out to bring him down.

But Franklin Gannon, director research for Nixon's memories, said in a statement released in San Clemente. Calif.: "The story is false because former President Nixon has not yet written the section of his book dealing with Watergate. Only Richard Nixon knows what he is going to say about Watergate."

## Ford Veto Of Labor, Health Bill Overridden

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House voted Thursday to override President Ford's veto of a \$56.6 billion appropriation bill for the departments of Labor and Health, Education and

The vote was 312 to 93, 42 more than the two-thirds needed to override. If left the final decision to the

Senate, which was expected to act promptly.

Ford has said the bill was inflationary, calling for \$4 billion more spending than he had recommended for the departments.

Supporters of the appropriation said Ford's budget made no provision for rising costs and would have forced cuts in

ward consideration of a revenue sharing measure that could be the key to determine whether Congress meets its weekend deadline for adjournament.

# Cost To Medicare Beneficiaries Boosted By Record 19 Per Cent

WASHINGTON (AP)- The portion of hospital fees that 25 million Medicare beneficiaries have to pay out of their own pockets was boosted a record 19 per cent Thursday by the Social Security Administration. Next Jan. I, means that an elderly or disabled person entering a hospital in 1977 will be responsible for the first \$124 of the initial bill, covering up to two months, compared with the present charge of \$104.

Similar increases apply to the share of costs that must be borne by the patient for extended stays in a hospital or skilled nursing home.

Social Security Commissioner James B. Cardwell said the increase is necessary to keep pace with hospital costs, which **Commodities** have been shooting up at more than twice the overall cost of

charges for up to the first 60 days except for an amount which, in theory, represents the cost on the day of admission.

Under the federal formula designed to balance off inflation, the price of that first and supposedly average - day goes to \$20. In fact, however, the computations lag behind actual costs by about two years.

After the patient picks up the first \$124 of his bill next year. Medicare will, as ususal, pick up the balance through the 60th

But then further increases apply which, for some patients, could prove even more dear. They will have to pay \$31 daily out of their own pockets for the 61st through the 90th day, up from the present \$26 daily.

Post-hospital stays lasting more than 20 days in a skilled nursing home wil require beneficiaries to pay \$15.20 daily for the 21st through the

100th day, up from the present

Medicare patients who must be hospitalized more than 90 consecutive days can draw upon their one-time-only life-time reserve - an extra 60 days - but will have to pay \$62 daily instead of the current \$52.

The agency said the cost of Medicare hospital insurance is expected to rise from an overall \$13.6 billion this year to \$16.1 billion in 1977.

About 24.7 million persons are eligible for the benefits this year. They are expected to number 25.3 million next year. Social Security said the average hospital stay now costs about \$1,600 per patient.

# Increase In Gasoline Tax

VICTORIA, Tex. (AP) - Rep. Joe Wyatt, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, disagrees with Gov. Dolph Briscoe's plan to shift \$825 million in general revenue to highways over the next two

Instead, he proposes an increase in the gasoline tax, offset by a-sales tax decrease and elimination of sales taxes on utility bills.

Highways currently are financed by dedicated motor fuel taxes and federal aid. Wyatt, D-Bloomington, made

his views known in a interview published this week in the Victoria Advocate:

He said the governor's plan would force the legislature to pass a tax increase in the 1979 legislature by using up taxes now spent to finance general state government functions. Wyatt's committee, assuming

he is reappointed chairman, will have life or death power over any tax proposals made to the 1977 legislative session. Briscoe remains adamant against passage of any new taxes or tax increases. The chairman told the

Advocate's associate editor. Friscoe wants too much for highways. He said \$500 million should be enough. To get that much, the five cents a gallon tax on gasoline should be increased

to nine cents, Wyatt said. "I don't propose to go that high all at once," he said. "I think we could raise the gasoline tax by two cents and provide for part of the increase in highway spending on a one-time basis out of general revenue, perhaps," Wyatt said.

"At the same time, I would propose dropping the state general sales tax from 4 to 31/2 per cent and eliminate the sales tax on utilities. This would reduce income by \$325 million a

Wyatt said this would cause a net tax cut of \$200 million over the two years beginning Sept. 1,

He defended the one-time use of general revenue for highways by saying this would not become dedicated money, as would part of general revenue under the governor's proposal.

Once money is dedicated by law, it takes an act of a future legislature to change of the status of the money, and this is seldom done.

Wyatt warned that the present general revenue surplus and even larger anticipated revenues really are windfall income from rising oil and natural gas prices. But those prices will stabilize in about two years, he predicted.

'If we don't hold down spending, two years from now we're going to have to spend \$3 for every \$1 spent next year to stoke the fires again," he said.

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
