Decision Delayed Another 30 Days

WTSU Regents Motion Prolongs Agony For Athletic Department

"Today is the day we solve the problem. We cannot go through this annual agony." chairman Jack Shelton told the West Texas State University Board of Regents yesterday as they prepared to make a decision on the fate of the WTSU athletic program, and football in particular.

BUT HOURS later. Shelton's statement had proven anticlimatic, and the fate of sports at West Texas State University had once again been left hanging in the air.

The regents board adjourned from three days of meetings yesterday without making any long-term decisions concerning sports at the university.

Houston Regent Dee Osborne presented the motion that WTSU retain the total athletic program on its present level and allow 30 days for underwriting a projected deficit of \$308,000.

Under Osborne's motion, if the deficit was not underwritten at the end of 30 days, the sports budget would be scaled down to the available funding level and the entire athletic program would be reduced to a level within the budget.

IN EFFECT, the Houston regent called for maintaining a football program at the Panhandle university, even if it must be maintained on a scaled-down level.

Earlier Thursday. Dumas Regent James Lovell made a motion to suspend football effective Aug. 31, "until the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient arhount of money to fund the West Texas" State University Athletic Department budget, or other long-term funds become available."

Osborne's motion was actually a substitute for the one proposed by Lovell.

LOVELL'S MOTION was amended by Regent Irby Carruth of Canyon, who wished to set a five day period to raise enough monty to keep the athletic program out of the red next year.

Lovell explained that he joined Carruth in the feeling that the money could be raised, and had left the door open for such a project by using the phrase, "or other long term funds become available." In reply, Osborne asked that the motion be defeated, and stated, "Even if we don't get all of the money, I am against dropping football."

Osborne then made his motion to maintain football at whatever level is possible.

UNDER THE PROPOSAL which was adopted by the regents, a period of 30 days is allowed for enlisting sufficient outside financial support to offset the athletic deficit. If within that period, sufficient support is not received, alternate plans would be made to continue the entire athletic program, including football, so as to operate within a balanced budget for the next ensuing fiscal year.

Some regents opposed the Osborne motion on the grounds that it merely offers the WTSU athletic department "another one year deal," but the Osborne motion was passed with four favoring it and two voting against it. The move effectively postponed any decision on the university's athletic future for at least another 30 days.

Those regents voting for another delay in the decision were Don Curry of Fort Worth, Mrs. B.M. Sims of Wellington, Carruth and Osborne.

We feel WTSU and its students will be best served with a strong athletic program of which we can all be proud and at the same time we must live within the amount of money that's available to us."

During the course of their meeting yesterday, the regents heard testimony from an Amarillo sportscaster who told the regents they were guilty of keeping information from the Panhandle residents who are vital in supporting the university. "Until you are more open, honest, and refrain from embarassing them, the people of the Panhandle will not support your university," the sportscaster commented.

SHELTON STATED that he would appoint a steering committee comprised of interested citizens to head the fund-raising drive for WTSU, as the session came to an end yesterday.

The regents chairman said that names of the committee members would probably be announced next week.

Ford Makes Last Energy Pitch

WASHINGTON (AP)- President Ford is making a final pitch for his energy programs, ranging from removal of price controls on fuels to stepped-up conservation measures.

FORD WAS expected today to spell out what he views as the nation's unfinished energy with the special message to Congress.

A White House aide said the message would break no new ground, but would substantially be "an update" of Ford administration energy programs and wecommended as a substantial of the substantial subst

Ford's efforts to get his own energy program through the last Congress were unsuccessful. There is little possibility that a Democratic Congress waiting for Democratic President-elect Carter to take office on Jan. 20 will take any action on the proposals of an outgoing Republican President.

One of Ford's most controversial recent

proposals is the removal of remaining price controls on gasoline.

ALTHOUGH FORD SEEMS certain to touch on this subject in his energy message, it was unclear whether he would couple the message with formal action to remove the controls.

He had been expected to order removal of controls earlier in the week. But the move was delayed amid growing opposition from congressional Democrats. They contended the step would result in higher prices for consumers at the gasoline pump.

to block such a move.

Even if Ford chooses to announce the action today, he will have left office before the 15 days expire, meaning the order could be rescinded by Carter if he so desired.

FORD'S MESSAGE WILL contain many points he raised in his 1976 energy message, an aide said. In that message, delivered last February, Ford blamed Congress for delaying action on energy measures.

Among measures Ford pushed then were bills to deregulate natural gas prices, ease clean air standards to allow more burning of coal and financial guarantees of up to \$6 billion for development of plants to convert coal into synthetic fuels. Those plans never were enacted.

Meanwhile, Carter has said his energy policy will stress conservation and moreuse of coal, giving nuclear power third place.

Ford has strongly pushed nuclear energy programs, but Carter has been less enthusiastic.

FORD AND CARTER differ on increasing coal production. Ford called for doubling production by 1985 with more strip-mining in the West.



Mrs. O.G. Hill (Bessie Foster) was a school teacher in Summerfield until her marriage 39-0.6 Hill in 1922. Thorsare the parents of five children: Mrs. J.D. Neill, Mrs. Horace Whisler, O.G. Hill Jr., Mrs. R.A. Daniel Jr. and Foster Hill.

During her childhood days in New Mexico, she recalls with pride herheritege ass part of a homesteaders family, who lived in a part dug-out and kept warm with the traditional fuel of the plains pioneer, cow-chips...Their home had one room above the ground and the remainder in a dugout.

IN WORLD WAR II, when her sons were in military service, she rode horses and helped move cattle like a cowhand,



In her experiences as a rancher's wife and as a trustee of the estate, Mrs. Hill savs her biggest job was cooking for the cowboys. When they were working near enough to Hereford, the crews would come in for meals at the big house. In later years she often fixed food and took it to the pastures and stockpens where the cowboys worked.

A WORKING MEMBER of the Democratic Party, she has been precinet chairman several times, she was on the United Fund Board and the breadth of her interests are indicated by her memberships in the Pioneer Study Club and Order or Eastern Star, where she is not now so active but has been a past Worthy Matron and a Deputy Grand Matron. She is now a 50 year member.

Mrs. Hill is a member of the First Bapfist Church, where she has always taught Sunday School classes. Special emphasis should be made for her work in the Hereford Garden Club. 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Hill Terms Televised Executions 'Nonsense'


" AUSTIN (AP)- Texas Atty. Gen. John Hill Thursday called proposals to televise executions 'utter nonsense" and said he would appeal a federal judge's ruling that would permit executions to be filmed by the mines media


»" Hill said since U.S District Court Judge William Taylor had made the decision to open up executions to all news media. only two television stations had indicated they would "afford memselves of this opportuųity.

This showed a "sense of responsibility and judgment" on the part of other television stations, he told a news Conference.

Taylor's order refers only to filming executions on a pool basis for possible telecast by Stations later. Although Hill spoke of televised executions he is actually appealing that portion of the judge's order which allows filming.

"Good journalistic accounts of executions will be adequate to inform the public." Hill said. and it should not be carried a step further by "filming the grisly affair." He said director W.J. Estelle Jr. of the prison system agreed that the TV portion of Taylor's order should be appealed.



AUSTIN (AP)- Parents could be fined \$200 for leaving children under 13 years old unattended in automobiles under a bill filed by Rep. Tony Polumbo, **D-Houston**

POLUMBO'S BILL is among about 350 House measures now filed in advance of the legislative session that begins next Tuesday.

It would require a person 15 and older to be in a parked car any time there are children left in it.

Other pre-filed bills include: -HB173, by Rep. Joe Allen, D-Baytown, creating the office of state ombudsman, who would investigate citizen complaints about administrative acts of state agencies.

HB176, by Rep. Gene Green, D-Houston, enabling school districts to commission peace officers.

-HB180. BY REP. John Whitmire. D-houston, prohibiting pay toilets. HB185, by Rep. Anthony Hall, D-Houston, raising the state minimum wage from \$1.25 to \$2.30 per hour.

-HB217, by Rep. Dan Kubiak, D-Rockdale, reducing the school year from 180 to 171 days.

HB218, by Rep. Frank Gaston, R-Dallas, providing a mandatory two-year extension of prison sentences for crimes committed with guns.

D-Gainesville, prohibiting charges for pupil ratios from the present standard of directory assistance telephone calls. one to 25 to 1:15 for kindergarten, 1:19 for grades 1 through 3; and 1:21 for -HB276, by Rep. Frank Madia, D-San

-HB229, BY REP. BILL Sullivant,

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - Sen. Barry Goldwater, R Ariz., angered over what he termed a ranks discourtesy, said he will never raise funds again for the Republican Party, the Arizona Republic reported in its Thursday editions.

The newspaper said Goldwater was left out of a Republican leadership meeting at the White House Wednesday. President Ford met with former California Gov. Ronald Reagan. former Texas Gov. John Connally and Vice President Nelson Rockefeller to discuss a new party

chairman. The 1964 Republican presidential nominee said he was upset with the discourtsey

Goldwater said his defeat in 1964 triggered the idea of consultation among top party leaders.

"I saw Ford after his defeat and he asked me what I thought about resuming those conferences." Goldwater said. "I told him I thought it was a heck of a good idea, and that was the last word I heard out of him."

Goldwater said it was insulting to a former presidential nominee to be excluded when party leadership is discussed He noted that Connally has

never been nominated for office



Crude Could Move In Four States

ALBUOUERQUE (AP)- State **Energy Administrator John** O'Leary says that presently, New Mexico can see only benefits from a plan to transport Alaskan crude oil by a pipeline through four states.

Sohio Transportation Co. is proposing to move 700,000 barrels of crude oil by tanker from Valdez, Alaska, to Long Beach, Calif., then over a 1,026-Beach to refineries in Midland, Tex.

O'Leary, spekaing Wednesday at a Bureau of Land Management hearing, said the plan was the most economically feasible and environmentally safe method, with potential environmental problems confined largely to California.

O'Leary also noted Sohio is offering to divert up to \$0,000 barrels of oil a day from the pipeline to New Mexico, when and if an oil refinery is built in the state.

Board has asked a private firm to conduct a study on a possible plan.

Depression is only a symptom By Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D."

DEAR DR. LAMB - Your column on depression remind-ed me of my late mother who died in 1950. She had been to many doctors. My father, at a calculated risk, undermined her confidence in the diagnostic ability of her own doctor. Her doctors all prescribed "rest and relax-ation." Many months passed while she experienced symptoms of fatigue like the lady you wrote about. In about two weeks Dad's doctor made his diagnosis and a biopsy confirmed Hodgkin's disease. Based on this I would take

issue with your statement that if the lady had already had several examinations, it was unlikely she had a disease but rather a depression. Mom's doctors did not pick up her dis-

DEAR READER - Most people think their doctor is great but are not so sure about those other doctors. Diagnoses are missed. Even with all the best tools of modern medicine at hand the diagnosis is not always easy. Your mother's case of Hodgkin's disease may have finally progressed to the point that swollen glands were large enough to be felt or seen on an X ray, thereby making it easier to make a diagnosis. Time permits a disease to become more evident. A fever of unknown origin may be easily explained after a typical rash develops. Quite frankly, medicine is not as easy in some cases as TV shows might lead one to believe.

You may be interested in how many letters I received similar to yours. Each letter writer was sure I was wrong about the lady having a depression and each made his or her own diagnosis. These included Hodgkin's disease, myasthenia gravis, tuber-culosis, kidney disease, disseminated lupus erythematosis (a rare disease), liver disease. emphysema and several others. Now all of these can't be right/ What does this mean? It means that chronic fatigue is a symptom, not a

DEAR DR. LAMB - My usband and I are each 50 years old. He is on a low cholesterol diet which I also use. Now we are both anemic. My question is how can we both get 18 milligrams of iron daily when the greatest emphysema. DEAR READER - There are five milligrams of iron in one cup of cooked mature bean seeds and four milligrams in a cup of cooked spinach. Neither contains cholesterol. Cook in iron pots and skillets. You'll get some iron from them. Finally, I don't see why peo-

ple with special con-siderations for their diet, as your husband has, need worry so much about getting all the vitamins and minerals they need from food intake. There is nothing wrong with taking one of the standard daily vitamin tablets with iron that you can get at the grocery store. Check the label and you'll find that those with iron usually contain 18 milligrams of iron. That could certainly make life easier for you.

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
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

LAREDO, Tex. (AP)- An demic of rabies in dogs exists in the Laredo area and the long incubation period of the disease ndicates it will spread further, a danger. local health department administrator says. Jose L. Gonzalez of the

Laredo-Webb County Health Department said Wednesday, We have had 20 rabies cases in dogs confirmed since Nov. 24. Certainly 20 cases is an epidemic. Because of the nature of this disease- the incubation period of 20-60 days- the tremendous possibility of secondary infection means we are going to be facing quite a lot more cases before this thing is through."

The federal Center for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta says the Mexican border, where Laredo is located. is practically the only area of the United States where rabies in dogs has not been eliminated.

Gonzalez said the 20 rabid order by police to "shoot to kill" any dog acting suspiciously. only two of the rabid animals were shot by police.

Rabies in humans mean almost certain death for the victim. The CDC says there are only two documented survivals by humans who have contracted the disease before a painful series of shots could be started. In Laredo, seven persons, including two children under 10 10, have been bitten by rabid dogs and 14 other persons have been exposed. All are either finished with treatment or are

taking it now. Most cases in the dogs are dumb rabies," meaning they usually don't bite, but are drooling all the time. This saliva has the virus in it and since the dogs give the appearance of choking on something, many owners put their hands in the

dog's mouth to help it and are exposed to the disease.

"The biggest news here is the fact that we have rabies at all," said Gonzalez. "This is the first case in 29 years. But we are very concerned, since we haven't reached a peak vet." Gonzalez said a mass


