### **PMA** Chief Explains Grain Sorghum Loan

The grain sorghum loan pro-gram is not the same as the price header at the local park. gram is not the same as the price support program, even though the price guarantee for both is \$2.28 a hundred," said Faust Collier, Production and Market-ling head, emphasizing the fact that farmers must put their grain in storage that meets federal specifications before they

er that the government will buy. League honors. by May 1, 1949, grain sorghums the farmer has on hand at a price based on \$2.28 per hundred

with grade and weight deductions in accordance with the quality of the grain.

To participate in this Purchase program the farmer will not be required to do anything but declare the amount of grain he has on hand to the P. M. A. office. On May 1, he may sell quantities under this contract, but he cannot sell more than he has previously declared to the PMA. Care of the grain is his own responsibility.

In contrast, says Cellier, to be eligible for the grain sorghums loan, the farmer must put his row crop in commercial elevators or in farm storage that is up to certain requirements.

A slight increase in the county tax rate was made by the commissioners court Monday when the 1948 levy was set at 88 cents per \$100 valuation. Common school district tax, also set by the court, ranges from \$1 to \$1.50.

Good news for tax payers to offset the slight hike in the county rate, is that state taxes this year will be only 42 cents per \$100 property valuation, a decrease of 30 cents from the 1947.
