Shows Bring Mixed Reviews from Residents, Manager Managing Editor

A Supreme Court justice, asked what is pornography, hesitated for a moment, then answered. "I know when I see it."

That may be the best way to define one of the most controversial issues in the country -pornography, a subject that has raised quite a furor in Hereford lately even though most city and Deaf Smith County officials consider the city to be relatively clean.

It is difficult to define. Federal courts haven't been able to define it-their role has been to decide whether state laws and definitions are violations of the First

Some Hereford folks have decided that the X-rated movies at the Tower Drive-In west of the city of pornographic-obscene under state definitions-and should not be shown.

Thomas Albracht, a locomotive engineer with Holly Sugar and the local president of the national anti-porno group Citizens for Decency through Law, is leading the fight against the drive-in. which regularly advertises three types of movies Spanish shows, regular shows and X-rated shows.

"It will be our process to do whatever we can in the law to bring the showing of these movies (X's) to an end in our community." said Albracht, who has

urged city commissioners to adopt an ordinance restricting so-called pornography in the community.

The drive-in is located outside the city so an ordinance would not govern the showing of movies as it might the sale of magazines which depict nude bodies And since county law cannot supercede state law, Albracht knows that preventing the showing of the X's is a doubtful proposition.

We have a definite problem with the movies being shown at the drive-in...l wish they wouldn't show these kinds of

Bob Ostercamp, manager of the Tower and the downtown Star Theatre, which

does not show X's, says the movies in question at the drive-in are not the hard-core variety

They're not the hard-core, commercial X's. There's nothing really damaging in them," said Ostercamp, adding that the Tower won't show X-rated movies for a few months beginning Oct. 1.

"The reason we do away with the movies in the winter is for lack of a product. The film companies aren't producing many decent X pictures

"So we hold off for a awhile and between the time we shut down and open up again and there'll be some more good quality X's made.

The Tower will remain open Friday through Sunday after Oct. 1 but will show movies only rated as high as R (restricted)

Ostercamp added that minors are not permitted to view the drive-in movies rated X, despite the fact there have been allegations concerning young people being admitted.

"Our employes lose their job if they let somebody in under age. There aren't any minors out there."

The allegations still may prompt an investigation by the Deaf Smith County district attorney's office.

"I've heard reports that there were

violates state law." DA Andy Shuval said. "It can cause the manager, owner and operator to be filed on with a possible jail sentence.

"It's also come to the attention of our department about the nature of these movies. We plan to make an investigation as to whether it is hard or soft pornography

Sheriff Travis McPherson said the movies seem to show simulated sex-which would make them the soft variety-and there have been no minors on the premises during three searches by his office.

Anita Moves from Gulf Coast into Mexico

Gun Found, Might Not Be Evidence

AMARILLO, Tex. (AP) - Dist. Atty. Iim Curry said today a gun has been found but has not and may not be connected to the Cullen Davis capital murder case

Curry, chief prosecutor in the Daivs capital murder trial here, confirmed rumors circulating overnight that a mystery pistol has surfaced in the case.

Investigators reported never finding the weapon used in the so-called mansion muiders of iasi year: Curry said there was nothing at this

point to connect the gun with the shootings but said he had advised the defense of the discovery. 'I doubt if anything will come of it. Curry told newsmen, adding that he was

bound by rules of the court from telling when and where the weapon was found. Defense attorneys today were prepared to zero back in on Priscilla Davis, after describing her Thursday as "scheming... greedy and devious.

Mrs Davis, meanwhile primed for round number ten today, said in an unsolicited remark to the defense Thursday that her estranged husband once called his stepdaughter Andrea 'stupid' and 'kicked at her.

Davis is accused of killing the 12-year-old girl last summer in a grim prelude to a midnight ambush of Mrs. Davis and her boyfriend Stan Farr, 30

Mrs. Davis, 36, was critically wounded and Farr was slain in the shooting spree at the \$6 million "dream house" Davis built for his wife during less turbulent

In her two weeks of testimony, the blonde socialite has repeatedly named Davis as the "man in black" who shot her in the chest and gunned down Farr.

Thursday's session was unusually volatile as defense lawyer Richard 'Racehorse' Havnes questioned Mrs. Davis about a telephone conversation hetween her estranged husband and Andrea in the spring of 1974.

She testified that Davis, angry and cursing, banished Andrea from his mansion, ordered her not to return and told her to send back everything he had ever given her.

At the time. Andrea lived with her father Jack Wilborn, Mrs. Davis's second husband

Havnes suggested Mrs Davis attributed profanity to her husband that she somehow neglected to mention in a statement given Asst. Dist. Atty. Joe Shannon about the incident.

You didn't tell Mr. Shannon about the obscenities. .. Haynes began.

Mrs. Davis interrupted: "I also didn't tell him about Davis calling her stupid and ticking at her

TAMPICO, Mex. (AP) · Hurricane Anita, a mighty display of nature's raw power, moved ashore early today with 155 mile-per-hour winds over a sparesly populated area about 100 miles north of this port city, but then spent itself rapidly

Anita moves west-southwest into Mexico and by midmorning, Anita's winds had diminished to less than 100 mph, dumping several inches of rain over the farming communities in its path. Mexican authorities said there were no

reports of casualties. We haven't had anything we can't

handle," said Mario Flores, director of public safety for the state of Tamaulipas. Electric power was cut off in Soto La Marina, the town directly in the hurricane's path as it came ashore at about 5 a.m. rushing in at 12 miles per

Soto La Marine and La Pesca, both on the edge of the Laguna Madre, had most of their residents evacuated by the Army early Thursday ahead of torrential rains and vicious winds

People are more afraid of the wind than the water." Flores said.

Mayor Leonel Tavares said the drought of recent months would help keep floods

Anita, the first hurricane of the seasons first had aimed its punch at the lower. Texas coast, but veered south Thursday morning and drifted into northeastern

Mexico as South Texas sighed with relief. In Matamoros, across from Brownsville at the tip of Texas, nearly 8,000 people were taken to shelters. Officials said today most of them were returning to their homes and there appeared to be little danger of flooding.

"We were very, very lucky," said Brownsville meteorologist Al Dreumont, "torrential rains and excessive winds missed us by only 25 miles."

The National Weather Service said that the primary concern was a serious threat of flash floodings in northeastern Mexico as rains of more than 8 inches fell in the La Pesca, a tiny coastal fishing village,

and Soto la Marina bore the brunt of Hurricane Ella in 1970.

Brownsville, some 100 miles to the north, recorded winds of 45 mph and

The leading edge of the storm dumped torrential rains along about 200 miles of the Mexican coast. Water covered some Tampico streets and the highways north of Tampico and Cludad Victoria were reportedly flooded.

"This is sparsely populated area, but some communities are so isolated, that it is possible they may not have heard warnings and may not have a chance to get out," said Al Druemont, Weather Service chief meteorogist in Brownsville. "If a storm of this intensity hit an

Athiests File Suit Over US Currency

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Three Texas atheists claim their constitutional rights are violated every time they handle money.

Madalyn Murray O'Hair and her two sons filed suit in federal court Thursday asking that the slogan "In God We Trust" be dropped from U.S. currency.

The suit cited the 1963 U.S. Supreme Court decision in Murray v. Curlett that outlawed official prayers in schools. The Murray in that case was William Murray, Mrs. O'Hair's

The other son is Jon Murray.

The suit filed Thursday in U.S. District Court here names Michael Blumenthal, secretary of the treasury. and James A. Conlon, director of engraving and printing, as defen-

"Plaintiffs are forced to handle and display with regularity currency and

coin which is imprinted by defendants with a religious motto, 'In God We Trust,' with which plaintiffs disagree," the petition states.

"This inscription on the currency and coin compels plaintiffs to subscribe to and affirm a belief which is antithetical to plaintiffs' most deeply held convictions and represents an abridgement of their rights under the free clause of the First Amendment.

"Plaintiffs must pay their financial obligations on a daily basis with United States currency and coin.

"This compelled dissemination of religious symbolism by plaintiffs through their regular and unavoidable handling of currency and coin so imprinted deprives plaintiffs of their right to disaffirm the motto in contravention of the First Amendment right to free speech," the petition

Texans Called 'Lucky', Leave Shelters

BROWNSVILLE. Tex. (AP) - South Texans slowly trickled out of shelters and sighed with relief today after escaping serious damage by Hurricane Anita.

Anita, a mighty display of nature's raw power, slammed into the northeastern coast of Mexico early today hitting a sparsely populated area after deviating south from a route that originally had placed it on a collision course with the lower Texas coast

Nearly 10,000 persons took refuge in shelters in Brownsville and other Rio Grande Valley towns.

All but about 40 of the 3,000 residents of Port Isabel, near the tip of Texas,

evacuated the town. Among the hardy souls were some eager fishermen who said they were waiting for things to settle down so they could take advantage of the good fishing conditions created by the

Late Thursday night winds of up to 60 miles per hour lashed Port Isabel and South Padre Island, a resort area of nearly 4,000 that had been evacuated by noon Thursday

Today the sun came up over a rosy Gulf of Mexico horizon off South Padre. A newsman on the scene said that early in the morning palm fronds and some aluminum roofing could be seen on the

sand and some high waves were still rolling deep into the shore near the abandoned hotels and residences.

Electrical power stayed on all night and street and home lights were left on in the naked town which was still enveloped by a sand storm at 2 a.m.

Authorities did not allow residents to return immediately at daybreak. The only entrance to the island is through the Queen Isabella Causeway

which connects it with Port Isabel. Some rain was reported along the lower coast and there was the possibility of some flooding, but the danger of serious damage appeared to be over as Anita spent itself over the Mexican mountains. Small craft warnings, however, were still in effect for the lower coast.

"We were very, very lucky," said Brownsville meteorologist Al Druemont as he watched Anita on the radar screen veer into Mexico.

"Torrential rains and excessive winds missed us by only 25 miles," he said.

From Corpus Christi to Brownsville. Texans were primed for Anita's onslaught. Homes were boarded up. low-lying areas, including Port Isabel and South Padre Island, were evacuated and emergency personnel were on standby.

South Padre Island, a glistening strip

of sand covered with about \$60 million in new resort construction, was evacuated early Thursday in the face of tides more than five feet above normal. At one point, it was directly in the storm's path.

The town has a city ordinance requiring evacuation in the face of hurricane danger.

Low-lying portions of the coast near Baytown were evacuated Wednesday.

"Considering the 155-mile-an-hour winds that were within a hundred miles of us, we have been extremely lucky," said Brownsville city official Gene Fernandez, who said the only real damage was to a

Damage to Crops Minor in Hurricane

AUSTIN, Tex (AP) Preliminary reports show that Hurricane Anita caused only minimal damage to crops in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, State Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown said today

Brown said, however, heavy rains could reduce production from the second picking of cotton. The first picking had been completed when Anita hit Mexico. touching off rains in the Texas valley.

"Heavy rainfall in Willacs and Cameron counties could damage some grain sorghum, which has mostly been harvested but is piled on the ground in some areas." Brown added in a

'Most of the fall vegetable crop has been planted," he said, "and could be affected by standing water. Indications are that winds were not strong enough to damage curus trees or front

Rhodesia's Smith Claims Plan 'Crazy'

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP) - Prime Minister Ian Smith termed key provisions in the British-American peace plan for Rhodesia "crazy suggestions" today but did not reject the proposal yet.

'It seems to me that the plan is not only ill conceived, it is rushed," Smith told a news conference. He accused Britain of "seeking revenge" for his declaration of independence in 1965.

The 8,000-word blueprint for ending Rhodesia's five-year guerrilla war and transferring power to the black majority next year was presented to Smith Thursday by Ambassador Andrew Young and British Foreign Secretary

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) A Panhandle man told the Water Resources Board at its first meeting Thursday there will be violence over the issue of cloudseeding to suppress hail.

Earl Cosby of Tulia, in-Swisher County, said he served in the air corps in Europe in World War II and he knowns the seeding is being done outside authorized limits.

"I'm telling you there's going to be violence over this by somebody." Cosby said, his voice shaking.

Cosby said he personally opposed violence. He pleaded with the board to take another look at the whole program.

In Swisher County, the vote in a recent election on the issue was 98.22 per cent against seeding, he said.

McClure's Nephew Also in Marines

CAMP PENDELTON. Calif. (AP) - Another Texan named Pvt. McClure is going through Marine basic training at a seaside base where the death of his uncle after training exercise caused the Marine Corps to tighten its enlistment policies.

But William McClure Jr. doesn't like to talk about the Decembr 1975 incident that led to his uncle's death four months later at a veterans Administration hospital in Houston.

Pvt. Lvnn E. McClure asked for trouble, the 18-year-old nephew suggested in a recent interview at the nation's largest Marine base.

He "wasn't mentally unbalanced, but he was slow at doing things. If he didn't have to do it, he didn't want to do it."

Lynn McClure, 22, of Lufkin, Tex., was injured during a drill using pugil sticks, padded sticks used to teach close combat. He lapsed into a coma, never regained consciousness and died four months later.

Marine enlistment policies were later tightened after it was disclosed that McClure was an abnormally slow learner who had a record of minor police scrapes before he signed up.

Marine officials were ordered to closely check drill sergeants and to report any abuses. Three drill sergeants and three other officers who supervised McClure's unit were court-martialed or reprimanded and a colonel was reassigned.

A \$21 million wrongful death suit filed by McClure's family was dismissed last May when a federal court in nearby San Diego ruled that the federal government was immune from prosecution

William McClure said he met his uncle 10 years ago during a visit to his older brother's home. William said he "didn't get along" with his uncle and saw

him only occasionally in the vears since.

His uncle's death had nothing to do with his decision to enlist, said William, a dark-haired,

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Labor Department Checking **Abuses in Job Programs**

By The Associated Press

The Labor Department is looking into charges of abuse in a federally financed job program three cities after ordering Chicago to repay nearly \$1 million allegedly used for political hiring.

Announcing the start of a nationwide crackdown, Labor Secretary Ray Marshall said Wednesday that an investigation found Chicago used a 'political referral system' to fill jobs intended for the long-term unemployed and financed under the federal Comprehensive Employment Training Act.

Under the CETA program, the government is paying states and cities \$5.5 billion to put 725,000 unemployed persons in public service jobs. The program is intended to create new jobs to ease unemployment and requires applicants to have been unemployed for a minimum of 15 weeks.







Work Break Can Lessen Stress

NEW YORK (AP) - A walk around the block; time out for meditating or reading; lunch hour exercise at a health spa. These are some of the ways business professionals find relief from job stress, reports a registered nurse in the occupational health field.

Interviews conducted by Dawn D. Kinsler, health administrator of Texas Commerce Bank, Houston, revealed individual workers' personal habits played a major role in creating stress, she says. Among them:

poor dietary habits, elimination of daily breaks from work routine and skipping breakfast or Ms. Kinsler, writing in "Oc-

cupational Health Nursing," official publication of the American Association of Occupational Health Nurses, suggests a number of ways to reduce excessive work stress.

These include understanding organization objectives, having ready access to superiors, starting a task with adequate facilities and supplies, maintenance of maximum organization and efficiency, a positive attitude toward success of an endeavor, being assertive rather than aggressive and not

relying on others for positive self-affirmation. Weekends with proper rest and good nourishment, leisure time spent with entertainment. sporting events, exercise programs and generally "doing your own thing" were advo-





Harris, Rodgers Elevate Chargers

LOS ANGELES (AP) - James Harris was bitter despite his earnest efforts to hide his feelings. As the first black quarterback to gain and hold regular status in the National Football League, he felt the Los Angeles Rams were wrong to demote him late in 1976.

He wasn't unhappy when the Rams traded him to the San Diego Chargers, and he set about earning a starting job

On Thursday night, the Chargers invaded the Rams' Coliseum home field, where Harris had been introduced for three seasons.

Even as a Charger, he was cheered on introduction and he thought, "That's one of the great cheers I've had."

The 30-year-old Harris responded with two touchdown passes in the first quarter - one going nine yards to Chuck Bradley and the second seven yards to Johnny Rodgers.

The Chargers won, 26-25, at the final gun, thanks not only to Harris but to a stellar performance by Rodgers. After four seasons in the

Canadian league, the Heisman Trophy winner from Nebraska came back to the National Football League and the coaches, fans and players are equally impressed.

"That Rodgers is unbelievable," declared Harris. "That one catch he made, I don't see how anybody could have made

on a play starting at the Rams' 34. Rodgers made a diving catch at the 20, retained his balance and went in for the touchdown.

Then in the final minute, it having come in the second was Rodgers who hauled in a 16-yard pass from Harris that gave the Chargers the ball at the three and set the situation for Tony Fritsch's 22-yard field goal just at the gun.


