### In Cullen Davis Trial

## Prosecution Calls 6th Witness

AMARILLO (AP) - With blood oozing from a bullet wound. Priscilla Davis lay on a stretcher in the early morning hours of Aug. 3, 1976, and told an ambulance

'My husband's in a black wig. He's killing my kids and everyone else. He's gone crazy. Please, let's get out of here. He's going to get me."

Such was the testimony Wednesday of Thomas Southall, 24, as he recounted the chilling aftermath of a shooting spree last summer at the \$6 million Fort Worth

mansion of industrialist Cullen Davis. Southall first told his story with jurors out of earshot, but later provided the panel a less dramatic account as Davis' capital murder trial moved deeper into its third week.

Southall returned today as the state's sixth witness in the prosecution of his stepdaughter Andrea Wilborn, 12, one of two killed in the savage attack.

The shootings stunned Fort Worth's loftiest social and financial elite and left Mrs. Davis critically wounded and her lover. Stan Farr, dead.

A chance visitor, Gus Gavrell, 22, was also severely wounded. Southall, now a Fort Worth beer route

salesman, told Wednesday of arriving at 12:56 a.m. at the residence where Mrs. Davis fled that night, and how she approached him and said. "I've been

He said he asked her who did it, and she replied. "My husband...Cullen

Southall said she was frightened. excited and bleeding and that when a car passed his parked ambulance, she said. Please, let's get out of here. He's going to come get me.

Southall, who helped remove Andrea's body from the mansion basement, identified the photo of the child lying on a bloody floor, her eyes open, her skirt up over her thighs and the fatal chest wound clearly visible

With the jury retired for the day. Mrs. Davis returned to the witness stand to respond for the record to defense questions left unanswered during her 11 days of previous testimony.

Moments after taking her seat, she spotted the picture of Andrea, which inadvertantly had been left lying exposed among several other exhibits.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) - A jury was deliberating charges today against Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. in a \$29 million damage suit filed against it by a fired executive and the family of another former Bell official who committed suicide.

The suit by James Ashley and the family of T.O. Gravitt went to the 10-man, two-women panel in state district court Wednesday afternoon following four weeks of testimony and four hours of final arguments by lawyers on both sides.

Deliberation of the case began at 9 a.m. today

Gravitt was the top Bell official in Texas when he killed himself at his Dallas home Oct. 17, 1974. Ashley was a \$55,000-a-year Bell executive in San Antonio when he was fired two weeks later, ending a 23-year career with the telephone company.

The suit, filed in November 1974. alleged that an improper internal company investigation by Southwestern Bell hounded Gravitt to his death and led to Ashley's wrongful dismissal.

The telephone company said it began its probe in late summer 1974 after rumors of sexual misconduct among San Antonio-area Bell employes reached corporate officials in the St. Louis headquarters.

Pat Maloney, the plaintiffs' lawyer, urged the jury to find Bell guilty of the allegations in the suit and "join a mighty crusade asking for social reform" of the giant utility

He said the investigation was designed to drive Ashley and Gravitt out of the Bell power structure because they became critical of certain company policies they considered unfair to consumers. He said these included unfair rate-making tactics. operation of a political "slush fund" and

extravagant wastes of company money. But Bell lawyer Hubert Green said Ashley and Gravitt "did themselves in" by the actions which led the company to investigate rumors of misconduct.

He said there were two Gravitts, one who was a chamber of commerce president and the other who was sexually promiscuous with female subordinate Bell employes.

Green reviewed the testimony of various women Bell employes who said they felt compelled to have sex with Ashley to get promotions.

"What we have are two people who were caught. That's what's so tragic," Green said. He said neither Ashley or

Gravitt ever complained of company policies "until they felt the heat" of the investigation in 1974. And, Green said every time the

plaintiffs talked about some alleged wrongdoing by the telephone company, they were at the bottom of it." Judge Peter Michael Curry gave the

jury final instructions and a list of 35 questions they had to answer before returning with their verdict.

Most of the questions dealt with whether Southwestern Bell or its corporate parents, American Telephone & Telegraph, slandered Ashley and Gravitt and whether the investigation was malicious. Jurors also had to decide the amount of damages, if any, to be awarded.

Gravitt left behind a suicide note in which he said, "Watergate is a gnat compared to the Bell system."

Generall, Maloney did not discuss And Maloney told the jury: "The truth is Watergate really is a gnat compared to Bell system

Generally. Maloney did not discuss much evidence in the case, and instead directed the jury to consider what 'magnificent people' the plaintiffs were.

"They have lost the personal dignity it took them all their lives to build up." he said referring to alleged damages caused by the Bell investigation.

And, Maloney blasted the telephone company as a corporate monster which believed it could control anyone with its

"They got the wrong guy. He wouldn't run. He stood and told the truth about them. It's a story that had to be told, a hill that had to be climbed." he said.

Maloney also said Bell had never fired any other employes who were supposedly involved in sexual activities with other employes. And, he said Ashley was the only executive at his level ever fired by

Jack Hebdon, another Bell lawyer, said Ashley and Gravitt were held in high esteem by their superiors in the telephone company until the investigat-

"They were in trouble with their subordinates. Little people will take it and put up with it just so long. Finally, they were heard from. Finally, the little people had enough" of the abuses by Ashley and Gravitt," Hebdon said.

## Weather Modification Terminated by Board

AUSTIN .. State Rep. Bill Clayton Wednesday told the Brand he has been informed by the Texas Department of Water Resources of the immediate termination of permits for weather modification operations in target areas of Atmospherics, Inc., and Plains Weather Improvement Association.

The cancellation of permits is the result of elections held in the permit areas. The election ballots were tabulated by the Department of Water Resources and the results finalized Wednesday.

Clayton said the election results are the finalization of the controversy which has

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Carter administration has Latin American backing for the new Panama Canal treaty. but the support of the American people and Congress is still in doubt

After the colorful treaty-signing ceremony, attended by 27 visiting leaders, the spotlight is focusing on opponents of the pact.

Iwo long-time foes of relinquishing control of the waterway planned to argue their case today before the Senate Judiciary subcommittee on separation of nowers: former California Gov. Ronald Reagan and Rep. Daniel Flood, D.Pa.

With public opinion polls showing only minority support for the treaty. Carter faces an uphill fight in his bid to convince two-thirds of the Senate that the accord is

in the national interest.

American officials say the President is expected to use three main arguments in his campaign for the treaty.

He is expected to stress the international support the treaty enjoys, a point amply demonstrated Wednesday

The 27 foreign leaders at the Organization of American States headquarters to watch Carter and Panamanian head of government Omar Torrijos mark the formal end of 13 years of negotiation with the signing.

The officials said Carter will also seek support by campaigning against the present treaty, which dates from the turn of the century.

He told the OAS gathering, "That

treaty, drafted in a world so different from ours, has become an obstacle to better relations with Latin America."

At a White House dinner for the visiting hemispheric dignitaries after the OAS ceremony. Carter noted that no Panamanian had read the 1903 treaty before it was signed.

The third point Carter will use in the coming weeks focuses on the provision in the treats guaranteeing the United States the right to ensure canal neutrality even after Panama assumes control of the waterway at the end of this century.

Carter said the treaty marks "the commitment of the United States to the belief that fairness, not force, should lie at the heart of dealings with the nations

Torrijos said that while the old treaty was a "technical conquest." it also was a "colornial conquest."

WASHINGTON (AP) - Americans at some future time may have to work beyond age 65 to qualify for full Social Security Denefits, if some serious students of the system have their way. The mere mention of this possibility recently provoked an approar, even though there is no pending legislation and no proposal by President Carter's administration for such a change. Congress is now working on a more pressing problem: how to seep the system's reserves from running out in about five years.

There is no real prospect that Congress will permit such an putcome, which would mean cutting off or reducing benefits. Actual drafting of legislation to refinance Social Security is

scheduled to begin in a House subcommittee Sept. 12. However, while that subcomittee and the corresponding Senate panel were conducting hearings on Carter's proposals to provide Social Security funds, they recieved testimony on a wide wariety of future threats and present inconsistencies in the huge system that collects taxes from more than nine out of ten U.S.

She replied she had made no porposal, the administration was considering none and so there was nothing to withdraw. But, she added, she thinks the possibility may have to be examined in the

Some nongovernmental witnesses did make such proposals to the committees. A typical one was to add one year to the standard retirement age in 1985 and two more at five-year intervals, bringing the age to 68. Persons still would be able to retire at 65, but with reduced

benefit, just as they now may retire at 62, but with a 20 per cent reduction A long-standing complaint about the treatment of women

under Social Security stems from its provisions affecting a dependent spouse - usually the wife - who nevertheless has worked and paid the payroll tax. When she retires, she receives either the benefit earned by

her contributions or half the amount of her husband's benefit. whichever is greater, but not both. Accordingly, in most cases, she is no better off than if she had never worked and never paid the payroll tax, since a nonworking wife is entitled to half the amount of a husband's benefit when they both retire.

This and other provisions relating to women reflect 1930's views that a standard family consisted of a working husband and a nonworking wife caring for children.

But the committees heard testimony that this description now fits only 16 per cent of American families, that recent statistics show 54 per cent of all working age women are in the labor force. including 44 per cent of married women and 29 per cent of women with children under six.

Supreme Court decisions during the past year force some change. The law provided that a wife was automatically a dependent, but a husband was not entitled to corresponding

proved he actually depended on her economically. The court held this distinction unconstitutional

The decision was estimated to affect 520,000 men at a cost to Social Security of \$515 million. Among other things, it requires payment of dependent or widower benefits to some men who had actually been the nain support of the family, if their employment for example, by the federal government - were outside Social Security coverage.

In response, the administration has proposed establishing a dependency test applicable to both husbands and wives. The dependent would be the member of the couple who had less than half its total income in the three years prior to retirement. disability or death. In most cases, this would be the wife.

Other provisions cited as unfair to women include the requirement that a divorced woman receives benefits on her former husband's earnings only if the marriage lasted at least 20 years; that a nonworking wife gets no benefits until her husband retires, even if he continues working after 65 and even if she is older than he: that a widow can draw no benefits during the years after her children are grown and before she reaches 60.

Some have suggested that a couple's income be split evenly. without regard to the proportion each earned, and that separate Social Security accounts be set up for each; that Social Security somehow recognize the economic value of a housewife's services; that women be given a preference in computing the average wage base for benefits because their working careers are predictably interupted by child-bearing and rearing.

Under present law, persons who retire under Social Security lose benefits if they earn more than a specified amount, although they may have any amount of investment or other unearned income without undergoing such a reduction.

This provision is perennially under attack in Congress. More than 200 members have sponsored legislation to liberlize or eliminate the so-called "retirement test.

But its defenders say the provision is consistent with Social Security's purpose: to insure against inability to work, and that one who does work should expect reduced or eliminated benefits. They also say that eliminating the retirement test would cost Social Security \$6 billion to \$7 billion annually and that this

money would be better spent improving benefits to those

needing them most.

The amount of permissible earnings is adjusted annually. This year it is \$3,000 and the 1978 figure is estimated at \$3,240. Above the official level, each \$2 of earnings means a \$1 reduction in the monthly benefit. Besides outright elimination of the retirement test, there are

proposals to increase the exempt amount of earnings, reduce the exemption age and liberalize the benefit reduction ratio. The scale of benefits is weighted in favor of lower-paid

workers. Under present law, a worker who received the minimum wage qualifies on retirement for a benefit estimated to equal about 65 per cent replacement of his earnings. A worker earning the maximum taxable amount has only about 33 per cent replaced and one earning more than that an even fower

The minimum Social Security benefit for a 65-year-old retiree this year is \$114.30 a month, while the maximum is \$437.10. A worker can qualify for the minimum by earning as little as \$50 a calender quarter for 61/2 years.

One result is that by a little moonlighting in private employment, a well-paid government employe with Civil Service retirement rights can qualify for a second retirement payment from Social Security. Although the system at its inception was designed to care only

for workers, it has expanded to provide benefits for wives, surviving spouses, deceased workers' children through college age, dependent parents and dependent grandchildren.

Some of those who emphasize what they call the welfare aspects of the system say this would justify some use of general funds. Regular federal welfare programs are so funded. One drastic suggestion was to restructure the system into two

layers: a basic subsistence payment paid at least in part from general funds and a supplementary payment tied directly to working life contributions plans. About 9 million workers, less than 10 per cent of the total, are

still not covered by Social Security. Federal government employes are the largest single uncovered group. Civil Service and other governmental retirement systems

operate on different principles, with different contribution scales and benefit computations, from those of Social Security. There have been proposals for merging the various

government-operated retirement plans into Social Security to create one compatible, better-financed system.

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

## Vapor Barrier Needed

COLLEGE STATION .- The energy efficient foam insulation board that is currently being installed in new homes presents a potentially serious problem, says an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

When foam insulation board is tightly installed on the exterior of a wall, moisture vapor may be trapped, resulting in condensation." points out Dr. Bill Stewart. Cold weather Hereford State Bank Friendship causes water vapor within a Veleda Study Club, home of exterior walls from the warm indoor temperatures to the

cooler outdoor temperatures. 'The problem arises when Hereford Music Study Club. too much water vapor passes Federation luncheon at Caison's through the inside wall finish. becomes trapped, and condenses on the cold exterior 4-H Teen Leaders at materials such as the foam Rotary Club, Civic Club board. The result is wet insulation and framing and Odd Fellows Lodge, IOOF musty odors. Over a prolonged period, wood rot develops," says Stewart.

Condensation problems become severe when outdoor temperatures drop to 35 degrees F. or lower for extended periods. Moisture vapor movement into the wall cavity can be restricted by proper installation of a vapor barrier near the inside surface of all exterior walls. Polyethylene film is an excellent vapor barrier when installed with no openings through it. This requires all lapped joints to be made over framing and openings for electrical outlets to be sealed. Foil-backed gypsum board is also a good vapor barrier if the joints are all made over framing.

## Select Certain Plants For Autumn Landscape

COLLEGE STATION-Have ou noticed the fall wardrobe of many of the woody trees and hrubs? As you drive through the countryside, observe the many attractive colors and consider some of these plants for your own landscape for fall and winter effects, suggests a landscape horticulturist.

"Some plant species have colorful foliage while others are ted for their attractive fruit, eresting seed pods, or sual bark characteristics," pints out Everett Janne with he Texas Agricultural Extenn Service.

Some of the most brilliant lage colors are provided by such species as sweet gum. Chinese tallow, black gum, dogwood, crapemyrtle, maple, Shumard oak, Texas oak, Callery pear and Chinese pistachio.

Shrubs having attractive fall for include winged euonymus. oneaster, mahonia, nandina, me viburnums and sumacs, which have the most brilliant foliage of all.

Plants noted for their colorful berries or fruit include yaupon, deciduous holly or possum haw. American beauty berry, pyracantha, hollies of all types, coralberry and cotoneaster. Dual purpose trees that have interesting fruit that is also edible include Japanese persimmon and crabapple.

Some plants such as the goldenrain tree, screwbean mesquite and redwing have interesting seedpods." notes the Extension Service specialist.

Janne also suggests selecting a few plants with colorful or interesting bark to boost the

## Cornmeal Adds Variety To Nutritional Menu

COLLEGE STATION -- Cornmeal brings variety--and historcal distinction -- to modern

The corn family dates back to the beginning of our countryand cornmeal has kept pace with changing food trends ever since, says Gwendolyne Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Friendly Indians taught New World settlers to grow corn, and. later to grind in into meal. The settlers learned to parch corn, and mix it with boiling water to bake into thin cakes. Hunters and traders depended on these cakes during their long journeys over Indian trails-hence the name "Journey Cake," latter called "Johnny Cake," she explains.

Hoe Cake and Corn Pone were the first simple forms of cornbread in the South. Spoon bread evolved when an old-time Virginia cook put a dish of cornmeal mush in the oven in the home of James Monroe, then president.

Today, there are about as many types of combread as there are regions in the country.

Cornmeal is ground by two general methods. It is "waterground" or "rock-ground" between two large rocks or mill stones. This method was used in early days when "meal" was

Meal ground between steel cylinders or rollers is called roller-ground." This types usually feels like fine crystals because it is finely cut rather than mashed.

Bolted meal is whole grain with some or all of the coarse layers of bran blown, or sifted, out. This makes it lighter in

Self-rising cornmeal contains baking powder and salt--already added and blended in the correct proporations.

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## Lance's Loans Not Questioned

WASHINGTON (AP) - The omptroller of the currency said Wednesday he found no reason to prosecute Budget Director Bert Lance or anyone else for several of Lance's private loans and overdrafts but questioned some of the banking practices involved.

The new report was on two of the lesser issues in the controversy over Lance's banking transactions. The comptroler is still preparing a report on Lance's use of bank aircraft and on the comptroller office's original investigation of Lance.

In his new report, Comptroller John Heimann traced a pattern of loans to Mr. and Mrs. Lance from the Fulton National Bank of Atlanta while Lance was president of the Calhoun, Ga., First National Bank.

As in some of Lance's other loans, the Calhoun bank had a "correspondent relationship" with the Fulton bank. This means the Calhoun bank deposited money without interest at the Fulton bank in exchange for services, a common banking practice. In each case, the comptroller's office has been trying to decide if Lance's bank kept extra money on deposit at the larger bank so Lance could get his

The report said the Fulton bank "looked in some measure to the maintenance of satisfactory correspondent balances in determining whether to make the loans and in calculating the profitability of loans after they were made.'

"In addition, there is some evidence tending to support the view that, but for the correspondent accounts, the loans would not have been made.'

But Heimann said "we do not believe that the prosecution of any individuals warranted."

Heimann said that the business from Lance's bank may have been to the detriment of two other banks. He suggested that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, which has jurisdiction over the other banks may want to investigate further. The other banks were Riggold and the Cohutta Banking Co. of Chatsworth, Ga.

After his unsuccessful 1974 gubernatorial campaign, Lance became president of the National Bank of Georgia in Atlanta but his family maintained accounts in the Calhoun bank. On Dec. 2, 1975, the comptroller's office ordered the Calhoun bank not to permit Lance's family to overdraw their checking accounts on grounds that the overdrafts were excessive.

Afterward, Lance set up an arrangement in which an employe in the Calhoun bank would write a check against his National Bank of Georgia account if his Calhoun account became overdrawn. Lance's account had seven

overdrafts this year but they were rarely for more than one day, the comptroller's office has The report concluded that the Calhoun bank had given other

customers the same privilege of avoiding overdrafts.

However, he said, the procedures "were not subject to sufficient controls to insure that overdrafts would not occur at

## Carter Wants Pipeline

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is ready to recommend to Congress a pipeline route across Canada for transporting Alaska natural gas to the lower 48 states, rejecting a proposal for an "all-American route," congressional and industry sources said Wednes-

The President will announce his decision on Thursday after meeting with Canadian Prime Pierre Elliott Trudeau, the sources said.

The \$10 billion pipeline would bring natural gas from Prudhoe Bay in Alaska to Fairbanks, then cut across Canada roughly along the route of the Alcan Highway. One branch would bring the gas to the Pacific Northwest. the Northwest Georgia Bank in another to the upper Midwest.

U.S. and Canadian negotiators announced a tentative decision to build such a pipeline last Friday in Ottawa. Energy Secretary James R. Schlesinger has said for some time that the administration prefers the mainland Canadian route if it can be shown to more economical to consumers.

The expected decision is a victory for the Northwest Pipeline Corp., the principal sponsor of the Canadian route. A Texas firm, El Paso Gas, had proposed the rival "all-American plan."

Under this scheme, gas would be moved along a new gas pipeline paralleling the existing trans-Alaska oil pipeline, then ... Hearings already have been a

liquefied in southern Alaska and shipped on tankers to the U.S. West Coast An aide to Sen. Ted Stevens.

R-Alaska, a key backer of the all-American route, said today that there still has been no formal word from the White House on the President's decision. 'We are still hopeful," the aide said.

Under a 1976 law dealing with the pipeline. Congress has 60 days after the President makes his recommendation to either approve it or let it stand.

Rude Guests in Our House

When the United States elected to host the United Nations it was assumed that these foreign "guests" would always be on their best behavior.

In the years since, however, the world's backward nations have come to dominate the General Assembly--and many brought with them their backward ways.

Last year three cars registered to Idi Amin's Ugandan Mission in the United States collected 1,761 traffic tickets in eleven months -- and ignored

A foreign diplomat can come and go-into and out of our country--carrying cash, drugs or state secrets in his luggage--and there is not a thing we can do about it.

A foreign diplomat living in the United States can ignore his bills, let his dog bite the neighbors. He can injure and even kill people with his automobile--and there's not a thing we can do about it.

And not only are diplomats beyond the reach of our laws but their wives and children are also-and even the housemaids in their embassies!

No other nation in the world treats international emissaries as leniently as do we.

Indeed, hard pressed as New York City is to pay its bills, the city still must spend more than two million dollars a year to protect these visitors--while they ignore some two hundred thousand traffic tickets each

A generation ago it was the 'Ugly American' who sometimes made himself unpopular. and unwelcome overseas. But nowhere did we expect to flaunt the laws of a host nation.

Newsweek magazine remembers when a cultural attache at the Panamanian Embassy ran a red light in 1974--crashed into the car of Dr. Halla Brown--a 62-year-old clinical professor of medicine at George Washington

The impact damaged Dr. Brown's spine, turned her into a permanent quadraplegic. Her medical bills have totaled a quarter million dollars and so far she still requires round-theclock nursing.

This will not clip their wings but, as United States protocol chief Erin Dobelle says, "It will require that they answer forwhat they do."

The Hereford Whitefaces picked up where they left off in 1976 by quickly establishing themselves on top of the District 4-4A offensive heap in 1977. The Herd finished 1976 in the number one spot offensively with an average of 247.8 yards per contest.

The newest edition kept the trend going with a 380-yard performance against Pampa in a 31-20 victory last week. Runner-up Monterey is far back with 264 yards picked up in a 7-0 squeaker win over the Canyon

Monterey picked up seven more yards on the ground than Hereford did in the first week. 236-229, but the 'Faces outdistanced the rest of the loop with 151 markers off the arm of sterling quarterback Kelly Kitchens, who connected on nine of 12 attempts against the Harvesters.

Lubbock High with 74 yards ran a sloppy second to the Herd in passing offense, while the rest of the league was under the 30-yard mark with Monterey and Plainview amassing 28 yards and Coronado but 16 via the airway.

Hereford leads the district scoring race also with its 31 points. Plainview with 15 and Lubbock with 14 are second and third. Monterey has scored seven points, while Coronado has yet to put a point up on the board.

Defensively Plainview leads the loop after having allowed Estacado only 95 yards total offense. Monterey is second with 125 markers given up to the game Eagles, and Coronado is third with 253 yards given up.

Hereford ranks fourth in the category after allowing Pampa 340 yards, while Lubbock is last with 380 yards allowed Borger in a 42-14 embarrassment.

Kitchens and Herd running sensation Paul Bell rank three. two in rushing among district rushers after one week. Bell's 153 yards put him only eight yards behind Monterey quarterback Ron Reeves. Kitchens is third on the list after picking up

47 markers against Pampa. Hereford tight end Greg Brockman swept to the number one spot among pass catchers with five receptions against the Harvesters good for 82 yards. and temmate Chris Hill is not far behind with 58 yards on three snags in the Herd's opening win. Sophomore Balen Ramirez finds himself in the number eight position in receiving with 11 yards on one catch last Friday.

Kitchens ranks second in passing percentage only because the top slinger in the loop had a one-for-one night. Jamie Hernandez of Lubbock hit the one pass he tried for 32 yards against Borger. Kitchens has a .750 percentage on nine of 12 attempts, and leads Lubbock's Ernest Day in passing yardage by a big margin, 151-42.

Reeves, the MVP in the loop last year after guiding the Plainsmen to the state playoffs. started the season with a 2-7 performance, good for 28 yards. Jamie McAlister of Plainview got the only touchdown pass in the first week, while teammate Bruce Wesley registered the sole interception.

Kitchens and Bell rank first and third in total offense thus far, with Reeves squeezed in between. Kitchens has accounted for 198 yards passing and rushing to lead Reeves by nine yards. Bell is third with his 153 rushing yards.

In the individual scoring race Bell is 10 points to the good with 18 points on three TDs against-Pampa. Lubbock's Day is second on the list with 8 points on one TD and a pair of conversions.

Kitchens with six points is tied for third in scoring with four other players including Reeves: Hereford kick specialist Charles Reyna is just behind with five points on a field goal and two PATs; and Brockman is on the list with two points on a pass from Kitchens following a Herd TD last week.

Washington, D.C. 20460. The crackdown by EPA has on the restricted list, manufacbeen in the making for some time. A 1972 federal pesticides law requires that after Oct. 21 of this year the potentially most hazardous pesticides must be used only be farmers, ranchers and others who are certified as capable of handling them.

## TFU Wants Grazing

In a letter to the Secretary of Agriculture, Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman urged that wheat farmers be permitted to graze set-aside acres and that diversion payments be made to compensate wheat farmers for their set-aside.

"Wheat farmers who are also cattle producers need the opportunity to graze set-aside acres to supplement low income from wheat production. It will encourage their participation in the wheat program," Naman said.

Texas Farmers Union has criticized the level of set-aside as being inadquate, but feels that set-aside provisions can be administered in such a way as to get maximum participation. Permitting grazing on set-aside acres would encourage wheat farmers to comply and to participate in the farm program. according to the Farmers Union.

Naman urged Secretary Bergland to announce a diversion payment in connection with the set-aside. According to Naman, the Secretary of Agriculture should authorize the payment of an amount sufficient to compensate farmers for abandoning set-aside acres.

Naman said, "The grain glut that farmers find themselves in was not their responsibility. They were encouraged and ever coerced to expand acreage by the previous administration. It is the responsibility of the government and the general public to see to it that wheat farmers are extricated from their serious economic predica-

The question of grazing set-aside acres is expected to be decided in a matter of days if the farm program is passed and signed by President Carter. Texas wheat producers are in general support of the liberal grazing regulations.



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


