Construction of the Deaf Smith County courthouse expansion has moved along to the plumbing stage. More than \$1 million will be spent on the renovation to bring the local jail into compliance with the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. Eligibility rule called 'trauma'

AUSTIN (AP) - Unhappy parents, coaches and school administrators say the new no pass, no play eligibility rule is a "trauma" in the state's concerted efforts to improve and reform Texas' public schools.

"There needs to be some room for stubbing your toe," Jerry Comalander, San Antonio coach representing the Texas High School Coaches Association, told the Senate Education Committee on Wednes-

day.
"This extracurricular rule has caused more controversy in my district than anything that ever happened, more than a tax bill," said Sen. Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville, author of one bill to trim the suspension period for those who do not pass all courses from six weeks to one

Glasgow's measure and similar bills by Sens. John Sharp, D-Victoria, and Bill Sarpalius, D-Canyon, were sent to a subcommittee for further testimony and

study. Critics of the eligibility rule got a quick answer from almost half of the members of the State Board of Education.

Chairman Jon Brumley, Fort Worth, and six other members of the new appointive board appeared before the Senate Nominations Committee and were quickly approved. All seven said they favored keeping the six-weeks suspension.

The controversial rule comes before the board for a third and final vote on Saturday.

Farm credit bill vetoed

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan's veto of an emergency farm credit bill brought angry reaction from farm-state members of Congress, but they conceded the action sharply diminishes chances of further help for farmers needing loans before spring planting.

Sen. John Melcher, D-Mont., compared the veto to "dropping the first omb on Pearl Harbor. From then on it's war, and no prisoners taken."

"It's going to be a long two years if the president continues to be this inflexible," said Senate Minority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., echoing the bitter partisan tone that has dominated debate on the farm credit issue in recent weeks.

Reagan signed the veto Wednesday, sending the legislation back to Congress where it appeared likely to die. House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. said he had no plans to try to override the veto, saying "I don't see any sense in it" because the Republican-controlled Senate likely would block any such move.

Five enter hospital board race

Five persons threw their hats into the proverbial ring on the last possible day to file for the Deaf Smith General Hospital Board of Trustees.

Two current board members will make bids for re-election, while a former board member and a former candidate have entered the race as well. There is one newcomer to be listed on the April 6 ballot.

Medical doctors Charles Allison and Gerald Payne will seek reelection to two of the at-large places open on the board. Ed Reinauer Jr. will not run again for the spot he currently occupies.

Also trying for the three open spots are Dr. Hap Cavness, a dentist who once served seven years on the board, and the Rev. Charles Threewit, who ran for the board last

David Workman, a cattle buyer for Iowa Beef Processors Inc., is the fifth candidate for the board.

Farm-state reps angry

Wielding his veto pen before reporters and television cameras in the Oval Office, Reagan called the measure a "massive new bailout that would add billions to the deficit" without really helping farmers.

"The bottom line is that someone in Washington must be responsible," the president said.

"Someone must be willing to stand up for those who pay America's bills. And someone must stand up to those

who say, 'Here's the key; there's the treasury; just take as many of those hard-earned tax dollars as you

Reagan said Congress had acted irresponsibly in passing the legislation, which he estimated would add \$2.5 billion to the deficit over the next several years. He vowed to "veto again and again until spending is brought under control."

Some in Congress were talking

about opening new talks with the White House in an effort to resurrect some compromise form of the credit legislation, but the administration and the Senate GOP leadership appeared to slam the door.

"The veto will stick." said presidential spokesman Larry Speakes. "If Congress wants to talk, let's talk about deficit reduction, not budget busting."

Firemen testify in trial

was the first to testify Wednesday as an arson trial began in 222nd District

Pete Casias Jr., 28, is being tried by a five-woman, seven man jury on charges that he set fire to the 205 Lawton home occupied by he and his family.

Casias was hospitalized as a result of the July 8, 1984 blaze, after apparently being overcome by smoke and dragged from the front porch of the residence by neighbors.

Assistant District Attorney Roxanne Davis, in her opening remarks to the jury, said the prosecution intended to show that "a man got mad. started throwing things around, knocked over furniture, poured flammable liquid around and set the house on fire."

Deaf Smith County Sheriff's Depuas a Hereford Police Officer the night of the fire, testified that he was summoned to the house that evening on a family disturbance call. He said he arrived just as two men were pulling Casias off the front porch and into the yard of the house next door.

Whitlow said he walked into the house after the fire was extinguished, and that it was in "total turmoil", with broken dishes littering the floor and the refrigerator overturned. He said he did not believe the displaced objects were a result of the fire.

Fire Chief David Spain then took

Hereford Fire Marshall Jay Spain the stand for the prosecution, telling jurors why he believed the fire was set by some sort of combustible fuel.

> He said Hereford volunteer firemen "darkened down" the front room of the house to completely extinguish the blaze, but as they entered the room the fire "flashed back" at them. He said that was an indication that combustible gases were still in the home.

Spain, who has been fire marshal since November of 1971, commented on a series of 37 slides taken of the house the night of the fire.

He claimed the fire burned more rapidly than such a structure would normally burn, which told him the blaze was "fueled."

Spain further testified that he was present at the Deaf Smith County jail on July 10, 1984, when Casias gave a statement to District Attorney's Investigator Terry Colston.

Spain then read the statement, which quoted Casias as saying he began drinking beer early that Sunday, and continued drinking beer at a friend's birthday party and then at a party in a Hereford park.

Casias allegedly told Colston he became angry with a friend, then with his wife, left the party and walked to his house at 205 Lawton.

According to the statement, Casias did not remember setting fire to the home, but said after thinking about it for two days he realized he was the only person who could have done it. He said he thought the fire might have been started with insect killer.

"I am sorry the house got burned," Casias was quoted as saying. "I would never have burned it if I were

Testimony was to resume at 9:45 this morning, with the prosecution and defense attorney John Lesly expected to wrap up their cases today.

Nuclear doctrine unchanged

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon says its doctrine governing the use of nuclear weapons hasn't changed, despite the charge of a senator who says he thinks a "much less

stable" policy is being adopted. "It sounds to me like we're moving toward a launch-under-attack policy," Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., told Gen. Bennie Davis, chief of the Strategic Air Command, during a hearing Wednesday.

Davis, head of the Air Force branch that controls the intercontinental missiles and long-range bombers in America's nuclear arsenal, was testifying before the Senate Armed Services strategic nuclear subcommittee.

Nunn noted that critics of the MX missile, which President Reagan is pushing Congress to approve, say it will force the United States to a "launch-on-warning" policy because the weapon will be housed in silos the Pentagon admits are vulnerable to a Soviet first strike.

"What I'm saying is that it seems to me that we've come off of the old policy and that we now are relying as almost a first option, if not policy, of planning to launch under attack," Nunn said. "I was hoping this day wouldn't come when I would conclude that was our policy, but I'm afraid that's what I'm hearing."

\$3.75 million judgment awarded

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - Dr. Vadam Diwan and the Coon Memorial Hospital of Dalhart have been ordered to pay more than \$3,750,000 to the parents and estate of a 6-year-old girl who died from an apparent overdose of dextrose in 1980.

Jim Brown, attorney for the girl's parents, Bill and Jan Patterson, called the verdict the largest ever in Texas in a suit alleging wrongful death of a child.

A Potter County jury deliberated for 15 hours over two days before returning the cash judgment Tuesday night in 59th state district

The jury concluded that Diwan was 70 percent liable and the hospital 30 percent liable for the death of Marlo Patterson, who was admitted to the hospital on Oct. 24, 1980, complaining of a stomach

She underwent surgery for removal of her appendix and then was rushed to Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital, 75 miles away, where she died the next day, after her parents agreed to allow lifesupport systems to be removed.

The first grader's parents alleged that Diwan allowed their daughter to receive an excessive dose of dextrose solution and then tried to cover his mistake.

Diwan's attorney, Richard Stokes III, said the doctor was not at the hospital when the dextrose was administered. The physician relied upon nurses to follow his orders, Stokes said.

The \$3,756,353 cash verdict included \$250,000 to the child's estate, \$1 million to her father, \$1 million to her mother, \$1.5 million in exemplary damages, \$3,000 in hospital expenses, and \$3,353 in funeral expenses.

Police unsure of motive

NEW BRAUNFELS, Texas (AP) - David Port admitted shortly after he was arrested last June 8 that he killed Houston mail carrier Debora Sue Schatz, but he said he did not know why he did so, a police officer has testified.

"I asked him 'why did you kill her,' " Houston police officer Irma Sauceda said in testimony Wednesday.

"He said 'I don't know. I didn't even know her,' " Ms. Sauceda

The testimony came during a pretrial hearing on a defense motion to throw out all oral and written confessions Port gave police.

The 18-year-old is accused of gunning down Ms. Schatz, 23, when she delivered mail in the affluent Houston neighborhood where the

The case drew heavy publicity when Port's father and stepmother refused to testify against him before a grand jury.

Bernard and Odette Port were jailed on contempt-of-court charges for their refusal, while their son remained free on \$20,000 bond. The Ports, who have been released, have not appeared in court since jury selection began Feb. 25.

A nine-man, three-woman jury was seated late Tuesday and sequestered early Wednesday.

However, they were not in the courtroom for Wednesday's testimony. Judge I.D. McMaster is expected to rule on the defense motion to dismiss the confessions before trial testimony begins.

GLASSBORO, N.J. (AP) - A college student with foam padding lining the rear of his sweatpants said that after a couple of thousand sit-ups, 30,000 or so more come easily.

Iran reports Iraqi missile attack

LONDON (AP) - Iran said Iraqi forces fired eight missiles into the southern city of Dezful early Thursday, killing at least five people, injuring more than 70 others and damaging a hospital and

The attack followed an Iraqi threat to shell Iranian cities in retaliation for an Iranian artillery attack Tuesday night on the port Reports from the Iranian state-controlled news agency IRNA

monitored in London said the attack took place at 1 a.m. (4:30 p.m. EST Wednesday), inflicting extensive casualties and damage.

IRNA said the bodies of two children and three elderly men had been recovered.

Western reporters are generally barred from the war zones, and there was no way to independently verify the Iranian account.

HARARE, Zimbabwe (AP) — Prime Minister Robert Mugabe announced today his government has positively identified the remains of some foreign tourists, including at least one American, who were abducted by anti-government rebels in July 1982. Six skeletons were found last week in three graves in the western

Lupane district of the troubled Matabeleland province.

Five of the victims were shot dead and the sixth was strangled three days after the July 23, 1982 capture of the six foreign tourists, Mugabe told a news conference.

He said pathologists had positively identified the bodies of Kevin Ellis of Bellevue, Wash., who was 24 at the time of the kidnapping; James Greenwell, 18, of Liverpool, Britain, and William Butler, 31,

"The tests are not complete ... (but) we have now come to the conclusion, quite definite, that ... they were murdered," Mugabe said.

Lynn Kemper, district supervisor for the Lubbock area for the Texas Department of Agriculture, said the bad checks may involve more than \$1

Ms. Hibs said Wednesday the TDA has received about 75 to 100 affidavits from farmer concerning the bad checks "thus far."

Ms. Hibbs said the purpose of the restraining order is "to prevent them (the company) from transferring any more cotton. Our basic concern is to protect farmers from losing any more money."

The order will freeze the company's assets, keeping the cotton still in possession in Texas, prevent the company from buying and selling and prevent the sale of the company for 10 days, she said. Either before or at the end of that period, another hearing will be held, she said.

Ms. Hibbs refused comment on the direction negotiations would take -whether the company would be allowed to sell or file for bankruptcy but said civil actions only had been Abilene, Ballinger and San Angelo.

Rich people worth \$2.4 trillion.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Almost 28 percent of the nation's personal wealth is held by 2.8 percent of the adult population - a concentration of money that declined only slightly between 1976 and 1982, when the number of millionaires more than doubled.

New statistics compiled by the Internal Revenue Service estimate that the richest Americans have a worth — assets minus debts — of more than \$2.4 trillion. The number of wealthy women is increasing much faster than the number of rich men; the typical rich woman has

more than her male counterpart, and real estate is the favorite asset of the rich, followed closely by corporate

"The top wealthholder in 1982 was apt to be a male under 50 years of age with new worth between \$250,000 and \$500,000," the IRS said in a report based on estate-tax returns filed in 1983. "More than one-half of his wealth was held as real estate and corporate stock, with real estate surpassing corporate stock as the most prominent asset in the top wealthholder's portfolio."



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
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

USFL, NFL heads move to different sides

WASHINGTON (AP) — The commissioners of the two professional football leagues lined up on different sides of the ball in testimony on bills that would give leagues the power to regulate franchise moves.

Harry Usher, rookie commissioner of the United States Football League, told the Senate Judiciary Committee on Wednesday that he opposes all proposed legislation that would grant professional sports leagues power to limit franchises from heading to new cities.

Usher spoke out against any change that might "further the monopoly of the NFL" and said the root problem of professional football is the scarcity of teams.

At present the NFL has 28 teams, the USFL has 14.

But National Football League Commissioner Pete Rozelle said he remains in favor of a bill proposed by Sen. Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., that would grant leagues such control over franchise movement under an exemption to federal antitrust law.

The DeConcini measure would provide the antitrust exemption to professional basketball and soccer, as well as football.

However, Rozelle, said a bill proposed by Sén. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., dealing only with football, had "too many conditions that must be met."

Usher, who opposes both bills, said of the Specter proposal, "Unless Congress acts to cure the underlying problem, this proposed bill will not only fail to achieve its objective, but it will actually aggravate the root problem by granting the NFL additional power to control franchise moves."


The Specter bill would prohibit a football team that has played at least six years in a city from relocating unless there is a breach in the stadium lease, or the team is losing

Two other bills under study in the House and Senate also would limit sports franchise movement.

Owner agrees to sell franchise

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Philadelphia Eagles owner Leonard Tose has agreed to sell the team to Miami auto dealer Norman Braman for \$65 million, a source close to the team said, and National Football League Commissioner Pete Rozelle said he expects a report on the negotiations this weekend.

The source told the Associated Press Wednesday that Tose would sell his entire interest despite his insistence in the past on retaining control of the team.

"The price is for 100 percent of the Eagles' assets," the source said. "They hope to have the agreement wrapped up in a couple of days."

Rozelle, in Washington for a hearing before the Senate Judiciary Committee, said Eagles Vice President Susan Fletcher, who is Tose's daughter, told him that Tose would present a report on the negotiations to a special committee formed by the owners to oversee his financial problems.

League meetings begin Monday in Phoenix, Ariz.

Tose faces an April 1 deadline on a \$12-million note from the Crocker Bank of California, which has

Miami Dolphins owner Joe Robbie had said Tuesday that Braman, a 52-year-old Pennsylvania native, would keep the team in Philadelphia.

The Philadelphia Inquirer today quoted a source in Miami familiar with the talks as saying details remained to be worked out.

"I think they've reached an agreement, but the issues are significantly thorny that the lawyers have to go over the language," the newspaper quoted the source as saying. "There are tax problems and things of that kind."

The source said an announcement probably would be made in Philadelphia this weekend.

Any deal to sell the team would need approval from 21 of the 28 NFL team owners

team owners.

Late last year, Tose came close to

moving the Eagles to Phoenix while negotiating to sell a minority interest in the Eagles to Canadian businessman James Monaghan.But Mayor W. Wilson Goode assembled a package of concessions primarily involving rent deferral and improvements to city-owned Veterans Stadium, and Tose agreed to stay.

Braman was involved in an unsuccessful effort last year to buy an existing United States Football League team, the Washington Federals, and move them to Miami. The negotiations ended when Braman withdrew his financial support, and the team subsequently moved to Orlando, Fla., to become the Renegades.



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Students bring life to ideas

DENTON, Texas (AP) - Many people can picture the clothes they'd like to wear, the colors and cuts that would most flatter them. Kay Butler and Jan Dalbey can do more than conceive their ideal clothes - they can create them.

The two senior design majors at Texas Woman's University recently achieved national recognition in the Make It Yourself with Wool contest with garments they designed, wove and sewed for themselves.

The handwoven category was reinstated in the Make It Yourself with Wool contest this year, after a 32-year absence. The contest is sponsored at local, state and national levels by American Sheep Producers Council Inc. and the Women's Auxiliary National Wool Growers Association. Ms. Butler and Ms. Dalbey each were awarded a National Certificate of Merit in the con-

The TWU designers' individual styles are reflected in their winning outfits. Ms. Butler spun part of the

yarn and dyed the fabric for her wool skirt and vest, woven with a raised windowpane pattern. She also dyed a silk blouse to match the teal outfit, which she models with matching hose and shoes.

Ms. Dalbey wove her nubbytextured coat in a variety of earthtone colors. Fox and mink tails accent the collar and shoulders. She wears the coat over dark brown wool slacks and a top she also designed, or she can turn the coat around so that the large buttons are in back, and wear it as a dress.

Like all students in TWU's department of fashion and textiles, they bring their designs through every stage, making initial drawings, transferring them to muslin, and then making patterns. Coming up with a design, however, rarely follows an organized sequence, the women said.

"I might see the whole design, or I might see it in parts and then struggle and struggle to get the rest," Ms. Butler said. "The last one I did, I knew exactly what the bottom should look like, but the bodice was a total

She does so many sketches before her final draft, she finally stopped using sketch books and resorted to cheap typing paper, she said.

"I was using six or seven sketch books every semester so I just get a ream of typing paper. Now I have stacks of typing paper all over the place."

Ms. Dalbey has a different style.

"I usually design the whole garment in my mind before I start making sketches. I can draw better in my mind than on paper, because I can change things instantly," she said.

Both women had an interest in fibers and design before coming to TWU. Ms. Butler's interest in weaving began in high school, when she discovered a loom sitting unused in a corner. Her teacher knew only the basics, and Ms. Butler found books with instruction on how to use the loom.

Her interest in spinning was sparked during a visit to Australia and New Zealand, where nearly all the

homes she visited had spinning wheels. Her parents bought her a wheel when she graduated from high school, and after trying without success to teach herself, she finally found a teacher who had learned the art from her grandmother. Ms. Butler now gives lessons and demonstrations herself.

Ms. Dalbey's account of learning to weave is brief and to the point: "T went out and bought a loom, took it home and figured it out."

She had woven 10 or 15 garments before the winning coat. This year's Make It Yourself with Wool contest was the first contest she had entered. Ms. Butler is a veteran of contests, with several awards from Career Day at the Apparel Mart.

Both said their favorite design at any given time is the one they are 33 Author Fleming working on or the one they have just finished.

"I become emotionally attached to most of my stuff," Ms. Butler said. "I think the reason is that I do a lot of handwork on my garments, and when a piece has 2,000 to 3,000 hours 45 Seasoning of work in it, when you put that much 47 Dangerous work and time into a garment, you form an emotional attachment.

Largely because of advances in immunizations, many childhood diseases that used to cause serious illness and often death are now much less common, according to the Texas Medical Association.

Recently, a nationwide shortage of the diptheria-tetanus-pertussis vaccine has brought about renewed interest in immunizations.

Lawsuits against drug companies whose vaccines have caused an occasional serious reaction have prompted at least two to stop vaccine production, causing the temporary shor-

Some parents who hear about child deaths from vaccines may decide to avoid them. But TMA notes that serious reactions are infrequent and that immunizations continue to play a primary role in reducing illness and death at an early age.

In 1950, 2,778 Texans were struck with a disease that permanently changed their lives. Today, some children may not even know what polio is. That's because since 1955, Texans have been vaccinated 512-477-6704.

In the 20-year period from 1963 to 1983, there were 185 cases of poliobarely 7 percent of all the cases reported in 1950. Polio and other diseases have been brought under control with vaccines. Smallpox has been wiped out.

Certain people, however, stand a greater chance of having a negative reaction to certain live-virus vaccines and should avoid them. At risk are premature babies, persons being treated for cancer, and those with immune-deficiency disease since.

Still, not only should most children receive vaccinations, but adults also should keep their immunizations current. A physician can advise you on







Texans seeking return of flag WASHINGTON (AP) -Amid the turmoil of current U.S.-Mexico relations, a

modest request flutters like the flag over the Alamo must have during a raging battle 149 years ago today. Two Lone Star patriots have asked Congress to seek the return from Mexico of the

only Texas flag flown over the Alamo still known to exist. The flag is in storage in the Chapultepec Museum in Mexico City. It has been in Mexico since it was cut down during the climactic battle on March 6, 1836.

A rugged band of soldiers held the small San Antonio mission for 13 days against the huge Mexican army before thousands of Mexican soldiers overran the Alamo. All of the Alamo defenders were killed, including commander William Barret Travis, Jim Bowie and Davy Crockett.

The heroic tale has been celebrated in book, song and motion picture.

Public Utility Commission of Texas



Consumer Update

The Public Utility Commission reminds Texans that federal law provides for tax credits for eligible home energy conservation improvements. These credits are scheduled to expire at the end of this year unless Congress acts to extend them. So, if you have been considering improvements to your home as a way of gaining control of your utility bills, this is the year to complete the job.

Under current law, homeowners may claim 15 percent of the first \$2,000 spent on improving the energy efficiency of existing homes, with a maximum credit of \$300. New homes are not eligible for the credits. The law applies only to improvements on homes built prior to April 20, 1977.

Though you may rent the residence, improvements must be to the taxpayer's "principal residence" (a rent house or vacation cottage would not qualify).

Energy conservation improvements that qualify for tax credits include insulation, storm doors and storm windows, caulking. weatherstripping, and certain devices such as automatic set-backs on thermostats, meters for measuring energy consumption, and

furnace ignition systems that replace pilot lights. Items that do not qualify for the tax credits include siding for the outside of the home, heat pumps, woodburning stoves, and ceiling

To qualify for the tax credits, energy-conserving items must be new; they must be expected to last at least three years; and they must meet certain performance and quality standards set by the federal government.

Tax credits also are available for expenditures

for certain renewable energy devices -- solar, windpowered, or geothermal -that are installed on the taxpayer's principal residence. You may claim 40 percent of the first \$10,000 spent on such devices. The full \$10,000 in expenditures may be spread out over several years, but to qualify for the 1984 tax returns, the work must have been completed during 1984.

Improvements which qualify under this section of the law include:

•solar equipment for heating and cooling the home or for providing hot water or electricity for use within the home;

•wind energy equipment for generating electricity for use within the home; and •geothermal energy

equipment. Qualifying expenditures include labor costs, installation, and equipment, but do not include structural components of the dwelling. You may claim the credit more than one year if you expand an existing system or purchase more than one system, but the maximum cumulative credit is \$400 on any one

residence. To qualify for the tax cred's, the equipment must be r.w, and must be expected to remain in operation for at least five years.

If you have been planning to make energy conservation improvements to your home and you want to take advantage of the tax credits, you should arrange to have the work completed by December 31, 1985.

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Ancient profession experiences revival

PARIS (AP) — The ancient profession of public scribe, which had withered since the introduction of universal education a century ago, is making a comeback.

In 1978, there were three public scribes working in France. Today, there are more than 150 "ecrivains publics," and new ones are opening offices every week.

Public scribes not only write letters for people who can't. They also prepare job resumes, edit manuscripts and memoires and help people cope with the government bureaucracy. Some even write poetry on demand.

More than 100 of the professional ghostwriters have banded together to form the Academy of Public Scribes, dedicated to promoting the profession and promulgating a code of ethics.

"Now, everybody knows how to write, but not necessarily how to write a letter,' said Myriam Chatet, a former personnel manager who for the past four years has worked as a public scribe in Paris' 10th District

"For people who want to make a complaint, or a request, who have problems with their landlord or social security, there is a special way of presenting things," said Mrs.

That is particularly true in French, a language of many nuances in which form is as important as content.

"Life has become more and more complicated and people need help," explained Parisian Jacques Claustres, who styles himself a "counsellor in correspondence" and also writes poetry on demand. The public scribe was born in

France in the Middle Ages at the same time the middle class emerged. The profession flourished in prosperous times and receded in hard

In the late 1970s, Francois Boisson, a job counsellor in the northeastern French city of Nancy who was moonlighting as a public scribe, decided to find out how many counterparts he had. He found two

In 1980 he founded the Academy of Public Scribes; 30 turned up at the

new organization's first congress. The Academy now numbers slightly more than 100. There are perhaps another 50 in the country who are not

members. Some scribes keep busy writing the traditional love letter.

Evelyne Ramelet, who until recently operated a small public scribe office in downtown Perpignan, a city near the border with Spain, said she wrote many love letters. And Claustres said he, too, handles a large number of affairs of the heart.

"There is an enormous number of lonely people in this country," said Claustres, a man in his 60s with a salt-and-pepper mustache.

Claustres, who specializes in writing acrostic poetry, interviews clients to get to know their feelings. He often spends more time on writing the poem than he is paid to do. In the end, the clients sign the poems he has helped create.

He called poetry "a reflex of the mind and heart that comes from the self. It's like a tear. It comes from you without any education on your part. It is a question of heart and


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
