



Chamber celebrates year of success, community support

Hundreds of people attended the 1994 Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture annual banquet at the Bailey County Coliseum Friday night.

In addition to celebrating another successful year, the chamber honored several lo-

cal businesses and community members for their efforts.

With the theme "Dallas Cowboys Tailgate Party," A highlight of the evening was featured speaker, Ray Stone. Stone is known as the "Voice of the Dallas Cowboys."

Stone produces the "Cowboy Football Report," a syn-

dedicated daily talk/interview show airing in five states on 186 radio stations. Stone also produces "Inside the NFL" hosted by Roger Staubach.

Stone shared humorous stories about the Dallas Cowboys, but he also left Muleshoe resident with an important message, "Shop Muleshoe!"

"I encourage the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce to build up membership, spend money at home and feel guilty when you go to Lubbock or Clovis to shop," Stone said.

"When you shop in Muleshoe, you are also helping to improve your schools, hospitals (etc.). Muleshoe, the

answer is in your hands," Stone said.

Charles Bratcher, past president of the chamber, encouraged everyone to except Stone's challenge.

According to Stone, when a person goes shopping in another town and spends \$1, it is worth \$10 in Muleshoe.

Bratcher said the two ambitious projects for the chamber in 1993 were the coordinating of Mule Days, which was held in August. Another major project was an evening Christmas Parade.

Bratcher said the Chamber hopes to continue with these

County commissioners to discuss felony forfeitures

The Bailey County Commissioners Court will meet Monday, March 14 at 10 a.m. in the Bailey County Courthouse.

During the meeting Monday, the sheriff will present a report for the court's approval on an audit of felony forfeitures for March 10, 1993, through February 28, 1994.

An executive session will be held following the meeting to discuss personnel matters concerning former employee Joyce McGehee.

The Commission on Monday will consider a Coliseum contract for March 21 to host Appreciate Day for speaker Pete Laney. Kevin Smith will discuss and give an update on the Coliseum.

Other items on the agenda for Monday include a discussion and consideration of advertising for proposals for group health insurance coverage and they will discuss Hart Forms & Services' record control schedules for county offices.

The Commission will discuss needed repairs on a motor grader for Precinct #3 and consider authorizing the county judge to advertise for bids for the purchase or lease of a new or used motor grader.

Other agenda items include a review of departmental reports, review and approval of the county treasurer's reports for February and consider Budget Amendment #4 to the fiscal year 1994 budget.

Mules win team title at Whirlwind Relays

The Muleshoe High School track teams were in action Saturday, competing in the Lubbock Roosevelt Invitational.

The Mules were coming off a team championship at the Whirlwind Relays in Floydada last weekend, while the Lady Mules had a third-place finish.

The Mules scored 158 points in the five-team meet, followed by Childress with 118 and Roosevelt with 89.

Lamesa won the girls' team title.

Russell Reyes had a pair of first-place finishes for the Mules, winning the 3,200 in 11:16.98 and the 1,600 in a time of 5:10.20.

The Mules also got first-place finishes from Daniel Garbarino in the 110-meter high hurdles (16.26); from Jesus Flores in the 800 meters (2:05.22) and from Robert Jaime in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles (44.37).

Shane Schuster had the only first-place finish for the Lady

Mules, winning the 3,200 meters in a 14:09.25 time. But the MHS girls scored in 13 events to finish strong.

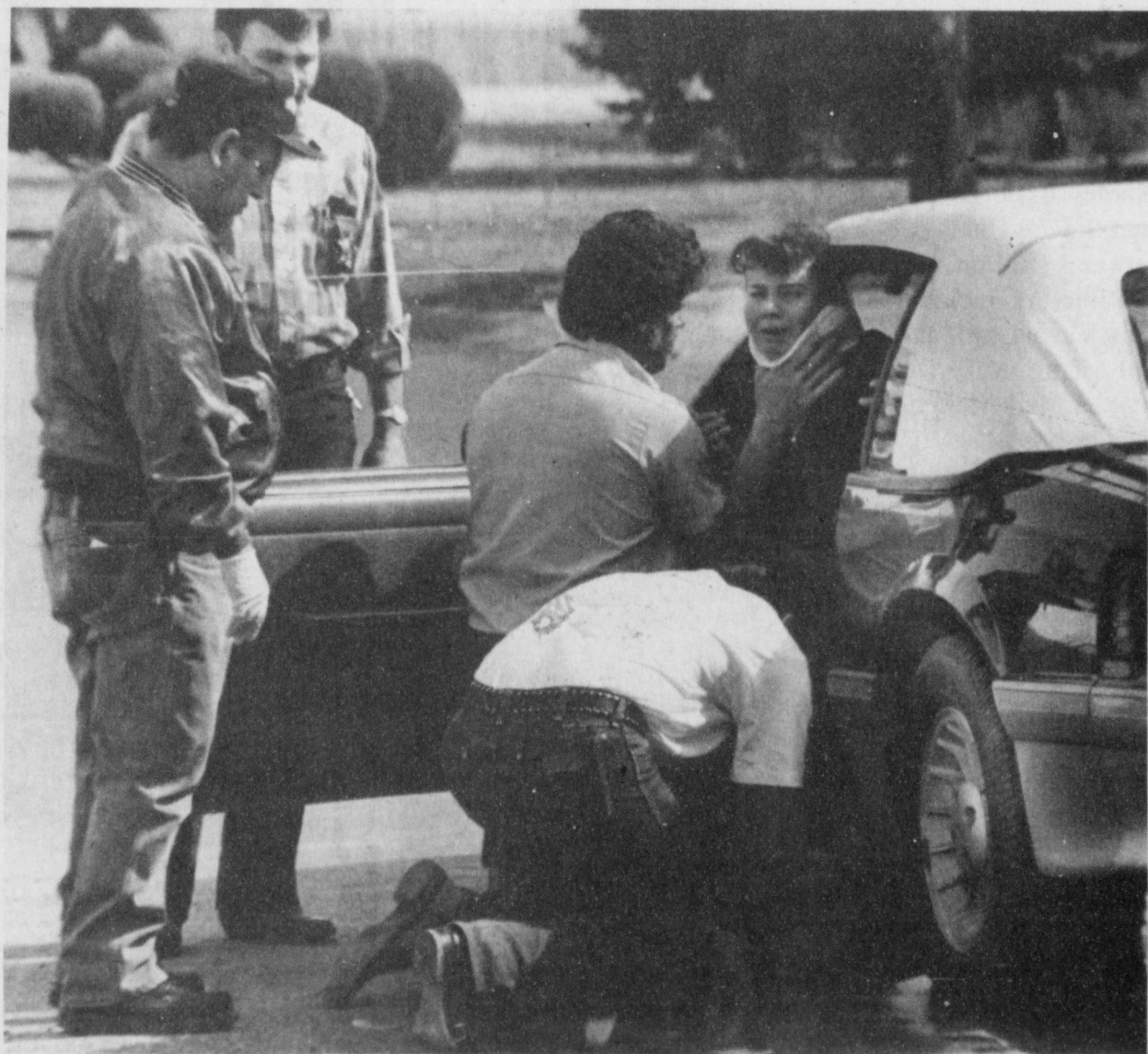

Computer record keeping for beginners will be taught in Muleshoe on April 1. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Farmer's Home Administration will sponsor the one-day course designed to make bookkeeping easier.

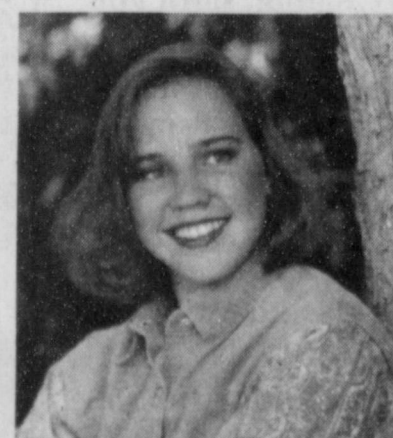
A panel of judges selected the 12 from 40 finalists whose

¡Varias exenciones de residencia pueden rebajar sus impuestos de propiedad!

Una exención de residencia reduce sus impuestos de propiedad. Por ejemplo, si su residencia tiene un valor de \$50,000 y Ud. recibe una exención de \$5,000, sus impuestos se calcularán como si el valor de su residencia fuera \$45,000.

¿Quién califica para una exención?

Cualquier dueño de una residencia principal el día 1 de enero tiene derecho a una exención de residencia de \$5,000 este año para rebajar sus impuestos escolares... y no importa si la residencia es casa, condominio o casa móvil. (Los condados, municipios y distritos especiales de impuestos también pueden ofrecer exenciones de residencia.)

¿Hay otras exenciones?

Si Ud. es incapacitado—o si tiene 65 años o más—tiene derecho a una exención adicional de \$10,000 en sus impuestos escolares de propiedad. Y si Ud. califica para la exención para los que ya cumplieron 65 años, también tiene derecho a un "cielo máximo" permanente en sus impuestos escolares de residencia. (El cielo máximo no tiene que ver con impuestos de propiedad de los condados o municipios, y esas entidades pueden ofrecer otras exenciones.)

¿Debo solicitarla cada año?

¿Dónde y cuándo debo solicitar mis exenciones?

Depression common, but often ignored

Depression can cause a person to withdraw from others, quit doing things they once enjoyed doing and even feel physically bad. Most of us have felt sort of down or "blue" at times. This usually happens when we are under lots of stress and tension. But when these feelings last a long time or get really serious, it's time to get some professional help.

Lots of people are depressed but its often ignored. If is severe it can disrupt a person's life, work and emotional well-being. It can affect anyone. The elderly may get depressed due to physical problems, retirement, declining income, various losses they have suffered, etc. The middle aged are the most common. Their goals may seem out-of-reach, children leaving home, etc. Even the younger adults, adolescents, and children due to responsibilities, search for identity, physical changes, conflict, etc. Women are twice as likely to suffer depression than men. Its

not for certain if this is due to biological differences or because its more common for women to show their feelings.

Some people feel that admitting depression or taking medication for it is wrong, that its a sign of weakness. Not so!! Admitting it is the first important step to getting relief and if taking medication is required, its not any worse than taking medication for physical problems. If you're suffering from depression, call someone that can give you information on how to get some help.

Many of the symptoms depend on the person. However, generally, there are:

*Changes in Behavior and Attitude. This may be a type of slowing down, neglecting responsibilities and appearance, loss of appetite (there could be weight gain though), poor memory and irritability.

*Different Feelings, and Perceptions. A person may be

"empty" emotionally, not finding pleasure in anything. There may be a feeling of helplessness and a loss of sexual desire. What is disturbing to many around a depressed person is a loss of warm feelings for family and friends. A loss of self-esteem and possible suicidal thoughts or actions.

*Physical Complaints (without apparent cause). These often include sleep disturbances such as waking real early, sleeping too much and insomnia. One may feel chronic fatigue and a lack of energy. There may be complaints of unexplained headaches, backaches, digestive upsets and changes in bowel habits.

There are three common types of depression:

1. Major Depression —this type interferes with normal functioning and can continue for months or years. A person may have just one episode but its more common

for the major episodes to repeat themselves in a person's life time.

2. Dysthymia —this is not as severe as the above type. It may last for years, so that the person may even forget what it is like to feel good. This usually prevents them from living up to their full potential.

3. Manic Depressive Illness (bipolar disorder) —alternates between being depressed and excited. The mood changes are usually gradual. There may be feelings of overconfidence, "wild" behavior, racing thoughts, etc.

Kendra Benham paced the Muleshoe 8th grade girls, winning the shot, the 100 meters, the 200 meters and finishing second in the long jump and the discus.

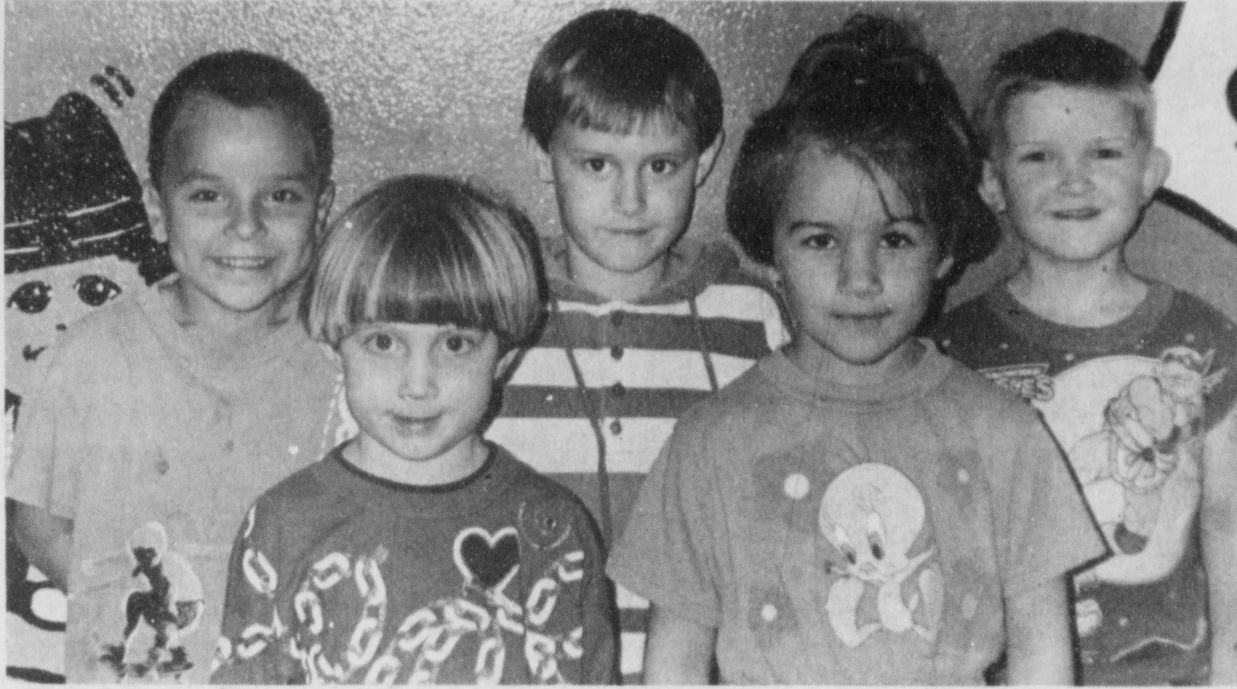

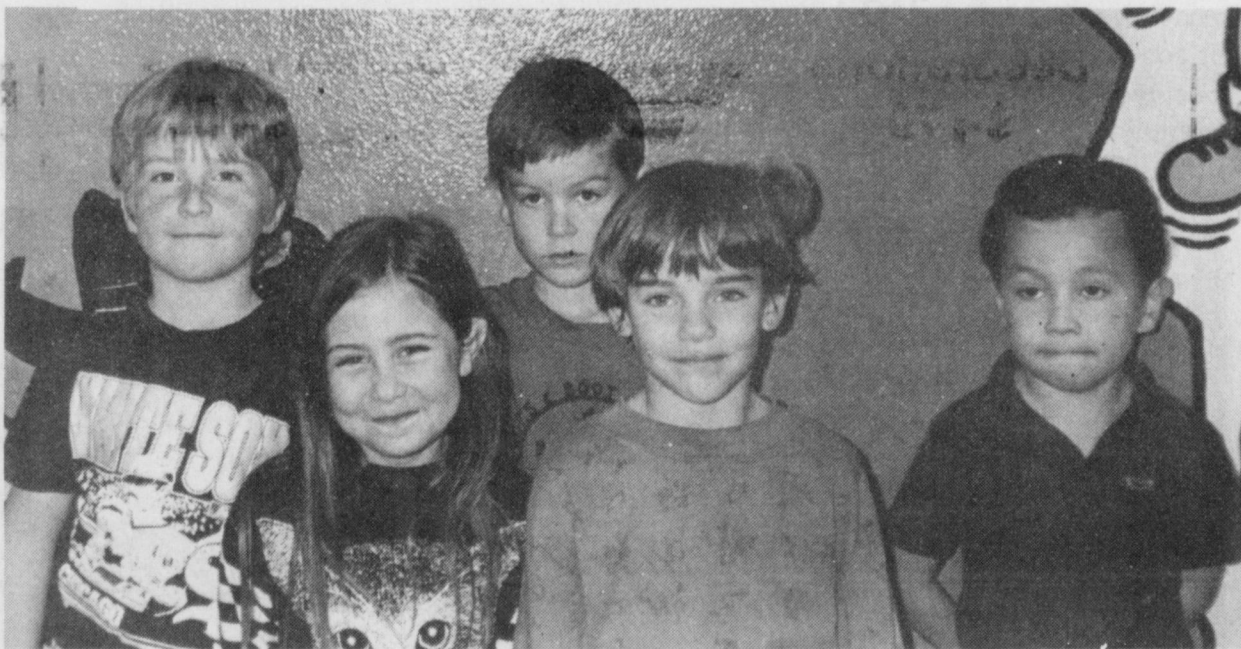

Cooks can put recipes to test in cook-off

Texas amateur cooks have until June 1 to enter the National Beef Cook-Off and be selected as one of 15 finalists who will compete for \$45,000 in cash prizes and the title of the nation's top beef cook. Each of the 15 finalists also will receive an all-expense paid trip to the national competition Sept. 22-23 at Little Rock, Ark.

Entries must be postmarked by June 1, 1994, and received by June 7, 1994. Anyone except food professionals is eligible to enter. For more specific rules, contact the National Beef Cook-Off at P.O. Box 3240, Chicago, IL 60654.

No one from Texas has ever won the National Beef Cook-Off even though it is the nation's largest beef producing state. It's time for that to change, says Texas Cattle Women, one of the contest's sponsoring organizations.

"We came close to winning it all with a third place finish in the indoor competition at the 1993 national competition," says Texas Cattle Women President Anita Brown of Wheeler. "As thrilling as that was, it now is time to go for the top award. The home kitchens of this state have more original beef recipes than any other state in the nation. Let's get those recipes out and compare them to the best of the other states."

The rules for entries must be followed exactly. A recipe must be original. It must use no more than eight ingredients (excluding salt, black pepper and water). Garnishes must be

made from those ingredients. Preparation and cooking times, including marinating time, must be less than 60 minutes. The beef cut selected must be appropriate for the recipe. It must use at least 1 pound and no more than 2 pounds of beef.

Robin Bonifay Hill of Arlington met all those qualifications in 1993 with a sirloin recipe called Calypso Steak. Her recipe received high marks from the judges for its simple preparation, appealing ingredients and convenient cooking method. As a result, Hill won third place—the highest finish for a Texan in the history of the national indoor cook-off competition.

Texas Cattle Women hope that among this year's entries are a few recipes that add enough judge-pleasing qualities to take Texas to the championship. Brown says judges choose recipes that are adapted for contemporary lifestyles. Other characteristics that judges appreciate are healthful ingredients, convenient preparation times, and balanced flavors.

"As one judge says, the key to success is to test the recipe over and over," Brown says. "Get other persons' opinions too, and then send the recipe to BIC. While you're waiting on the national competition, work on the food's presentation. Judges see the food both as individual portions and on a large platter, so make sure it looks good."

The grand prize "Best of Beef"

award will receive \$25,000, second place, \$10,000, and third place, \$5,000. Two honorable mention contestants will receive \$2,500 each.

"Remember that the idea has to be original," says Brown. "But don't overlook sources of

ideas for your recipes like cook-books, magazines and restaurants. Then develop them into recipes with award-winning potential to send to the National Beef Cook-Off. It's time to bring the championship to Texas."

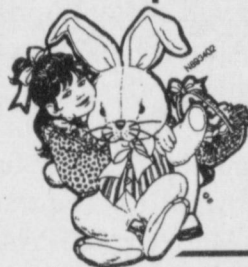

Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 14th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- ☑ You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- ☑ You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- ☑ You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1993. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1994.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing or postmarking 1994 renditions is Thursday, April 14. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 14 deadline.

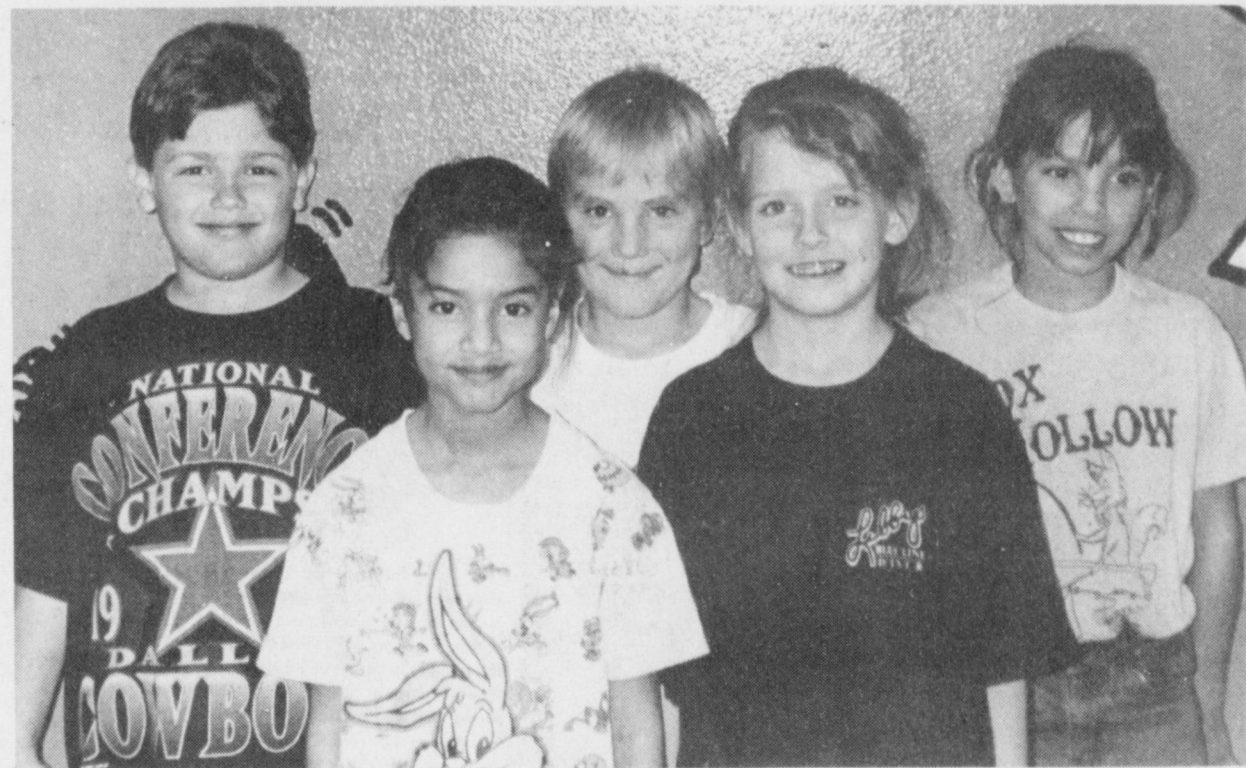

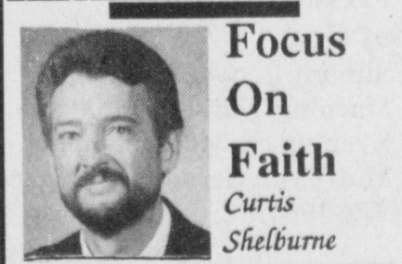

On Recognizing Unity

"All through the New Testament," William Barclay writes, "there rings a plea for Christian unity." But the plea is not for us to somehow create unity between the followers of Jesus Christ: the plea is for us to recognize the unity that already exists through his Spirit.



I don't know what was causing the friction between two Philippian women named Euodia and Syntyche, but I do know that Paul singles them out and entreats them to, as Phillips translates, "make up your differences as Christians should" (4:2).

Probably both gals were fine Christian women, but they've gone down in history simply as two women who fussed loudly and longly enough that their quarrel threatened the health of the church they both undoubtedly professed to love.

They fussed. But did their quarrel ever erase the fact that they were both sisters in the

Lord? No! Paul doesn't write, "Become sisters in Christ!" They already were—even when the "fur" was flying! What he says is basically, "Act like what you are, sisters in the Lord."

I would be a fool if I thought I needed to somehow create brotherhood between my younger brother and myself. It's already there, given to us through no effort of our own by our parents. He is my brother, and most of the time I'm proud to claim him! (Then there was the time he tried to blow the top off the neighbor's new fencepost...) But whether I claim him or not makes absolutely no difference as far as our physical brotherhood goes. We are brothers because we have the same parents. Jim and I cannot create brotherhood. What we can do is recognize and cherish it.

Sometimes God's children disagree. Sometimes they quarrel tooth and nail. But even when we seem the most divided, our job is never to create unity. Our job is to recognize the unity that is already there binding believers together simply because we are the children of the same Father, bought by the blood of the same Son, and given life by the same Spirit.

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$45,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$5,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year... and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.)

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1993, you won't need to reapply for 1994 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 1994. And if you turned 65 or became disabled during 1993, you need to file for the additional exemptions.

When and where should I file?

Legal Matters

By Texas Attorney General Dan Morales

It's very important that parents who do not live with their children help support them financially with regular child support payments. The law requires it. While the person's ability to pay is taken into account, the obligation to pay child support supersedes all other debts except income tax and social security.

In 1984, the Office of the Attorney General became the child support enforcement agency for the state. As such, we are responsible for collecting money from absent parents who fail to pay court-ordered child support. It's a big job: we currently handle more than 750,000 cases.

In my three years as Attorney General, we have collected more than \$1 billion.

When you receive your paycheck, your children's needs should come first. That's why parents who are delinquent in their child support payments may be subject to wage withholding. It means that court-ordered child support can be automatically deducted from an absent parent's paycheck every month.

Since 1986, wage-withholding provisions have been written into all child support court orders. However, orders established before 1986 still can be modified by the court to include withholding. If a child-support payment is delinquent after 30 days, withholding is automatically instituted.

Unfortunately, the paycheck withholding program does not work as easily with absent parents who are self-employed or whose income is irregular. Overall, however, it is a highly effective way to collect child support. In fact, wage withholding is our most effective

collection tool. It accounted for about 60 percent of all child support collections last year.

If a parent is behind on child support payments, we also can ask the IRS to deduct the money owed from any income tax refund the parent may have coming. The tax refund "intercept" is not automatic. We most notify the IRS whenever we need to deduct child support payments from a parent's tax refund. And, obviously, if the IRS does not owe the parent a

refund, we will not be able to collect any money.

Still, Texas is one of the nation's leading states in collecting child support from income tax refunds. In 1993, we collected \$35 million through this enforcement tool.

Parents have a responsibility to provide their children with such basic needs as food, clothing, housing, and health care. We recognize that many non-custodial parents have a hard time meeting their obli-

gations. But we are even more deeply concerned about children who must grow up knowing the pain and humiliation of poverty because their absent parents have neglected to provide them support.



Parking Lot Pointers

(NAPS)—Here's a surprising statistic: Parking lot accidents are a major source of auto insurance claims.

In response, the AARP Auto and Homeowners Insurance Program, provided by ITT Hartford Insurance Group, conducted a national survey of parking lot accidents to try to understand why they happen. Some of the study's highlights include:

• Most of the accidents involved a driver hitting a parked car or being hit by another vehicle while parked.

• Thirty-five percent of the accidents occurred when drivers were backing out of a space.

• A disproportionate number of accidents occur in small lots where there's less room to maneuver.

• The percent of accidents related to a driver's ability to maneuver a car increased with age.

• Some ways to avoid parking lot accidents: Slow down before proceeding across aisle intersections. Turn into an aisle with caution in case there's a car about to back out of a space.

Crack open your window and turn off the radio to be sure you can hear pedestrians and cars you can't see.

Use your directional signal when parking. When entering an angled parking spot, be sure your left front bumper and right rear bumper clear neighboring vehicles.

When possible, park so you can pull out head first rather than back out.

Tap your horn twice before backing up. Check your rear and side view mirrors and look over both shoulders. Re-check after backing a short distance.

Back out of a space very slowly.
