### Jubilee plans discussed

Plans for the Town & Country Jubilee were discussed and a new industrial development video was viewed by directors when the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce board held a regular monthly meeting Thursday afternoon.

Directors also heard a report on the Texcel program from Mike Carr, executive vice president, and heard progress reports from Lajan Henry, retail business committee, and Lanette Leasure, president of the Women's Division.

Carr presided at the meeting in the absence of President Bill Harris. No action was taken at the session since there was not a quorum present. Attending the meeting were Carr, Doug Manning, B.J. Gilliland, John Hays, Allen Parsons, Mrs. Leasure and Mrs. Henry.

### Death ruled accidental

Following an investigation by Hereford detectives and an autopsy by Amarillo pathologist Ralph Erdman, Monday's death of Tomasa Pena Muniz has been ruled as accidental by Justice of the Peace Johnnie Turrentine.

Muniz fell from atop pickup parked in Veteran's Park early Saturday. Erdman's report said the 35-year-old woman died from blunt force trauma to the head as consequence of a fall.

### Church bus vandalized

The front windshield, headlights and one blinker were broken on a bus parked at the Church of the Nazarene, 1410 La Plata sometime early Thursday, according to Hereford police reports. No suspects were named.

Other police reports included two disorderly conduct complaints, BB pellets shot into a car windshield, a suspicious vehicle report, an assault and some kids throwing rocks at each other.

Police also filed a report of indecency with a child.

### School shed burglarized

The tin door of a shed at Northwest School was found peeled back and one tool is reported missing, according to police reports filed Thursday.

Other tools taken from the shed were found on the ground nearby. Police believe the burglary occurred between 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. Thursday.

### Budget on county agenda

Deaf Smith County Commissioners are to consider adoption of a \$3,784,095 budget for 1986-87 when they meet at 10 a.m. Monday in the courthouse.

Other items on the agenda include a transfer of funds from the road and bridge funds to general funds, consider a typewriter purchase, a request by County Clerk David Ruland to attend an election seminar next month, the intergovernmental contract on the nuclear waste study, and payment of claims in the Cervantez vs. Deaf Smith County case.

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## Agreements no closer

# State deficit tops \$3 billion

AUSTIN (AP) — With the state budget deficit now mushrooming to \$3.52 billion, top legislative leaders still appear no closer to agreement on how to balance the books.

Comptroller Bob Bullock on Thursday released the latest deficit prediction, saying it could get even worse.

But House Speaker Gib Lewis and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby continued to urge different solutions.

Lewis, D-Fort Worth, said he remains opposed to a tax increase.

"The House will continue to examine alternative spending cuts and is not interested in any new tax proposals," Lewis said.

"I believe the majority of Texans feel we are taking the right approach and will not tolerate an increase in their existing tax burden given the depressed nature of our present economy," Lewis said.

Hobby, meanwhile, told state senators, business leaders and news

reporters that a combination of spending cuts and tax hikes is the "responsible" solution.

By imposing spending cuts, rolling back the 3 percent pay raise previously given state employees, Hobby mapped out about \$650 million in possible cuts.

"There are \$650 million in reductions we can make here. We will continue to look at all the options. But much beyond that point and we trifle with the future of this state," Hobby said.

"It is my hope that the Legislature will meet this crisis with a combination of spending reductions and revenue increases," he said.

Gov. Mark White has called a special session of the Legislature for Aug. 6 to try to cope with the ballooning deficit.

White said that in light of Bullock's latest deficit estimate, "It is obvious that we must continue to slash state

spending." He did not suggest where such cuts should be made.

White also issued an executive order tightening his previously ordered state hiring freeze.

The 1985 Legislature passed a budget totaling \$37.16 billion for the 1986-87 fiscal years.

Bullock said the worldwide oil price tumble, soaring Texas unemployment and other economic woes mean the state's income by Aug. 31, 1987, will fall \$3.52 billion

short of that figure.

Calling that a "moving target," he said the deficit could be more.

"Although there might be a slim chance of improving economic conditions, there is a much greater possibility that our economic downturn will worsen beyond what we currently expect, driving the shortfall even higher," Bullock said.

## Delicate art of hand lettering fading, few craftsmen remain

The art of hand-lettered sign painting is, like other manual skills, becoming obsolete due to the computer. So much so that hand-lettering is not a required course for commercial art college students any longer.

Why hand-letter when a machine can make the letters straighter, more consistent, and at any size one needs for a sign?

Hereford has a few of the skilled artists left who can produce quality hand-lettering.

Don Tice said he's been painting all of his life for relatives and friends, just as noted local artist Elaine McNutt does.

McNutt said she mainly enjoys painting children's rooms with animation characters. Her own children have a barnyard scene on their wall at home. McNutt has been painting full-time for the past five years and has done a lot of murals and signs for the county museum's displays.

"I got to doing more sign painting than my regular job so I decided to quit and make it full-time," explained Tice.

Only having one typestyle book on hand, Tice said he learned free-handed lettering from watching

other sign painters such as B.J. Puryear, Morris Means, and Larry Baine.

"I always like to look at other sign painters' work because there will always be something different that can help me out a bunch," said Tice.

"As far as layout, we start from scratch, find the center of the board and layout from there. Nowadays they'll use computers to run their pattern through and the computer perforates just like the pouncing wheel," Tice explained.

The pouncing wheel and dust bag are common tools for Tice. The pouncing wheel resembles a tracing

on," grinned Tice. "Anything from mailboxes to an 18-wheeler."

He is presently working on a flower pattern on a glass plate which is to be transferred to a pan. He explained that his customer had been given the pan by her mother and she wanted to hang the plate and the pan as a matching wallpiece for a remembrance.

The artist's tools for recreating what the eye can see includes various items such as a mall stick. The mall stick is similar to a baton and is held by the free hand to steady the wrist of the painting hand. Scalpels, easels, ladders and draw-

motivates the artist when at work. Being able to leave everything where it sits is also part of being an artist. Any artist can relate to the smallest corner being his or her castle when filled with even a minimum of art supplies.

Tice said he buys a piece at a time—adds another brush and a can of paint for every sign he does.

"Brushes are too expensive to go out and buy a whole bunch at one time, but they last a long time too," he said.

He also said that you have to have several types of brushes in artwork, from the small thin-line to the big flat paint brushes.

Tice said he also enjoys airbrushing which is a painting technique used on T-shirts, signs, and other items. In airbrushing, the air pushes a stream of paint through a type of brush creating a very fine mist. Clouds and background scenery including highlighting letters to give a shadow effect, are easy to achieve with the airbrush.

Tice said he uses lettering enamel that's strictly for sign painters and a plain old brush when it comes to signs. "The lettering enamel tends to stay on a lot better than your other paints," said Tice. "It's an oil base and lasts a lot longer than water

wheel that is used in sewing and the dust bag is dusted across the perforation to leave a faint pattern to paint by.

"That way you can go both sides of your board to get your pattern," said Tice. "Unless you've got a pounce wheel, it's hard to get the same pattern on both sides."

Tice free-hands his letters onto the board, instead of using stencils. "I letter anything I can get my paint

### Interstate banking recommended

DALLAS (AP) — With more Texas banks faltering under the state's shaky economy, the state banking commissioner is recommending interstate banking be considered for the first time in Texas history.

Banking Commissioner James Sexton said Thursday he is drafting a bill to permit out-of-state banks to buy Texas banks. He said his proposal will be offered for consideration by the Legislature at its August special session.

If the Legislature approves Sexton's bill, the move would mark the first time the state has opened its doors to out-of-state ownership of its financial institutions.

Sexton said he briefed Gov. Mark White Wednesday and told him that banks hurt by a bad economy were running out of resources.

"I told him we are going to need some capital in this state and it didn't appear to me to be readily available internally," Sexton said. "I mentioned it occurred to me we should be thinking about going outside the state."

White was campaigning Thursday and could not be immediately reached for comment.

Sexton said he would offer a draft proposal to various banking interest groups in an effort to build support for the plan.

F. Hagen McMahon, executive director of the Independent Bankers Association of Texas, said his group would prefer to see the issue debated in next year's regular session of the Legislature, rather than a special session. He said the emergency nature of the special session — called to examine the state's fiscal crisis — might not provide enough time to properly debate the bill.

### Vet receives tardy star

DENISON, Texas (AP) — R.L. Franks waited more than 40 years, but the World War II combat infantryman has finally collected a Bronze Star earned as a scout of enemy territory.

"Well, the government is sometimes slow about a lot of things," Franks said. "You know how the government works. About the only thing I know they're fast at is when you try to beat them out of income taxes."

"I'm just proud it did come."

The Bronze Star arrived in June.

Franks, 65, volunteered for the military in September 1942. He found himself a year later in England assigned to Company I of the 18th Infantry Division. He spent more than two years in Europe, serving in England, France, Germany, Czechoslovakia and Holland before the war ended.

He was assigned scout duty to check the safety of combat zones in advance of the main unit. Franks recalled the duty as frightening.

"You know, war — it's hard to talk to anybody about war unless they were really involved in it, because people don't understand," he said.

Franks survived a train derailment in 1961.

A railroad worker since pre-war days, Franks was riding with another man in the caboose of a train bound for Fort Worth. The train derailed, killing the other man and leaving Franks too injured to resume railroad work.

His part-time real estate work became his full-time job.

"The good Lord wanted me to stay here so I could pay the debts I owed," he said.

### Prison approves 'trusty camps'

AUSTIN (AP) — Ten "trusty camps" approved by the prison board will be the least secure units ever built by the Texas Department of Corrections, a system that long believed in maximum security for all inmates.

About 2,000 inmates will be housed in the camps that will be built outside the walls at existing prison sites. There will be no fences.

"These are our best prisoners. We trust them enough to, in many cases, get in a truck and drive all over the state of Texas picking up meat and moving it around all day long and drive back and forth in the truck," said prison board chairman Alfred Hughes of Austin. "I don't see why we'd be worried about them leaving at night."

The prison board Thursday voted 6-0 to approve the trusty camps, which will be built on a lease-purchase basis.

Hughes and TDC director O.L. McCotter said they would prefer fencing the camps if the money was available.

"If we had unlimited funding, I would tell you I would like to have it," McCotter said. "However, I feel very strongly that we can operate the camps in line with what the scope calls for. I think we can do it properly and in a safe manner and defend the public safety within the state of Texas."

Fences and additional lights for security would cost \$194,000 per camp. It would cost another \$140,000 a year to man the fences at each unit, according to TDC projections.

"It would be nice to have them. But they're not absolutely necessary at this time," Hughes said, adding that fences could be added later if needed.

### Protestors occupy bridge

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) — Thousands of supporters of the main opposition party, demanding annulment of recent elections, occupied a bridge linking this border city with El Paso, Texas, and vowed not to leave for 24 hours.

The blockade of the Bridge of the Americas, expected to end at about 8:30 p.m. MDT today, could hurt businesses on both sides of the border as it is the only route between the two cities available to industrial vehicles.

With the bridge takeover, the National Action Party, or PAN, renewed its waning campaign to annul July 6 state elections it claims were marred by massive, government-instituted fraud. The ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party, in power since 1929, has denied the charges.

About 5,000 people walked to the bridge from a rally at nearby Chamizal Park. The rally marked the end of a 48-hour fast by 150 PAN women that started Tuesday evening.

Francisco Barrio, who resigned as mayor of Juarez to run for governor of the state of Chihuahua, told supporters at the rally that the Mexican government was stalling and not taking seriously PAN's demands for new elections.

Barrio said he had been to Mexico City earlier Tuesday to discuss the party's demands with government officials who were not convinced there was enough proof of electoral fraud.

"If during the discussions all the proof we showed was not enough, then we are going to take measures of political pressure to defend our rights with the utmost energy," Barrio said to a crowd of cheering supporters.

The PRI was declared winner in the governor's race, in all 14 state legislative elections and 65 of 67 mayoral races in Chihuahua, the largest of Mexico's 31 states. Juarez, with a population of 1.2 million, is the largest city in Chihuahua.

PAN supporters occupied two bridges connecting the downtown areas of both cities for two hours July 14, the day election results were announced. Mexican army troops in riot gear were present, but no violence was reported.

duction, natural gas and sales taxes.

Sales tax collections are projected to fall \$1.35 billion short of the original estimate, Bullock said. The oil production levy will fall \$428 million short and the natural gas tax will bring in \$632 million less than expected.

According to the comptroller's analysis, virtually all indicators are negative. That includes personal income, creation of new jobs, the unemployment rate, oil prices and retail sales.

The budget problem has exploded since February, when falling oil prices prompted Bullock to estimate a deficit of \$1.3 billion. On May 30, that estimate hit \$2 billion deficit, then \$2.3 billion in mid-June.

The House Appropriations Committee has been studying the impact of various budget cuts, but made no recommendations during a series of meetings this week.

The governor said he would meet with officials from major state agencies next week to review potential budget cuts and the impact on state services.

"Our first order of business when the Legislature meets is to cut back as far as possible without diminishing basic and essential services," White said.

base. It costs more but it does last longer."

"I prefer the brush script typestyle for lettering because it has a more distinct, crisp accent to it when painting a sign," Tice said as he finished a letter on a "Pool Rules" sign. "And customer's seem to like it too."

Tice said he paints the letters with the thickest, heaviest, paint possible to help the sign beat the elements.

The painter said he basically uses three different shades of one color for each sign and prefers mixing his own colors. "You've got to keep every sign different. I try to use a different stroke and different shades of

paints to accent the letters. It brings your sign forward and makes it more attractive," he stressed.

Tice said he stays away from red as much as possible, "because that's the one color that fades the quickest."

He said the common colors for signs are red and white.

"But personally, I don't like red and white. It's just like a white house— everybody has a white house."

The artist explained that when spending money on having a sign made, one wouldn't want it to look like everyone else's. He thinks each

sign should represent the business or reason that it is trying to get across to the public. Tice mentioned that colors have their own personalities and that people perceive colors that way.

"Logos really accent the sign. Customers recognize a logo sooner than reading the sign," explained Tice.

"They cost more but in the long run it pays off more too," he said. He explained that the logo that goes on a sign can be used in corporate advertising for such business forms as letterheads, caps, pens, stickers, etc. and are just as easily recognized.

"You paint a sign and it will be there for at least 10 years before needing repainting. In comparison of other ways to advertise, it makes sign painting pretty cheap advertising," he smiled.

For his own advertising, Tice said he painted a pallet and some brushes on the side of his old "paint-wagon"— his station wagon. He considers his paint-wagon his calling card because it displays his own work and demonstrates what the customer can expect.

"Local people here in Hereford have really been good to me no longer than I've been in it," said Tice. "They've helped me out a bunch."

Tice, like many artists, is a perfectionist and admitted he's never satisfied with a sign. "I've yet to do the perfect sign. Every sign could be a little better," said Tice. And added that he'll try harder on the next one.

## Ann Landers

DEAR ANN LANDERS: We are writing to you because of our deep concern with the problem of sexual abuse of children. We are grateful for the attention you have given in your column to this widespread problem. However, your advice to those who write about child molesters is sometimes not strong enough.

As employees in the office of the Attorney General of West Virginia we have learned a great deal more about the legal implications and the social dynamics of sexual abuse than many people who consider themselves experts.

First, your recommendation to talk to both the parents and the child is certainly good. However, your readers should be aware that many parents, even those who are not guilty of child abuse, often have knowledge of the situation and choose to do nothing. They frequently accuse the child of lying. This sometimes frightens him or her into silence.

Your readers should be told what to do if they report parents who are child abuser and nothing is done to correct the situation. If this occurs the matter should be referred to the local social service agency responsible for the investigation of treatment for child abuse. In West Virginia, it is the Department of Human Services and/or the police.

In the case discussed by "Guilt By Silence In Mo.," a referral to the police would be the appropriate course of action since the man referred to had been molesting children for at least 19 years. It is extremely likely that he is a pedophile, and not suffering from a temporary aberration. No little girl will be safe around him unless he gets help. (Many pedophiles refuse to face the fact that they are sick until they are arrested.)

Many people who know about such situations refuse to take strong action because the abuser is "family." However, it should be remembered that the children who are being abus-

ed are also "family." People who possess guilty knowledge should ask themselves if they want to see those children grow up with a load of emotional problems that might never have developed had they had the courage to report the abuse to the authorities.

Finally, a word to parents: if your child tells you that he or she is being molested, believe it. Children almost never lie about sexual abuse. Furthermore, the law in West Virginia holds parents responsible for knowingly allowing their child to be abused, sexually or otherwise.

Sooner or later your child may confide in someone if you refuse to help. The weight of such a problem could become too great for a child to bear silently. When your child finally tells someone, you, along with the abuser, will be asked to explain your silence in court.

Thank you, Ann, for giving us and your other readers this public forum. Please continue to urge your readers to keep the lines of communication between them and their youngster open. Encourage parents to teach their children the difference between good touching and bad touching. Alert parents to the symptoms of child abuse. Urge all adults to speak out against this hideous crime against children. It can arp their approach to sex forever and ruin their lives.—MARY BETH KERSHNER, ASSISTANT ATTORNEY GENERAL, AND LESA GULLEY, CHILD ABUSE SPECIALIST, CHARLESTON, W.VA.

# Hereford wins Babe Ruth state title

The Hereford Kids Inc. Babe Ruth League 14 and 15-year-old all-star team claimed the West Texas state championship Thursday night in Levelland by coming from behind to defeat Andrews 9-7.

The win gives Hereford a berth in the Southwest Region tournament. The Hereford all-stars will meet the Arkansas state champions at 4 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 2 in their first game of the tournament.

It was the second victory for Hereford over Andrews in the tournament. Hereford defeated Andrews 3-1 Tuesday night, and Andrews earned a spot in the title game by shutting out Canyon 4-0 on Wednesday night.

Hereford began Thursday night's contest with a bang when Keith Brown lined the second pitch of the game for a home run over the fence.

No runs were scored by either team until the bottom of the third when Andrews scored two runs on a bunt. Both of the Andrews who scored had earlier singled.

Then in the fourth inning, Hereford suffered through a disaster when five errors were committed, allowing Andrews to score five runs for a 7-1

lead. The first Andrews baserunner of the fourth reached the basepaths on an error, and then scored on a play in which two errors were committed.

A single, an error, another single, and still another error enabled Andrews to make its lead 5-1. Then two RBI singles made the margin 7-1.

But the Hereford all-stars did not fall down deep in discouragement. They came right back in the top of the fifth with six runs of their own to tie up the ballgame, 7-7.

Pat Mercer reached base on a throwing error to first base, and went to second base on that error. Mercer scored when Todd Collier hit a double.

Collier advanced to third base on a passed ball, and Kyle Andrews walked. A stolen base by Andrews gave Hereford runners at second and third base.

One run was scored when Brown singled, and then an RBI groundout by Glenn Parker cut the Andrews lead to 7-4.

On a ball four pitch to Jason Scott, Brown stole third base. That brought Roger McCracken up to bat.

McCracken blasted the first pitch to him over the centerfield fence for

a three-run homer, tying the contest at 7-7. Hereford had one more baserunner in the inning, Robby Collier who singled, but he was left stranded on the basepaths.

Andrews did not score in the bottom of the fifth, and neither team scored in the sixth inning to break the tie.

But in the seventh inning, McCracken provided more heroics for the Hereford all-star team with an RBI double to put Hereford on top, 8-7. McCracken batted in Scott, who had reached the basepaths on an error.

Robby Collier followed with another double, driving home McCracken for what later was the final margin of victory over Andrews, 9-7.

The inning may have continued, but Collier was trapped between second and third base in a rundown, after he had attempted to stretch his double into a triple, and he was thrown out for the third out of the inning.

Fidel Ceballos, who pitched the last two innings, sealed up the victory for Hereford by striking out the first and third batters he faced in the seventh, and getting the other batter

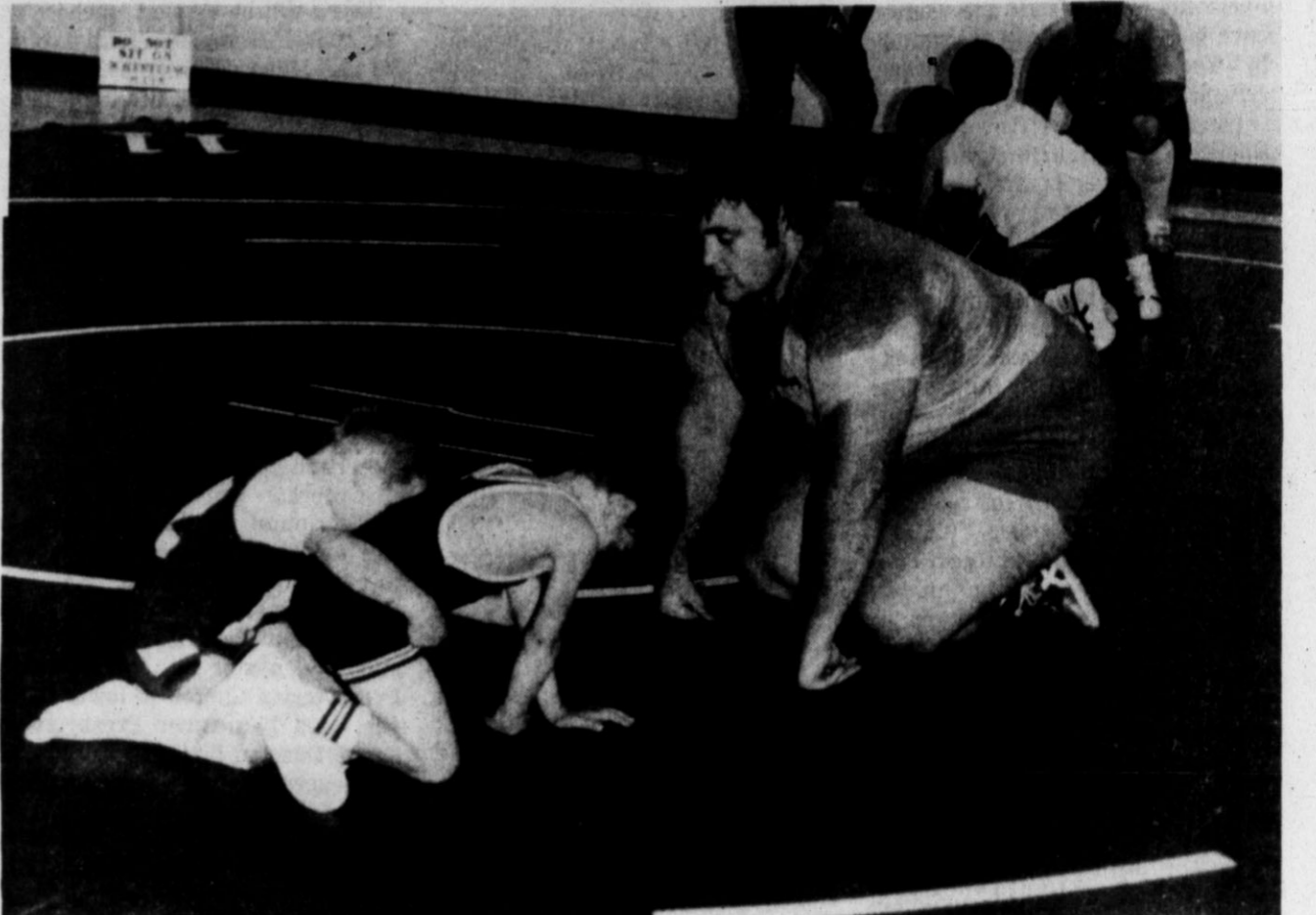
to hit a fly ball to the shortstop.
