A letter received during the past week by Judge Jno. P. Slaton, president of the chamber of commerce, from H. E. Davidson who has been negotiating with interests here relative to keeping the cotton gin in Hereford, gives accurate information as to Mr. Davidson's intentions for remodeling the present gin, and the type of equipment he expects to use.

"I do not like sorry machinery," he writes. "I want nothing but the best, and will not have anything less than that."

He calls the present gin a wreck and says all he plans to use as it now is, without change, is the building, as he intends to make a reat gin for Hereford and Deaf Smith County, one of the best in West Texas, without exception.

Mr. Davidson says he will take out the present boiler and a larger and much better one will be installed; the engine completely overhauled or rather made over to be better than when it was new, more efficient and more powerful.

The old cleaners over the stands will be thrown away, and the stands will be given everything they need to be the very best, entirely new parts from the floor up, if necessary. Two new cleaners of the very latest design and efficiency will be over each gin stand. Mitchells, which Mr. Davidson says

are the best in the world. Seed scales, not now a part of the equipment, will be installed. The entire press, condenser and tramper, with all their power units will be taken out and be replaced with the most recent ginning machinery.

In addition, Mr. Davidson says that after the reconstruction work on the gin begins if anything the least bit faulty is found, or a way made evident to improve the service or ginning possibilities, the highest type of equipment will be installed then to be a part of the complete gin, second to none in West Texas.

A number of local farmers have responded to the appeal of the chamber of commerce to let it be known how much cotton they will plant, but rumors of many others not reported, give an indication of the largest acreage ever planted around Hereford, Many had already made up their minds to put out cotton crops this year and haul it elsewhere for ginning. They are elated with the prospects of having a gin of the highest type of efficiency to handle the crop here




