Muleshoe Little Dribblers win girls' national crown

SNYDER — The Muleshoe Major All-Stars rallied from behind in the final seconds to beat Seminole 28-27 and won the Girls National Little Dribblers championship at the Scurry County Coliseum here June 11.

Muleshoe led most of the way in the championship contest, but Seminole took the lead late.

Lindsey Field scored a three-point play with 25 seconds left to bring Muleshoe back from a one-point deficit. Field got the ball in the post and scored while being fouled. She made the free throw to give Muleshoe a 28-26 lead.

Seminole inbounded in an attempt to even the game and was fouled. Seminole cut the margin to 28-27, hitting the second free throw on a two-

shot foul.

But Muleshoe ran out the clock to preserve the victory and bring home the national title.

Field scored 11 points to pace Muleshoe in the title game, while Scottie Brown had 8. Rounding out the scoring for Muleshoe were Myndi Heathington with 4 and Chyla Torres and Laura Jo Via with 2 each. Other members of the team, coached by Tanya Crawford and Kristin Holmans, were Kala Johnson, Bobbie Benham, Lysie Black and Stacy Locker. Alternates were Melissa Flores, Michelle Parker and Lela Hancock.

Muleshoe earned the right to compete in the national tournament by placing second in the regional tournament in

Muleshoe opened national tournament play on June 9, beating Gulf Coast 37-23. They advanced again that evening, beating Cenla, LA, 45-16.

In the semifinals on June 10, the Muleshoe girls took on

Seminole, holding on for a 48-41 victory and sending Seminole into the loser's bracket.

Seminole came back out of the loser's bracket facing the task of beating Muleshoe twice in order to win the double-elimination tournament. But the Muleshoe girls took care of business and finished the tour-

Family uninjured in one-vehicle rollover

A family of three who were all wearing their seatbelts escaped serious injury when their vehicle rolled over Friday at approximately 10 a.m. at about five miles east of Muleshoe on U.S. Highway 84.

According to reports at the Department of Public Safety, Armando Quezada of Clovis, N.M., was driving a 1986 Chevrolet, eastbound to Lubbock. Other passengers included his wife, Marha and children, ages 5 and eight-months-old.

The vehicle reportedly then ran over the edge of the road and overcorrected sideways into a median and rolled over once.

Marha Quezada was trans-

ported to Muleshoe Area Medical Center, where she was treated for some minor injuries. Citations are currently pending.

In an unrelated accident on Monday, June 13, Jason Terry of Cannon Air Force Base, N.M., was involved in a motorcycle wreck when his motorcycle reportedly hit a spillage, slick spot on road

westbound at approximately 1.6 miles west of Muleshoe.

He was transported to Muleshoe Area Medical Center, where he was treated and released for minor injuries. Terry was reportedly wearing a helmet at the time of the accident.

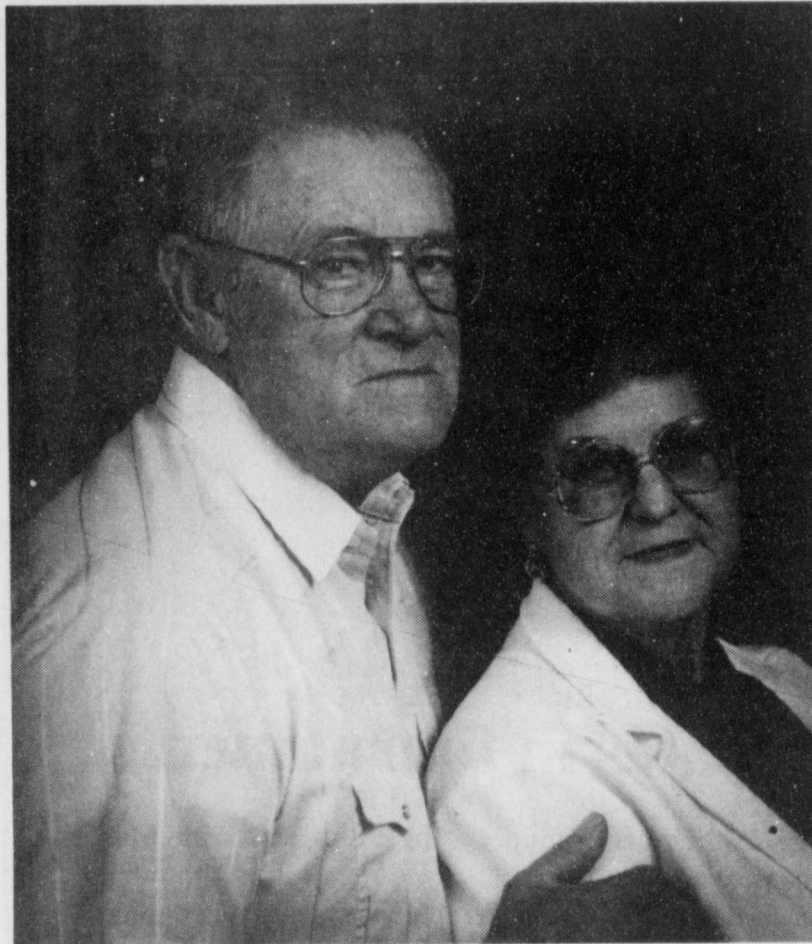

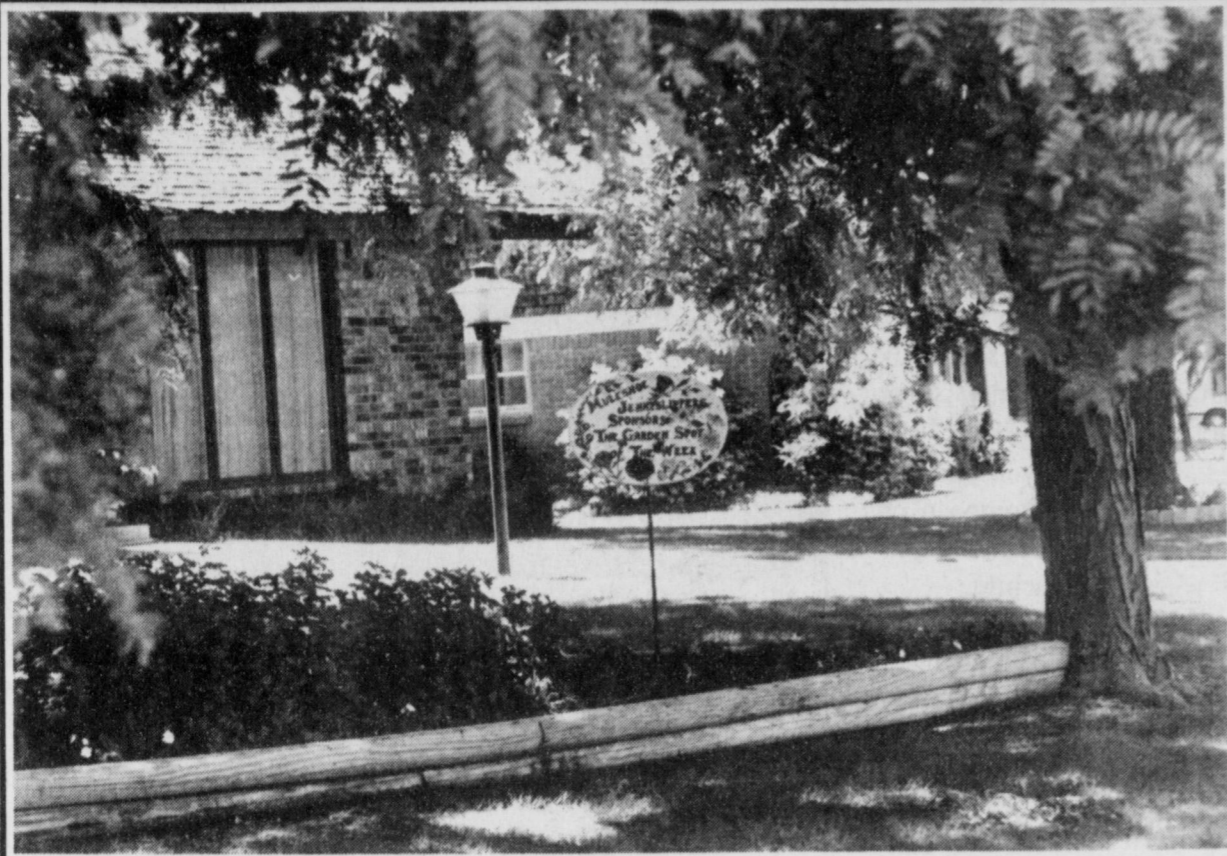

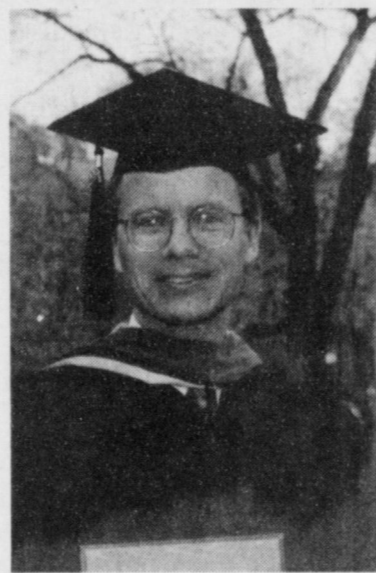
Tutt

The God of the Universe Is Our Father

Christians are united as brothers spiritually by the very same thing which makes men brothers physically--they have the same Father.

What a marvelous blessing! God is our Father!

It is not simply that God gives us physical life, though

he does (and in that sense God is the Father of all men), but he is our Father in that he gives his believing children a new kind of life, a spiritual life which, unlike biological life, will never fade but is fit for eternity.

The two gifts of life (for which biblical Greek has two completely different words) are similar. Biological life and spiritual life look alike but, as C. S. Lewis writes, they are really as different as night and day. One is a photo of a place; the other, the real place. One is the statue of a man; the other, the man himself.

The business of Christianity is to impart to men real life, the life of God which comes

only by grace through faith in Jesus Christ.

"This world," Lewis writes, "is a great sculptor's shop. We are the statues and there is a rumour going round the shop that some of us are some day going to come to life."

The difference, you see, between mere biological life and spiritual life is the difference between a "carved stone" and a living, breathing man.

Our God is a great King, but it was no royal nobility which caused him to send his Son to give real life to you and to me.

Our God is a powerful Judge, but no legal demands of any law--and certainly no merit on our part--obligated him to freely extend life and mercy to any of us.

Our God is a masterful Creator, but nothing in his great creative energy forced him to fashion sons out of statues.

But thank God himself that he is also our Father, and out of his deep Father's love for his children he extends to us freely the blessings of eternal life. No description of God is as expressive or beautiful or full of meaning as this: God is our Father.

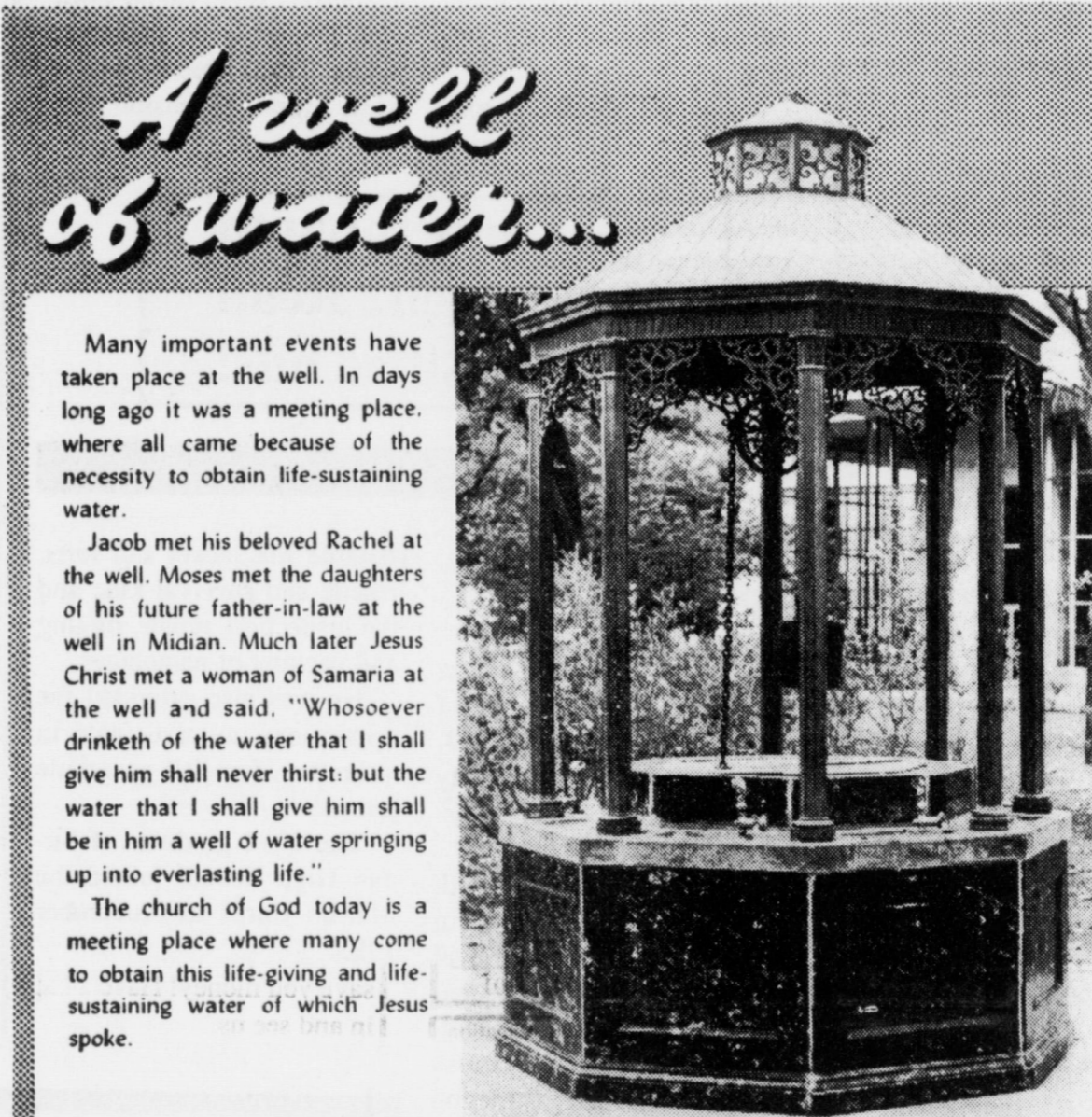

Butterflies are endangered species?



The big news on page 14A of the local paper was that three arrests had been made for poaching endangered species. Great Scott! Had someone bagged a Florida panther? Were two black rhinos now enhancing the love life of a Chinese politician? Was the last remaining California condor served with cranberries and dressing?

No. It turned out the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service had broken a ring of butterfly smugglers. These Lepidoptera nappers had taken more than 2,200 rare and endangered species from their natural habitat in parks and forests and sold them to collectors worldwide.

Obviously, these conniving criminals knew the difference between an Uncompahgre

fritillary and a cabbage moth. On the surface, being arrested for butterfly poaching may seem silly (Hey, bro, I'm doin' 15 to 20 for armed robbery. Whatta you in for?) Even the assistant director said, "Frankly, we have higher priority endangered species (than) obscure animals or plants." But taking 2,200 of these critters is pressing the limits of even the most civilized poaching.

Sierra Clubbers are not evil people. But they're like so many in our world today. They take no responsibility for their actions. They wage their campaign, devastate our rural communities and then go home pervasively satisfied they have done something noble. Back to their urban townhouse where others like them have destroyed their own natural habitat long ago.

You could spend all day with a net in the board rooms and offices of the Sierra Club headquarters and though you might catch a lunatic or two, I'll bet you a spotted owl burger there's not an Uncompahgre fritillary within fifty miles.

I don't hold the Fish and Wildlife Service responsible for the lunacy that surrounds the Endangered Species Act. They're just doin' their jobs and, I think, tryin' to use a little common sense. As a member of the Rocky Mountain Butterfly Consortium said, "It's not like killing a rhino..."

In addition, it was comforting to hear that the Fish and Wildlife Service has higher priorities than obscure animals and plants.

Wait a minute! Obscure animals? Like the Bruneau snail, the Alabama beach mouse and the Lee County isopod? These three endangered obscurities have been used to threaten entire communities in Idaho, Alabama and Virginia. Fortunately for the urban public, these critters are endangered in rural areas "where no one lives."

But the battle has nothing to do with the endangered species itself. These obscure species have simply become the weapon of those who wish to control the land.

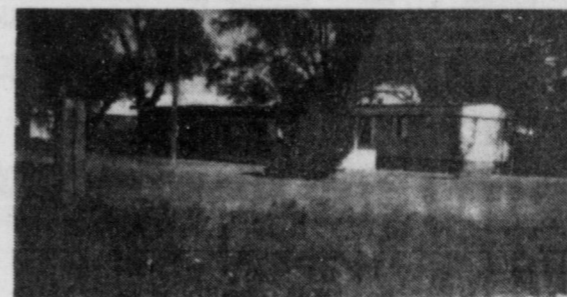

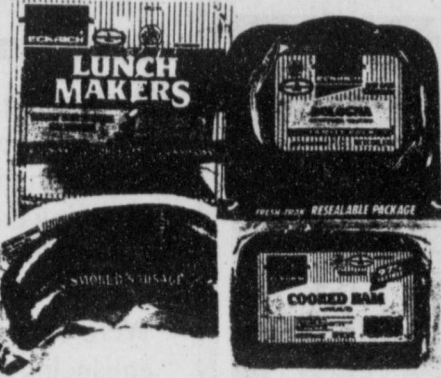

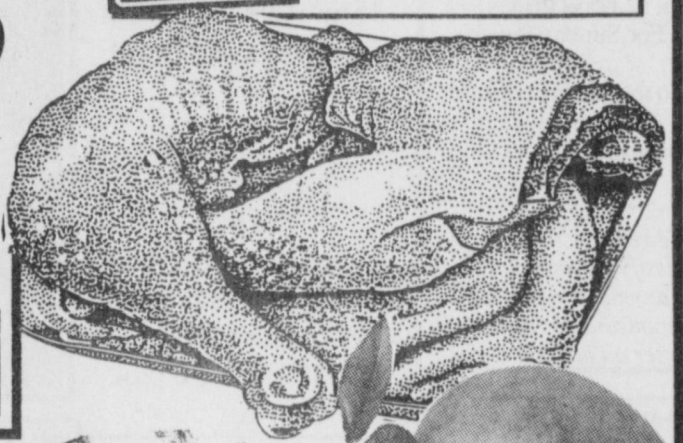
