Bishop makes visit to Muleshoe

Rodriguez was recently made bishop of Lubbock during a ceremony on June 1.

Rodriguez was present at Immaculate Conception Church last weekend to conduct a confirmation ceremony, a ceremony in which he is required to be there. Approximately 15 people were confirmed on that day.

Confirmation is the sacrament through which a person formally professes their faith. The bishop is the usual minister of confirmation. According to Father Joe

Augustine, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, the bishop of the

Lubbock Diocese only makes visits on special occasions, such as confirmations, which averages to about once every two years.

"The bishop was very happy to see our people," Augustine said. "We don't expect him back for another two years, unless there is a special need."

Augustine said about 215 people were present at the church as the bishop presided over the confirmation ceremony.

Lewis writes, they are really as different as night and day. One is a photo of a place; the other, the real place. One is the statue of a man; the other, the man himself.

The business of Christianity is to impart to men real life, the life of God which comes

Jesus Christ.

"This world," Lewis writes, "is a great sculptor's shop. We are the statues and there is a rumour going round the shop that some of us are some day going to come to life."

The difference, you see, between mere biological life and spiritual life is the difference between a "carved stone" and a living, breathing man.

Our God is a great King, but it was no royal nobility which caused him to send his Son to give real life to you and to me.

Our God is a powerful Judge, but no legal demands of any law--and certainly no merit on our part--obligated him to freely extend life and mercy to any of us.

Our God is a masterful Creator, but nothing in his great creative energy forced him to fashion sons out of statues.

But thank God himself that he is also our Father, and out of his deep Father's love for his children he extends to us freely the blessings of eternal life. No description of God is as expressive or beautiful or full of meaning as this: God is our Father.


