Her hobby is watching old movies. She also enjoys going to new ones.



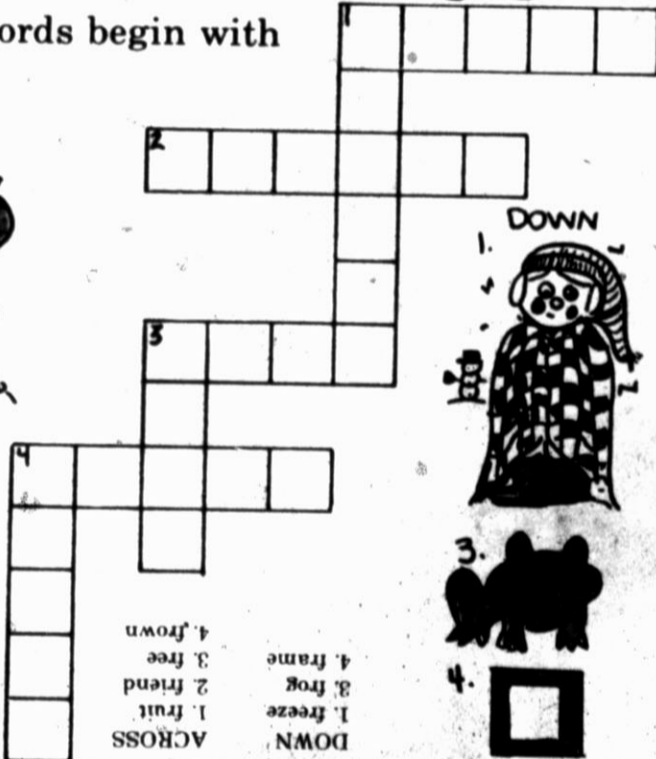

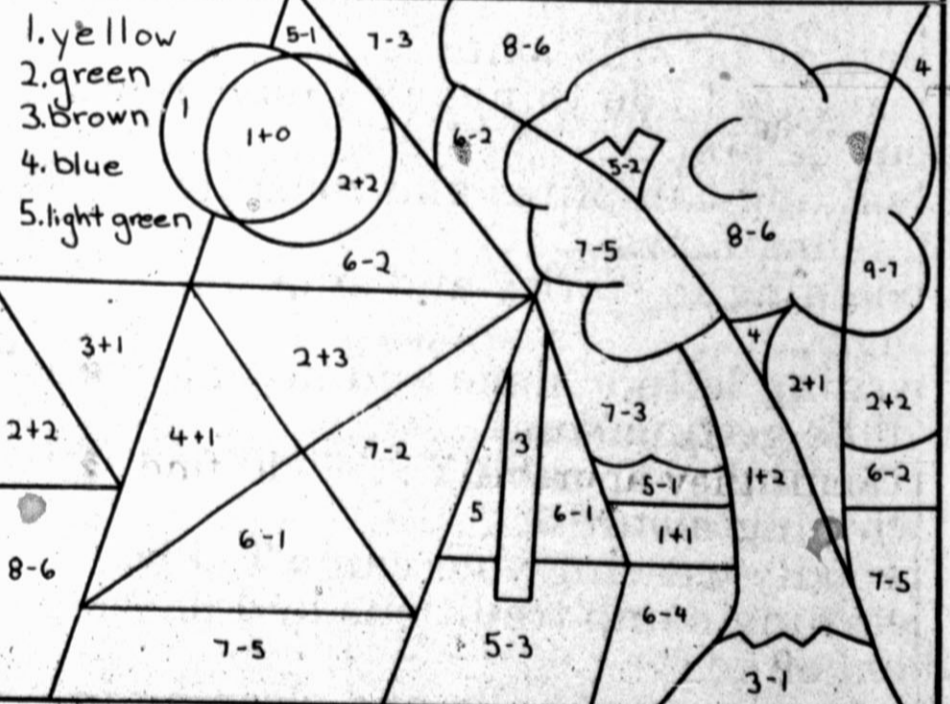
