# Israelis Kill 5 Palestinians In Attack on Lebanon Base

AAQBIYE. Lebanon (AP) - Israeli commandos striking before dawn from the air and sea attacked a Palestinian base at this southern Lebanon fishing village today, killing five guerrillas and wounding seven others. Palestinians here

The Israeli military command in Tel-Aviv said two Israel lieutenants were killed and eight of its soldiers were wounded in the surprise assault by seaborne commandos and paratroopers.

It said the strike destroyed a guerrilla naval base and there has evidence the seacoast compound was being used to prepare for terrorist attacks on Israel "in the near future.

An Israeli military spokesman said the raiders counted eight Palestinian bodies, and he claimed none of the estimated 30 to 40 defenders escaped before the Israeli raiders dynamited the base

Guerrillas said they killed h ti 11 Israelis in the two-hour clash

Western correspondents who drove down from Beirut to this village 2t miles north of the Israeli border saw signs of a

Abu Jihad, the Al Fatah guerrilu group's top military commander in Lebanon, toured the bloodstamed site at midmorning. He denied the base was used to train guerrillas for seatorne attacks into Israel

#### Language-Response Teachers To Be Added by District

Teachers who can communicate with students in both English and Spanish will be added to the staffs at each Hereford school as part of a plan to comply with Department of Health, Education and Welfare language standards.

The proposal highlighted discussion of a Thursday night meeting in which the Hereford Independent School District board studied the plan, which is to be presented to HEW's regional office in Dallas next week for consideration.

HEW earlier this year notified the school district that the bi-lingual education program limited in Hereford to grades kindergarten through third was not adequate. The notification stated that language-response education, which

entails teachers responding in two languages, must be expanded to grades 4-6 and into junior high and high school

Superintendent Dr. Harrell Holder wild the board Thursday that a 56-page plan to bring the language-response program up to HEW standards includes the adding of nine bi-lingual teachers-one at each of the six elementary schools, at Stanton and La Plata junior highs and at the high school.

Board president James Gentry assked Holder how the program would be financed.

# Skylab's Descent Worries Officials

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Skylab is falling and the space agency is trying to catch it.

On Saturday morning, scientists in Houston will attempt a crucial maneuver to alter the huge, 85-ton space station's position and extend its orbital life for perhaps another year.

If the maneuver fails, Skylab could plunge to its destruction as early as next

SPACE CENTER, Houston [AP] - The orbiting Skylab laboratory responded quickly today to ground commands aimed at prolonging the life of the 84-ton vehicle abandoned in space in 1973.

Spokesmen at the Johnson Space Center said the response to the commands transmitted from tracking stations on Bermuda and near Madrid placed the planned weekend maneuvers hours ahead of schedule.

"We hadn't anticipated so much success so quickly," said spokesman Bob Gordon. "But we still have adjustment aneuvers to execute Saturday morn-

The fear is that some of the pieces could hit populated areas, although space

officials say that chance is remote. "Can you imagine a 300-pound piece of Super Bowl?" asked one observer.

Scientists have been making a major effort this week to extend the life of Skylab, the world's largest man-made satellite which the United States launched five years ago.

They have been sending a series of commands to turn on heaters and gyroscopes and to point the station's battery-charging solar panels at the sun.

These have been preludes to the big maneuver planned for Saturday, which key members of Congress will be watching.

At 7:12 a.m. in Houston, a team of 15 men led by flight controller Bill Peters will send a radio signal to Skylab from the same control center that was a hub of activity during the historic Apollo moon flights and when Skylab was inhabited by three different astronaut crews in 1973 and 1974.

If all goes well Saturday, the radio signal will fire small steering rockets to tip the cylinder-shaped station so that instead of orbiting with its nose up, it will fly parallel to the earth, small end forward. If the signal doesn't work, there will be no further attempts to prolong the station's flight.

There will be a few hours of tense waiting to see if the maneuver works. If it does, there will be a collective sign of relief throughout the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, for it would reduce the atmospheric drag slowly

pulling Skylab toward earth and could add as much as a year to its life in orbit.

That would give astronauts a chance to fly up to the abandoned spacecraft fate next year and attach a small rocket to it. The rocket could be used to boost Skylab into a higher orbit, where it would stay several years, and perhaps be reinhabited. Or it could be used to guide the station to an atmospheric re-entry. breaking up over a remote ocean area.

The astronauts can't make the rescue attempt before October, 1979, because the space shuttle, the new reuseable manned spaceship, won't be ready for such a journey until then. The shuttle is slated for its maiden orbital flight in June next vear.

Even if Saturday's maneuver, is successful, Skylab's two gyroscopes must continue to operate if it is to remain in its new position. If not, the craft would shift in relation to the earth and its death plunge would be hastened.

Members of the House Appropriations Committee will be following the activity in Houston to see if they should approve the \$20.5 million needed to develop the rocket the astronauts would attach to Skylab.

The committee recently rejected the financing, saying it did not believe the shuttle could be ready in time to accomplish its mission. But members said they might change their minds if

#### metal plunging out of space into the Carter Raises Import Quotas For Beef from 13 Countries

WASHINGTON (AP) - President import restrictions will save Americans \$500 million this year in cheaper hamburger, but the government still thinks the overall cost of beef will average up to 23 percent higher than last year.

Carter's plan - announced on Thursday will allow an additional 200 million pounds of hamburger and other low-grade beef into the country by renegotiating meat-import agreements with 13 countries, principally Australia and New Zealand

Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland predicted the larger supply would trim hamburger prices from what they might have been by a nickel or slightly more during the height of the late summer outdoor cooking season. What the "otherwise-might-be price" would have been. Bergland would not say.

But Kent Christiansen, an economist with the Food Marketing Institute, the food retailers and whosesalers' trade group, said, "It's hard for me to conceive of its having that kind of impact." The extra beef is a rise in the supply of less than 1 percent.

Some 15 percent to 18 percent of consumer grocery dollars go for beef each year and, Christiansen said "is by far the most important item we sell in the grocery stores.'

Beef prices have been rising rapidly since last summer and, with a record leap in April, led the largest increase in

Prices to producers for their cattle have been increasing at an even greater rate. and neither spiral is expected to be reversed until sometime next year, if

The increases stem from cattle producers' reactions to devastating losses

for 15 of the last 23 three-month periods. Carter said the added imports of lean, grass-fed beef "will not change the

price of fat cattle at all. "It will certainly not hurt the farmers who produce beef, but it will be of great help to consumers," the president said.

#### If Limits Exceeded, Restrictions To Be Set

WASHINGTON (AP - When President Carter announced Thursday that an additional 200 million pounds of foreign beef will be allowed to enter the United States this year, it involved some fast paper shuffling to abide by a 1964 meat import law.

Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland is required by the law to estimate every three months how much quota-type meat - mainly low grade hamburger beef - will enter the country in the entire calendar

If any of his quarterly estimates exceeds a maximum level specified by a formula in the law, the government is supposed to impose a strick country-bycountry quotas for the remainder of the year to keep imports within bounds.

As part of the process, Bergland announced Thrusday that his July 1 estimate of imports would be nearly 1.5 billion pounds for all of 1978. That was 200 million pounds more than the maximum permitted under the law's. formula, precisely the amount announced by Carter.

Thirteen supplying countries, mainly Australia and New Zealand, previously were bound by "voluntary restraint" agreements to keep their shipments below the maximum level which would trigger quotas.

The new official estimate by Bergland then was used by Carter as a legal reason for proclaiming quotas for the remainder of 1978. Carter then immediately

#### Black Representatives Sought

#### Human Relations Group Forms By PAUL SIMS

A teacher, a doctor, a lawyer and two ministers are among members of the Hereford Human Relations Commission, being created to improve relations between the city's three main races.

The members are seeking three representatives of the black community to fill out the commission, which plans to be completed, adopt a charter and elect officers in approximately two weeks.

Commission members include Stanton macher Pat Montgomery, who represents the Hereford Classroom Teachers Assuciation; Dr. Clyde Rush; The Rev. Ermilo Montemayor and The Rev. Mack McCarter, who represent the Hereford Ministerial Alliance; lawyer Jimmy Crang, Hereford Bar Association; John Arsula. San Jose community; and Rumaido Garcia, American GI Forum.

Here's a group of people who on their swn time are seeking to model a ammission from other cities and create a growth and love in Hereford, Texas." Bes. McCarter said. "We've tried to get

representatives from some of the major segments of the community. We're still trying to get representatives of the black community.

McCarter said he hopes that the black members will be added by the commission's third meeting, scheduled in approximately two weeks. The two previous meetings have been for organizational purposes only, but the commission in its next meeting plans to begin work on bridging racial gaps in Hereford.

Rev. McCarter said the commission's purpose is three-fold.

"We want to foster communication between the divergent cultures here, to a bridge-builder between the people of the community and the helping organizations, like the police, and to provide a forum for misunderstandings, misinformation and complaints arising out of discriminatory practices," Rev. McCarter

"Right now we want to disseminate information that we do have a bridge-building group here in Hereford.

It will not be a passive group as such, not just an open forum to hear complaints. It's going to actively build bridges and improve communication."

But Rev. McCarter admitted the idea of a human relations commission began with a complaint. Representatives of the American GI Forum last year accused Hereford police of harrassing customers at the Wishing Well, a Mexican-American dance hall on Main Street. Rev. McCarter, who attended a meeting when city commissioners heard the complaint, suggested then that a human relations commission might be the only solution to any problems between the two races.

There are people here who read the destructive things in the paper and might remember the Wishing Well incident and get the wrong idea about the commission. But we are forming this group to foster the well-being of our community economically, socially and across the board."

Rev. McCarter said if there had been a human relations commission when the complaints arose about the police

department, "we could have brought both groups of people--the police and the complainants--to seek to understand the other instead of arguing. Then I think there could have been a

#### Soviets Demand That U.S. Pay For Equipment

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet Union has demanded that the United States pay for damage its investigators did when they broke up Soviet bugging of the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. Tass, the official Soviet news agency, said the Americans destroyed a Soviet "protective system" designed to foil U.S. spy gear.

Tass said the Soviet Foreign Ministry filed a protest with the State Department threatening to make public documentary

#### Jury Says Hughes Didn't Write Will

LAS VEGAS. Nev. (AP) - The handwritten words that would have made a gas station attendant a millionaire have been rendered worthless because a jury concluded that Howard Hughes didn't

The unanimous decision showed the jurors did not believe the strange story told by Melvin Dummar, the once obscure Utah man who said he met Hughes as a hitchhiker, helped him out and won a bequest of some \$10 million.

The five men and three women of the jury, who heard seven months of testimony in the complex trial, spent 11 hours in deliberations before reaching their decision Thursday night.

In a hushed, packed courtroom, the verdict was unsealed and read:

"We the jury . . . find that certain three-page document writted on lined. legal paper dated March 19, 1968 . . . was not entirely written, dated and signed by the hand of the decedent, Howard Robard Hughes Jr. himself."

#### Carter Says Equipment Sold to China

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Carter administration is permitting the sale of \$2.8 million in military-related equipment to communist China, reversing a decision made only one month ago.

Administration officials disclosed the reversal Thursday but contended that the action did not reflect a change in U.S. trade policy toward Peking.

The officials, who asked not to be identified, said approval was granted only after the administration was convinced that the equipment's technology would be used for civilian, not military, purposes.

The equipment involves sophisticated airborne infrared scanning devices and highspeed recording devices that can detect potential earthquakes and help locate oil deposits.

The initial export application from Daedulus Enterprises of Ann Arbor, Mich., was rejected early last month on national security grounds.

The administration reportedly was concerned that the Chinese could adapt the equipment to intercept U.S. military signals.

The company criticized the rejection as "absurd," and filed an appeal. A company official argued that the technology was more than 20 years old and that the Chinese could obtain simpler methods for intercepting U.S. military

#### Kids Swept Away On Washington Beach

KALALOCH, Wash. (AP) - A sunny oceanside picnic turned to terror and tragedy when a slack tide churned into a killer surf, pulling seventh and eighth graders from the beach. Two were swept away and are listed as missing.

"I came pretty close to giving up myself. I was losing my sense of direction and starting to hallucinate," 'Volkert Volkersz, 27, a music teacher at Lake Quinault School, said Thursday.

"We started hearing kids screaming for help, saw kids pulling other kids out of the water," said Volkersz. "I jumped in and pulled out two." Another teacher rescued one pupil.

But there were two they could not reach, Teresa Case, 14, of Amanda Park and Donald Hale, 13, of Lake Quinault.

"I was all out of strength myself - it just turned into a hopeless case," said

#### U.S. To Sue Exxon For Overcharging

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States, accusing the world's largest petroleum producer of overcharging crude oil customers \$183 million over a three-year period, is suing Exxon Corp. for the money and interest.

The suit was filed Thursday in U.S. District Court here and is a followup to a probable violation notice issued against the Houston-based corporation by the Energy Department six months ago.

Paul L. Bloom, a department attorney, said the government decided to go into the courts now instead of proceeding along administrative lines to achieve "the earliest possible resolution" of the case.

Presumably, he said, the company would have appealed an administrative decision to the courts at any rate. The suit is the result of an audit of Exxon records for the period running from late 1973 through 1976.

Exxon officials were not available for comment on the suit.

When the government's notice was issued last January, Exxon denied the overcharges. The company claimed the government was trying to apply price ceilings retroactively using "standards not in effect when our decision and commitments were made.'

## Carter Message Applied To Both Soviets, Americans

WASHINGTON (AP) - One problem with major speeches is that they seldom are. And President Carter's latest assessment of U.S.-Soviet relations tends to prove the rule.

It is hardly likely to be marked down as the Annapolis doctrine. for Carter charted no innovations or new directions. Instead, he summarized a situation and a dilemma that has confronted administrations ever since the Cold War thawed into detente.

And if the message was for Moscow, it also was for the American electorate and the congressional critics who contend that the Carter administration has been uncertain and divided on the course of East-West relations.

"It was an effort to show that

there is no disharmony, that the administration speaks with one voice, and that this is the definitive view." a Carter aid

The White House insists that there never has been any discord of confusion within the administration, and that suggestions to the contrary come from outsiders who are themselves confused.

Perhaps, but it was Zbigniew Brzezinski, Carter's national security adviser, who said strategic arms talks had reached a take it or leave it stage, with reasonable American proposals on the table to stay there until the Russians accept them. At about the same time, Paul C. Warnke, the administration's arms negotiator, was saying

just that - negotiate.

In any event, the one voice at Annapolis was Carter's. And much of what he said could as easily have been uttered by Gerald R. Ford or Richard M. Nixon, at earlier stages of detente and the SALT talks.

Washington wants peace, and Carter said he is convinced the Russians do too. But the White House and the Kremlin define it differently. As they have for years, the Soviets persist in probing here, intervening there, constantly seeking to expand their influence abroad.

"To the Soviet Union, detente seems to mean a continuing aggressive struggle for political advantage and increased influence in a variety of ways,"

that his instructions were to do Carter said. "The Soviet Union apparently sees military power and military assistance as the best means of expanding their influence abroad.'

Military assistance is not a Moscow monopoly, although Carter said as a candidate that he wanted to sharply curtail the commerce in arms.

What concerns NASA is Skylab's size. It is 118 feet long and 22 feet in diameter. with the volume of a three-bedroom house. While much of its aluminum parts would burn up from atmospheric friction during re-entry, scientists say the fuel tanks and structural girders of steel and titanium might partially survive and strike the earth.

Computer calculations indicate that when Skylab dives into the atmosphere it could spew pieces over a track 3,000 miles long and 100 miles wide.

Possibly as many as 400 pieces, some weighing as much as 300 pounds, might survive the searing heat of re-entry and strike earth at a speed of about 200 miles





#### Trojans Breeze To CWS Title





#### Sterility in men By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I need to know at what age a man becomes sterile if ever, or is his sperm always able to produce children. I'm in my change of life and my future husband is 66. Let me know if I need to take anything at this stage. I'd rather not raise any more children. DEAR READER - There

is no specific cut-off date for men that can apply to all cases. The Russians claim that one of the men that they have studied for aging was still potent and produced viable sperm cells at age To give you thore informa-

tion on this I am sending you The Health Letter number 1-7. Perpetual Youth, Aging. Others who want this issue can send 50 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to me in care of this newspaper, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, NY

Since many older men do father children I would suggest that you use precautions until you are certain you yourself are no longer able to become pregnant. That usually means at least one year after you have stopped having menstrual periods after your menopause; some suggest two years for even greater

security. You can check with your doctor in your individual case to make sure that you have completed the menopause and are no longer apt to get pregnant before you throw caution to the wind.

DEAR DR. LAMB About two years ago my wife and I started having a "staph infection." The infection appears as boils and they interchange their position from one arm pit to the other. The boils do come and go about every six weeks. We have done all we can do within our power to control it. No medications seem to work.

Now my wife, who has a tendency to blame me for anything that goes wrong and not to praise me for anything that goes right, says that she really hates me and that she gets the boils from me. She worsened the whole situation by saying without shame that there would be no more sex because having sex with me would bring on the boils. I nearly committed suicide. I do not know how we can have a baby without sex. That's also one of our prob-lems. Can you tell me what causes these infections and what we can use to cure it? DEAR READER — Staph infections are caused by the

staphylococcal bacteria. These bacteria invade the root of the hair and start a little infection which turns into a boil. You will need medical guidance to help control it because once a staph infection has invaded a home it persists. We all have some forms of

out and they're often not the kind that set up an infection.

It's absolutely essential that in the presence of a staph infection that you do

tor should be able to culture the bacteria and find out which antibiotics will help control it. With proper skin care and antibiotics you may be able to control the infection.

Infection has no relation-ship to sexual activity. The problem here, as suggested by your letter, is your basic relationship with your wife. To resolve these problems you may need some help from a marriage counselor

Bloodstain won't go By Polly Cramer POLLY'S PROBLEM DEAR POLLY — Recently my son got a cut on his leg and left some blood on a chair cushion. The cushion had not been pre-treated and is a flowered pattern on a beige background. I have had no success removing these spots with spot removers and am afraid of getting the cushion too wet. Can you or the readers help me? — MRS. C.R.

DEAR MRS. C.R. — You are certainly right in not wanting to soak your cushion. Does your fabric take kindly to water? If so you could make a thick paste of

starch and water, spread over the stain, let dry and then brush it off. If that does not work a back seam in the cushion might be opened and a protective piece of plastic be slipped in and under the spots with a table knife. Sponge with warm suds with just a bit of ammonia added to brighten it. Rinse with clear water and then blow dry with your hair dryer or an electric fan before removing the plastic. Resew the seam. Test anything on an inconspicuous place. Both the above arc suggested for removing bloodstains from washable fabrics. — POLLY

# Carter People Puzzled Over Mystery Name

the problem.

WASHINGTON (AP) - First there was the ghost in the Lincoln bedroom. Then there was the mysterious 181/2-minute gap in the Nixon tapes. Now, the White House has the curious case of Warren D. Riebe.

Riebe's name materialized one day about seven months ago in the basement of the Old Executive Office Building next to the White House. The name popped up in a letter sent by James Gammill, the head of President Carter's personnel

Somewhere between the attic and the basement there is, perhaps, someone who can identify Warren D. Riebe. But neither Gammill nor anyone on his staff can figure out who

Gammill's machine-penned signature, was about a man named Jack Tanner and no one on the staff, or on the letter-writing staff housed in the basement, can figure out just why Riebe's name appeared in it.

Nor can a woman ih Seattle. She had written to the White House last October opposing Tanner's nomination for a federal judgeship. Back came Gammill's response thanking her for recommending Warren D. Riebe for a position in "this administration.

A month later the woman again wrote the White House about Tanner, wondering who in the world Warren D. Riebe

Seven days later Gammill wrote back: "In response to your letter of November 27, 1977, please excuse the mixup that occurred in responding to your earlier correspondence. We appreciate your recommendation of Jack Tanner."

Exasperated, the woman, who asked not to be named, again wrote opposing Tanner's nomination and asking why the White House letter writers couldn't get the matter straight. Then she gave up.

The White House didn't write back.

That's the nub of a story about what can happen when the White House, or anyone else, tries to use automatic typewriters to turn out letters with a personal touch.

It seems that the first reply to the Seattle woman was prepared in the Old Executive Office Building by an operator of an automatic typewriter who placed a magnetic tape or card into a machine that would automati-

Mistake No. 1: The tape or card was the one used to thank

WASHINGTON (AP) .- The next round of U.S. - Soviet nuclear weapons negotiations probably will be held next month in Europe, according to U.S. officials.

It will again bring together Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko in what has been until now an unsuccessful effort to conclude a treaty limiting intercontinental ballistic missiles and long-range bombers until 1985.

In the meantime, the Carter administration is urging the Kremlin to offer further proposals on the testing of new missiles to break the current deadlock.

"The ball remains in their court," said one U.S. official who asked not to be identified.

The last major Soviet offer, a surprise proposal to ban the testing and deployment of all new missile systems for the life of the treaty, was rejected by the U.S. late last week, mainly because the U.S. felt it would sidetrack the American MX mobile land-based missile.

Earlier, the Russians had suggested allowing both sides to deploy one new missile system each in the first phase of the treaty. Initially seen as a three-year period, that first phase has been cut to two years during the drawn-out negotia-

This proposal also was rejected by the Carter administration as it would have the effect of permitting the Russians to field their new SS20 heavy missile but have no benefit for the United States because the MX is not likely to be ready for deployment until the early 1980s.

Vance surveyed treaty pros-pects at a 42-minute meeting in his State Department office Tuesday with Soviet Ambassador Anatoliy F. Dobrynin.

At the meeting Vance reaffirmed U.S. interest in completing the agreement, officials here said. President Carter, in his foreign policy address Wednesday at the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., said both sides were negotiating "in good faith because we both know that failure would precipitate a resumption of a massive nuclear arms race."

The president, who has always been publicly optimistic about an early agreement, said prospects for a treaty "are

In trying to set up a meeting between Vance and Gromyko the two sides ran into scheduling problems, ruling out this month as impractical.

July is highly probable, officials here said, with Geneva and Vienna possible sites. Regarding timing, Vance will accompany Carter to the western economie summit meeting in Bonn in mid-July. Vance could get together with Gromyko as a part of that trip. Or, the officials said, Vance might make a separate trip to Europe to see Gromyko.

Besides differences over new missile systems, the two sides are apart on a number of other
