ORDER OF COMMISSIONERS

Court Prohibiting the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors in Deaf Smith County.

Be it remembered:—That on the 19th day of October A. D. 1901, there was begun and holden a special term of the Hon. Commissioners court of Deaf Smith county, Texas, for the purpose of opening the polls and counting the votes cast at an election held October 5th A. D. 1901, for the purpose of determining whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in Deaf Smith county, Texas at which the Hon. W. B. Boyd, County Judge, was presiding and R. N. Mounts Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, and Ira Aten, Commissioner of Precinct No. 3 were present and County clerk F. B. Fuller, and Sheriff J. T. Inmon were in attendance when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

The court proceeded to open the polls and canvass the returns of the said special Election, which said canvass shows the result of the ballot to be 105 votes for prohibition and 86 votes against prohibition. It appearing that of the total vote cast in Deaf Smith County at said election there is a majority of 19 votes for prohibition.

We the Commissioners Court of Deaf Smith County therefore declare the result of ballot in the aforesaid election to be 105 votes for, and 86 votes against prohibition.

It is therefore ordered by this court that the sale of intoxicating liquors, except for the purposes and under the regulations provided by law, under title 69 of the revised statutes, be and the same is prohibited in Deaf Smith county, Texas, until such time as the qualified voters there-in, may at a legal election held for that purpose by a majority vote decide otherwise.

The foregoing minutes read and approved in open court; It is ordered that this court do now stand adjourned.

Czolgoz, the murderer of President McKinley, was executed in the cell in Buffalo last Tuesday morning. He asked to make a public talk, but was refused.

A race war occurred near New Orleans on Tuesday between whites and negroes, the cause being an assault made upon a white woman by a negro. The negro was burned. More than 30 negroes were killed and several white men.

The New Public Road South.

On last Saturday information reached the citizens of Hereford that the way for the entrance of herds from the South to the stock pens had been closed. A meeting was called for Saturday night to improvise way to be opened again. G. R. Jowell, Judge Ferguson and Lewis Bradley were placed on committee to investigate and open the way as stated. We understand that the road is opened temporarily and that a petition is being circulated asking the commissioners' court to open a public road south from the stock pens. Hereford can't afford for this road to be closed.

The Experimental Station

An interest was aroused among our citizens this week in the location of an experimental station in West Texas, for which an appropriation of \$1000 was made during the last legislature, said station to be located by a committee to meet for that purpose in Ft. Worth on the 6th inst.

Consequently a meeting was called at the court house Wednesday night for the purpose of agitating the question of making an effort to secure this station. A large crowd assembled at the court house and Judge Gough was called to the chair and stated the object of the meeting. Considerable enthusiasm was manifested and a motion prevailed to send a delegation to Ft. Worth for the purpose of making an effort for this station. The committee are as follows: Judge Jno. E. Ferguson, G. R. Jowell, C. R. Witherspoon, T. J. Davis, W. H. Patton, B. C. D. Binum.

No section of the country deserves or needs such a station more than the plains country, and we trust success may crown the efforts of the committee.

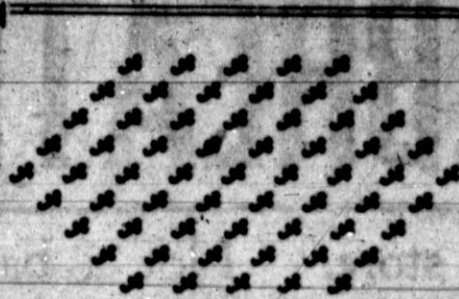

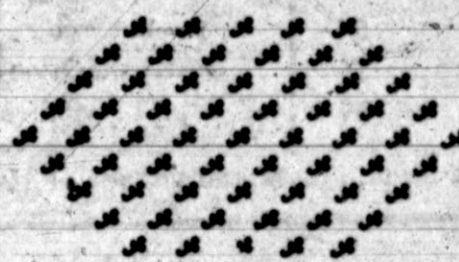
