## Business Changes

### BEACH & ORR.

The confectionery dealing firm of Beach & Orr on Saturday last sold their business to B. T. Hinton, formerly of the furniture dealing firm of McGlothlin & Hinton. Mr. Hinton has thoroughly renovated the place, and in the spring, when the postoffice has been moved into its new quarters, will carpet the place and add cosy ice cream parlors. ### THE BRAND.

#### What It Will Be—Its Aims and Its Objects Set Forth.

As announced last week, a new publication will be issued from this office about the 1st. of March, 1902.

One of our greatest needs is an experiment station. This country is rich with undeveloped resources. There are a good many products of the soil which private experiments have proven prolific, but there are many others which have not been tried, owing to the cost of preparing the soil and other incidental expenses. At the present time our people are doing fairly well raising

such produce as is known to do well. But with the fast increasing number of settlers who are buying property in this section, expecting to make a livelihood tilling the soil, it will become necessary for our farmers to diversify. If all plant only those crops which are known to do well, our markets will soon have an oversupply of these particular products, and no sale for them, which will work a hardship on all. With an experiment station, conducted by the state, it would soon be known with what prolificacy certain products, heretofore untried, could be grown, and an experiment station will be one of THE BRAND's strongest issues. After having gained this station, we will publish the result of these experiments for the benefit of our readers—and we hope to have every progressive citizen of the Panhandle a constant reader of THE BRAND.

The experiment station is only one of the many good things for the Panhandle for which THE BRAND will work with unceasing and untiring efforts, a few of which will be outlined in the succeeding issues of the REPORTER.

## A BETTER SERVICE.

The Santa Fe Has Improved the Traveling Conditions of Its Panhandle Patrons.

Under the new passenger schedule the patrons of the Pecos system and the Southern Kansas of Texas are now enabled to reach Kansas City with about twelve hours less traveling than formerly, which, with the better connections at Kansas City, makes the time between this section of the country and St. Louis, Chicago and New York via the Santa Fe twenty-four hours quicker than before, and that much quicker than any other route. In addition to this better time service, another admirable feature has been added—a Pullman sleeping car, which runs through to Wichita, Kas. These concessions were made to accommodate the largely increased traveling patronage which the Santa Fe has been receiving of late.

#### DID NOT ESCAPE.

A Couple of Shots from the Sheriff's Gun Causes Him to Stop.

Mrs. Russell's presence of mind prompted her to grab Collins, and in the scuffle for the reins the horses ran into a tree top about two hundred yards from the gate, breaking the hack tongue and bringing the team to a halt.

Collins sprang from the hack and attempted to make good his escape, but Russell, being very fleet, ran until he had gotten within forty yards of him and opened fire. After the second shot Collins threw up his hands and begged the sheriff not to shoot any more.

When Collins had been recaptured and Miss Lillie's condition was looked after it was found that the shock had rendered her unconscious for the time, but being near the residence of Mr. Peter Shelley such aid as was necessary was soon summoned and in a short time she was able to make the trip home.

Collins is a dangerous man and should be carefully guarded until District court, when he, in all probability, will take a trip down the road.—Johnson City Enterprise.

### To Lubbock and Back in Thirty-Six Hours.

J. W. Fewell will about the first of next month commence a freighting business between here and Plainview and Lubbock. He will use a traction engine with Beaumont oil as the fuel. This engine will haul 60,000 lbs. (about 8 wagon loads) and will make the trip in thirty-six hours from here to Lubbock and return. The engine will have 24-inch tires, while the wagons will have 8-inch tires. We bespeak for Mr. Fewell unbounded success in his new enterprise, as it will provide cheaper freight rates for the southern country people.

#### Shall We Incorporate?
