HEREFORD PUBLIC SCHOOL

Opened on Monday Last With Largest Enrollment in Town's History.

PRESENT BUILDING AND CORPS OF TEACHERS

Taxed to Their Full Capacity and More Room is Badly Needed—With Hearty Co-Operation of Patrons Hereford's School Will Rank Second To None in the Panhandle.

The Hereford High School opened Monday, September 2, with brighter prospects for a successful term than at any time in previous years. The enrollment to date is one hundred ninety-six, a gain of nearly eighty per cent over last year.

The advantages of Hereford as an educational center are no longer questioned. With suitable buildings and proper encouragement on the part of the citizens of Hereford and surrounding country this can be made the greatest educational center of the Panhandle.

The enrollment now is all the present corps of teachers and the building can accommodate. More teachers and more room is an absolute necessity for the present term. We, as parents and citizens, cannot afford not to furnish ample facilities for the education of our children.

The children of this country, as a rule, are bright and intelligent, and must not be neglected. Therefore, we parents should give all encouragement and assistance possible to our teachers. Without the hearty co-operation of all interested in the school with the teachers, the best results cannot be obtained.

This is good in its place, but often the most often encouragement is withheld when most needed. It is

teacher are on the best of terms. Not to say chummy, but when difficulties arise and sailing is not smooth, parents are often non-communicative or critical. How often it is that the child is permanently injured by such a course of the parent. Better quietly suffer a wrong than by imprudence and unguarded words and acts because of a supposed or probably a real wrong course of a teacher, hazard the chances of your child for an education. If the teacher is too strict or too lax, kindly tell the teacher, as one who is a partner with you in moulding the character of your child, instead of instilling a dislike for the teacher and thus cutting off his ability to benefit the child. Where this latter course is pursued the parent will be wondering in a few years why "Charlie" has such a distaste for school and won't take an education. They will be writing to college that "Charlie" isn't doing much good and better let him come home.

If you would have your child like the school and the teacher, inquire of the teacher if he has plenty of work to keep him busy; if he needs any more books; if he is doing the work that he ought to do; if he is ever tardy; and be more specific and ask, "Is he good in arithmetic? in grammar? in geography?" and so on to the end of the list. And if he is deficient anywhere, stimulate him on this point, and in a few years you will be rewarded. Try it.

HEREFORD'S BIG REVIVAL.

Great Good Accomplished as a Result of the Meetings.

The greatest revival in the history of Deaf Smith county closed last night. Rev. J. A. Andrews and his co-laborer and singer, Bro. Phillips, came to Hereford fifteen days ago, at the solicitation of Bro. Clark, and began this meeting. These men are a power for good. Bro. Andrews is a concentrated, forceful speaker and the sledge hammer hits and trumpet blasts which he gave will do good for time and eternity. He has a most happy way of putting things. And Phillips! Ah! My! He is out of sight as a leader among the young people in singing and religious work. God bless these consecrated men is the prayer that is following them by almost the entire town.

Following are some of the results of the meeting:

One hundred and thirty-five conversions; 73 additions to the Methodist church; 30 additions to the Baptist church; 16 additions to the Cumberland Presbyterian church, and 14 additions to the Disciples of Christ or Christian church. In all 135 conversions and 133 additions to the various churches. About \$550 was raised for the various expenses of the meeting, about \$400 of which was willingly given to Bros. Phillips and Andrews. And besides all this, there was inaugurated a movement to cause this town to go "dry."

be so formed that each congressional
aspirant could have a sure walk-over
into congress. At present it seems
probable that the redistricting bill as
presented by the conference com-
mittee will be passed at an early
date.
