Great Good Accomplished as a Result of the Meetings.

The greatest revival in the history of Deaf Smith county closed last night. Rev. J. A. Andrews and his co-laborer and singer, Bro. Phillips, came to Hereford fifteen days ago, at the solicitation of Bro. Clark, and began this meeting. These men are a power for good. Bro. Andrews is a concentrated, forceful speaker and the sledge hammer hits and trumpet blasts which he gave will do good for time and eternity. He has a most happy way of putting things. And Phillips! Ah! My! He is out of sight as a leader among the young people in singing and religious work. God bless these consecrated men is the prayer that is following them by almost the entire town.

Following are some of the results of the meeting:

One hundred and thirty-five conversions; 73 additions to the Methodist church; 30 additions to the Baptist church; 16 additions to the Cumberland Presbyterian church, and 14 additions to the Disciples of Christ or Christian church. In all 135 conversions and 133 additions to the var-

ious churches. About \$550 raised for the various expenses of the meeting, about \$400 of which was willingly given to Bros. Phillips and Andrews. And besides all this. there was inaugurated a movement to cause this town to go "dry."

The Bull Pight in America.

They had a series of bull-fights at Omaha lately and the history thereof affords a striking illustration of the moral effect which these entertainments have upon the beholder. When the enterprise was a matter of public discussion, the humane people of the city were naturally somewhat exercised in mind over the prospect. Not much over two years ago long discussions of the character of the Spaniard were had, in which it was argued that he must be cruel because he liked bullfights. There could hardly be so decided an innovation as a bull-fight on American soil without some com-

But the bull fight was had and it was announced that the performance would be conducted on humane principles, the matadors being armed with wooden swords, and their object being to worry the bull, not to kill it. There would be no danger, there would be no gore; there would simply a superb display of strength and skill. The matadors understood this: so did the spectators; the co-operation of the bull could not for obvious reason be secured but it was thought he would come to understand the rules of the game.

Apparently he did, for at the first fight went off without anybody's being injured. The bulls were merely teased and pleagued until they became furious, and chased and chased until they were exhausted. The sight of blood is strangely exhilarating to some natures. It seems to have a gruesome facination.

The amusement of watching a cruel sport is one which rapidly begets the passion for cruelty. The people who today demand the torture or death of an animal will tomorrow witness with a curious, shivery sort of delight the perilous feats of a man, and their delight will not be lessened if the man makes a mis-step, or falls of quickness in vision, and becomes a shapeless, bleeding mass. It is not far from delight in witnessing of scenes of blood to actual participation in them. The mob howling today over a bull-fight may tomorrow be howlmauling of some inoffensive person


