WE are in receipt of an invitation

to call the Sun man's attention to
his error. The article in question
was contributed expressly to THE
BRAND, and never appeared in the
REPORTER.

THERE has been much hippodrom-
ing of the German prince for the
purpose, as announced from the other
side of the water, of cementing the
friendship of the two nations. It is
burlesque diplomacy to attempt to
strengthen the friendship of nations
by pageantry. The prince's address
at the banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria

was not happy, and emphasized a
gulf wider than the Atlantic that
separates autocracy from democracy.
The German throne hates and fears
the press, and it appears from his
speech that journalism could suggest
nothing to his brother but interviews,
mines, and explosions, which, how-
ever, like Farragut, he was deter-
mined to brave. He could think of no
better comparison than to liken edit-
ors to his brother's generals in the
field. His words were not well timed.
How could they be? Prince Henry
is out of habitat in this country.
Our antecedents, adjacents and ideals
are different from his.

Free and Independent Cuba.

With the election of Thomas Es-
trada Palma as President, of Louis
Estevez y Romero as Vice President,
and of the members of the first Cu-
ban senate, the free, independent
Republic of Cuba in effect takes its
place among the established Govern-
ments of earth. The people of the
United States should rejoice equally
with the people of Cuba in this con-
summation of the latter's long strug-
gle for freedom. We have the
right to rejoice with the Cubans, be-
cause we won their freedom for
them and we have dealt fairly with
them in assisting them to form their
independent national government.

This is a very gratifying thought
to consistent Americans familiar
with American history and with the
ideals that have always animated
the best American action. There
has never been a more consistent
page of American history written
than that on which is recorded the
story of Cuba's liberation from the
yoke of Spain and of the establish-
ment of the Cuban Republic under
the helpful protection of the United
States government, the world's
greatest Republic. We should be
very proud of this American record,
so proud, indeed, that, until Cuba
herself asks to be annexed to the
United States, the Cuban Republic
shall be as safe from overthrow as
is our very own.—St. Louis Republic.

The Hereford Orchestra met at the home of Dr. Gough last Wednesday evening and discoursed music divine to a small but select and appreciative crowd.

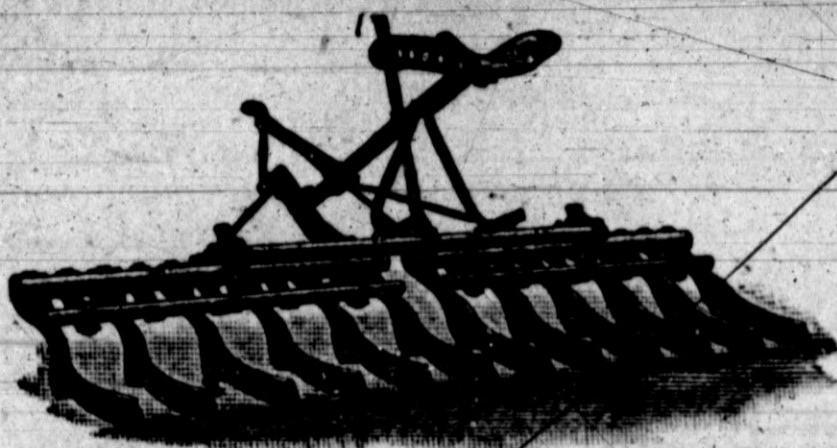

The contract for the new Methodist church was awarded to contractor J. P. Snyder. We feel safe in saying that they will have a splendid edifice. The building will cost about \$2200. This, with cost of seating and furnishing, will run the total expenditures up to about \$2000.

We learn that the Dimmitt Telephone Co. let the contract for the erection of their line from here to Dimmitt to Turrentine brothers of this place, who began work Tuesday morning. It is thought that the work will be completed in two weeks. This line will be connected with the lines of the Hereford Telephone Company, making it very convenient for both Dimmitt and Hereford people.

The exportation of cattle direct from Texas to Liverpool has again opened up within the last month or two with apparent success. We say success for the reason that the parties who made an experimental shipment a few weeks ago, after receiving returns, immediately brought another ship load which is now on the ocean. With a good brisk foreign demand and two big packing houses at Fort Worth, Texas feeders ought to be able to realize top prices for their cattle.—Farm and Ranch.

A Southwestern Museum.

Considerable interest attaches to the statement that an extensive ethnological and archeological museum is to be established at Albuquerque, New Mexico, by the Curio Department of the Harvey Company, as an adjunct to the new Hotel Alvarado. This museum will undoubtedly be the largest and most complete of its kind in the world.

The collections already gathered by the Harvey Company are valued at many thousands of dollars, and embrace specimens of everything relating to the life, customs and environment of the Western American Indians.

Many of the exhibits are so rare as to be practically impossible of duplication. In the course of a number of years' collecting, there have been gathered and reserved many of the choicest examples of Indian wares—implements of warfare and agriculture, fantastic adornments and musical instruments, blankets, baskets, stone axes, looms and prayer sticks, idols, silver ornaments, skulls of cliff dwellers, totem poles, jewels, wampum beads, odd carvings, cooking utensils and gaming implements. These represent Navajo, Aztec, Zuni, Moki, Pima, Toltec, Apache and many other peoples, of some of which even the name is lost. That this fine collection is the result of what was primarily a commercial enterprise, does not detract from its scientific value. Indeed, in the gathering and classification of the specimens some of the best known scientists of the country have contributed.

The location of the museum at Albuquerque, on the border of this strange new-old land of the Southwest, is a fortunate one. Local pride in the extent and completeness of the exhibits will undoubtedly bring to them from time to time new treasures from private collections in New Mexico and Arizona, the existence of which is perhaps not now even guessed.

Explorers are constantly traveling in remote districts of this western treasure land among savage and primitive tribes, seeking to perfect this or that link in the historic web the great museum is weaving. Incidentally they will pick up, as opportunity offers, the best examples of present day artificers in the line of work in which the Indian excels.

Expert Indian workers on pottery, silver and blankets will ply their unique trades in the museum building, surrounded by all the odd contrivances of their native villages.

It will be worth one's while then to stop off at Albuquerque, to enjoy the new hotel, the curios and the Indians.

Improving the Santa Fe in Texas
The expenditures authorized by the Santa Fe for betterments this year are larger than ever before. It is noticeable, however, that these expenditures are all in the way of increasing the earning power of its lines and not for frills.
Among the work to be done is the laying of 135 miles of new 75-pound steel rails on the Texas line. Thirty-one steel bridges on the same line are to be replaced by larger and stronger types, to provide for the heavier locomotives and long trains.
A large section of the Texas lines are to be equipped for burning fuel oil from the Beaumont fields. This involves the erection of a number of immense steel storage tanks, and the installation of minor supply plants from which the locomotives will take the oil. Of the recent purchase of locomotives, fifty-three are to be assigned for service on Texas lines. These are only samples of similar improvements on other portions of the system, which already ranks as one of the first railways in the West.
