It's Back to D.C. for Protesting Farmers

WASHINGTON (AP) - The farm protest group American Agriculture, serving notice that it isn't dead or dying, has dumped 200 bushels of corn practically on the steps of the Agriculture Department.

Spawned in eastern Colorado in 1977, American Agriculture a year ago was threatening a nationwide farm strike to force up the prices of wheat, corn and other commodities.

almost ceaselessly last winter with tractors and trucks to put pressure on Congress and the Carter administration.

The corn was dumped from a truck Thursday as leaders of the movement held a news conference on the back steps of the department's administration building.

After unloading the corn in a long pile

The strike didn't materialize but the loosely-knit group roared into town Bergland Receives 200-Bushel 'Gift'

in the street, the truck drove off before authorities could stop them.

Federal police cordoned off the pile to reroute traffic. There was no violence among the 20 or so farmers during the

City trash trucks appeared and

workmen began scooping the corn to take it to the dump along with paper, empty whisky bottles, broken tree limbs and other refuse.

But bystanders, noting that the grain was headed for the dump, began filling plastic bags, cardboard containers and

even coat pockets to take home to feed birds and suburban livestock. At least two small pickup trucks also were loaded.

By early afternoon, the grain was removed, much of it salvaged by the alert passersby. Some reportedly wound up as feed for National Park Service horses.

Wayne Peterson of Holabird, S.D., a spokesmen for the farmers, said "that's a good question" when a reporter asked who owned the corn in the first place.

Several others in the group said the corn was trucked in from Michigan, where farmers had donated the grain for the demonstration.

Peterson said the corn was worth less than \$2 a bushel at the farm, meaning the dumped grain probably was worth less than \$400.

Peterson read a prepared statement in which American Agriculture urged (See FARMERS, Page 2)



Strikers' Birthday Rally Set

The American Agriculture Movement, born in an hour of desperation in 1977, is officially one year old this week, and supporters of the grass-roots farm protest movement will gather in Lubbock tomorrow to look back over a year of activities that began with a talk session in a Colorado coffee shop.

The birthday rally will be held at the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium and Texas Tech Campus, beginning with a chili supper at 6 p.m.

A rally, scheduled for 8 p.m. will feature speakers including Gerald McCathern of Hereford, Alvin Jenkins and Father Andy of Colorado, and Tommy Kersey of Georgia.

The farmer protest movement, which listed 100 percent parity prices for agricultural commodities as its goal, grabbed regional attention one year ago when it was launched with a massive tractorcade to Amarillo.

The movement grew in strength over the late fall and winter months with blockades and tractorcades accounting for much of the organization's activity.

The group's efforts reached a peak in lanuary of this year when thousands of farmers descended on Washington to lobby for more favorable farm legislation,, focusing national attention on the movement.

AAM activities slacked off during the spring and summer, but spokesmen for the group say that lobbying activities will resume where they left off after fall harvest, and another mass movement on Washington may be in store for January.

SPS Won't Fight Ruling, **Biggers Says**

Brac Biggers, Panhandle division manager for Southwestern Public Service Company, announced Thursday that after considering all alternatives, SPS has decided to accept the \$15.9-million rate increase granted by the Public Utilities Commission of Texas.

"We feel that to pursue the matter further would be an unnecessary added expense to the cities, our customers and the company," Biggers said. "However, the \$15.9-million is not enough to cover our expenses as they were presented to the regulatory bodies.

"In order to continue to build coal-fired plants to take care of our customers' needs and comply with Texas Docket 600, I'm sure it will be necessary to request another adjustment to our rates in the near future."

"Of course, we will make every effort, as we have in the past, to hold the line on expenses and continue providing the highest quality of service to our customers," Biggers said.

Former Bell VP Indicted

Along with Amarillo Lawyer, 4 Others

DALLAS (AP) - A federal grand jury has indicted a retired vice president of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. and five others on charges of bribery fraud and income tax evasion.

Authorities allege it was part of a four-year scheme that bilked the utility out of more than \$1.7 million.

Ray A. "Pete" Acker, 63, a former vice president for data systems at Bell's headquarters in St. Louis, was named in two indictments alleging he failed to pay \$585,000 in income taxes on more than \$1 million in bribes and kickbacks paid to him in 1975 and 1976.

The two indictments, both naming all six men, accuse Acker of accepting bribes for providing advance bid information and kickbacks for arranging the lease of computers and copying equipment to Southwestern Bell.

The indictment said the scheme defrauded customers, competitors, stockholders managemen of the telephone company from June 1974 to March 1978.

Also indicted Thursday were Irven Eugene Barlow and Richard Reid Wadsworth Jr., officials of Intercap Corp. of Dallas; Robert Ancel Palmer Jr., president and owner of International

Equipment Financing Corp. of Dallas; Robert Charles Sullivan Jr., former president of Citizens State Bank of Princeton, north of Dallas; and Warren Eugene Zimmerman, an Amarillo lawyer who has an office in Dallas.

Dallas businessman Joel H. McQuade, who's name surfaced along with Acker's this summer when some details of the federal case were revealed, was named an unindicted co-conspirator. The Dallas News reported today McAquade, former president of the Dallas Playboy Club, was offered immunity from prosecution in (See BELL, Page 2)

Texans for Tax Relief' Forms

A new organization - Texans for Tax Relief - has been formed to win voter approval of a "tax relief" amendment to the Texas Constitution in the November election.

Former state Republic Party chairman Ray Hutchison of Dallas and Marcella Perry, a conservative Democrat from Houston, announced the organization's birth at a news conference Thursday.

"We will spend what we can raise," Mrs. Perry said of the campaign. She has banking interests and is chairman of the board of regents of Texas Woman's University.

The sproposed constitutional amend-

ment the organization supports provides for the valuation of farm and ranch land on the basis of productivity rather than market value; creates a general homestead exemption from school taxes; provides for increased homestead exemptions for the elderly; and ties state spending to the growth of the economy unless the Legislature votes otherwise.

"That would be a very tough vote and, accordingly, a very real limitation" on state spending, Hutchison said.

In other political campaigning Thursday in Texas, Republican gubernatorial candidate Bill Clements announced the appointment of Fred Wulff of Brady and Jay Anderson of Eagle Lake and East

Bernard as co-chairmen of Farmers and Ranchers for Clements.

Rep. Bob Krueger, Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate, said he will be in Austin Oct. 16 for a \$25-a-couple fundraising reception in his honor. The committee for the fundraiser includes Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas.

Sen. John Tower, who opposes Krueger, said in Port Arthur, "I am sorry that the House failed to override the president's veto on the Public Works Bill. This contained many projects of great need in Texas. I think it reflects the administration's insensitivity to the needs of the western states."

Senior Citizens' Head Remembers Swift Campaign

Of all Debbs Knox's many accomplishments and contributions locally, the one he seems most proud of is his 1966 stint as United Way drive

"Melvin Jayroe was president; I was drive chairman," said Knox, who now is president of Hereford Senior Citizens, a United Way agency. "We made our quota in eight days. Fastest of any town this size in Texas."

Knox was president of United Way the following year. He has always supported the United Way.

"I sure have. I believe in it. I've always been a contributor and I worked in it for years. I'm going to work in it again this year."

Hereford Senior Citizens' share of the 1979 budget is \$4,625. Most of that

money will be used to pay a director; the rest will pay what Knox called "many incidental expenses."

The first-ever Hereford Senior Citizens director, who was to have been hired Thursday night in a meeting of the organization's board of directors, will oversee the operations of the senior citizens center, located at 406 W. 4th, in the former Central School building.

"We sure need one (a director)," Knox said. "The director will meet with civic clubs and senior citizens groups around the area and work up programs and entertainment." Hereford Senior Citizens, like all

United Way participants is a non-profit organization which provides game-playing and programs to persons age 55 and older.

Bridge and dominoes take up most of the afternoon for the seniors. There also is "Game Night" on the first and third Thursdays of each month, with the fourth Thursday devoted to a covered dish social.

"Everyone brings food and sets it on one table at the social. We go through the line and, after that, we'll have a quartet or speaker or some Kind of entertainment," Knox said.

Women also quilt at the center. Some seniors enjoy participating in an arts and crafts class, which began this

Plans for the future, include a nutrition program during lunch. "We're hoping for a government subsidy so we can have a lunch program."

Speaking of subsidies, Knox said, "we don't get all our money from the government. Even on grants, we have to come up with a percentage."

Knox drives a van for the center. picking up seniors who have no way to shop, go to the doctor or participate in center activities.

"If they don't have transportation, I'll pick them up." Knox said. "We don't call this a taxi, but that's what it

Tax-Cut Package Called Inflationary

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Roth-Kemp plan for a 33 percent tax cut over the next three years is facing a critical vote in the Senate, where opponents are branding the Republican proposal an inflationary time bomb.

"American consumers would pay for the Roth-Kemp tax cut with higher prices," Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd cautioned in advance of today's

But Sen. William V. Roth, R-Del., said his plan, in contrast to the version approved by the Senate Finance Committee, offers real tax cuts for what he calls the forgotten middle class.

"Unless Roth-Kemp tax rate reductions are adopted, most Americans will face a tax increase next year" because of inflation and higher Social Security taxes, Roth said.

The Roth-Kemp amendment, backed by the Republican National Committee. would commit the government to cutting taxes not only in 1979, as the Finance Committee bill would do, but in 1980 and 1981 as well.

The amendment would reduce individual income taxes an average of 8 percent in 1979, 10 percent in 1980 and 15 percent in 1981. Individual and business reductions would total \$100 billion to \$210 billion over the three years. The Finance Committee version would reduce taxes by \$22.9 billion, or about 8 percent, in 1979.

The 223-190 House roll call fell 53 votes short of the two-third majority necessary to override Carter's veto. Had the House voted to override, a similar majority would have been required in the Senate to enact the bill over the president's objections.

After the vote, Carter said in a statement: "This has been a tough-fight. I am gratified by the results ..." He said the vote amounted to "a long step in the battle against inflation" and that the nation "owes a debt to the Congress for its wise and responsible action.'

Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill had warned that the veto - no matter what the outcome - would make enemies for the president just as his crucial energy legislation nears final passage.

Leaders of both chambers said no effort would be made to rewrite the public works bill to suit Carter before Congress adjourns Oct. 14. Instead, a routine continuing resolution would guarantee financing for existing projects, while new ones in the measure will await action next

Unemployment Edges

Up in September

WASHINGTON (AP) - The unemployment rate edged up from 5.9 percent to 6 percent in September, but the number of adult women with jobs increased sharply, the Labor Department said today.

The report indicated that the jobless rate is stabilizing at the 6 percent level, a big improvement from the 6.8 percent rate a year earlier.

Most of the gain in unemployment last month was caused by persons new to the labor force looking for work. The number of Americans with jobs advanced by 290,000 in September to 94.9 million, the department said.

"A substantial increase in the number of adult women with jobs accounted for the bulk of the increase," the department

"And, for the first time ever, more than half of their population were working or seeking work," it said.

The report showed that 37.95 million women over age 20 either had jobs or were looking for work out of a population group of 75.87 million.

The number of adult women holding jobs rose from 35.2 million to 35.7

million, an increase of about 500,000.

The only group experiencing a decline in employment was teen-agers, whose unemployment rate rose from 15.6 percent to 16.6 percent.

Indians Announce Birth Of Test-Tube Baby

CALCUTTA, India (AP) - Indian medical researchers have announced the birth of the world's second test-tube baby-a seven-pound, six-ounce girl.

But unlike the world hoopla that greeted the July 25 birth in Oldham, England of Louise Brown, the first child conceived outside the human body. details of the birth Tuesday of the second test-tube baby were cloaked in secrecy.

The names of the parents and child were kept shielded, apparently because the stigma of laboratory conception might hamper the baby's future marriage prospects in India's conservative Hindu society.

First word of the birth, at a unidentified nursing home in this teeming city on India's east coast, came Thursday in broadcasts by Calcutta's state radio.

The three researchers later appeared on Calcutta television and said their procedure differed in some respects from that pioneered by two British physicians who engineered the birth of baby Louise, but didn't say how.

Calcutta television identified the researchers as Drs. Sunit Mukherjee and Subhash Mukherjee of Calcutta Medical College and Dajadavpur University biology researcher Saroj K. Bhattachar-

Peterson added, however that there has been "nothing firmed up" for another tractor march this winter.

Another spokesman, Don Patterson of The Plains, Va.; said that many American Agriculture delegates felt that, while the strike talk of a year ago helped focus' attention, it "went against the grain" of many people.

Thus, he said, American Agriculture now is concentrating on a "positive approach" on how to use surplus land and commodities, such as making

gasahol fuel from surplus grain.

Patterson and other farmers said they were frustrated by USDA and others pointing to a rise in farmers' net incomes this year from 1977. Farmers still are not getting enough return on their investment, he said.

"They try to fool the people on how the whole thing works," Patterson said. "But too many farmers have been down here this year learning and understanding how the thing works, so we're going to continue to be here until we get some

things turned around." The USDA has forecast a record corn harvest this fall of 6.8 billion bushels. Added to what already is left over from past harvests, the corn supply is far larger than needed to meet domestic and' export needs in the coming year.

Consequently, market prices of corn are lower than farmers say it costs to produce it.

Bergland's answer is that farmers can

store part of their crop in a three-year reserve until prices go up. In a related development, the department announced Thursday that

farmers who put 1978 corn under government loan can enter the grain directly into the reserve program. Until now, only 1977-crop corn was

eligible for the reserve. But Bergland indicated two months ago that if there was not enough in the program by Oct. 1 he would allow corn from the new crop to enter right away.

The goal was to have 670 million bushels of feed grains - based on a corn. equivalent - in the reserve by then. But as of Sept. 29 only 413 million bushels were in storage. That included about 315.5 million bushels of corn plus barley, oats and sorghum.
