# City Grants \$4.2 Million SPS Rate Hike

THE IMPORTATION of water to the Panhandle and West Texas continues to be a dream for the future, but almost insurmountable problems have been encountered in most of the proposed water plans.

Because of this, it was with much interest that we read a recent column by H.M. Baggarly of The Tulia Herald. He suggests that the North American Water and Power Alliance (NAWAPA) is the most plausible of all water plans for the arid areas of the nation.

By taking just a portion of the melting snow from Alaska and northern Canada, the plan could benefit 31 states, seven Canadian provinces, and Old Mexico. In contrast, the plans to bring water from the Mississippi would cost billions and benefit only a small area, making it politically unfeasible so far as Washington is concerned.

Baggarly reports that the heart of the NAWAPA system is a 500-mile long storage reservoir in Canada at an elevation of 3,000 feet. The system would not only generate its own power for the necessary lift stations but would have a saleable excess. At today's competitive prices, it could produce income substantially in excess of \$4 billion annually from the sale of power, and related direct benefits.

Only a third of the generated power would be needed for lifting purposes, thus two-thirds would be for sale commercially, greatly easing the energy problem. With 31 states involved, as well as water needs in Canada and Mexico, it would be much easier to solve the political problems. Cost of the project is estimated at \$100 billion over a 30-year period, but if it earned \$4 billion a year it would be financially feasible over the

But, solution of the political and engineering phases could take as long as 10 years, and 20 years might be necessary to complete construction. It's not too early to begin thinking and working toward this plan, points out

Spanish Assembly of God Church, 135 Ave. G, needs a new sanctuary, and members have no idea how they are going to get

Fire destroyed most of the front part of the church, including the sanctuary and nursery, a few hours before Sunday morning

The cause of the fire is not known, still under investigation by

the Hereford fire marshal, and of little concern to church members, who say they are worried more about a meeting place. "We didn't know we didn't have insurance," said The Rev. Hector Sanchez, pastor of the approximately 100-member

church. "The insurance lapsed five months ago, and we weren't notified.'

The church building was purchased from First Assembly of God Church, which moved into new quarters, in 1976. Before the policy expired, the insurance company notified First Assembly instead of Spanish Assembly, Rev. Sanchez said.

"We found that out yesterday (Sunday) when we contacted the insurance people. Now we have a problem. I estimated the destruction at between \$15,000 and \$20,000," he said.


Members will meet in the basement dining room of the church until they can find a larger place. The room can accommodate about 50 persons, and the usual Sunday morning attendance is around 140.

Rev. Sanchez said that church members completely remodeled the building after it was purchased. New carpet, curtains and pews were installed, and the sanctuary was paneled.

"It was a pretty church," the pastor said. "Our people were proud of it.' The fire, which apparently had been burning for a long time

when it was noticed by a telephone line repairman around 7:30 a.m. Sunday, destroyed the carpet, curtains, pews, piano, hymnals and nursery. Smoke damage in the entire front portion

### Nullifies Fuel Cost Adjustment

**Managing Editor** The Hereford City Commission Monday night said that a Southwestern Public Service rate increase should be nearly \$17 million less than what the utility requested, then abolished the controversial fuel cost adjustment on SPS billings in the city.

Cities have the authority, according to the act which created the Public Utilities Commission, to set their own electric rates. The city commission Monday conducted a public hearing to do just

An ordinance adopted by the commission stated that Hereford electricity rates should be computed on the basis of an overall \$4.2 million increase. SPS had asked the PUC to grant a \$21 million increase.

PUC examiners said the company should be entitled to additional revenues of \$15.6 million, and 70 percent of what SPS had requested.

Hereford and other Panhandle cities, all following the recommendations of a hired staff of rate analysts, are granting SPS an increase of about 20 percent what the company is seeking. Representatives of Panhandle cities met Thursday in Canyon to adopt similar ordinances regarding the increase.

"All of the cities present, about 20, agreed to abolish the fuel cost adjustment," City Manager Dudley Bayne told the commission.

The ordinance stated that analysts' studies showed that SPS "has, through application of an automatic fuel cost adjustment to its rates, collected excessive charges from its customers within the City of Hereford, and passed same along to its fuel-supply subsidiary....

The subsidiary, wholly-owned by SPS. is TUCO, which Bayne has taken numerous shots at in recent weeks. claiming that the company's profits have (See CITY, Page 2)

# 'Government' Aided Woman in Lawsuit

**Managing Editor** A Mexican-American woman who is suing for the reapportionment of Deaf Smith County commissioner precincts said Monday "the government" advised her to contact a San Antonio attorney for help concerning her allegations of gerrymandering.

Oralia Guzman, one of three plaintiffs, in the reapportionment suit, told The Brand that her concern about the small number of Mexican-American political candidates in Deaf Smith County inspired her to write a letter to a government agency, which she refused to name

"I would rather keep that (the name of the agency) to myself," Mrs. Guzman

"I thought, well, maybe Mexican-Americans have a chance in running for office, local office, that is, and so I asked for information from the government. I asked what we can do to have our people run for the commission...and have a chance to do something.

"I was told to contact this lawyer by the government."

### Sheriff Probes **Shooting Death**

Deaf Smith County Sheriff Travis McPherson said Monday there are still "unanswered questions" concerning the fatal shooting of a 53-year-old woman Sunday morning.

Mrs. Ernest Tijerina was discovered around 10 a.m. Sunday by her husband lying in the front seat of a car beside the couple's house southeast of town. She apparently had been shot once in the heart by a .32 caliber pistol found beside her body in the front seat.

Results of an autopsy ordered by Justice of the Peace Glen Nelson were expected sometime today. McPherson

Deaf Smith County Hospital board members Tuesday morning approved a new budget for 1978-79. The new operating budget was placed

at \$1,995,944, up only \$58,344 from last year's budget of \$1,937,600.

The new budget allows for a 9 percent hospital inflation cost factor, 8 percent in other hospital costs, 29 percent in hospital benefits, including an insurance hike, and in all, about \$1,016,531 in hospital salaries.

Hospital administrator Jim Bullard said the hospital experts total revenues of approximately \$2,019,428. This figure however, is only a forecast of upcoming revenues and indeed can rise or fall, especially with inflationary hospital

Helping make up some of the hospital expenditures were the number of patient days in August.

Bullard said 1,008 patients visited the hospital in August. The figure represents a jump of about 172 patients from the

same time last year. . The volume of patients in August was what Bullard was happy about. In all hospital procedures, including surgical and lab work, the numbers are up from

# Thwarted Hog Business Turned into Peas for Lady

Roberta Campbell taught before she farmed but the long-time Deaf Smith County resident/whose black-eyed peas have gained fame as far away as Alaska says farming it her first love.

"I just got tired of school teaching and doing the routine of doing something at the same time eyery morning. I had an uncle and aunt living here, and I had lived and taught here, and I had visited here a lot, so I moved here to farm." said Miss Campbell, who at 76 enjoys the fruits of labor as much now as she ever

"When I came here to farm, they were beginning to develop irrigation. They had previously had irrigation wells, but they didn't have good pumps. They had those

big, ol' 22-inch bowls and great big Bussamer engines, and they said that everytime the motor turned over it said.\* 'one dime, one dime' or 'give me a

"They they started making those 10-inch bowls, and they could be pulled by a much smaller motor. Irrigation became more practical.

"I had about 120 acres when they started this wheat allotment program before you were born. The program said I had to leave part of it out-they had too much wheat and didn't want people to grow. But I had started planting, and I ended up with a little block I didn't know what to do with: so I planted barley.

"When I harvested the barley, I didn't know what to do with it, so I traded part

of the barley for three hogs, shoats, to fatten out. I fed them on barley soaked in buttermilk. One day, I came home from town, and someone stole the hogs. carried them off.


"I always thought they did me a favor. I went out of the hog business pretty fast. And that's when I planted black-eyed peas."

She's planted them ever since, getting

a \$1 bushel when she started and \$3 now. "When I started, they came from everywhere to pick my black-eyed peas for canning. The reason they cost more now is because the seed costs me three or four times as much, gas to run the motor costs a lot more, and the gas to drive the tráctors costs a lot more.

"I certainly understand the farmers'

Most Cities Vote

### To Maintain Tax

AUSTIN. Tex. (AP) - More Texas cities have decided to keep the local sales tax on utility bills than have voted to repeal the levy on residential gas and electric bills, says Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock said Monday that a total of 125 cities have notified his office they will repeal the one percent local sales tax while another 127 cities have notified him they will retain the tax.

A total of about 900 cities levy the one percent city sales tax. The cities had until Sept. 10 to notify the comptroller they wanted it repealed.

Bullock said all homeowners and renters will enjoy an additional \$150 million tax break when the state's four percent sales tax on utility bills is repealed, effective Oct. 1.

The one percent local sales tax on utilities will be automatically repealed in all Texas cities effective Oct. 1, 1979, unless they vote by May 1, 1979, to continue the tax.

Bullock said San Antonio, Dallas, Fort Worth and Austin have voted to repeal the local tax on this Oct. 1. Houston refused to repeal the tax, but has not yet notified the comptroller of its decision.

Other cities that have repealed the local tax include Alamo Heights, Baytown, Coleman, Columbus, Commerce. Cotulla, Denton, El Paso, Garland, Greenville, Hidalgo, Junction, Kilgore, Laredo, Lufkin, McAllen, Paris, Pasadena, Parr, Texas City, and Universal City.

The cities that have decided to retain the local sales tax include Hereford, Arkansas Pass. Bastrop. Bonham, Edinburg, El Campe, Farmersville, Freeport, Jefferson, Kerrville, Mason, Mt. Pleasant, New Braunfels, Plainview, Raymondville, Tyler, and Weslaco.

### Death Toll Enormous From Iran Earthquake

TABAS, Iran (AP) - The cloth-wrapped bodies stretched out in rows amid the ruins of ancient Tabas as relief workers predicted there would be more than 15,000 deaf from the giant earthquake

three nights ago. The bodies, some frozen in grotesque postures of sudden death, were lined up under palm trees, wrapped in white sheets or colorful handwoven cloth, while the gravediggers worked, unable to keep ahead of the steady stream of dead.

A Moslem clergyman prayed over the wrapped corpses.

Friends and relatives identified the dead as workers pulled the bodies from the rubble. The living slapped and struck themselves in the ritual of grief.

'Where is the army? Why doesn't someone help me?" an old man said as he wandered through the ruins in the city square searching for bodies of his family.

Only one of the 10 had been found, he

Some 10,000 of Tabas' 13,000 population were estimated killed by the quake. Thousands more were believed buried in surrounding villages, and rescue workers feared the toll would pass

The quake, the world's strongest so far this year, hit Saturday evening, crumbling minarets, mosques and mudbrick houses in this oasis city 400 miles southeast of Tehran, Tabas looked like a flattened sand castle.

It demolished 40 villages in northeast Iran, badly damaged 60 others and shook two-thirds of the rest of the country as well, including the capital. Aftershocks continue, fueling the fears of the

### Clements To Send

### Watchdogs with Hill

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Bill Clements said Monday he is sending out a watchdog team to follow Democrat John Hill over the state and correct any mis-statements they hear.

The Republican candidate made the announcement at a news conference in Fort Worth.

Meanwhile, another news conference on the same subject was held in Austin.

'The purpose of Operation Observation is to make sure that John Hill does not get away with running the same mind of negative campaign that he has has conducted," said Omar Harvey, appointed to head the observation team. Harvey was campaign manager for

Clements in the GOP primary. Harvey said he and his staff will immediately call a news conference in the town where Hill appeared "to publicly correct and air any mis-statement by

Clements also announced in Fort Worth that C.P. Hamer, Giddings rancher and a state director of the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas, was switching from the Hill campaign to Clements. He said Hamer worked for Hill in five agricultural counties during the primary.

### Leaders To Return Home from Victory

WASHINGTON (AP) - The leaders of Egypt and Israel, about to embark on the delicate job of selling the Camp David accords to their own peoples, first face a round of questioning on Capitol Hill.

Uppermost in the minds of members of Congress as they prepared to meet with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin were the critical tests facing the agreements reached by the two longtime

Both men scheduled appearances today before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and the House International Affairs Committee.

Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance. meanwhile, was preparing to leave on a hastily arranged trip in hopes of winning backing for the agreements from Jordan's King Hussein and Saudi Arabia's King Khalid.

Vance's goal, President Carter told a

nationally televised joint session of Congress Monday night, is "to secure their support for the realization of the new hopes and dreams of the people of the Middle East."

The support of both nations is considered vital to the outcome of the 'framework for peace' which Sadat, Begin and Carter signed at the end of their 13-day summit.

And Carter, in an extraordinary appeal to the Israeli parliament, asked it to approve the removal of settlements from Egyptian territory as a condition for

"It is my strong hope," he said, "that the question of Israeli settlements on Egyptian territory will not be the final obstacle to peace." The Knesset is scheduled to vote within two weeks on the settlements.

POLLY'S PROBLEM

DEAR POLLY — A long time ago I read in the column about how to wash furniture. I think the solution was made with pure olive oil and turpentine water but I do not remember the correct amounts. I hope someone can help me. — MARY G.

DEAR MARY G. — The formula I have for washing furniture consists of three tablespoons linseed oil and one tablespoon turpentine mixed well in a quart of hot water. When this cools a rag is wrung out of the solution and used to clean off a small area at a time which is immediately dried with a clean soft cloth. Continue until all is clean. Rub with the grain of the wood. — POLLY

# **Economists Fear** Economy Stranglehold

NEW YORK (AP) - The Federal Reserve System appears to be tightening credit another notch in its renewed fight against inflation. But many economists are becoming worried that the credit squeeze may become an economic stranglehold.

The Fed. which is the nation's chief banking and monetary authority. signaled what analysts see as another round of credit tightening by letting the target federal funds rate rise a notch to 8 3/8 this past week from 81/4 percent.

Since federal funds are reserves which banks lend to each other, the effect is to make money more expensive for banks. Not surprisingly, if banks end up paying more for their funds for a period of time. the higher interest rates are passed along to other types of loans.

Thus several major banks acted Friday

to raise their prime rates - the interest charged preferred corporate customers from 91/4 to 91/2 percent.

In theory, the credit-tightening tactic is used to reduce the amount of money in circulation and reduce inflationary pressures by trying to achieve a balance between the amount of money and credit available and the goods and services produced.

At the same time, since it makes loans more expensive, it also may slow economic growth because people and businesses may borrow less for purchases or business' investments.

Robust growth of the economy during the spring and early summer drove the money supply up, aggravating the Fed's fears of inflation. Price inflation has been at a 9.7 percent annual rate in recent

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

### Varicose veins and standing

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - I

would like to know if you would advise anyone with varicose veins to enter a profession that requires being on her feet most of the time - even if she wears support hose and arched

DEAR READER - That depends. If you mean standing still, the pressure builds up in the veins of the legs while you are standing and does aggravate varicose vein problems.

But if a person is moving around, walking and using the leg muscles, the movement of the leg muscles tends to pump blood out of the veins toward the heart actually draining them. Walking, as such, is actually helpful and is not a significant factor in causing varicose veins or making them

To illustrate the point, a barber has to stand still in one spot most of the day and that's very hard on the veins in his legs. The same is true

of anyone who has a similar occupation. A postman who must walk to deliver the mail, on the other hand, will be constantly milking the blood out of his veins, and that won't be a factor in causing varicose veins.

How severe the varicose veir's are is also important. When the varicose veins involve large, dilated veins deep inside the leg muscle, as well as those on the outside of the leg, the problem is more complicated. So, you need to know exactly what kind of profession you are talking about and how

bad the veins are. In general, I don't like the idea of telling someone that they can't be on their feet. That implies not being active. Lack of activity leads to other health problems. Since I am sure you would appreciate more detailed information about varicose veins and what can be done about them, I am sending you The Health Letter number 5-8, Varicose

DEAR DR. LAMB - Recently I read an article in the paper which mentions that humidifiers may be a cause of respiratory problems. The article quoted the Journal of the American Medical Association and advised that, while these devices put moisture back into the air, they can also harbor organisms that may cause pulmonary problems.

The article said that homeowners who had portable humidifiers should clean them at least once a week with a detergent and refill them with fresh water containing a growth deterrent chemical. They suggested copper sulfate. The article also said that if

the humidifier was part of the furnace that the screens ought to be cleaned fre-quently and a growth detergent applied. Is this true and do you have any comments about it? My wife has bronchial asthma and we need to make an effort to be sure that she doesn't have any

additional lung problems.

DEAR READER - Yes, the comments you have made are all accurate. I am afraid people just take the air they breathe for granted. It can either be too dry, full of chemicals or even full of organisms. Any device that circulates air and is able to accumulate water is a potential place for the growth of fungi and various organisms.

All air-circulating devices, whether they are airconditioners (central or window), humidifiers or any other device that's in the system of circulating the air you breathe should be kept clean at all times. All filters should be cleaned regularly. You should never allow standing water to accumulate in any part of the device as a breeding ground for organisms.
