Camp David Boosts Jimmy's Popularity Some

NEW YORK (AP) - Although the Camp David summit boosted Jimmy Carter's standing with many Americans, the public still has grave doubts about his ability to deal with domestic problems, particularly the economy and energy, an Associated

Press-NBC News poll shows. The surge in the judgment of Carter's overall performance totaled 16 points in the aftermath of the summit talks on the Middle East, according to the survey taken Tuesday and

Wednesday. But the surge is a relatively narrow one, focused on the Middle East in specific and foreign affairs in general.

Carter, as other presidents before him, has seen a decisive move in international affairs provide a substantial boost in his standing with the public.

On his overall performance, Carter got "excellent" or "good" ratings from 42 percent of the public, up from 26 percent last

He got "only fair" ratings from 45 percent of those interviewed, down from 53 percent in August. Twelve percent rated his work "poor." down from 20 percent last month. In both months, 1 percent was undecided.

But, asked specifically about energy and the economy, Americans gave Carter poor grades for his work.

In the economic area, only 19 percent rated him good or excellent this month for his performance, about the same as the 18 percent found last month. Seventy-seven percent gave him only fair or poor marks. Four percent were not sure.

On energy problems, the public gave Carter's efforts just a 22 percent good for excellent, slightly below the 24 percent found in August. Seventy-two percent judged his work on energy poor or only fair, and 6 percent were not sure.

Carter's low rating in these two areas near to American hearts and pocketbooks is also reflected in the public's continuing perception that Carter does not have the ability to get things done.

The percentage of Americans giving Carter credit for getting things done has risen about 10 points since May, but even the Camp David summit did not convince a majority of Americans that overall Carter had shown that trait.

This month, half of those interviewed say Carter has not shown he can accomplish much as president. Forty-three percent think he has shown the ability to get things done. Eight percent

In May, 63 percent said Carter hadn't shown he can get things done, while 31 percent thought he had.

The AP-NBC poll of 1,600 adults by telephone Tuesday and Wednesday was the first national survey since Carter explained the summit to the American people in a nationally televised address to Congress on Monday.

The reason for the jump in Carter's overall rating is clearly his success at negotiating a framework for peace in the Middle East with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israel's Prime Minister Menachem Begin at Camp David.

Nearly three-quarters of the public - 74 percent - gave Carter exceleint or good ratings for his handling of the Middle East situation. Only 23 percent gave him only fair or poor marks. Three percent were not sure.

That is 24 points higher from the 50-43 rating of Carter's role in the Middle East found by the January AP-NBC News poll this

But even that jump is overshadowed by the startling 35-point move in the public's rating of Carter's handling of foreign policy. Last month only 21 percent of the public rated Carter's foreign policy work good or excellent. This month, that figure was 56

Those rating his foreign affairs work only fair or poor dropped to 40 percent from 73 percent in August. Four percent were undecided in September.

Carter's current foreign policy rating is the highest of his administration, passing the 46 percent positive mark he received in May 1977 after his first overseas trip.

By contrast, Carter's overall performance rating is now at the same level found late last year and early this year, but still well below the highs of the early months of his administration.

A number of recent presidents have found - like Carter - that a decisive move in foreign policy can give a substantial boost to one's standing in the eyes of the American people.

John Kennedy's rating jumped after the Cuban missile crisis in 1962, as did Richard Nixon's after the Vietnam peace accord in 1973 and Gerald Ford's after the Mayaguez incident in 1975.

As with any sample survey, the results of the AP-NBC News polls could differ from the results of interviews with all Americans with telephones becaues of chance variations in the

For polls with 1,600 interviews, the results should vary no more than three percentage points either way simply because of sample errors. That is, there is only one chance out of 20 that the results of interviews with all American adults with telephones would vary from those results by more than three percentage

HEC Recommends Permanent Primary Law.

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Rank-and-file Texas voters will once again have a say in the nomination of presidential candidates in 1980 if the House Elections Committee has its way.

Committee members voted unanimously Thursday to recommend passage of a permanent presidential primary law.

And they tried to make it easy for the Legislature by letting party executive committees decide how to allocate delegates to various presidential hopefuls on the basis of primary vote totals.

Dividing national convention delegations among candidates according to how the votes went is the hardest job.

That issue tied the 1975 Legislature in knots as it debated what came to be

known as the "Bentsen Bill" that established the 1976 presidential primaries. The committee recommended that the

presidential primary be held on the same day as the June run-off primary for state offices - not the much more heavily attended May primary.

Parties would choose whether to even hold a primary. But if a party does hold one, all "major, nationally recognized presidential candidates" would have to be on the ballot.

Voters would choose among candidates themselves, not "surrogates or intermediaries or slates of delegates" as was the. case in the "Bentsen primary" of 1976.

Agriculture To Be Topic Of Tower Speech to HGC

U.S. Senator John Tower will assess the impact of the 95th Congress on agriculture during a speech to the Hereford Grain Corporation tonight in the Bull Barn.

The corporation will begin its annual stockholders' meeting at 7 p.m. The co-op grain elevator consists of 429

Tower, who calls himself a longtime advocate of Texas farmers and ranchers. will arrive in Hereford after late afternoon stops in Lubbock.

Tower, chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, is serving in his third term and is campaigning against U.S. Rep. Bob Krueger, D-New

Braunfels, for Tower's Senate seat. Tower says he introduced legislation to raise the amount paid to farmers for storing wheat and feed grains from 20 cents a bushel to 25. He also calls himself an original co-sponsor of the Flexible Parity Act, approved by the Senate but defeated in the House of Representa-

Tower is top-ranking Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee and is a member of the Senate Select Committee drafted the presidential primaryrecommendation, wanted the balloting to take, place at the time of the first primary

Resources Department **Votes for Free Stamps**

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The Texas Board of Human Resources voted Thursday to end the requirement that poor people make a cash outlay to obtain food stamps.

Board members made the decision at their meeting in Amarillo, and it was announced here.

Jerome Chapman, commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Resources, said he hopes to make the no-cash rule effective around Dec. 1. He must await authorization from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which runs the food stamp program nationally.

He said dropping the cash requirement would add 102,000 persons in 30,000 households to the 773,000 Texans now receiving food stamps.

Chapman said he expects the agriculture department to issue guidelines for eliminating the purchase requirement in early October. If the guidelines come out on schedule, the Texas agency will end the cash outlay

rule on Dec. 1, he said. A family of four receiving \$182 a month in food stamps now pays \$58 in cash for the stamps, thus getting a "bonus value" of \$124. When the purchase requirements are eliminated, the family will receive the same \$124 worth of stamps without paying anything.

"Eliminating the cash outlay provision in the food stamp program will provide needy Texans the same amount of nutritional subsidy, while permitting them to retain more of their limited resources for other necessities." Chapman said.

He said thousands of Texans do not have the money to buy their full entitlement of food coupons or are faced with a choice between paying their rent and utilities or buying food stamps.

Afterwards, the results were much the same. State Department spokesman Hodding Carter said Vance intended to continue talking to the Saudis, but Carter could report no change in the announced Saudi position that the accords are an unacceptable framework for a final solution to the Middle East problem.

The Saudis cite the same reasons as the Jordanians. The accords fail to guarantee ultimate Israeli withdrawal from the occupied territories of the West Bank of the Jordan River and Gaza Strip. For the Saudis, the accords' failure to deal with occupied Arab Jerusalem is a particular concern because of the Islamic holy

places there. The American position on those issues is that Israel, in the Camp David accords, agreed to a partial withdrawal. And once it has begun, the withdrawal process will acquire momentum, Vance argues. But his ability to make a case has been

hampered by the dispute with Israel over exactly what Israel agreed to at Camp David.

The most important squabble concerns Israel's freeze on new settlements in the West Bank area. Israel contends that pledge applies only for three months. The United States says it applies for five years, but it is hopeful the dispute will be settled soon.

Meanwhile. President Hafez Assad of Syria was hosting a Damascus summit of Arab leaders opposed to the Camp David agreements. The meeting is expected to overlap Vance's arrival in Damascus on Saturday, and Syrian Foreign Minister Abdel Halim Khaddam said the secretary's visit would have no effect on Syria's unequivocal rejection of the Sadat-Begin accords.

SFC Wants To Tie Hikes to Overspending

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Finance Committee, sensing a national mood for less government, wants income taxes to go up automatically whenever Congress spends more than it should.

Citizens would get the message when they fill out their tax returns. The form would spell out exactly why the tax was being raised - whether to pay for fighting a war or increasing federal aid to education.

The committee voted 8-2 Thursday to dd the Republican surtax provision to the big tax-cut bill it is writing. Eight members of the committee were absent. however, and they were to be given an opportunity to cast their votes today.

Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., chief sponsor of the proposed surtax to curb spending, said the idea is that if politicians have to explain to voters exactly why taxes are going up, they will stop and think before passing new programs.

By a 13-1 margin, the committee also approved a \$4.2-billion reduction in the tax on capital gains, despite the opposition of the Carter administration. More than ong-third of the money would go to persons with income above \$200,000 a year.

The House-passed version would slice individual and corporate taxes by \$16.3

Fall Arives Early Here

The calendar says fall arrives Saturday, but temperatures in Hereford the last two mornings would leave one to believe fall came a little early. Cool air settled over West Texas.

including the Panhandle, Wednesday, dropping the temperature in Hereford to 44 degrees. This morning's low was 48. Many Hereford residents had to warm

up their houses on the final days of summer, as gas consumption was up about 53 percent over a reading taken prior to the cold front.

"It's still not a quarter of our regular winter load, though," said Pioneer Natural Gas Co. manager Nicks Fariss. "It means that a bunch of heaters came on, but it appears not even half of them are lit."

Forecasters called for partly cloudy skies and a warmer afternoon in the Panhandle but predicted scattered rain and thundershowers over most of the state. Highs were expected to range from the 60s in the Panhandle to the 70s and 80s over the remainder of the state.

Another cool evening was predicted for tonight, with Saturday morning's low expected to be in the upper 40s.

Early morning temperatures today included 46 at Dalhart, 49 at Amarillo, 54 at Lubbock, 61 at Wichita Falls, 74 at Houston and 80 at Galveston.

Cherokee Sheriff Says Life Threatened

TYLER. Texas (AP) - Cherokee County Sheriff Danny Stallings says he believes a \$35,000 contract has been issued for his life in retaliation for a recent crackdown on drug dealing in his East Texas county.

"There are at least two people in this county that want to see me dead, and probably more," said Stallings, a former Department of Public Safety narcotics agent. "It takes good money to kill an

Last Friday, he said, an anonymous caller led him to a roadside park in the county in an apparent attempt to ambush

Stallings, suspecting the ambush, said he hid in a wooded area near the park until a small car drove up and dropped off a man carrying a shotgun. The sheriff said 25-year-old James Thomas Pryor shot at him once before Stallings returned

DPS officers and Texas Rangers are car that deposited Pryor at the park.

Early in August, Stallings' house burned down in a fire that has since been labeled arson.

Oil Fire Burns

In Louisiana Swamp

HACKBERRY, La. (AP) - A towering pillar of flames billowed over an alligator-infested swamp of palmetto and sawgrass today following an explosion that left one man dead and another seriously injured at the showcase storage site of the nation's strategic petroleum

The fire, visible 25 miles away

overnight, was expected to burn for at least two days. It was fed from an underground cavern - 10 stories high and as big as a city block - that held 7 million barrels of crude oil being stored as a hedge against foreign oil embargos.

The fire roared up a six-inch drill pipe during routine maintenance late Thursday and caught about 20 men on a steel drilling rig, officials said. Two men were burned while four dived to safety in a mudbank and the others clambered down a staircase just ahead of the flames. The heat melted the drilling rig.

"We don't know what happened," said Bill Parker, deputy project manager. But workmen said the fire was touched

off by a spark that was struck while they were pulling a drilling bit up the pipe.

"A big stream of oil spewed into the air about 50 to 60 feet high fog about 40 seconds. Then there was a loud explosion that rocked my truck and the oil caught on fire," said George LaBove, a mechanical inspector who was about a quarter mile

Israeli Troops Drag

Off Protesting Settlers

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - Israeli troops were reported moving in to drag off hundreds of Jewish settlers from a hilltop position in the occupied West Bank of the Jordan River after stopping two other attempts by punching protesters enraged by the Camp David accords.

'We never give up. We will continue to settle the land. This is our land and we intend to settle it," one of the leaders of the occupation said.

About 200 residents of Kiryat Arbe, a Jewish town near Hebron on the southern West Bank, occupied the hill and began building a house Thursday as soldiers were carting 300 other fighting settlers down rocky slopes from a mountain top site near Nablus.

Israeli radio said seven soldiers and seven settlers were injured in fistfights at the site near Nablus.

Israel television said another attempt to occupy a hill near the Jewish settlement of Maale Adumim, six miles northeast of Jerusalem, was halted immediately, but that fights broke out and a curfew was imposed in the area.

The settlers are enraged that the Camp David accords put a temporary ban on

new Jewish settlements in the disputed West Bank. The protestors are led by the nationalistic Gush Emunim, Hebrew for "Bloc of the Faithful."

Assassination Panel

Seeks Helms' Testimony

WASHINGTON (AP) - House investigators want former CIA Director Richard Helms to explain why the agency withheld significant information from the Warren Commission's investigation of the murder of President John F. Kennedy.

Helms, the top U.S. spymaster from 1966 to 1973, was scheduled to testify before the House assassinations committee today.

Although John McCone was CIA director when the commission was conducting its probe in 1964, Helms was head of the agency's clandestine services and was heavily involved in its dealings with the commission.

The committee was expected to seek Helms' explanation for the agency decision to withhold information about these matters:

-Bizarre CIA plots to assassinate Cuban leader Fidel Castro, possibly with the help of U.S. crime syndicate figures. Some conspiracy theorists have suggested Cubans were involved in Kennedy's murder as retaliztion for the plots against

-A Russian defector, Yuri Nosenko, who claimed he had been a high-ranking Soviet intelligence official with direct knowledge of Lee Harvey Oswald's activities during a three-year stay in Russia. The Warren Commission identified Oswald as Kennedy's killer and said he acted alone. The CIA believed Nosenko was a Soviet-planted spy at the time and thought he would offer no truthful information about Oswald.

Hereford police traveled arrests, which the report categorized as follows: seven runaways, three larceny thefts, three vandalisms, one aggravated assault, one public intoxication, one disorderly conduct and one miscellaneous offense.

In August, police investigated 53 accidents, which resulted in eight injuries and no deaths.

There were 308 traffic citations, 279 for moving violations, written in August. Of the total number of persons who were ticketed, 243 either pleaded or were found guilty in municipal court.

Jim Baker." Congress currently is considering federal price controls on gas sold within a state as part of an energy package that gradually would phase out all

gas ceilings.

Baker said in a position paper on energy that California's energy commission had urged a slowdown in conversion from gas to coal as a boiler fuel.

This, he said, was "because the fast pace of coal conversion in Texas would free a supply of 'cleaner' Texas natural gas for California use."

Electrical generating plants and other industries using gas to boil water to produce steam are under Texas Railroad Commission orders to reduce their consumption.

The-idea was to reduce dependence on the dwindling natural gas supply and convert to coal, currently a cheaper fuel for the amount of heat





Moth balls lingered

POLLY'S PROBLEM

DEAR POLLY - How do I get the smell of moth

balls out of a trunk? - PAT DEAR POLLY - I have a nice dress that was packed with moth balls and now the odor is so strong I cannot wear it. I washed it in a cold water detergent for delicate fabrics and aired it several times but it

DEAR PAT and J.C.P. - I would fill the trunk with crumpled newspapers and leave them closed up in it for a couple of weeks. The dress might be put in a closed box with crumpled newspapers, too, but do protect it from the newsprint by enclosing it in tissue

A rinse in salt water often obliterates such an odor in washable clothing. Also, if the color and fiber content in the garment (test first) will take it a solution of white vinegar and water is another possibility. - POLLY

DEAR POLLY - When crocheting with several shades of one color of yarn, such as when making a ripple afghan, I wind my yarn on numbered clean ice cream sticks. It is certainly easier to look at numbers than the different

Irrigation Change Told in History

Second of two parts, continued from Thursday: The sale of 327 acres of land in northwest Deaf Smith County was not an unusual occurence earlier this month, except that some background history was recorded by the original owner, the late Joseph Y. Chmelik of Chicago, Ill. In the first chapter, Chmelik discussed events leading up to the purchase of the half

At the time we purchased the land, I was foreman of the Douglas Parks Station (a Chicago branch post office) at a salary of \$1,000 a year and later, when I became auditor, it was \$4,000. In 1941 I was retired after 55 years of service.

Now, we come to the interesting part of the Hereford investment. After we had bought and paid for the land, mother and I decided I should see what I had bought. The Farwell people were still running excursions and Mrs. Colby was going on

I took our son, Arthur, who was then 11 years old, and we arrived in Kansas City on July 4, 1906. It was very hot there. The train took on some more land seekers and, being the 4th of July, Art was having a good time on the train with his firecrackers and some of the men. They had him setting firecrackers off under the seats of the sleeping men!

We arrived in Hereford and there, at the depot, was a line of horses and buggies in which we were put before there was a chance of local dealers getting to us. Off we went across the prairie with no fences to interfere for about 25 miles. There, they put us off into

a barn where we were fed and slept in the hayloft.

Some wanted to go back to town the next day, but no one would take them. However, Mrs. Colby managed to get a ride and took Art with her, as I can well remember.

That day, the agents took their victims (or were they?) looking over the land. That night, I got nervous about Art. It was the worst night I ever experienced and I don't think I slept a wink. The next morning I managed to get a ride to town.

Just as we got there, who do we see but Art and another boy on ponies. Art waved his hand and yelled, "Hello, Dad. We're going fishing!", and off they went.

When Art and I were in Hereford, we had our meals in one of the native's homes. As we set at the table, flies were all over the place. A young girl had sticks with strips of paper attached, and she stood around and distributed them. Yes, times do change and will continue to do

While in town, I overheard one of the natives say to another, "They can't make a living out of a section of land, they must have four or six sections!"

The Panhandle was known at that time as the great American desert, or Llano Estacado, and had roving buffaloes. Now, about the land itself. For many years we got no interest in it. Later on, Elliston rented it for us for grazing at 50 cents an acre. Late. I leased it for \$1 to \$4 an acre.

One time the renter had a bad season and couldn't pay the rent. The next year, I got a check for both years. As I had been leasing the whole section for both Cartwright and us, one-half the check was Cartwright's. "What did you do, sell the land?", asked Cartwright. Was he surprised to find out it was rent money, as Cartwright was on pension and it sure came in handy to him.

As you all know, the land had been leased for dryland farming, and the past few years we could only get \$3 per acre cash. This year, 1957, the lease expired. So, again I made a trip to Hereford and after 11 days doing the spade work, Min and Russ (Mr. and Mrs. Russell) arrived and I briefed them on what I had done and that the agricultural agent could not make any contracts with the soil bank at

After we got home, we found out the government would only sign up for one year. I was registered for five years, so that was up. Particularly when Min and Russ got the lowdown on irrigation, it didn't take them long to sell me on the idea. They agreed to take over, as I knew I was not equal to the problem. So now, the family will be the owners of an irrigated half section, instead of a dry

I hope the individual returns (of the heirs) will be as much and more than ours was. Last, but not least, my theory is paying off-showing an original investment of \$260 in 40 acres that grew into 327 acres now valued at about \$33,000. And, when it is irrigated it will be at least

Also, in the meantime, we had received in rentals many times its original cost. All of my children, as well as the Cartwrights, are fortunate to have this happen to you. It could not have happened without the unselfish cooperation of your dear mother.

Economy Outgrows Economists In Biggest Jump in 2 Years

WASHINGTON (AP) - The second-quarter growth in July, nation's economy grew at a more furious pace in the spring than economists previously believed, the Commerce Department said Wednesday.

The Gross National Product, or output of goods and services, grew at an annual rate of 8.7 percent, the biggest gain in more than two years.

The report was encouraging for the outlook for jobs and business activity. However, the economy slowed down somewhat in the summer.

Meanwhile, the department said the inflation rate for the second quarter was 10.8 percent, close to previous estimates. That was the biggest gain since a 12.8 percent increase in the fourth quarter of

issued its first report on second quarter," the depart-

saying the economy grew by 7.4 percent. Last month, it raised the figure to 8 percent before issuing the 8.7 percent figure today in its second revision.

The report removes the effects of inflation and makes adjustments for seasonal varia-

The report made it more likely that the Carter administration's goal of a 4 percent growth rate can be reached for the year. The economy had declined 0.1 percent in the first quarter during the coal strike and a severe winter before gaining substantially in the spring.

"If the strike and weather effects are set aside, real GNP probably would have increased about 3 percent in the first The Commerce Department quarter and 4 percent in the

The second quarter inflation was the biggest since a 12.8 percent gain in the fourth quarter of 1974.

The department said the main reason for the upward revision in GNP was an increase in exports of goods and services and rising inventory investments. Personal consumption expenditures were revised downward.

The department said corporate profits from current production increased \$30.8 billion in the second quarter to an annual rate of \$163.4 billion. In the first quarter, profits decreased \$15.6 billion. Beforetax book profits increased \$33.4 billion in the second quarter to

Overall, the nation's combined total output, without adjustment for inflation, was \$2 trillion, 87.5 billion.

Economists say it takes a growth rate of about 4 percent a year to keep unemployment from getting worse. The unemployment rate fell from 6.1 to 5.8 percent in August.

New economic figures have shown the economy is continuing to grow but at a slower rate. Industrial production grew 0.7 percent in June and July and percent in August, moderate growth pace. Consumer spending has tapered off but business spending, housing construction and airplane orders have remained strong.

The inflation estimate was only a slight increase from the 10.7 percent report on the second quarter issued last month. The Commerce Department's chain price index rose at an annual rate of 7.1 percent in the first quarter.



Rachel and her six brothers and sisters did not go to public schools, never used a hotel's swimming pool, and never spoke without their father's permission. Meals were taken to their suite and the children were never seen without their

parents. On Aug. 3, after learning of David's suicide, his wife, also named Rachel, ordered or pushed her seven children from the 11th floor balcony of their suite before she jumped. Police said she could not live without her husband.

Her eldest daughter suffered extensive internal, leg and hip injuries. She has been unconscious since the fall, only believers who supported the awakening sporadically to look

around her hospital room.

Dr. Terry Clemmer, head of intensive care, said Wednesday that she probably will become fully conscious slowly. He does much of what happened to her, at least he said the hospital will do everything it can to protect her privacy and shelter her from a curious public.

of the season, SWC teams are averaging one field goal and 1.5 attempts per game, where last season they averaged 0.9 successes on 1.7 attempts per

Field goals have ranged from longs of 46 yards by Erxleben and Ismael Ordonez to a short of 26 yards, also by Erxleben. The average attempt has been 35 yards and the average successful boot has been 32.

While the distance has dropped off slightly, the percentage has risen dramatically. Last year SWC kickers hit 88 of 171 attempts for 51.4 percent, this year it's 11 of 16 for 68.8 percent. Texas Tech's Bill (Blade) Adams is the leader with three successful kicks in three attempts, followed by Erxleben (2-for-2) and Houston's Ken Hatfield and SMU freshman Eddie Garcia, both one-for-one. As recently as last season, you could count on a meeting of the St. Louis Cardinals and Dallas Cowboys to go a long way in determining whether either club would be in or out of the National Football League title

This year, though, people are wondering whether the Cardinals are in or out of the league.

The Cowboys, shocked 27-14 last Sunday by Los Angeles, nevertheless are rated one of the National Conference's powerhouses, a preseason pick . to make it back to the Super Bowl - and favorites by more than two touchdowns to demolish St. Louis Sunday in Texas Stadium.

Sunday's other games are Los Angeles at Houston, Cleveland at Pittsburgh, Baltimore at Buffalo, Miami at Philadelphia, New Orleans at Cincinnati, the New York Jets at Washington, Denver at Kansas City, Detroit at Seattle. Atlanta at Tampa

Bay, Green Bay at San Diego, San Francisco at the New York Giants and, at night, New England at Oakland. Monday night's game is Minnesota at Chicago.

The Cards, East Division champions in 1974 and 1975 and 10-4 runnerup in 1976 before sagging to 7-7 last year, are staggering around under firstyear pro Coach Bud Wilkinson, winless in three games and the second-lowest scoring team in the league, a shocker considering they were among the most explosive teams in recent seasons.

'We are a disappointed football team," said the 61-year-old Wilkinson, a legend in the college ranks at Oklahoma. "Sure, the schedule is tough, but the schedule is a fact of life.

'We've had some injury problems. But you can't look at those two factors and say that's why we haven't won. We haven't won because we still have not played with the intensity we should have. We've lost because we've dropped passes and missed tackles.

Tom Landry, Dallas' coach, thinks that under those dismal numbers lie the same old Cards. "I see no difference in attitude and pursuit. They are a hard-hitting team. I look at the Cardinals and I see all-out effort. We've got to hit 'em fast. I'm still not worried. We can look awful bad but we also can look awful good."

Los Angeles, which looked awfully good in shutting down running back Tony Doreset of the Cowboys last Sunday, takes its unbeaten record into the Astrodome with the intention of doing the same thing to Earl Campbell, the Oilers' leagueleading rusher.

Cleveland, which hasn't won in Pittsburgh since 1969, is 3-0 along with the Steelers, so the winner of that game will own first place in the American Conference East. The only other unbeaten teams are Chicago. first in the NFC Central, and Washington, the surprise leader in the NFC East, one game ahead of the Cowboys and

Buffalo, Cincinnati and San Francisco, along with the Cardinals, are winless.

Akers' Recruits **Gunning For Him**

Three years ago Fred Akers on the road. was head coach at Wyoming. Some of the players her recruited will be playing against him Saturday night in Memorial Stadium when the Cowboys try to upset the sixth-ranked Texas Longhorns.

"They have some very good football players," said Akers. "They are tough and experienced and some of them have started for three years. It looks like their strengths are defense where they are large and have alot of experience."

The Cowboys are three to four touchdown underdogs against the Longhorns despite possessing a highly effective offensive weapon-running back Myron Hardeman, another Akers

"Hardeman is an All-America caliber runner," said Akers.
