DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

Proceedings of the County Democratic Convention Held April 26, 1902.

Pursuant to a call of the chairman, Judge Jno. E. Ferguson, of the Democratic executive committee, a goodly number of chizens met at the court house on the above date for the purpose of electing delegates to the different district and state conventions of the Democratic party of Texas.

The house was called to order by Chairman Ferguson and after explaining the object of the meeting F. M. Avis was elected to the chair and presided over the further deliberations of the convention.

Rat Jowell was elected secretary On motion the chair appointed a committee on resolutions consisting ds C. G. Witherspoon, R. F. Holloway and S. S. Evants.

The report of the above committee as reported and adopted is as follows:

WHEREAS, It seems probable that an effort will be made in the next legislature to abolish the quarantine line as established by state authority; and,

WHEREAS, We see in this danger to the stock interests of the Panhandle without good to those who advocate its abolition.

Resolved, It is the sense of this convention that the line should remain as provided for by the statutes and we hereby instruct our representative and state senator to use all honorable means in so maintaining the said line.

THE senate committee on a national university has reported a resolution raising the standard of admission to include only holders of Master's degrees instead of Bachelor's, as under former bills.

A RETURN to the common butter dish, and to the castor with salt, pepper and vinegar supplies, is predicted as a necessity forced on restaurant and hotel keepers by souvenir friends who carry off "individual" butter and salt dishes, etc.

THE republican policy of muzzling all persons in government service found its latest victim in an assistant secretary of the treasury, accused of giving "interviews" on a public question. So it is a misdemeanor to let the people know how they are being governed.

MR. ROOSEVELT seems to have lost caste by his use of broncho-busting methods in the white house. The people want a president not influenced by the characteristics of a nimrod or a rough-rider. They want dignity, conservatism, toleration and kindly consideration.

They would not hear of a reduced tariff on shoes, which would benefit the people, but want free hides so they can keep up the price on the finished article while they are favored with cheaper raw material.

Oliver Wendell Holmes said that society was a solution of books. It is too much to expect of overworked society to dissolve the 5000 or more new books the country is now turning out every year.

There is a chance now that should not be lost of putting the consular service beyond the mere reward of partisan allegiance, on a basis of permanency of employment to faithful and efficient consuls.

The supreme court attacked the railroads for giving illegal rebates to packing houses, and the packing houses get even with the people by raising the price of meat. The consumers have to pay for the misdemeanors of the trusts.

The University of Pennsylvania is said to possess the oldest piece of writing known. It is on a fragment of vase taken from the ruins of Nippur, in Mesopotamia, and dates back forty-five centuries B. C., being, in other words, 6,400 years old.

As long as supply and demand regulate prices by the strict rules of economics, a reduction of 10 per cent in the demand for butchers meats would soon bring the price down to normal. The people in this case have the remedy in their own hands.

Courts of Glasgow, Scotland, have decided that girls can no longer be employed in that city as barmaids. The case has attracted wide attention throughout the United Kingdom and the liquor and temperance interests are arraying for a fight as to the legality of the prohibition.

The bill to give millionaires more millions for running steamships at a profit will probably go over until the next session. This is wise, as some do not care to face their constituents with the record of having voted for this misappropriation of the people's money. After election, scruples will not be so urgent.

Prices in the Philippines are new thirty per cent higher than they were a short time ago, and the United States is asked to grant relief. In this country prices of certain necessities are forty per cent higher than they were a short time ago, but there is little hope that a trust-dominated administration will begin its charity at home.



A new universal language has been devised which is called "Esperanto" by its originators, who claim that it possesses advantages over any other system, including "Volapuk," which provoked such general discussion about fifteen years ago. It has similarities to English, Prench and Spanish, but with all irregularities eliminated. La Lomo, published at Montreal, Canada, is a monthly journal devoted to the interests of the new language.


