



position. In a lot of ways, the situation reminds us of the old fable about killing the goose that laid the golden eggs. No one wishes to wipe out our high living standards, whether they be in the shops, on the farms or in our retail stores. On the other

### Steel Strike Is Rolling Along

No negotiators were perhaps ever more independent than those found on both sides of the present steel strike, which closed out its 60th consecutive day this week. Labor Secretary Mitchell, in addition, has indicated that the government will continue its "hands off" policy at least until October.

Meanwhile, both sides are adding up staggering losses. Steel mills will not regain their financial loss for several months, perhaps even years. The workers-provided they get any sort of reasonable raisehave already lost incomes totaling two months salary, which means that they cannot break even in less than five years on a higher pay schedule, which the mills still refuse to grant.

All of which proves nothing we did not know. Strikes, like wars, seldom achieve the goals of which individuals dream and

More importance possibly rests on the settlement of this strike than most of us realize. Foremost, of course, is possible resulting inflation in case higher salaries are allowed. A drop in tax revenues is bound to result on both sides of the strike, along with using up any surplus or savings the mills may have on hand or which the striking workers must draw against to exist.

So far, no extreme pinch has occured in public consumption of necessities or luxuries. This is the point, in all probability, at which the government will step in to the picture. Up to now, the steel people and the laborers have hurt only themselves and, as the time for government intervention draws nearer, efforts to close out the strike should become more sincere and more intense,

### The BOOTLEG ---Philosopher

Editor's note: The Bootleg Philosopher on his bindweed farm writes about Chinese farming this week. At least, we think that's what he's writing about.

Dear editor: Everybody is supposed to be polite to Mr. Khrushchev on his visit to the United States, even if he is a Russian Communist dictator, but nobody has said we had to be polite to the Chinese Communists, and I was reading an article last night that made me laugh at how dumb the Chinese Communists are.

As I understand it, a few years ago the Communist bosses over there decided they were going to show the Chinese farmers how to farm, so they reorganized the whole business. What they did was throw all the farmers in "communes," this is, herd farmers in groups of around 5,000 into one place, build barracks for them, and run farming like it was a military operation.

What the Chinese bureaucrats failed to realize is that you can't throw people togther in close quarters with any success. Any big city proves that,

Also, they must have been working on the theory that a farmer lives in the country because he can't afford to live in town. They're wrong. Actually, these days, very few people can afford to live in either place, town or country, but the way I see it is, you can fail to make ends meet a lot more privately in the country.

I don't know about those Chinese farmers, other than that the news has leaked out they aren't happy about being herded up in barracks and agricultural production is far short of the goals the bosses set up, but the reason I live out here on this bindweed farm instead of in a big city is not because I couldn't swing city life if I tried, It's not because there's not room enough there for me. There's not room enough for the people already there, but that has no bearing on it. Cities keep on getting bigger anyway.

The Chinese Communists have another think coming if they believe they can improve agriculture by putting

formers in towns.

I've seen lots of farmers move to town, but it didn't help their farming ability. Most of them wound up becoming barbers or bankers or grocery clerks or merchants or bookkeepers or they ran for office. Of course I know some city people own farms, but generally speaking they're not causing the agricultural surplusses.
