New Directors
Of C-C Named

Four directors were named to
the board of the Deaf Smith
County Chamber of Commerce
this week. They are Les Combs,
Bill Dameron, Wayne Phillips
and Oliver Stouffer.

Canvass of votes was made
Thursday by the nominating
committee. They counted 316
ballots. Two others were disqual-
ified by the committee.

The newly-elected directors
will serve three-year terms,
commencing on Feb. 1, 1960.

There will not be any retir-
ing directors this year, since a
re-organization of the Chamber by
laws recently included a re-
vision that current directors'
terms be extended from two to
three years.

Deadline for the voting was
Tuesday, Dec. 15. The ballots
were to have been canvassed
on Wednesday, but bad weather
forced a postponement of one
day.

New Insurance
Plan For Local
Schools Adopted

In a special meeting, trustees
accepted a sweeping new in-
surance program for the Here-
ford Rural High School District.
The meeting was held Wednes-
day afternoon after bad weather
forced a postponement from
Tuesday evening.

The new plan provides single-
policy coverage for all the
many physical plants and buildings
of the school system and, ulti-
mately, will do away with the
41 policies now used to protect
school facilities. Previously ap-
proved in substance, the details
were presented Wednesday for
board consideration.

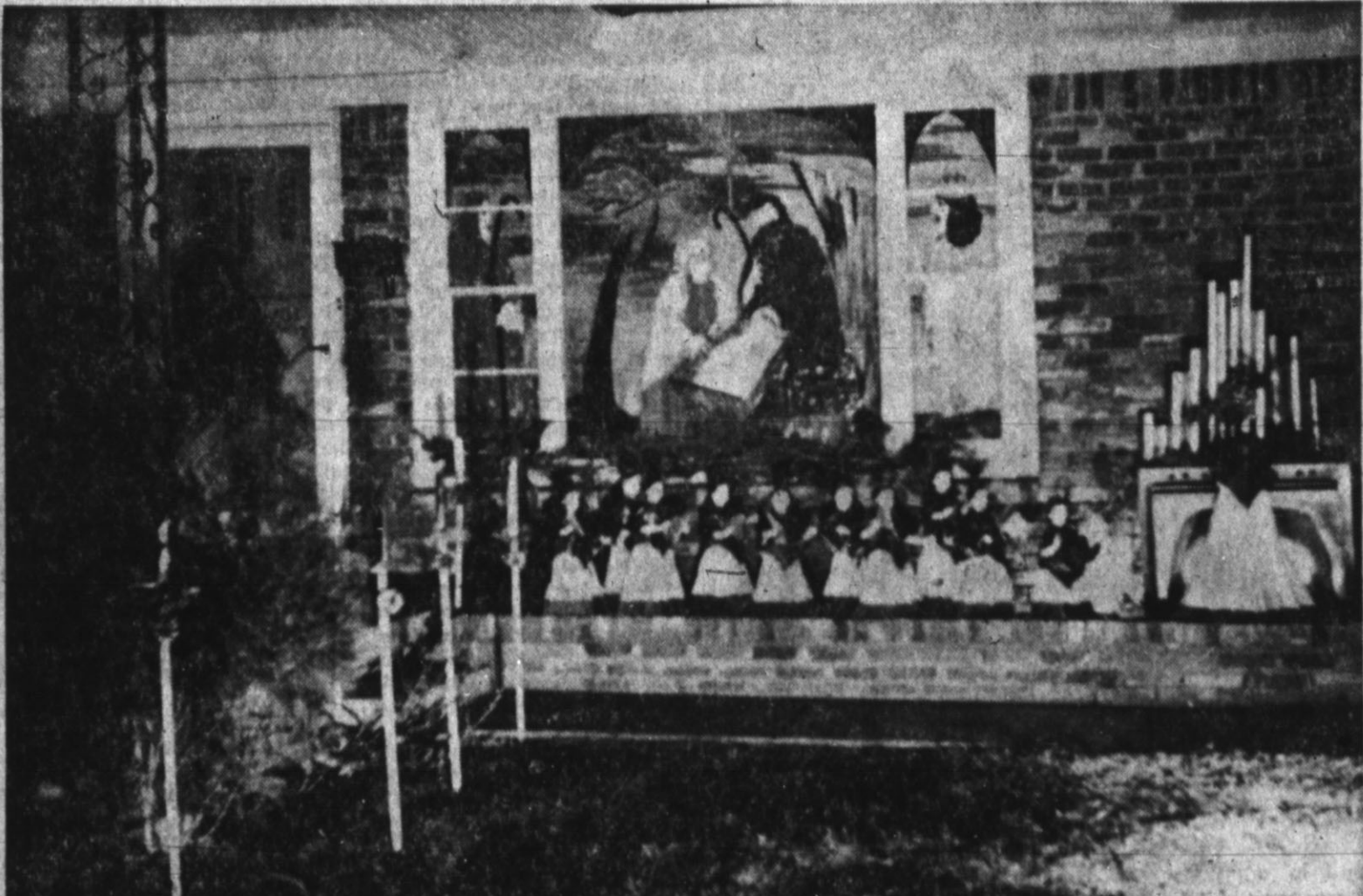
Under the new plan, the
school will have \$3,681,800 of
insurance. Previous policies
had totalled \$1,642,300, but did
not provide coverage for three
major buildings. Two of these,
Northwest Elementary and a
cafeteria-administration
building, have been complet-
ed. The other, classroom addi-
tion and gymnasium for Stan-
ton Junior High, is to be fin-
ished soon.

New coverage includes \$103,-
000 for Northwest, \$145,000 for
the junior-senior high cafeteria
and \$330,000 for the Stanton
addition.

An additional \$861,500 in cov-
erage for existing buildings also
is included in the master plan.
Previously, the school had car-
ried insurance with seven Here-
ford agencies, each writing sepa-
rate policies. The new plan,
which was prepared and will be
administered by Robinson-Decker
Agency, provides for cov-
erage under a single, five-year
policy.

In return for handling the en-
tire program, and submitting an
annual report and survey, Rob-
inson-Decker will receive 50
per cent of the commission. The
other six agencies which had
been handling insurance for the
school will share the remainder
of the Commission. They are:
Hereford Insurance, Plains In-
surance, Lone Star Insurance,
E. E. Fridley Agency, McLean
Insurance and Hugh Bookout
Agency.

Under the master plan, insur-
ance on Park View Elementary

Tough Foes For
Herd After Loss
To Friona Squad

Hereford's Whitefaces will
face two tough opponents on
consecutive nights next week.
Monday they will host the
rugged Dimmitt Bobcats and
Tuesday to try the Bulldogs.
With top scoring threats in
Junior Coffey and Hal Ratcliff,
the Bobcats have fared well this
season. During the Hereford
double header, they lost to Palo
Duro and beat Canyon.

Plainview, one of the under-
rated teams in the 3-AA loop,
already holds one win over the
Herd this year.

Friday night, Hereford was
on the losing end of a mild upset
at the hands of the Friona
Chiefs.

Working hard on rebounds and
hitting the easy shots, the Chiefs
pulled out front late in the game
to take a 48-43 victory.

Hereford matched the Chiefs
shot for shot in the first period,
which ended in a 12-12 dead-
lock. Behind the shooting of
Lynn Eastberry, the Chiefs
moved into a 24-19 lead at the
end of the half.

With Charlie Thomas netting
nine points in the quarter, the
Whitefaces pulled up to trail 36-
35 at the end of the third per-
iod.

But it was all Friona in the
final stanza of the loosely-of-
ficiated game.

Thomas garnered 13 points
and sophomore Dennis Hodges
hit 10 for Hereford. Castleberry
was high for Friona with 15.

The lead changed frequent-
ly in the contest. The Herd
led 39-27 with 5:50 left in
the game, but the Chiefs roared
back to a five-point margin
and swapped baskets in the
closing minutes.

Rain Brightens
Farm Prospects

"Rain and melting snow and
ice this week certainly brighten-
ed farmers' prospects of yield-
ing as much as 20 bushels to the
acre in some Deaf Smith County
dryland wheat fields," said
County Agent J.W. "Lefty" Thom-
as Friday.

With very little runoff, most
of the 4.53 inches of moisture
gauged in the county penetra-
ted deeply into the soil, boost-
ing prospects for high yields
for the 1960 wheat crop.

Irrigated fields will gain ben-
efits from the moisture also,
Thomas explained, as irrigation
expense will be cut for some
time.

"The moisture hit the wheat
crop at a very good stage of its
growth," Thomas said. Some
dryland farmers have high hop-
es of realizing up to 20 bush-
els an acre.

Much of the 1960 crop was
planted here in August and Sep-
tember and will be harvested in
June or July.

Thomas said that the mois-
ture should help boost pasture
development. During the ice
storm, however, many livestock
raisers were in a precarious sit-
uation because of absence of el-
ectricity to power water pumps.
Many county dairymen had to
milk by hand in the light of a
kerosene lantern, Thomas said.

Hereford's official moisture
gauge at City Hall recorded the
following amounts: 1.93 Tuesday,
.45 Wednesday, 2.13 Thursday
and .02 Friday.

Country Club Buys
Site; Draws Plans

After several months of activ-
ity, the Hereford Country Club
organization has purchased a
site for its building and facili-
ties.

A location on the south side
of the John Pitman Municipal
Golf Course was purchased
this week. It includes about
seven acres, with an 1170-
frontage on Austin Road.

Country Club president Clint
Formby announced the purchase
this week, as a climax of the
search for a permanent location
for the newly-organized Country
Club.

Upon its organization, the club
negotiated for purchase of land
adjoining the south edge of the
golf course, then dealt with the
city for lease of a location on
the north side of the course.

"We feel that we have an ex-
cellent location, with room to
expand in the future," Formby
commented in announcing the
purchase.

Oscar A. Schilling, Amarillo
architect has been commis-
sioned to draw plans for the club
house, swimming pool, wading
pool and tennis courts.

It is now planned by the
club's directors to call for con-
tractors' bids on the facilities
about Feb. 15. If bids are ac-
cepted, the club house and
swimming pool should be com-
pleted by July 1, Formby
said.

Elo J. Urbanovsky, head of
the department of horticulture
and landscape architect for Tex-
as Tech, has been retained by

the club to aid in locating the
building on the site and plan-
ning landscaping features.

"When the group was forming,
some 300 family memberships
were planned as a maximum.
About 200 such memberships, at
\$500 each, have been sold. Ap-

your angel after the flick.

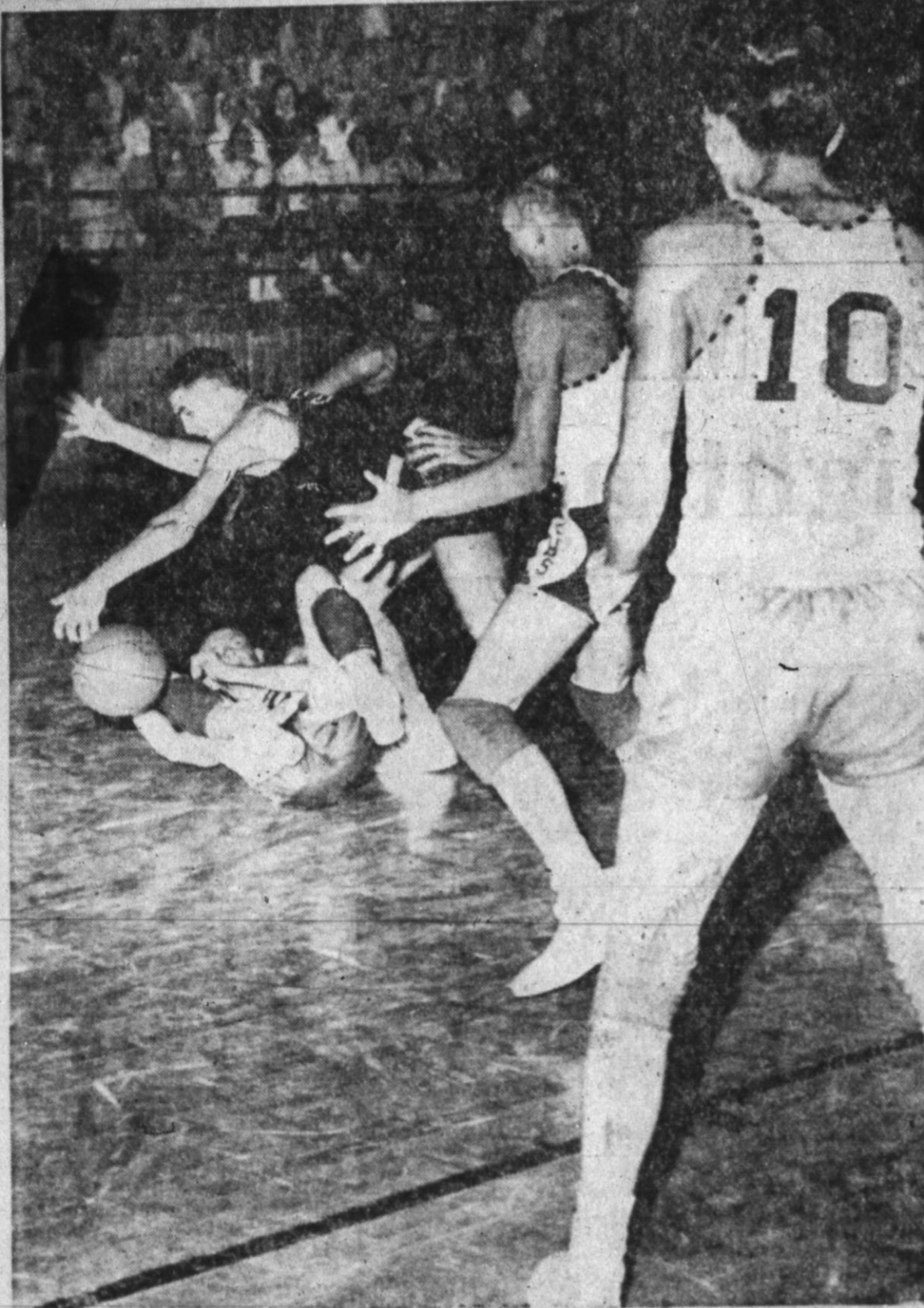
'Say you're a lama who plays

B. S. degree. Coaching success came early in his career as he guided the White Deer basketball team to the district championship during the 1951 - 52 season. He also served the Bucks as an assistant football coach.

After serving from 1952 - 54 in the U. S. Navy, Cuby was basketball coach and assistant football coach at Groom during the 1954 - 55 school year.

He came to Hereford in September, 1955, and started building the Whitefaces into a cage power. His team won the district and regional titles during the 1957 - 58 and 1958 - 59 seasons.

In 1958, the Herd was dropped in the first round of the four-team AAA play-off. A comparatively small team of Whitefaces captured the state's fancy in March, 1959, as they swept through district and regional titles before losing in the state finals to the towering players from Smiley of Houston. In six years of coaching, Kitchens' teams have compiled a 94 - 62 record.

After an 8 - 15 mark in his first year at Hereford, the Whitefaces moved to a 15 - 7 record in 1957, earned a 19 - 9 mark in 1958 and during the 1958 - 59 campaign romped to a 29 - 6 record, which ended in the State runner-up post.

Although the largest is 6 - 4, there are five boys now playing college basketball who were coached in Hereford high school by Kitchens. They include: Jim Curtisinger, 6 - 4, sophomore, West Texas; Steve Slagle, 6 - 3, freshman, West Texas; Bobby Shelton, 6 - 0, freshman, West Texas; Ken Clearman, 6 - 1, freshman, Howard County Junior College; and Milner Duvall, 5 - 11, freshman, Eastern New Mexico University.

Now teaching physical education, Kitchens earned his master's degree from West Texas State in 1956.

He and his wife, Bobbie, have three children: Keith, 6; Karen, 4; and Kelly, 2.

# Langley Retired From U.S. Army

Culminating 17½ years of continuous service, Earnest Langley of Hereford this week received his certificate of retirement from the United States Army Reserves.

The local attorney, who retired as a Major, received his retirement certificate by mail this week. His retirement became effective Nov. 30, and he was to have received the certificate in special ceremonies at the local armory Tuesday night. However, the ice storm which struck the city and county postponed ceremonies.

Langley joined the U. S. Army as a private July 14, 1942, while he lived in Sweetwater. Assigned to the 89th Infantry Division, he was eventually promoted to Sergeant.

Shortly after enlistment, he entered Officer Candidate School at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Md. He was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant just 7½ months after enlistment in the Army.

A short time after he received his commission, Langley was assigned to an ordnance maintenance company and served in that company until World War II ended.

He was stationed at the following camps during the war: Fort Sill, Okla., Camp Carson, Colo., Camp Davis, N. C., Fort Bliss, Tex., Camp Young, Cal. and Camp Cooke, Calif.

His ordnance company received overseas assignment to Gen. George S. Patton's Third U. S. Army and the company was sent to England. The company went to France with the Third Army in July, 1944, and participated in all campaigns from the Cherbourg Peninsula to Czechoslovakian border.

The company was awarded five battle stars. In March, 1945, Langley was appointed company commanding officer.

In June, 1945, while in Germany he was promoted to rank of captain, and he went from active duty to reserve status as a Captain in December, 1945.

Langley has been active in Army Reserves since the end of the war. He has taken part in summer camp for 22 weeks since 1945 at Red River Arsenal, Tex., Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Fort Hood and Fort Wolters, Tex.

Langley was commanding ordnance maintenance company and was a staff officer of a logistical command unit in Austin from 1948 to 1951.

At Amarillo, Langley was a staff officer of a logistical command unit and was an instructor in the U. S. Army Reserve School.

Langley moved to Hereford in April, 1952. While living in Hereford, he instructed at the Amarillo school for two years.

In 1954, Langley aided in establishing a U. S. Army Reserve unit here, a branch of the Army Reserve School. He was branch director of the unit until it was deactivated in 1957.

Langley was promoted from Captain to rank of Major here

in March, 1955. He was assigned to headquarters of Texas Military District in Austin prior to his retirement.

Langley, his wife, Helen, and four daughters live at 502 Star St. in Hereford. From 1948 to 1951, he attended law school at the University of Texas, where he obtained his LL. B. degree. He holds the B. A. degree from Texas Tech in Lubbock.

(Continued on Page 2) School was lowered slightly. The high school boiler house, which had not been covered, has a \$15,000.

Many of the other buildings were increased on coverage as a reflection of actual cost or replacement cost, depending upon the age and type of building.

The following facilities were increased by these amounts: high school, \$300,000; Aikman Elementary, \$100,000; Shirley Elementary, \$130,000; vocational agriculture building, \$20,000; Central cafeteria - gymnasium, \$35,000; bus shops, \$3,000; field house contents, \$11,000; Central, \$115,000; and Stanton, \$123,500.

Previous cost had been \$14,263.18 for five years, which paid for \$1,642,300 in insurance. New cost, for \$33,081,800 coverage, will be \$18,691.38.

Cost to the school district will be \$3881.21 for the first year, and \$4,117.18 annually for the following four years.

It is planned that after five years, the program will probably include five policies, with the school paying 20 per cent of the total cost, or \$4,603.59 annually.

On hand to help explain the plan was Murrell Tripp of Lubbock, president of Western Fire and Indemnity Company; J. W. Robinson and Bill Decker.

# Liking The River, She Hired On As Waitress

JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind. (AP) — In her younger days Mrs. Catherine Burns used to watch with fascination as commercial boats plied the Ohio River. "I always wished I could find a way to stay out on the river," she says. At 39 she has — by becoming a waitress on the towboat Memphis Zephyr.

For 60 days Mrs. Burns, a divorcee, serves a crew of 14 as the boat travels between Pittsburgh and New Orleans. The next 60 days are her own. She spends most of them with her two teen-age children, who think her job is wonderful.

The National Maritime Union, of which Mrs. Burns is a member, estimates about 200 women work as cooks or waitresses on towboats or tugboats throughout the nation. The trend started during World War II.

Mrs. Burns says she was hired on two years ago, "and I've had no regrets whatever."

On the tug her day starts at 4:30 a.m. She sets table for two shifts.

Later she helps the cook. At 1:30 p.m. she gets a two-hour break. Then she helps prepare dinner. Her day ends at 7 p.m.

"On my free time I read a lot, listen to the radio, fix my nails or write letters," Mrs. Burns says. "I don't have time to get bored."

For her labors she clears about \$300 a month. She has a private room and bath aboard the boat.

There are "fringe" benefits, too.

"I think the upper Mississippi River is the most beautiful on our route," Mrs. Burns says. "And you feel fine out on the water. The air is so pure."

Sometimes she spends hours watching people along the banks. Occasionally she debarks at a landing to shop in a town along the way.

"The fall is the prettiest time for nature," Mrs. Burns says. "Even a day or two makes a difference in the color of the leaves."

CINCINNATI (AP) — Take seven children, two adults and put them in a standard size automobile during a long trip. What do you have? A reason to find another means of transportation.

That's what Professor Joseph Ebacher of Xavier University did this summer. Ebacher, his wife, and large family found that last summer's vacation trip to Salisbury, Mass., was too crowded for comfort.

Returning to Cincinnati, he bought an old 32-passenger school bus. The inside was remade to contain bunks, windows, screens, shades, a refrigerator, a play area, and other features.

"Everybody's got his own position," Ebacher says. "There's room, comfort, and we have traveling leisure."

The children, five boys and two girls ranging in age from nine months to 11 years, each had a turtle when the family left Cincinnati for the seashore at Salisbury recently. There also was a pigeon and a carom board on which 50 different games can be played when the kids get restless.

"Last summer we didn't get a bit of sleep on the trip," Mrs. Ebacher says. "We spent \$39 for a day and half at a motel."

Of the present system of travel, Ebacher says: "I guess you might call us respectable bums."

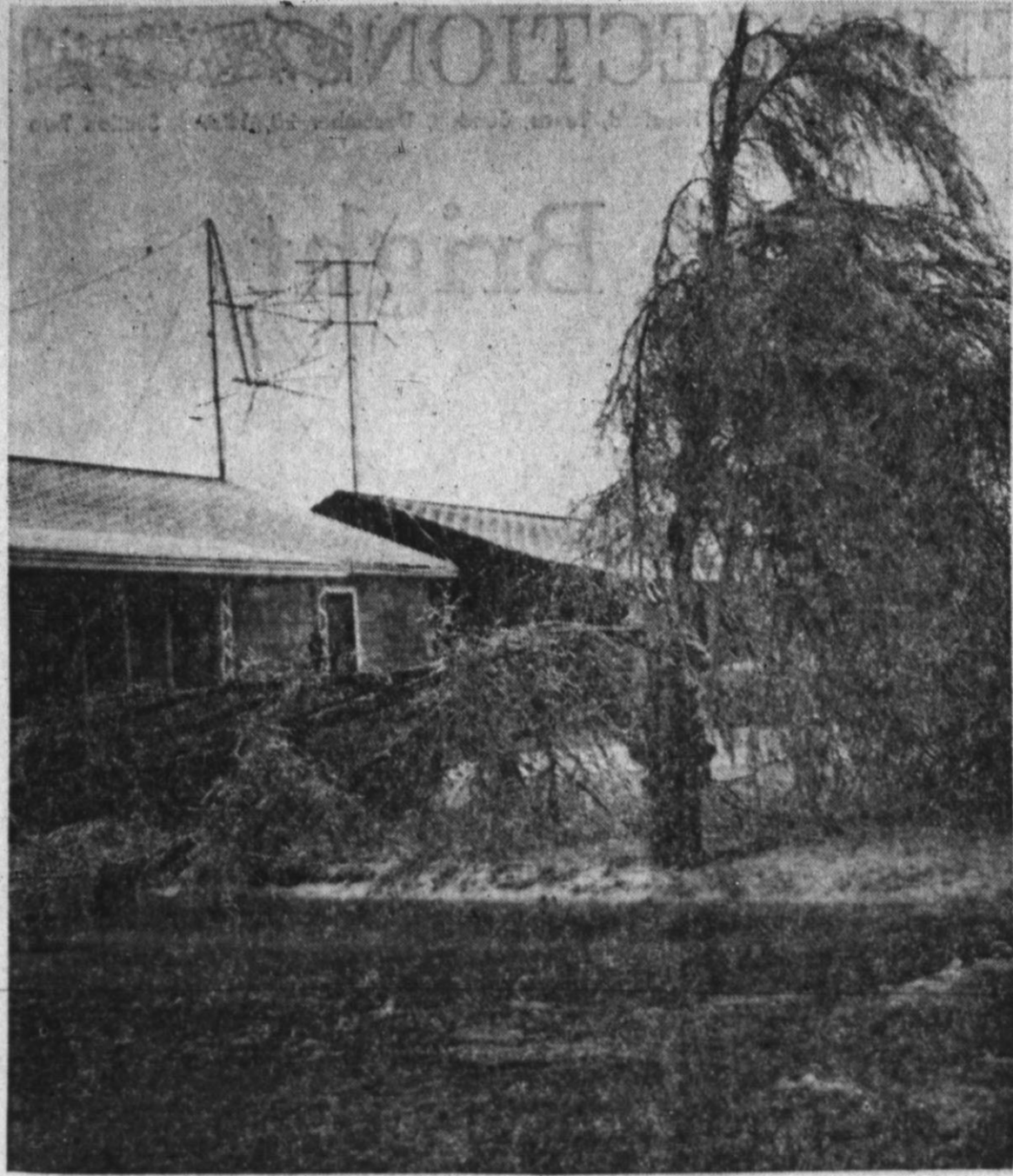

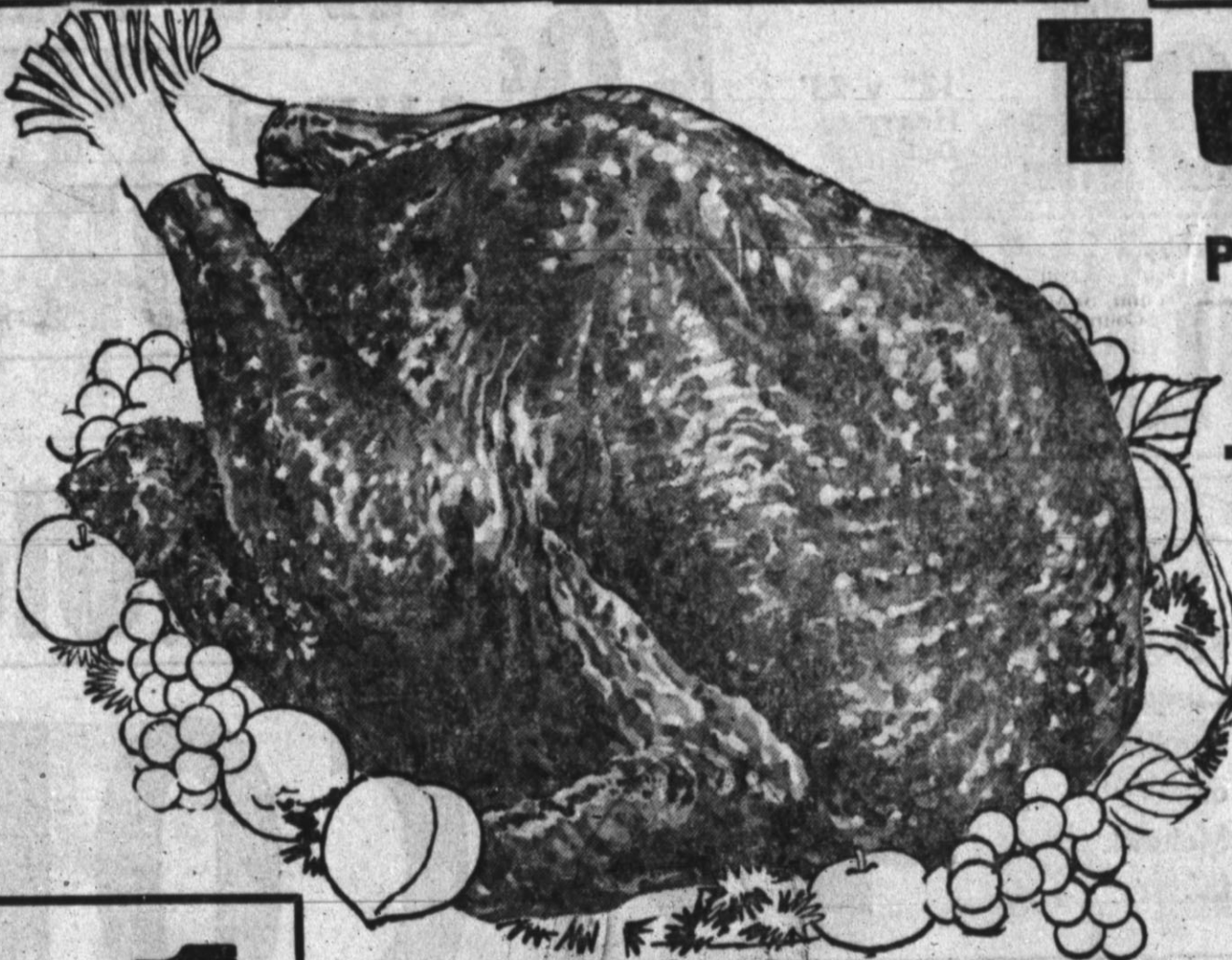

New Apartment House Plan Helps Old People To 'Keep On Living'

Much national interest is focused on Wesley Manor, a Methodist approved apartment house plan now under way in Westlaco, Texas.

lowing success of the west coast apartment house, the Westlaco project is one worth plenty of study.

Because Hereford, like Westlaco, provides an ideal location for such a project, and because so much interest has previously been shown in a center for older people, there is little question that the apartment house plan of the Wesley Manor merits further investigation here.

Most of all, we like the idea because it entails a certain amount of initiative on part of the occupants—and because it provides older people with "a place to live," rather than merely offering them a place to hibernate or die.

Military Service Takes Six Years

Current U. S. Regulations require around six years of the average young man's time in military service, one way or another, and there really isn't much he can do about it.

Such information furnished by a recent speaker before the Lions Club in Hereford, although he did analyze several different plans to fit various individual situations.

The greatest trouble, it seems to us, rests in the fact that the government presumes that each and every young man will have decided his entire future by the time he finishes high school—and this we doubt sincerely.

The college student, for instance, may find that at least one of the routes is designed to help, rather than hinder, his pursuit of additional education.

Meanwhile, we feel sure that most of the high school graduates will probably alter their plans between the ages of 18 and 26 years. Regardless, however, they can look forward to spending six years in connected military services—and that is quite a generous portion of the average man's life.

What Happens To Our Big Cities?

Most American cities are undergoing a great transition as they shift from downtown business areas to the more friendly shopping centers. New York, in fact, is often cited as the only city in this nation which is not adhering to the trend, and New York just simply does not have the additional room to spare.

Lack of parking space has contributed most toward the trend, which is bound to continue. In a nutshell, the new way of life makes for a series of small towns within the average large city.

Production of theatrical plays and operas, for instance, will suffer. This is one reason, in fact, that New York continues unchallenged as the leader in this field.

Already, numerous cities are finding it necessary to "shotgun" outlying areas within their limits in order to offset mounting expenses. People in the centers frequently protest and object, generally to no avail.

The ultimate result of this trend is a good question. About all we know is that our rural areas are centralizing into the cities—and the cities are de-centralizing into surrounding rural areas.

Meanwhile, the transition is possibly of as great or greater ultimate importance than was the trek of covered wagons westward a couple of generations back.

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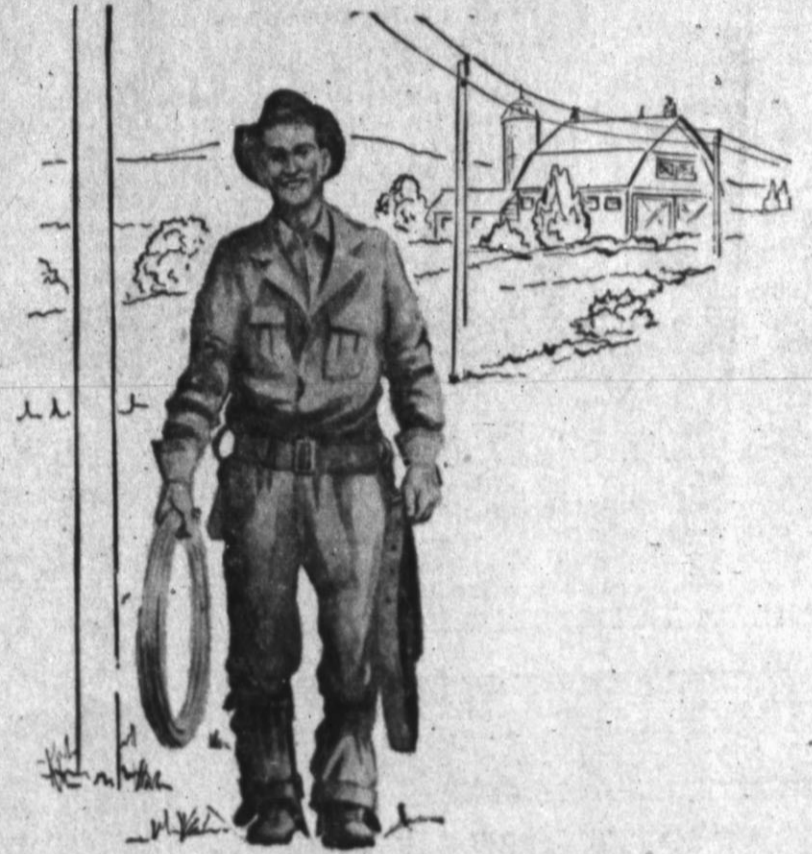

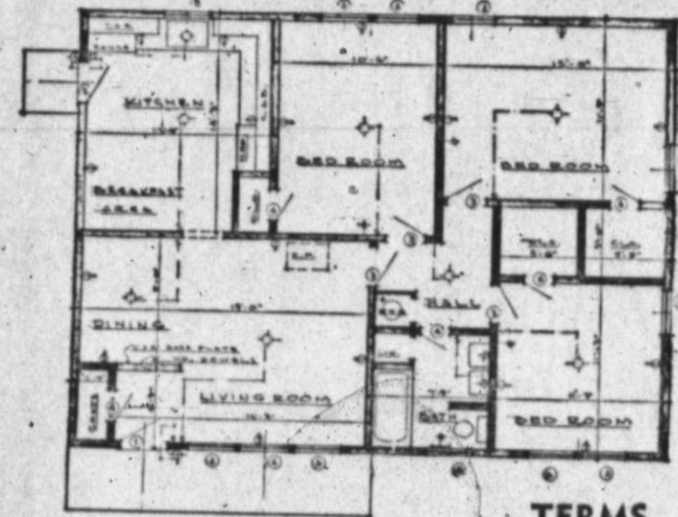

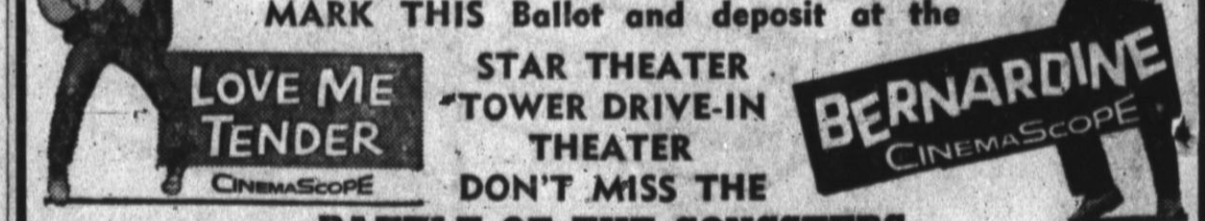
