This herd has taken first prize wherever shown in the ring and formerly belonged to S. T. Howard. The consideration for the twelve head comprising the herd was \$3600. The Columbian government has increased the tariff 50 per cent on all imports to meet the war expenses against the Liberals.

Two-thirds of the hardware jobbing concerns in the country have united to control the trade, with a capitalization of \$120,000,000.

It is estimated that the war tax repeal bill, which goes into effect July 1st, will reduce government revenues by about \$70,000,000.

The power of the ship subsidy bill as a vote-repeller is so generally recognized that the republicans are not anxious for the passage until after the fall elections.

The slang term "dough" for money, probably had its origin in the

French word "dot," pronounced like dough, meaning marriage dowry. A girl who has the "dot" is one who has money.

In the new "How To" Library series, the finest volume is "How to Write a Novel." Anyone who makes novel writing any easier than it now is should be discouraged.

Some of the most prominent gentlemen of the prize-ring were to have been invited to the Charleston exposition to draw a greater crowd, but the governor vetoed the proposition in no uncertain terms.

The diamond diggings in British Guiana have lately developed surprisingly. Last week 18,100 stones were brought to the port of Georgetown as the result of five weeks' work by the syndicate developing the mines.

When oppressive taxes are abolished the demand for dishonest goods will cease as the poor man can then afford the best. Congress should spend more time trying to make it easy to get good food rather than hard to get bad food.

The wedding ring is a barbaric tradition of the time when the ring was worn in the nose, or as an anklet or manacle, by which a sold slave was led away by the master, recalling the time when wives were purchased or were trophies of war.

Policemen are usually allowed to ride free on street cars as a condition of the traction franchise. The postoffice department has to pay, however, for the "free" rides of the letter carriers. For this purpose New York gets \$10,000; Philadelphia about the same; Chicago, \$26,000; Boston, \$13,000, and Washington \$4,500 of the appropriation for the purpose. Altogether the government expends a quarter of a million for these "lifts" for the carriers, but it pays in the amount of time saved.

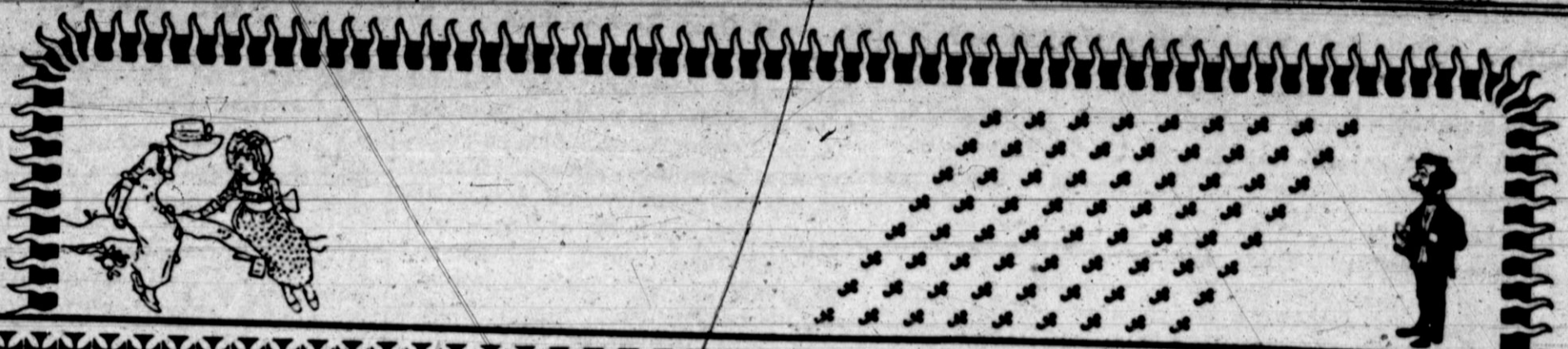

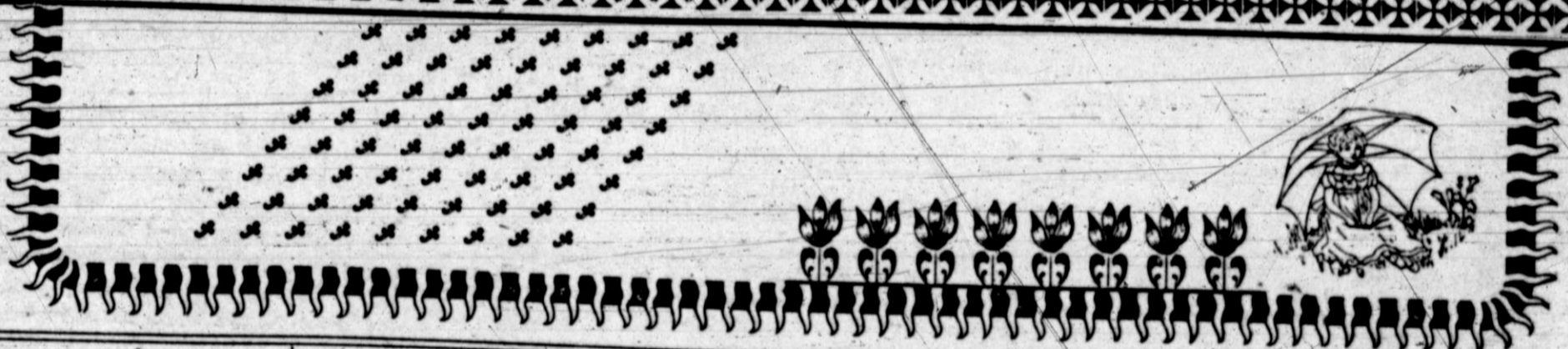

To Open Reservations.

The bill of Representative Stephens to open for settlement the 480,000 acres of pasturage reservation in the Kiowa, Comanche and Apache country was favorably reported Thursday by the committee on Indian affairs. The bill is merely an extension of the law opening the Kiowa, Comanche and Apache reservations, and provides that within ninety days after the approval of the bill, the president shall by proclamation, open the land to settlement and that homeseekers must draw lots for the homesteads. The land is at present occupied by S. B. Burnett and other Texas cattlemen, and there are now about 40,000 head of cattle on the range. The lessees of the land have already secured an extension of their leases, which expired the first of this month, until the first of July, which will afford them time to remove the cattle without serious loss.—Wichita Times.

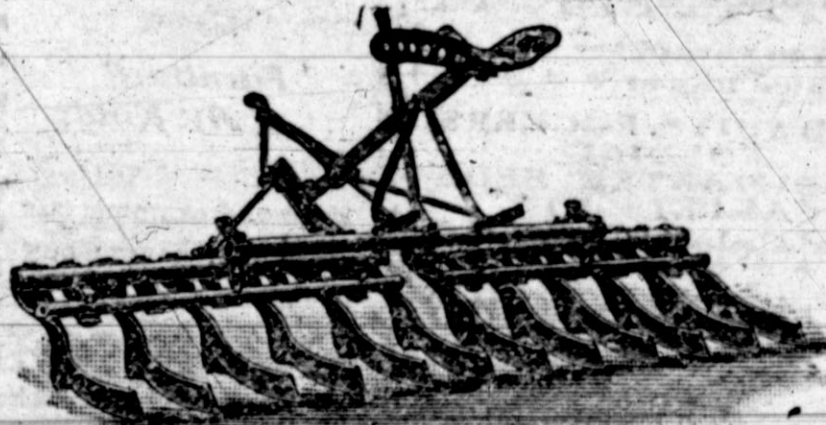
