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## Charge Man As An Habitual Criminal Here

A Waxahachie man charged here in a complaint alleging two previous felonious convictions, was arraigned in Justice of the Peace Court, C. M. Miles presiding, Friday. Bond was set at \$5,000.

Charged in the complaint filed by the Hereford Police Department was Carroll Weldon Hartis, 34.

In explaining the meaning of the charge, Henry Aycock, chief of police, said the complaint amounts to an habitual criminal charge and carries a mandatory life sentence, upon conviction.

Allegations against Hartis contend that he allegedly purchased a car from Charlie Seeds Motor Co. with a worthless check in Nov. 1961.

When he purchased the vehicle, Hartis is reported to have told the salesman that he had the money in bonds to cover the check.

In the original complaint, the salesman contended that Hartis said he would cash the bonds and deposit the money in the bank.

The suspect is also alleged to have forged a check on C. D. Fitzgerald and cashed it at a local business.

Action was taken in the case by the Deaf Smith County Grand Jury and Hartis was indicted for forgery and passing.

The Waxahachie man was arrested in Plainview by Aycock on Thursday, after Plainview law enforcement officers brought him back to Texas from California.

Hartis is reported to have been charged in Plainview on a complaint alleging two counts of felony forgery. His bond was set for the two alleged offenses at \$4500.

Annual drive to Clean Up, Fix Up, Paint Up the community will be conducted April 30 through May 6. It is Hereford's official week for "Spring Cleaning" and is particularly aimed at the exterior appearance of the city's homes and businesses.

City of Hereford got off to an early start on the clean-up campaign last week as city trucks started making extra rounds. City manager Dudley Bayne said that extra trash collections would be made for two more weeks. Residents are asked to pile their trash and debris in containers in the alleys to assist city workers.

Clean-Up Week is an activity of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce beautification committee. It is directed by a sub-committee, of which Mrs. Jimmie Gilleland is chairman.

"Essentially, this week is set aside to encourage every person to clean up, fix up and paint up his home or place of business," Mrs. Gilleland said. "Making Hereford a cleaner, neater place is the responsibility of each of us."

Bayne urged that trash be placed in covered containers if possible so it would not be scattered by dogs or wind before it could be picked up. The Chamber of Commerce is interested in the effort, since it makes the city more attractive to tourists, visitors and those who might be interested in moving to Hereford. A clean town also is an added inducement for

businesses and industries which might be considering Hereford for a location.

Fire Chief Dub Reeves, added his enthusiastic endorsement to the drive: "Many of our fire calls are the result of litter inside a building which is set afire. We also have to answer many calls from homeowners when weeds and high grass catch fire and threaten fences and other property. Our job will be easier, and your taxes lower, if we make fewer calls. One of our main jobs is prevention and we have found that clean buildings and property cut fire losses sharply," he pointed out.

Adding his support of the Clean Up Week efforts was Police Chief Henry Aycock, who said, "Removing tall weeds and grass from vacant lots and alleys removes some potential hiding places for prowlers, burglars and other criminals and could help cut down crime. House prowlers particularly are less apt to work in your neighborhood if there is no place to hide."

Final plans for the Clean Up Week program were discussed at the Hereford Country Club Thursday during a meeting of the Beautification Committee. J. D. Kirkland reported that an old truck was available at the courthouse for use by the committee. County prisoners, he said, could be used to aid in planting or special work for the committee.

Mrs. W. C. Hromas, chairman of the park sub-committee, reported that dandelions needed to be sprayed three times in conjunction with the city's spraying of the weeds.

Mrs. Irving Alexander, chairman of the downtown area, said that there had been many requests for a repeat of last year's D-Day to kill dandelions. It was decided that plans will be drawn up to make a unified effort all over the city to kill off dandelions.

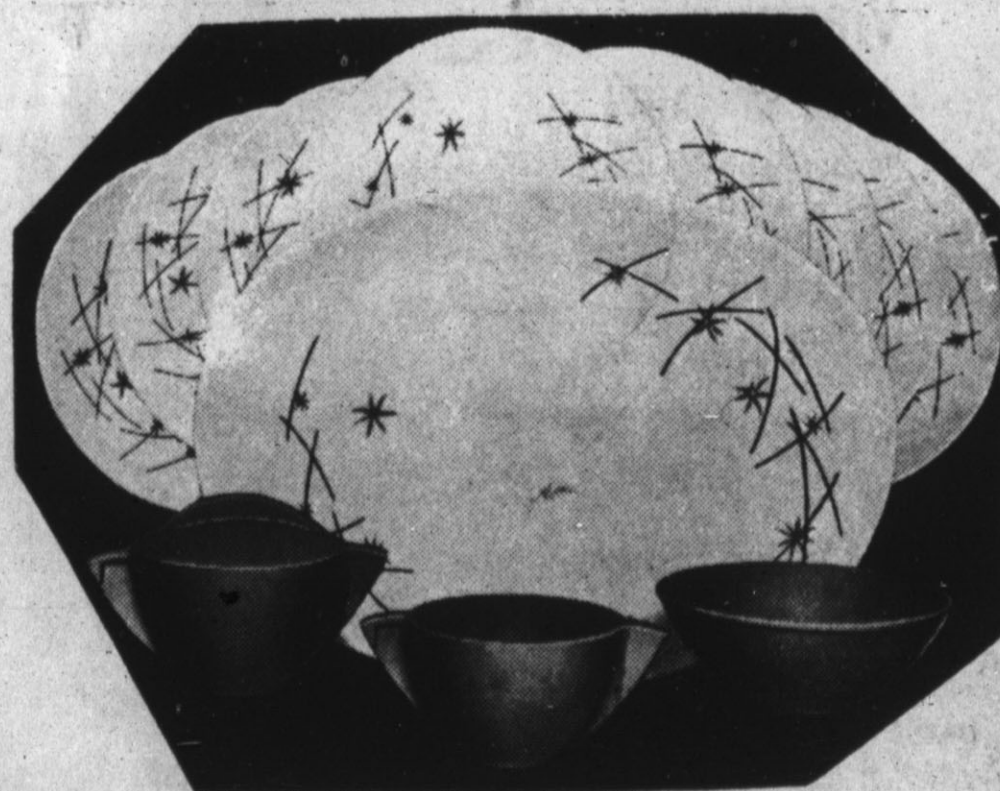

## "Battle Stations"

Many of you have been wondering why the Republican candidate for State Representative has not been beating more bushes. Well, I have been catching up with my farming, trying to stay calm about the birth of a fine new son, and listening to what my three opponents in the Demo primary have to say. I even went fishing one day, snagged three plugs in the underwater brush, and didn't catch a thing. As any fisherman knows though, even this is fun. Now I reckon it's time to unfurl my battle flag and get down to politics. You folks who paid your \$1.75 are going to get your money's worth this year. I like farming and I'm not in this race because I want to get on the public payroll. It is because there are a lot of things that have been needing saying the last few years, and the old system of standing staunchly on a non-controversial platform just won't be sufficient in these times. # 'Deaf' Smith Says

TO: The Spirit Of General Sam Houston  
FROM: The Spirit Of Erastus 'Deaf' Smith

SUBJECT: My Chamber Of Commerce In Action

Last week, Sam, I attempted to report to you the answers contained in a little pamphlet published by the California Association of Chamber of Commerce Managers on some basic questions about Chambers of Commerce in general. Last week the questions "What is a Chamber of Commerce?", "How is it organized?" and "What does it do?" were covered. This week I want to report to you the answers to some more basic questions.

**How Does It Work?** The Chamber of Commerce works through committees which analyze problems, develop solutions, and take action to achieve the objectives which solve the problems. For example:

1. Committee work designed to stimulate new business; convention promotion, industrial development, retail trade promotion, agriculture, etc.

2. Committee work directed to community improvement: civic development, beautification, health and safety, traffic and transportation, etc.

3. Committee work designed to promote good citizenship; legislative activities, get-out-the-vote campaigns, education, etc.

4. Committee work on organization improvement; membership promotion, program of work, ways and means, etc.

**Office Services** — A Chamber of Commerce maintains a working library of directories, reports, surveys, maps, travel information, and other material available for the inspection and use of its members. Detailed civic information is given out by means of telephone calls and correspondence to residents, newcomers, visitors, and persons making inquiry. In addition to servicing the committees, which are the means of activating a dynamic program of work, the person or persons who make up the staff of the Chamber of Commerce provide a coordinating element which can unify the organization effort of the entire

community. The Chamber of Commerce becomes, as it were, the "front door" to the entire community.

**How Is It Financed?** All Chambers are supported primarily by the members of the business community, representing business, industry, agriculture or the professions who are interested in stimulating new and improved business and in building a better community. Each member, individual and firm is expected to subscribe a fair share of the total cost of the sustaining Chamber of Commerce effort in the community.

There is no more profitable investment available to any businessman, industrialist or professional man than his annual financial investment in the local Chamber of Commerce.

**Who Can and Should Belong?** All businesses, industries and professional men, business men on the farm and individuals are not only eligible to be Chamber members, but should be. The rare exceptions to this rule would be illegitimate or unethical operators or those so small that annual income does not even support as much as one person. There is no obligation other than the payment of proportionate annual dues, and a willingness to serve on committees (if one can) and help carry out the Chamber's functions.

That's my report for this week, Sam, and should answer some of those general questions about Chambers of Commerce. My Chamber always welcomes inquiries into its purpose and operation. The staff is always willing to assist on any worthwhile community project falling within the policies of the Board. Chamber committees are always receptive to new ideas that will help my County to grow to be a better place in which to live and in which to make a living. Next week I'll have a report on the trip of the delegation to the U. S. Highway 60 Convention in Banning, Calif.

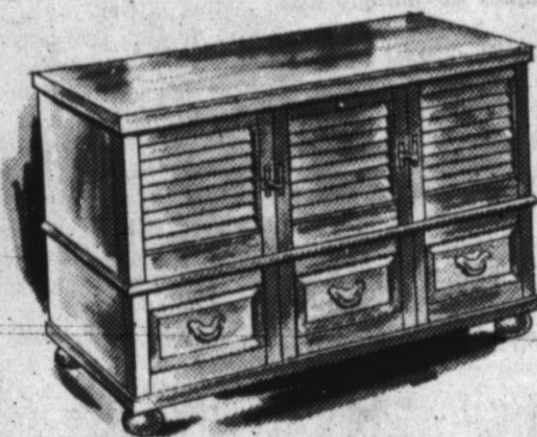

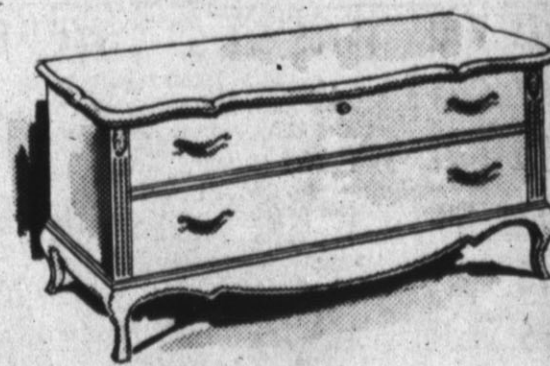

### Dictatorial Methods Of Wage-Hour Section Draw Ire Of Many Owners

For many years the people of the United States have heard rumors of possible dictatorship. At the same time, they have noted the spread and growth of government bureaus, none of which are ever abandoned. Today, these two factors seemed to have joined forces under the jurisdiction of America's Wage and Hour division.

Invariably, representatives of the Wage-Hour division are reported to be insolent, high handed, and dictatorial. They enter a business firm on routine checks with the assumption that the operator is "guilty until proven innocent". In true Russian style, the so-called investigators have frankly told business men that they are not interested in their business or what happens to it. Their sole objective, according to all reports, is one of subjugation rather than assistance and, no matter how hard the operator tries, rare indeed is the man who gets through with a clean bill of health.

The child labor laws, too, appear to have more teeth than most people realize and as one man puts it: "The law does not say you cannot employ a youngster under 16 years of age, but the regulations leave things where you do not want to do so." As a result, parents report that it is next to impossible for the average youngster to find any summer employment.

The Brand has stood for law and order since 1901. We do not feel that the Wage-Hour division should be any exception. On the other hand, we feel that government employees should be civil and cooperative. Instead of being dictators, they should make an effort to help people understand and comply with the laws — and assume that there are bound to be a few honest, law-abiding Americans who try to do exactly this. In addition, they should leave browbeating and coercion to Mr. Khrushchev and

the Russian police; they might at least show the same consideration as investigators for the Income Tax department.

Let us, at the same time, remember that our youngsters will some day be adults, and that they will pursue the work habits they learned as boys and girls. While we would never endorse "sweat shop" labor tactics, we do believe that youngsters gainfully employed in safe jobs with reasonable hours are far less likely to turn up in court as delinquents. This assumption, it seems, no longer is legal in the United States.

Meanwhile, people who face abuse at the hands of Wage-Hour investigators should definitely wire or call their congressman and senator, setting forth any unnecessary dictatorial demand or insolent attitudes. We may be on the road to a dictatorship, but we still have the right to complain — and it should be exercised to the fullest extent.

### Marshall Formby For Governor

The right to vote as one pleases is an American privilege, and we hope that every eligible voter in this area will cast his ballot next Saturday.

At the same time, we hope that every voter will carefully consider the candidacy of Marshall Formby, former Deaf Smith County resident, who made an outstanding record on the Texas Highway Commission. Mr. Formby is a friend and a fellow West Texan to many of us. He has proven himself efficient and capable in several public offices and, without question it would help this part of the state to have a man in the governor's office.

These reasons are well and fine, but there is another reason of still greater importance: Marshall Formby is an independent candidate, financed through small donations and if elected, he will not be obligated to any special interest, individual or clique. This, as many of you know, is the only way that Formby would agree to make the race.

Texas needs this kind of leadership at the present time. While one of the candidates is closely allied to the Administration in Washington, a second is committed to labor, and still another is asking for a third term on a do-nothing record. Right now, Texas is in a financial muddle; its citizens elected a Republican senator in protest to federal intervention, and industrial growth has placed organized labor in its strongest position of the state's history.

We do not claim that Formby is another Sam Houston, but we do know that he is a good man, sincerely interested in the welfare of Texas, and honest with those people he contacts. His hands are not tied in any fashion. He has the experience, background and training to perform an outstanding service for Texas, which is more than we can say for any other candidate in the race.

It is rare indeed when most of us actually know first hand better qualifications of a candidate as we know those concerning Marshall Formby. For this reason alone, we should back him to the fullest extent with donations if possible, with letters and cards and, most important of all, with our individual votes, next Saturday.

### Clean-Up Week April 30-May 7

Hereford's annual "Clean Up, Paint Up, Fix Up" campaign has been scheduled April 30 to May 7, and if it is anything like as successful as the 1961 campaign, its completion will establish the community as a better place to live.

Credit for success of the campaign in our opinion goes to the ladies, who have changed the annual drive from a token effort into a well organized movement. As someone recently put it, "The men may do the work, but it takes the wives to get them on the job."

From every standpoint, beginning with health and ranging to pride in appearance, the annual clean up campaign is certainly worth the effort involved. Regardless of individual effort, success of the campaign is measured in terms of participation, chiefly because one person can nullify the efforts of an entire block in case he leaves exposed garbage which attracts flies and mosquitoes.

At the same time, no single thing speaks a better recommendation for a community than yards, well kept homes and attractive plantings and Hereford, for many years, has been considered a leader in this direction.

The fact that Deaf Smith County is classified as one of the 10 higher per-capita income areas in the Southwest is a bonafide reason for the community ranking high in the field of attractive homes and yards, but it took the ladies to bring out the best in us — and we certainly owe them a word of appreciation.

### INITIAL BANGS TESTING BEGINS

The Brucellosis eradication program moves into Bailey County and farmers and ranchers are asked to cooperate so that the county may reap the full benefits from the program. The equipment for the program moved into Bailey County recently and testing began Monday, April 23. A meeting was called Tuesday, April 24, in the District Courtroom and began at 7 p. m. Cattle owners were asked to attend the meeting for information and instructions regarding the program. To facilitate the operation, "lineup men" will operate in each of the precincts signing up farmers and ranchers and scheduling the various stops. John Tucker is the supervising veterinarian and is assisted by Robert Daniel. "We'll shoot for all the cattle in Bailey County," said Dr. R. M. Zirkle of San Angelo, veterinarian in charge. "We usually manage to hit every producer in the county, and test about 80 per cent of the cattle without much trouble," he commented. The rule governing the program states that at least 50 head of cattle in each herd must be tested. In herds larger than 200 head, 20 per cent must be tested.

Editor's note: The Bootleg Philosopher on his bindweed farm tries to throw some light on a complicated problem his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor:

According to an article I read last night, the farmers aren't the only people suffering from the high costs of operating. High costs have now hit politics.

As I understand it, the cost of running for office has gotten so high that there is a move on for financial relief to candidates. It just costs too much to wage a national campaign, not to mention a state or even local one.

I can see the country can't afford to have a lot of public offices unfilled because it costs too much to run for them, although I for one have been unable to detect any shortages along this line. As far as I can determine, every office we've got is filled and there's always a good many defeated candidates left over and willing to try again next time.

At any rate, a commission in Washington has been studying this situation and has come up with the suggestion that more people ought to contribute to campaigns, to ease the burden on the candidates, and the commission has suggested that people be allowed to deduct a part of their campaign contributions from their income tax.

For instance, it suggested, if you contributed \$25 to a campaign, you could take \$10 off your income tax.

Now I have thought this matter over and, while I have a great deal of sympathy for the candidates and believe it'd be an unwholesome situation if we ever got to the point where only a wealthy man could afford to run for office, still, looking at it from the voter's standpoint, we've got high costs staring us in the face too and spending \$25 on a candidate in order to save \$10 on your income tax, ain't exactly the way to balance your personal budget. The way I figure it, you're still out \$15, and maybe even more, if the candidate gets elected and raises your government expenses by \$10.

As I see it, the situation is involved. The candidates are asking the public for financial relief in running, and then after they get elected the public needs financial relief from what happens after they get there.

This makes the farm problem look simple.

This amusing non-fiction book is on the reserved shelf at the Deaf Smith County library.

Mrs. Bailey needed more money and looked around for a way to earn it. Despite cold feet that almost caused her to back out, the Bailey Barn Auction soon got underway near Brattleboro, Vermont.

Assisting were her husband, Jack, and the two girls, Emmy Lou became the clerk and Estelle had the soda concession.

Everyone in New England loves auctions, but they weren't so happy about a woman entering what had previously been left solely to men. But Mrs. Bailey beat a zoning restriction and got her license.

When the time came for her first sale, she was shaking so badly that she almost fell off the platform. But she managed it and had started on a career.

Starting with barn auctions—where consigned goods are sold at the auctioneer's barn—she progressed to house auctions. This involved selling all the contents of a house, from basement to attic with nothing left over.

In her wonderful book, Mrs. Bailey tells how she appraises goods, her advertising and how she maintains the quick pace essential to a good auction.

She also tells the reader what to look for in furniture, glassware, even how she sold farm machinery. Her tips to would-be bidders at auctions are excellent, along with her information about how to outwit sharp traders.

Mrs. Bailey even hazards some guesses about what type of antiques will become popular in the near future. But this, she admits, is pure speculation.

Any reader will feel a warmth as Mrs. Bailey tells how she enables some special items to go to a particular bidder... with the silent help of others who also are in on the unwritten pact.

Although she was the first woman elected to the previously all-male National Auctioneers Association and is entitled to the accolade, she doesn't want to be known as "Colonel."

With enjoyable humor, Mrs. Bailey relates her experiences. When the reader gets through,
