Carter Says Recession Talk Damaging

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter says predictions of a recession next year could "become a self-fulfilling prophesy" if people begin to believe them, even though the economy is basically sound.

"There are predictions of a recession from various sources which I think can become a self-fulfilling prophesy unless the facts are described accurately to the American people," Carter told a group of business leaders Wednesday night.

Meanwhile, a key member of Congress said today the dollar is failing in its role as the world's key currency and should be supplemented with other international

money before the world economic system collapses.

The suggestion by Rep. Henry S. Reuss, D-Wis., was made in remarks prepared for the opening of hearings on the dollar problem before the international economics subcommittee of the Joint Economic Committee.

Treasury Secretary W. Michael Blumenthal and Charles L. Schultze, chairman of Carter's Council of Economic Advisers, were scheduled to testify later in the day.

In his speech, Carter said the economy continues to show strength that even his own advisers have found surprising. pointing to recent favorable statistics on housing, employment retail sales and business inventories.

He said the "one consistent error in economic predictions" of his administration has been "to underestimate the economic strength and growth potential of our country.'

"We do not anticipate a recession next year...Our nation is strong," Carter said. The president's address was to a meeting of the Business Council, an organization of the nation's top corporate executives. He appealed for backing for his anti-inflation program, warning that inflation could undo all the economic

gains of the last two years.

"Give me your pledge of compliance," he said. "There is no excuse now for you to delay... It would mean a great deal."

Business Council Chairman John D. DeButts, who also is chairman of American Telephone and Telegraph, urged in his own remarks that the corporate executives work to support the wage and price guidelines.

While they are not perfect, he said, "I think the alternatives to the program are far worse, possible mandatory controls." Reuss told the economics subcommittee, which he heads, that as much as 1700 billion in U.S. dollars are held by

foreigners, which could be used to overwhelm efforts to prop up the value of the battered greenback.

"This country must take the lead in suggesting that the time has come to deal with the disease that is destroying the international monetary system, and to go beyond the band-aid process of intervention," said Reuss, who also is chairman of the House Banking Committee.


He applauded Carter's Nov. 1 program to support the dollar with \$30 billion in borrowed foreign currency. The money is being used to buy up unwanted dollars on foreign money markets, a process called

The dollar, which had dropped as much as 40 percent in value against some major world currencies, has regained about 10 percent of the lost value since the Carter program was launched. The biggest lossers were against the Japanee yen, and Swiss franc and German mark.

Reuss said that while the emergency measures were clearly necessary, the dollar-support operation already has used up billions of dollars and threatens to "involve substantial monetary loss to this country."

Governor-Elect: Tax Cut **Might Not Be \$1 Billion**

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - On Nov. 22, Gov.-elect Bill Clements insisted that 'one way or another" he would reduce state taxes by \$1 billion in addition to the "Tax Relief Amendment."

But on Wednesday, Clements backed off his rigid stance on the \$1 billion figure.

"I said at the time it wasn't definitive, but I'm optimistic," Texas' first Republican governor in a century told an impromptu Capitol news conference. "Certainly I'd say that a billion dollars is a goal. It's still a goal I'll work toward."

Clements talked about possible tax cuts following a meeting with Speaker Bill Clayton.

The governor-elect and Clayton said spending proposals by the Legislative Budget Board ers, be trimmed in the lawmaking session that begins Jan. 9.

The board recommended over \$2.4 billion in new state spending for 1980-1981, leaving only \$80 million in new revenue from inflation, higher oil and and gas prices and economic growth available for spending or tax cut programs.

"I think there will be, in due course, a meeting of the minds and we'll come out of this with a program that will be good for the people of Texas," said Clements. Clements and Clayton said they needed state revenue estimates from Comptroller Bob Bullock before deciding what budget areas to cut.

"There will be some areas in the document that can be trimmed." Clayton said. "I don't know that it would be proper to say \$1 billion or \$2 billion or half a billion dollars."

Clements said he has received "very good reaction" from legislators during recent private meetings.

"I'm extremely pleased. I think everyone's in a high degree of cooperation," he said. "That's not to say we all agree on everything. We don't but that's the way the system works."

FmHA Offices Not in Danger Of Being Closed, Says Government

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That feller on Tierra Blanca Creek says it's easy to figure out why Christmas colors are red and green. Before Christmas you go around spending all that green, and after Christmas you wind up in the red. 000

WOMEN, ALREADY credited with controlling most of a family's purchasing power, may have more clout in the future. Their numbers are growing on the job and so are the incomes of their families. Only one-third of all women were employed 30 years ago. That percentage is up to 50 percent now and could be two-thirds by 1990.

.000 "ALMOST ALL our national problems have their roots in human greed," says Tulia editor H.M. Baggarly in a recent column. "What is medicine for one is poison for another. So, we are confronted with the decision -- shall we medicate one person and poison another or act for the overall good?"

Baggarly says the answer usually is, "I'll do what is best for me as an individual...to hell with everybody else."

The point is well taken, because the problem of self interest is seen in many areas. What we might consider as wasteful government spending--food stamps or some other form of aid--might mean everything to a person down the street. If our concern is uncrowded classrooms or better police protection, that might be considered a waste of money to our neighbor.

The farmer is caught in this self-interest game, because most people are not looking at the overall picture. When they argue that farm subsidies or price supports give the farmer something for nothing, they don't see the complete transaction.

Many of the critics of farm subsidies are all for high protective tariffs. They pay what they must to manufacture a product here in this country, but they find imported products being offered cheaper. (See BULL, Page 2)

Garcia Guilty Of

Attempted Murder

Juan Jesus Garcia was found guilty of attempted murder Wednesday in connection with the July 3 shooting of his two nephews.

The punishment phase of the trial began this morning in Judge Wes Gulley's 222nd District Court.

Garcia, 34, had been charged with shooting Arnulfo Barrientes, 19, and Robert Barrientes, 17, both of Hereford, following a fight at the Tierra Blanca Motel, where Garcia was living at the time.

The older Barrientes was shot in the chest with a .357 magnum, while his brother was shot in the right arm.

Garcia was arrested the same day of the shooting in an Amarillo bar.

sources One of the sources, who requested anonymity, said Wednesday "a lot of heat" was generated by a news story Dec. 6 disclosing that the administration was giving "active consideration" to shutting down the offices.

Meanwhile, a senior Agriculture Department official who oversees operations of FmHA, the lead agency in the department's rural development programs, said, "No county FmHA

offices are being closed."

The official, Assistant Secretary Alex P. Mercure, said several alternatives are in draft form but that "none has gone to the president" for a decision, Mercure's remarks were in a speech

prepared for a meeting Wednesday in Denver of state FmHA directors. Texts of his remarks also were issued in Washington.

Among the options for FmHA, he said, is one to put development programs now operated by the agency into a new "super Department of Community and Economic Development" that also would include functions of some other federal agencies such as Housing and Urban Development and the Small Business Administration.

This part of the plan also was disclosed in the story a week ago, which was based on official documents. The phrase "active consideration" in describing the plan to close county offices also was from the documents.

One of the sources said "the only place" where talk of closing county FmHA offices showed up was in staff papers drawn up to illustrate potential savings by juggling various federal (See FmHA, Page 2)

The shooting occurred between 7:05 and 7:50 p.m. Tuesday at the home of Texas Department of Public Safety trooper Jesse Lambert at 200 North St. Lambert, who has been on duty in Deaf Smith County since Monday after being transferred from Orange, and his wife were dining out when the shooting occurred.

Investigation by the Hereford Police Department, DPS and Deaf Smith Cunty Sheriff's Office showed that the mobile home had been shot 11 times. The east (front) side of the mobile home had seven bullet holes in it, and two windows and the front storm door were broken.

"We don't have any suspects or anything concrete," said Detective Roger Scott, who is heading the investigation for Hereford police. Sheriff Travis McPherson said today

acquired through witnesses being kept confidential.

"We're looking at this as a very serious offense, and we plan to find out who did the shooting and why," McPherson said. MoPherson said that no motive has been established for the shooting, but added that Lambert's patrol car was parked in front of the mobile home Monday.

"They could have known he was a highway patrolman," McPherson said.

A light had been left on inside the trailer while Lambert and his wife were away Tuesday night, McPherson added.

Even though the incident occurred inside the Hereford city limits, county officers are involved in the investigation "because he is a law enforcement officer." McPherson said. "We'd help on the investigation if it had been a city policeman's home."

Ex-Wife Claims Grijalva Alone Was Responsible

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - The ex-wife of a New Mexico man accused in the capital murder of an Amarillo Pizza Hut manager has admitted it was her idea to rob the restaurant, but said 26-year-old David Grijalva was wholly responsible for

Prosecutors contend Grijalva, of Gallup, N.M., killed Jeanette Powers by slashing her throat, beating her on the head with a 15-pound rolling pin and then shoving her head-in a dough mixer.

Kathy Sutton, the state's star witness against Grijalva, testified Wednesday she lied to police initially about her role in the

the killing.

incident in blaming the entire episode on Grialva.

Miss Sutton, 20, pleaded guilty to robbery and was assessed a 10-year probated sentence for her role in the Jan. 11, 1977, incident at the pizza parlor.

Contrary to what she first told police, she knew about the pistol used in the robbery, she knew Grijalva was plotting the robbery and she knew what happened to Grijalva's bloodstained clothes after the slaying, she testified Wednesday.

Vance Fails in Bid for Israel Acceptance

JERUSALEM (AP) - Secretary of State Cyrus Vance failed to win Prime Minister Menachem Begin's agreement today to Egyptian peace treaty demands favored by the United States.

Vance prepared to return to Cairo and Washington a day ahead of schedule, and Begin called a special meeting of the Israeli Cabinet Friday to determine the government's course of action.

Vance after a final meeting with Begin said peace was still the "common goal" of the United States and Israel, "and we are determined that goal will be achieved."

But Begin said "there are differences

of opinion" between Egypt and Israel, and U.S. spokesman George Sherman said differences remained on major issues.

Sherman clearly indicated the United States supported the Egyptian proposals Vance brought from Cairo on Wednesday. Asked if there were differences between Israel and the United States as well as between Israel and Egypt, he replied: "Obviously."

We shall continue our friendly discussions in the future," said Begin. But it was obvious the Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty would not be signed by Sunday, the goal set in the Camp David summit agreements.

Vance was scheduled to fly to Egypt later today for a meeting with President Anwar Sadat and to return to Washington Friday. He had been scheduled to remain in Israel until Friday.

. The secretary said he had to return home "because of important matters totally unrelated to the Middle East."

After two meetings between Vance and Begin Wednesday, the Israeli state radio said the prime minister found the Egyptian proposals unacceptable. Other Israeli sources claimed Egypt had hardened its negotiating position.

"I wouldn't call it a crisis," Vance told

reporters. But after conferring with President Carter by telephone Wednesday, the secretary announced he would leave Israel a day ahead of schedule. Vance said he had "some very important

things to discuss with the president." Some observers thought Vance's early departure was an attempt to nudge Israel into making concessions. Carter himself appeared to be stepping up pressure on Israel in a speech to a business group in Washington Wednesday night. He praised Sadat for being "very generous" in his concessions in the negotiations but was silent about Begin.

"We pray that both nations will accept

the same documents." said the president. "But it is extremely difficult."

Carter said Vance can only spend "a limited amount of time...on the Mideast treaty, as important as it is." He pointed out that the secretary is meeting Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Groymko in Geneva next Thrusday for talks that they hope will put the finishing touches on a new SALT agreement limiting nuclear arms.

The stalemate appeared to rule out any chance Israel and Egypt would sign a peace treaty by Dec. 17. the goal set in the Camp David agreements.

Hijacker Arrested

In South Carolina

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) - A man who said he wanted to, go to Cuba tried to hijack a National Airlines flight from New York to Miami early today, the FBI said.

The plane was diverted to Charleston. where FBI agents boarded the plane and arrested the man, tentatively identified as Gerald Edmond Casey.

FBI agent John Lee in Washington said Flight 97 was enroute from Kennedy Airport to Miami with 48 passengers and a crew of six. He said that shortly after 3 a.m. when the flight was about 50 miles south of Wilmington, N.C., a man approached a flight attendant and said

We're going to go to Cuba." The alleged hijacker was unable to get. into the cockpit, and the pilot diverted the flight and notified authorities on the ground.

Lee said no weapons were found.

Casey was charged with "crime aboard an aircraft-interference with a flight crew.

He is being held in the Charleston County jail pending a 9 a.m. EST hearing before a U.S. magistrate.

An unnamed regional spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration said Flight 97 continued on to Miami after Casey was removed from the plane.

Cindy Gough was the first witness in the trial of Brenda Carr, 26, charged with second-degree murder in the death of the 11-year-old boy. The girl is the daughter of Larry Paul Gough, 36, a co-defendant

Miss Gough testified young Ward sometimes was given little or nothing to eat by Mrs. Carr and Gough and was sadistically punished when he failed to learn his school lessons.

Miss Gough said the punishment included beating him, forcing him to stay in a closet for long periods of time, putting him in a clothes dryer and turning it on, tying him to a chair, shocking him with an electrical wire, holding his head under water and pulling his teeth out.

Convicts To Testify

In Davis' Defense

HOUSTON (AP) - The first of three convicts was expected to testify today that he was approached by prosecutors seeking to "cut a deal" for perjured testimony against millionaire Cullen Davis

Randall Craig, John Florio and his cousin, Sal Florio, appeared in court Wednesday while the jury was out and leveled the charges against representatives of the district attorney's office in Fort Worth.

Trial Judge Wallace Moore said the testimony is relevant to the defense theory that Davis was framed and he would allow them to tell their stories to the jury.

Defense attorney Richard "Racehorse" Haynes indicated he would lead off today with John Florio, 37, who like Sal, has a string of felony convictions dating back to the 1960s.

The state dismissed the trio as "liars." Davis, 45, a Fort Worth industrialist, is accused of soliciting a hired gunman to kill his divorce judge.

The defense contends he was framed by his estranged wife, Priscilla, FBI informant David McCrory and Fort Worth karate instructor Pat Burleson.

Saving and Loans

May Lower Payments

WASHINGTON (AP) . Many federal savings and loans are preparing to offer conventional loans to home buyers on a

raduated interest rate that will let them make lower mortage payments for the first few years they are buying a house.

For example, a standard home mortgage of \$50,000 at 91/2 percent interest over 30 years calls for monthly payments of \$420. Under the graduated plan, the payments during the first year would be \$318 a month.

The monthly payment would increase in each of the first five years, reaching \$457 in the fifth year. It would continue at that level until the loan is repaid.

The plan already is offered on many loans guaranteed by the Federal Housing Administration - commonly referred to as FHA loans

The Federal Home Loan Bank Board was voting today on a regulation authorizing the nation's 2.000 federally chartered savings and loans to offer the graduated plan on conventional loans.

"They will start very promptly. probably after the first of the year." said Alan Wade, spokesman for the United States League of Savings Associations.

However, he said, the program's growth may be gradual and he could not cestimate how many associations would offer the plan.

Texas Democrats, who lost the governor's race for the first time in a century. met here last week to consider plans for the future and to hear from potential leaders.

Attorney General John Hill, loser in the governor's contest; Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Attorney Generalelect Mark White addressed the State Democratic Executive Committee at its Austin session.

SDEC applauded a 1979 rebuilding program, approved expulsion of local party officers who defect to the GOP, gave the go-ahead to explore purchasing a permanent party headquarters in Austin and voted to hold celebration for victorious Democrats here January 9.

Chairman Billy Goldberg proposed a \$370,000 annual party budget, an enlarged staff and expanded education, local organizational and voter registration programs. Hill and Hobby volunteered their services as Democratic leaders, and White indicated he is also ready to serve. Hill said he is willing to be the leader or part of a leadership team. Hobby reminded that, as senior Democratic state official, he will have a significant role to play-as will Hill, White and Goldberg.

Products Law Studied

A House committee has come up with a lengthy

study report and recommendations to change products liability laws-generally regarded as one of the hottest issues before the 1979 legislative session.

About 20 bills drafted for consideration legislative would make it more difficult for those damaged or injured by defective products to collect in court.

The committee report noted many manufacturers, are having trouble getting insurance against faulty products and that their liahility premiums are skyrocketing.

Recommendations include a six-year limit from the date of manufacture to the date a products liability case is filed. elimination of punitive damages in such cases and a provision that damages will be paid only to the extent the manufacturer's negligence is greater than that of the user.

The Supreme Court upheld an intermediate court ruling that Webb County commissioners did not violate the Texas Open Meetings Act when they fired a county road and , bridge superintendent in 1975.

The Court of Criminal Appeals upheld the conviction of a prominent Dallas man on a cocaine possession charge.

A Houston man convinced the Court of Criminal Appeals to reverse his aggravated robbery conviction due to prosecution reference to extraneous offenses during his trial.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld an Austin lawver's disbarment. A Dallas man won a new

trial on burglary charges. when the Court of Criminal Appeals determined he did not waive his rights to be charged in an indictment.

Christless Christmas Fought by Nation's Schools

By DAVID L. LANGFORD A move to take Christ out of

Christmas in schools and other public places is drawing protests reminiscent of the prayer controversy of another time. "I am disturbed our country

is falling apart from the inside before Russia or anyone else has had a chance to come after us." says one Tulsa, Okla., teenager.

He is Pat Calhoun, 16, one of about 400 people who turned out at a meeting of the Tulsa **Classroom Teachers Association** last week to argue over a recommendation that teachers

avoid religious themes in holiday programs.

Nothing was resolved at that meeting, and elsewhere the American Civil Liberties Union has gone to court to try to silence the singing of "Silent

Night" and other carols in classrooms. In Baytown, Texas, the

ACLU's actions prompted angry citizens to organize the United. Legal Christian Association UCLA - that's ACLU spelled backwards - to help fight the lawsuits.

In other cities, the effort to ban religious symbolism has spread beyond the schools.

The city attorney of Des Moines. Iowa, has said city employees cannot depict shepherds and wise men at the annual nativity pageant at the Children's Zoo,

In a seven-page opinion issued after a year-long debate, Philip Riley said the city "may not legally sponsor or endorse

such a religious pageant." The debate began last year when Steven Brown, director of the Iowa Civil Liberties Union, said the pageant violates the U.S. Constitution's guarantee of

separation of church and state. He said the pageant was effectively an endorsement of a

religious celebration.

The city fathers in Traverse City, Mich., decided not to display the traditional nativity scene in a town park this year. after the local Human Rights Commission argued the scene could provoke a lawsuit.

Similarly, the Texas State Board of Control is expected to rule this week on a proposed ban against religious displays or meetings in the state capitol.

For almost two years, a lawsuit against the Goose Creek school district in Baytown. Texas, has been in a federal court. The suit, filed by the ACLU in behalf of a Jewish





rate will be offered to groups of 20 or more.







### USDA Acts to Carry Out New Child Nutrition Law

Agriculture (USDA) is proposadminister the special supplemental food program for woman, infants and children.

Basically, the proposal governs the formula used to reimburse states for their administrative costs and recognizes that these costs vary from area to area, that costs to begin a programfare often higher than

those to run the program, and that programs serving rural areas and those with high percentages of migrant farm workers are more costly to administer.

The law, signed by the President on Nov.' 10, extends and expands food assistance to needy mothers and children. In addition, the new law made program which provides food and cash assistance for meals served at eligible child care institutions. It also provides added incentives to improve breakfast programs in schools.

USDA invites comments which may be used to alter the formula. Meanwhile, the proposed formula will be used to distribute administrative funds for the second quarter of fiscal year 1979 to states and Indian tribes which provide special supplemental foods to women and children.

The formula, which was developed earlier this year with the help of interested persons, does the following:

--provides a minimum grant to permit smaller state agencies to meet operating requirements; -- ties a portion of the administrative funding to the amount of food assistance provided for state agencies;

--directs the remaining funds to areas with higher operating costs.

On a national basis, money for administration of the program will remain at 20 percent of total program funding. The percentage received by states under the more flexible formula will range






WASHINGTON (NEA) — President Carter's ambitious anti-inflation program has little chance of success because it fails to focus on the root causes of the price increases that have the greatest impact on the budgets of most families

That's the conclusion of a compelling economic analysis produced by a broad coalition of senior citizen, consumer, labor and environmental groups that recently organized as Consumers Opposed to Inflation in the Necessities, or COIN.

Relying on research done by the Washington-based Exploratory Project for Economic Alternatives, COIN offers a persuasive argument that the White House must target its anti-inflation campaign on the big-ticket items responsible for the most dramatic price increase of recent years.

But Carter is relying instead on a conventional "shot-gun" approach that wrongly assumes wage hikes and price increases are equally responsible for inflation and makes few distinctions between luxuries and necessities. COIN has identified four broad groupings that represent necessi-ties by virtue of the fact that consumption is neither optional nor deferrable for most families.

Those categories and the seasonally adjusted annual rate of inflation for the first 10 months of this year are food, 12.6 percent; shelter, 12.6 percent; medical care, 8.9 percent, and energy, 8.6 percent. The weighted average of those increases is 11.6 percent, substantially higher than the 9.4 percent increase regis-tered during the same period for all items measured in the federal government's Consumer Price Index. Excluded from COIN's analysis are alcoholic beverages, tobacco products, cosmetics, entertainment, household

tobacco products, cosmetics, entertainment, household furnishings, clothing and various other items whose purchase can be postponed if not foregone by families on tight budgets.

Perhaps most significantly, many of the elements most responsible for inflation during the 1970s are not even

guidelines. The most notable exception to that rule is the adminis-tration's still-unsuccessful effort to convince Congress to approve hospital cost containment legislation. But other health care costs have received far less attention. Drug company profits, in terms of return on equity, were 18.2 percent last year. The average income for doctors in 1976 was \$63,000. Although food prices increased 67 percent between 1970

Although food prices increased 67 percent between 1970 and 1977, farmers last year received only 31 cents of every dollar spent on food, down from 34 cents two years earlier. Yet food marketing firms and other corporate middlemen increased their after-tax profits by 150 percent during the 1970s

In the energy field, profits of the nine largest petroleum companies have doubled, from \$4.5 billion in 1970 to \$9 billion in 1977. Gas and electric rates rose 69 percent during the five years of the mid-1970s.

Soaring interest rates and property costs pushed the average price of a new home up from \$23,400 in 1970 to \$48,800 in 1977 — an increase of more than 100 percent. A close examination of the price shifts during that period

shows land prices and financing charges registered major increases as components of home construction while labor

costs declined in relation to other components. In virtually every field, COIN argues, wage increases are only a minor factor in fueling inflation. Real earnings - weekly wages and salaries adjusted for inflation and increased taxes - are down more than 3 percent nationally

Increased taxes — are down more than 3 percent nationally thus far this year. The COIN campaign was best summarized by a statement made during a nationwide television address in early 1977: "Inflation has hit us hardest not in the luxuries but in the essentials — food, energy, health and housing." But almost two years have passed since then, and the speaker — Jimmy Carter — seems to have forgotten the wisdom he offered on that occasion.

## **Federal Payments to Sheepmen Continuing Climb Under Formula**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Des- now to make similar payments pite a longterm decline in U.S. to farmers for major crops such sheep production, federal payments intended to boost the quality and production of wool are climbing under-a new formula designed by Congress last year.

So-called "incentive payments" were authorized in the Wool Act of 1954 to bridge the price gap between what growers got for wool on the market and a level considered fair to the sheep and lamb industry.

This was the forerunner of the system of "target prices" used as wheat, corn and cotton.

After wool is sold, the Agriculture Department computes the average market price in the calendar year and later sends producers their payments.

For some years, the wool incentive price was 72 cents pound, meaning that if the market price was less payments up the difference.

directed that the incentive price be adjusted annually, beginning with the wool that was marketed last year.

The incentive price for wool sold in 1977 was raised to 99 cents a pound. But the market price averaged 72 cents a pound the same as the old incentive price - and about \$25 million

was paid to producers. For wool shorn and sold this year, the incentive price was would go to producers to make raised to \$1.08 a pound Athough the final figures are

not ready, officials say that the Agriculture Act of 1977, 1978 wool market price average may be about 77 cents a pound and that total payments to growers next spring may be around \$31 million. Looking farther ahead, the

lambs have been declining for many years and last Jan. 1 totaled about 12.4 million head, the smallest since USDA began keeping such figures a century ago. At that time the US., flock was 46.3 million head, and the peak was in 1942 when 56.2 million sheep and lambs were reported.

Payments soared to a record of \$102.3 million for wool sold in 1971, a year when market prices sank to their lowest levels since. the late 1930s.

No payments were made for 1973 wool, when market prices had rebounded to 83 cents a

## **Farmers** Union QuestionsQuarantine Looking farther ahead, the department has announced that

AMARILLO - Underscoring the fact that a proposed pest quarantine in 15 Panhandle counties is aimed at regulating only outgoing shipments of corn and grain, the Texas Farmers Union has formally asked a Texas Department of Agriculture hearing to reconsider its tactics.

-

Ronnie Bezner, a Dalhart farmer and past-president of the Dallam-Hartley Farmers Union, suggest on behalf of the statewide farm organization that producers be allowed to set up an insect control district to address the problem of infestation by the European Com Borer. The recommendation was made to a TDA hearing during solicitation of public comment on the proposed quarantine.

"If effective control of this pest is the aim of this action." said Bezner, "then both incoming and outgoing

corn and grain shipments must be controlled. In addition, something must be done to attack the corn borer in the field. If this comprehensive approach is not taken, we are simply protecting 'free' areas from 'infested' areas, but not trying to really clean up the problem in the quarantined

counties. "Farmers should not be subjected to the burden of inspection, paperwork, and inevitable increased costs of regulation unless the ultimate goal is to bring about conditions where the quaran-

tine can be lifted," he added. The 15 Texas counties proposed for quarantine of the European Corn Borer are Carson, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Gray, Hansford, Hartley. Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Mooore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Roberts, and Sherman.

Frost in Brazil during the critical flowering stages of the coffee tree means possible damage to up to 25 percent of the world's coffee production. Analysts this year expect that the Brazilian frost did only moderate damage, probably. reducing the world coffee crop by less than 1 percent.

But no one can be sure until the Brazilian crop is harvested next April, and no one takes Brazilian frost lightly. In 1975 a frost killed a large proportion of that nation's coffee trees. The frost, along with other factors, pushed retail coffee prices to a high of \$3.931/2 a pound in June 1977 and led some consumers to build up a "pantry inventory" of coffee.

Outside Brazil, the crop awaiting harvest looks healthy and abundant.

Another factor in lower prices is a long-term decline in demand.
