MAF Sponsorship Sought By Group On Field Lights

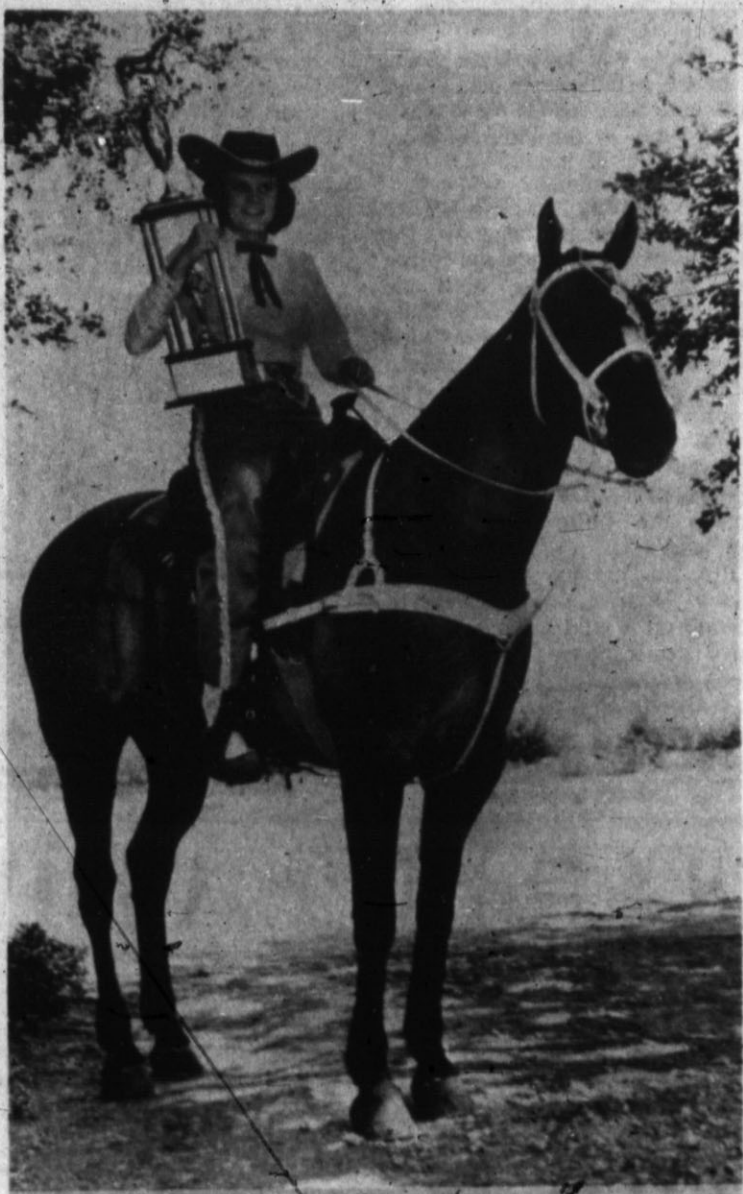
A group meeting Friday night voted to request the Hereford Area Foundation to head a drive to put lights on the high school baseball diamond.

Quick-Acting Thieves Hit Unwatched Autos, Purses

A bold, young Latin American youth walked up to a car parked at the Deaf Smith County Hospital recently and snatched a purse from the front seat of the vehicle as the woman's three-and-a-half-year old daughter watched.

Another purse snatching occurred recently at a local grocery store. The thief watched the woman as she cashed her pay check.

As the woman was shopping, he reached into the purse in the grocery basket, grabbed the billfold, and was gone before the woman knew what had happened.

Purse snatching in Hereford is again becoming a serious problem, said Chief of Police Marshall Padgett on Thursday, with more than a half a dozen incidents being reported in the past three weeks.

Other losses have occurred in the city, he continued, but have not been reported to the Hereford Police Department.

Sentence Airman On Theft Charge

An Amarillo Air Force Base airman was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail plus court costs as he was tried on a misdemeanor theft charge Friday in Deaf Smith County Court, Judge H. C. Williams presiding.

The man and his 15-year-old brother had been arrested Tuesday, July 3, in Amarillo. They were being held for the county by the Randall County Sheriff's office.

Sentenced on the theft charge was A/1c William Wray Denton, 23. His brother had been handled by the Juvenile Court, Judge Williams presiding, and turned over to the custody of his parents.

Both are alleged to have been involved in the theft of approximately 50 gallons of gasoline on the Meyer Brothers farm, northeast of Hereford.

The fuel is reported to have been taken from two combines and an overhead storage tank.

Area onion and potato producers are facing a "favorable market situation" at the present time, shed owners and shippers said late last week, as the 1962 crops began pouring in to Hereford sheds for processing, grading and shipping to national markets.

Prices for both crops were still holding steady here at the end of the week with area shippers still anticipating a rise in prices.

Among the factors contributing to the "favorable situation" is that California and Arizona potato harvests are within five percent of being complete, said a shed manager.

Trail Of Stolen Cars Starts And Finishes Here

A trail of stolen automobiles reaching from Hereford to Littlefield through Dimmitt sent Panhandle law enforcement officers on a search for a "joy riding youth" Friday.

The trail began in Hereford shortly after noon Friday and by the time it ended here about midnight, vehicles had been taken in each of the cities.

All of the vehicles were recovered by peace officers after one had a flat tire, one run out of gas, and another was involved in a hit-and-run accident.

First of the automobiles taken was a 1957 sedan belonging to John C. Robinson, 138 Beach. It was parked at the Deaf Smith County Hospital between 12:30 and 1 p.m. Friday.

The car was recovered about 30 minutes later after a flat tire had forced the car thief to abandon it at Fourth and Roosevelt streets.

In the meantime, a second theft was reported by E. J. Miles, 915 Union, as his 1957 model sedan was taken from a local lumber company between 1:15 and 2:15 p.m.

The sedan was later recovered in Dimmitt about 5:30 p.m., but the owner of a 1959 sedan in that city reported the theft of his automobile.

After a hit-and-run accident in Littlefield, the Dimmitt vehicle was abandoned. However, another 1959 sedan was taken there and driven back to Hereford.

It was found about 1:55 a.m. Saturday abandoned on Austin Road, one and a half miles east of the Main St. "Y". The automobile was out of gas.

In each of the thefts, car keys had been left in the ignition.

Hereford Police Department is cautioning city residents to remove keys from auto ignitions and to make sure the ignition is in the "locked" position.

they are not mature enough to compete, he commented.

He also pointed out that other major producing areas in the United States are not expected to begin harvesting for the next three to four weeks in quantities that would affect the market.

Contributing factors to the "favorable situation" for Hereford's onion crop are reported to be the high quality of the onions and that approximately 50 percent of the nation's summer crop is located in the Deaf Smith County area.

It was reported by a shed owner that many of the onions reaching the market from other areas are marginal in quality, "but the market has held in spite of this."

He expressed confidence that the market would rise since the Deaf Smith County crop is beginning to reach the market.

Most processors began handling potatoes this week with one or two loads coming in earlier. Shippers are describing the crop, saying, the quality is "real nice."

It is reported that the potatoes are of "real good quality" and "not many are culls."

In commenting on the onions being grown in the Hereford area, shed managers and owners have commented that the crop this year is "real good" and is perhaps "actually better than a year ago."

"Yields, however, are not as high as we would like to see," said one. All are pointing out the fact that yields are down with average production estimated at about 650 bags to the acre.

The market and demand are still strong and processors are shipping all of the crops now. (Continued on page 8)

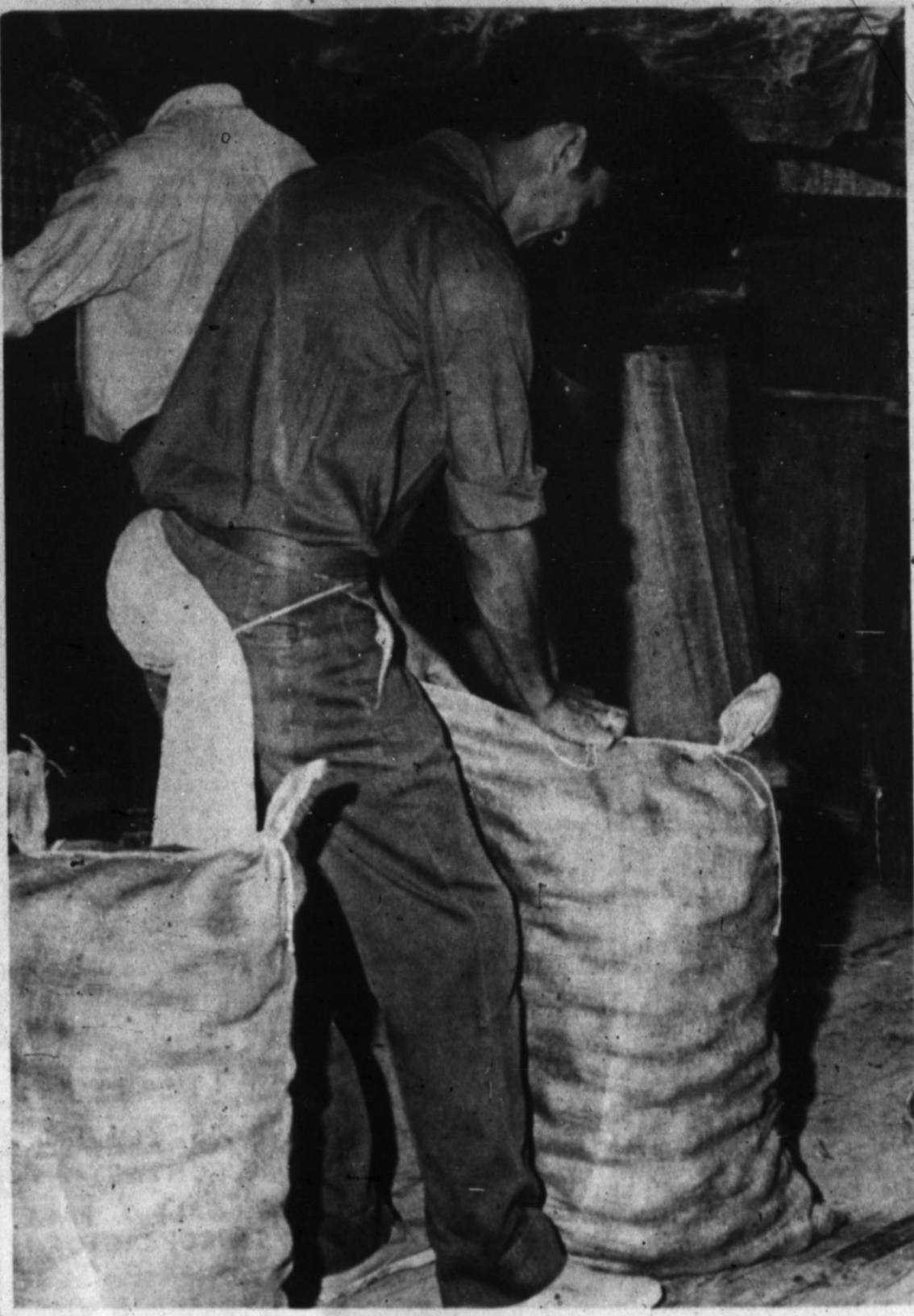

Letter To The Editor

It is impossible to read a newspaper these days without reading some commentary on the so-called prayer ban. I think it is a shame and disgrace the way some of the "good American citizens" react.

First, these good American citizens do not know the situation, and yet they feel authorized to give a "sound" opinion. I will say, though my voice is just one in millions, that the Supreme Court should be commended on handing down a just decision in view of the fact they knew what the public reaction would be to this decision. To call them anti-religious, Aesthetics, or any of the names that has been given them is poor support for our public officials. They handed down a decision not on the prayer but the law that says the teachers have to use that prayer each morning.

It is illegal for the state to pass a law of that type. For those who disbelieve this they may check the Constitution of the United States, the 1st Amendment, which guarantees every citizen the right to religious freedom, and also the 14th Amendment which also guarantees this fundamental liberty.

To put it on a basis that would be more of a reality to you, what would you think if the state of Texas passed a law stating that you could not print your own opinions in your newspaper if it is contrary to the accepted opinion? Would you not say that it deprives you of freedom of the press which is guaranteed by the Constitution? The same objective was used in the recent Supreme Court decision.

Again, I personally commend the Supreme Court for their unbiased opinion in view of public reaction. More power to them for upholding our fundamental freedoms rather than having these freedoms become forced upon us by the law.

As you probably know our own high school has a morning devotional program. This program does not hurt anyone, in fact some of the students are probably getting the only exposure to religion they have ever had. But there is no law which says they have to have these devotionals. They are not

forced to have these devotionals. There is no prayer ban here or in any school in the United States, there is only a clause in the Constitution which prevents the national or state governments from forcing these things down our throats when they are not in accord with our own principles.

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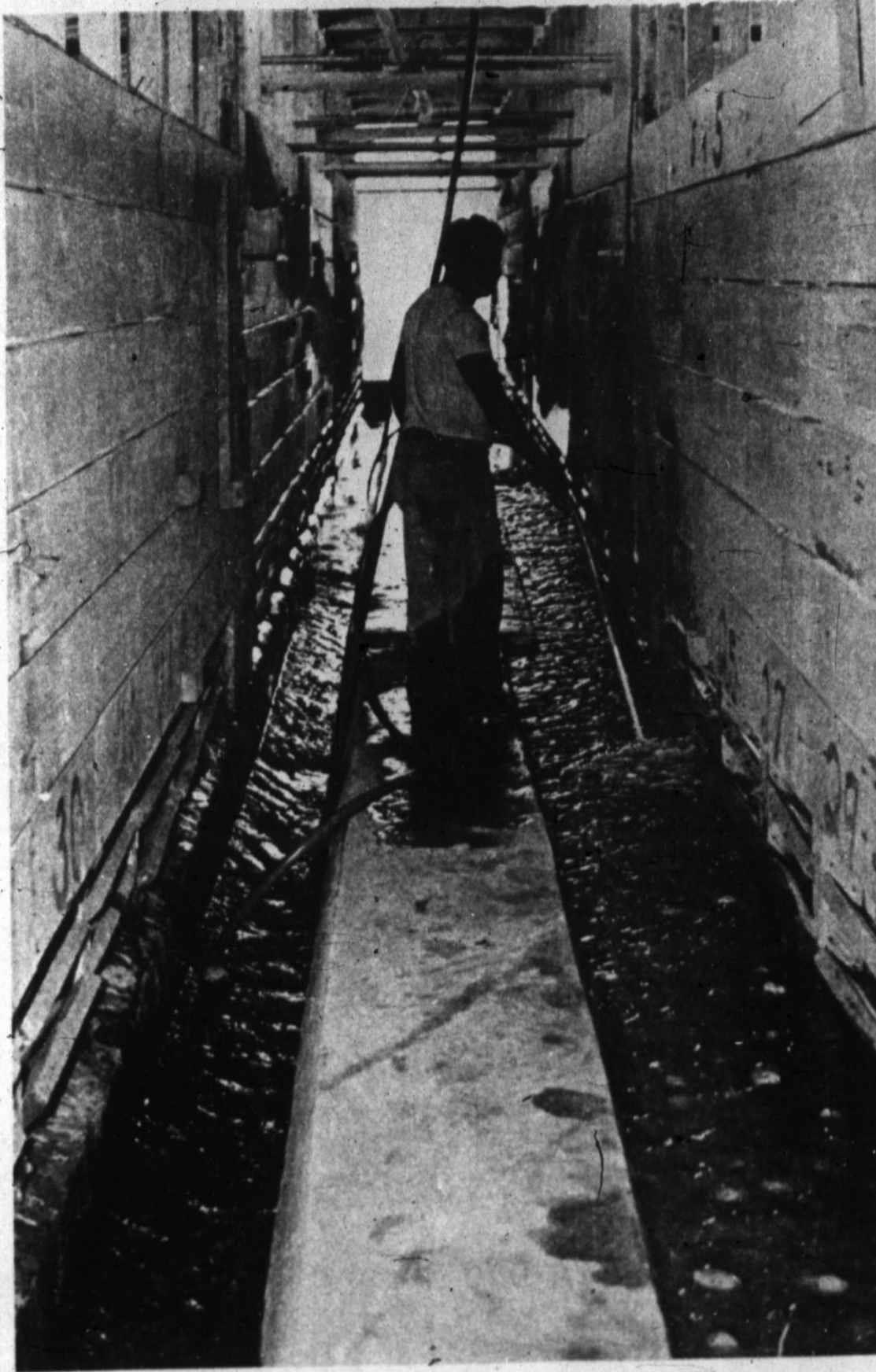

**Hereford Blasts
Canyon Here 16-5**

Hereford's American Legion baseball team celebrated the Fourth of July by firing rocket-like hits against a hapless Canyon team here. The scheduled seven-inning affair was called at the end of four and a half innings with Hereford leading 16-5. American Legion rules provide that the game may be called after five innings if one team has a ten-run lead.

Hereford slammed out 12 hits, eight of them for extra bases to maintain its second place standing in the south half of District 18.

In the top of the first inning, Canyon got one runner on by a walk but stranded him on first.

Hereford lost little time in jumping out front 3-0. Ronnie Duncan singled and John Willoughby sacrificed him to second. Dan McDowell walked. With two out, Larry Coffman doubled in one run with two errors allowing the other two runs to score.

Ronnie Reynolds doubled for Canyon in the second, but was left there. Hereford again showed power at the plate as it picked up five more runs in the second. With one out, Duncan walked, Willoughby singled and Dan McDowell walked to load the bases. Eugene Green homered to drive in four runs and Canyon changed pitchers.

Larry Coffman greeted the new hurler with a single, went to second on a wild pitch and came in on John Buck's double.

With one out, Canyon put a runner on by a walk. But a double play from Duncan to Buck to Mickey Stevens closed out the side in a hurry.

Hereford picked up five more runs in its part of the third. Mike Ranspot singled

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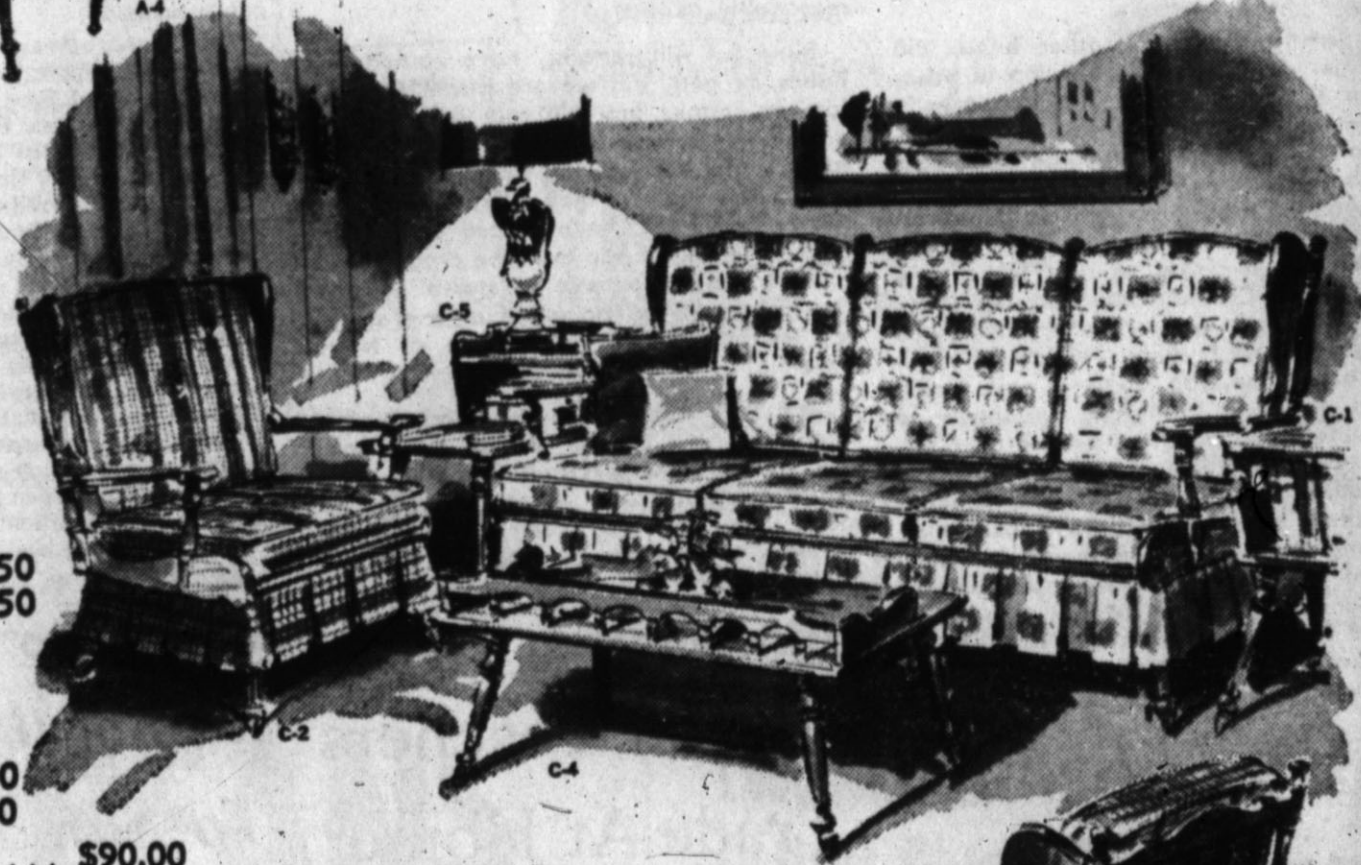

People who buy or stake such claims could stand to lose all of their investment—in land in the improvements they build on the land—if the Government contests the claims and finds them null and void."
