# Residents Losing Their Heart in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - In the chilly, beautiful city that has inspired song and poetry, grief hung like fog today amid a plague of bizarre violence that led residents to ask: "Why does it happen

"I feel so sorry for this city," said a citizen shaken by the murder Monday of San Francisco Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk. "We've had the Zebra killers, the Zodiac, the SLA, the Peoples Temple and now this. I don't know how much more we can take."

The tearful throng of 25,000 to 40,000 residents who gathered in numbed shock outside City Hall Monday night tried to provide their own answer. Carrying candles and clinging to their

neighbors like survivors of some natural catastrophe or a war, they sang, "We shall overcome."

Columnist Herb Caen, among the most influential men in town, summed up the feelings of his beloved city in today's San Francisco Chronicle.

"Horror upon horror. Shock upon shock." Caen wrote. "... The vocabulary of grief and disbelief stretches only so far...At the end of a week of incredible headlines, all of us were left stunned, exhausted, overwhelmed by the flood of bloody 'senseless' information.

"...It was all senseless. Like the hundreds dead in Guyana...And yet there must be a thread connecting all this violence."

The thread that connected Moscone and Milk, Caen said, was one common to many of their constituents: "They loved San Francisco."

So did Jim Jones. And Charlie

"This is every misfit's favorite city as well as the favorite city of a lot of straight, normal people," said San Francisco Examiner Editor and Publisher Reg Murphy.

"It's the most photogenic city in the

country," Murphy added. "It's also the most accepting city. It contains some of the brightest minds in America...But there's an odd mixture of the highly intellectual community and the crazy community."

The "crazy community" bloomed in the 1960s. Longhaired young people calling themselves "hippies" and "flower children" swarmed into San Francisco tawdry Haight-Ashbury

They were turned off by the Vietnam War and "turned on" by the prophet of LSD, Timothy Leary.

The flower children were hallucinating on drugs. "We were riding on the wind," one of them would remember. Her name was Lynette "Squeak" Fromme. Year later, she would try to kill a president.

She came to San Francisco with the ragged Charles Manson "family" in 1968. Manson, guru of a band of young misfits, had passed through Haight Ashbury earlier, staying long enough to learn the power of drugs and a word, "Love." He took his "hippies" to Los Angeles and ordered mass murders.

In Haight Ashbury, teenagers "freaked out" screaming in the agony of LSD "bad trips."

The plague they had brought did not die. It festered and burst in the '70s, San Francisco's most violent decade since the days of the Barbary Coast.

In 1969 and 1970, a murderer calling himself "Zodiac" sent grisly coded messages to local newspapers. "Killing people is more fun than killing wild game," he wrote. Zodiac has not been caught. Police say he probably killed six persons. He boasts of slaying 37

In 1972, a midwestern preacher, the Rev. Jim Jones set up his Peoples Temple in San Francisco's poor Fillmore district.

## Clements Says Victory Cost \$6 Million Total

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (AP) - Bill Clements says he spent \$65,000 of his own money on his historic victory in the Texas gubernatorial race: "And that was in there before I even knew it."

The Dallas businessman also said Monday he personally guaranteed more than \$2.7 million in loans for the race against his Democratic opponent, Attorney General John Hill.

Clements, who began as a roughneck and built a multimillion dollar oil drilling

empire, also said Hill lost votes by claiming his Republican opponent was attempting to buy the election.

The governor-elect spoke to a press gathering at the Republican Governors' Conference.

"I want to make it very clear that I think anyone who would put that forward doesn't understand the Texas voter." he began. "If anyone knows of a Texas vote for sale, I want you to tell me about it,

## China Sales Won't Hurt, **Bergland Says**

WASHINGTON (AP) - There is some concern that if China emerges as a regular market for U.S. grain, the purchases could have an impact on American food prices.

But Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland, who has returned from a 10-day visit to China, says that in view of the huge stockpile of corn and other grain, sales to Peking will have a negligible effect on overall U.S. retail

At least that is the way it looks to Bergland for the next 12 months or so. He has been asked several times since returning from China about the possible impact on Americans if a regular grain trade develops with Peking.

The main purpose for Bergland's playing down the effects of selling corn and wheat to China is that grain stockpiles are huge and will remain so, at least until the 1979 harvest so wheat, corn and other crops shape up.

Bergland said again on the CBS broadcast "Face the Nation" over the weekend that the U.S. stockpile of grain accumulated in recent years will provide more than enough to meet demands from China and other foreign buyers in the year ahead.

However, Bergland came back from China with more or less an understanding that it will be buying around 10 million metric tons of foreign grain annually over the next few years, including perhaps 5 million to 6 million metric tons from the United

Commissioners approved the budget after County Judge Sam Morgan stated that Mrs. Kindsfather had done "a fine job" since she was hired to head the program.

In other business during Monday's court meeting, commissioners discussed per diem expenses for county officials, broken courthouse steps, a maintainer for Precinct 2, office help for the county service officer, paramedic equipment and revenue sharing

County Treasurer Vesta Mae Nunely told the court that the county still had approximately \$21,800 in unallocated revenue-sharing funds, which she stated would have to be spent soon.

She also said that the newest entitlement period for revenue-sharing would result in \$33,100 less than the previous period.

Commissioners voted to deduct the \$33,100 from general government, which had been designated to receive \$66,765. The court also decided to use the \$21,800 for general government in order to trim the deficit to \$11,300.

In a separate vote, commissioners approved the payment of approximately \$700 in teletype equipment for the sheriff's office from the general government revenue-sharing budget.

Commissioners agreed to pay for a new maintainer for Precinct 2 from the \$107,000 left in the revenue-sharing transportation budget.

Commissioner Bruce Coleman requested that the court change its policy on per diem meal expenses from reimbursing officials on the basis of

receipts to a flat \$12.50-per-day rate. "It would be simpler and maybe fairer to establish a flat rate on out-of-town trips," Coleman said.

The commission approved the change. ## **Potential Jurors Report** At Hawkins Murder Trial

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Prospective abducted from her Amarillo home. jurors reported Monday for the capital murder trial of an Amarillo man condemned to die for murdering a Borger housewife and now accused of slaying of a 12-year-old girl.

The trial of Samuel Christopher Hawkins was moved from Amarillo on a change of venue.

Hawkins was convicted earlier this year of the May 1977 murder of Abbe Hamilton, 19, of Borger. The conviction is being appealed, as is Hawkins' conviction for the aggravated rape of a Hereford woman.

State District Judge Jerry Shackelford agreed the defendant could represent himself as long as he has an attorney present in the courtroom. Hawkins had earlier fired two attorneys.

## Consumer Prices Increase More

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Carter administration expects to see results from its anti-inflation program in mid-1979, virtually writing off the next few months to rising prices.

The Labor Department was releasing its October report on consumer prices today amid indications the price index would surpass the 200 mark for the first

That means the average retail product costs twice as much as it did in the 1967 base period.

Economists expect little headway against inflation the rest of this year because wholesale prices are continuing

The October wholesale price report, released Nov. 2, showed that the prices retailers paid for their products jumped 0.9 percent in October. These costs are usually passed on to consumers.

The Carter administration, which had predicted a 5.9 percent yearly inflation rate at the start of 1978, now expects

On Monday, the Interstate Commerce Commission rejected a 6.2 percent truck freight rate increase requested by the Southern Motor Carriers Rate Conference

Commissioners said their action also is intended to set guidelines for the entire trucking industry. Last week the administration persauded railroads to reduce their requested freight rate

increases from 8.1 to 7 percent. Carter, who is trying to convince labor unions they will not lose out under his program, warned urban leaders Monday

they too will have to make sacrifices. At the National League of Cities convention in St. Louis, Carter said the next federal budget will be "very, very tight" and that city officials will have to

exercise restraint to help fight inflation. Carter is committed to cutting his 1980 federal budget by between \$15 billion and \$20 billion to achieve a federal deficit of no more than \$30 billion.



HOUSTON (AP) - Prosecutors in the murder conspiracy trial of millionaire Cullen Davis say defense probings have failed to find any penetrable holes in the state's prime piece of evidence: the incriminating tape recordings.

"He didn't get to first base." prosecutor Tolley Wilson chuckled Monday after watching defense lawyer Richard "Racehorse" Haynes crossexamine FBI agent Joe Gray.

"The defense gains are non-existent." he said.

Haynes spent several hours Monday questioning the Dallas agent about the audio and video tapes which capture the Aug. 20 meeting between Davis and FBI informant David McCrory.

Gray was the surveillance expert at the scene of the Fort Worth parking lot encounter.

McCrory, 40, the state's key witness, contends the Fort Worth oil heir ordered him to hire a "hit man" to kill his divorce judge and others.

The judge was not harmed.

Jurors listened through bright yellow earphones as videotape monitors again provided what the state contends is an eyewitness account of the crime unfolding.

'Hey. I got something here..." McCrory says as he allegedly shows the 45-year-old defendant a Polaroid picture of Judge Joe Edison posing as if dead.

"Who do you want to go next?" McCrory asked Davis in the conversation which was picked up via a Nagra tape recorder strapped to his chest.

#### Jonestown Survivors

#### To Return to U.S.

GEORGETOWN, Guyana (AP) -Jonestown survivors will begin returning to the United States this week, perhaps starting Wednesday, after Guyanese authorities sift out suspects and material witnesses to the Peoples Temple suicide-murders. U.S. and Guyanese officials say.

Guyanese police are making a complete inventory of the camp and questioning sect members at Georgetown headquarters to determine which of the 80 survivors will be permitted to leave this South American nation.

"Their status is being reviewed, and some will be allowed to go," Assistant Commissioner Skip Roberts said Monday. "Some will be held for judicial proceedings."

Two Americans have been charged with murder, and three others were questioned Monday for the second time about the death ceremony in which 908 Americans and one Guyanese died at the Rev. Jim Jones' religious commune in northwest Guyana.

The three were Tim Carter, 28, and his brother, Michael, 20, both of Boise, Idaho, and Michael Prokes, 32, a former Modesto, Calif., television newsman.

Bergland said "that's not certain" and emphasized that no formal agreement was sought by either side. Besides, he said. full diplomatic relations still do not exist between China and the United

"There's no agreement of any sort; the numbers are purely speculative." Bergland said.

But Bergland acknowledges he let the Chinese know clearly that the United States is interested in establishing trade on a "steady, businesslike basis" and that the practice of China entering the U.S. market sporadically and unpredictably should be changed.

Assuming for illustration that China will buy six million metric tons of grain annually from the United States, that would represent about 7.5 percent of the 79.5 million metric tons of wheat and corn the USDA estimates will be exported to

all foreign countries in 1978-79. Put another way, exports of six million

metric tons of corn and wheat to China would be about 2.1 percent of the total U.S. supply of 282.5 million metric tons of the two grains in the 1978-79 season.

But six million tons of grain, whether it is wheat or corn or both, is a large amount, particularly if it is in exports to a foreign country that until now has been an erratic customer.

For example, if it were all corn, six million metric tons would be about 236.4 million bushels - roughly the average production this fall from about 2.02 million acres of lowa corn land.

Thus, while it is correct that such a tonnage of grain sales to China is relatively small in comparison to the overall U.S. supply and amount of exports, a regular market of this magnitude would be valuable to farmers in terms of stronger prices and reduced stockpiles.

It also would be a big help to administration planners faced with

The Agriculture Department announced Monday that China has bought an additional 350,000 metric tons of U.S. corn for delivery through next Sept. 30.

The department said the new purchases, handled by unidentified exporting companies, boosted to 2.3 million metric tons the amount of corn China has bought since resuming grain purchases from the United States this

I don't understand the anatomy of children's legs. The same legs that will bend double and apparently have no bone when you put a boot on it. can, in the next minute.

kick the back of a car seat with the force of a wrecking ball. The same legs that turn to liquid after an hour of shopping and will no longer support their bodies will, at bedtime, be capable of scaling walls and running a marathon.

I discovered this phenomenon with my first child. One day when she was about two, she simply collapsed on t and refused to stand. When I put her on my lap, she flexed her legs, her knees locked, and she pushed herself into a standing position right under my chin, nearly severing my

Every mother who has ever tried to thread the legs of a toddler into a grocery cart seat will know what I am talking

My children's first words were an entire declarative

sentence. "Carry me!"

"I can't see the parade. Carry me!"

"I'm sleepy. Carry me!" "The grass tickles my feet. Carry me!"

"I'm running away from home. Carry me!"

I lugged those kids around so much that by the time they were ready to enter school. I had a stomach like a snack tray... People at cocktail parties used to set glasses on it.

The legs continued to be a phenomenon. They weren't long enough to climb on a chair, get a drink of water or scale a toilet seat. On the other hand, they could leap over playpens higher than the child's head. get cookies on the top shelf or





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

## Federal Agencies Under Fire For Handling of Religious Cults

WASHINGTON (AP) - Two federal agencies under fire for the way they handle complaints about religious cults contend they would come under even more criticism for taking stronger steps to limit religious activities.

Procedures of both the State Department and Justice Department have been questioned in the wake of the mass murder-suicide last weekend that claimed nearly 900 lives at Jonestown, Guvana.

Justice Department officials said the constitutional guarantee of freedom of religion is the main factor prompting them to fread lightly when dealing with offbeat religious groups.

In addition to constitutional considerations, the State Department said it must take into account that the people it deals with normally are guests of a foreign

In a statement issued Friday, the Justice Department said it "recognizes the anguish that parents suffer when their adult children give up their former way of life to join a different religious sect. However, in enforcing the federal criminal law we must act within our jurisdiction and scrupulously observe constitutional restraints.'

The statement said the department had made "numerous inquiries" into allegations that "federal laws might have been violated by persons connected with religious sects.'

It said it sometimes found there were no federal violations and in a few instances turned information over to state authorities for possible action.

"In all cases, we have made clear that the department was not and could not lawfully conduct a general inquiry into the activities or practices of any religious sects," the statement said.

About 99 percent of the telephone installations made in the United States are routine. according to Dale Johnston, Southwestern Bell manager for the business office in Hereford.

"But the ones that aren't belong in some kind of record book," Johnston said.

The company's policy is to install a telephone where the customer wants it, Johnston said. However, safety and reliable service are primary concerns in any installation.

"If it is humanly possible, we'll try to do it," he said.

People have called the telephone company around the United States for a variety of strange installations.

"I've heard of people wanting telephones in coffins, bomp shelters, caves-the list is almost endless," Johnston said. "In another Bell company, there was a case of a customer wanting a telephone installed in a teepee," he said.

One of the places that has become increasingly popular for

many installations is the bathroom. "To some people it will sound silly, but there seems to be a trend toward more bathrooms equipped with telephones," Johnston said.

He added many hotels are installing one telephone in the room and one in the bathroom. It's obviously for customer convenience, he said.

The popularity of telepones in bathrooms also holds true for outside plumbing. Telephones in outhouses also are a novelty

Other outside installation points for telephones are barns and stables. Johnston noted that ranchers and farmers spend a good deal of time in their barns, and it follows that they want communications there.

"The company has found that almost all people want phones where they do most of their work and spend most of their time," he said.

WASHINGTON (AP) - A film technician contends a sevensecond strip of color film taken minutes before the John F. Kennedy assassination is "important new evidence" showing more than one person was responsible for the president's death.

Technician Robert Groden of Hope Lawn, N.J., who performed "photo-enhancement" on the film, enlarging individual frames to more than 1,000 times their original size, was present Sunday when a group called the Assassination Information Bureau screened the film for representatives of the media.

The bureau consists of critics of the official Warren Commission, which conclude that Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone when he shot Kennedy from a sixth-floor window of the Texas School Book Depository in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963.

Groden said the film "is proof and important new evidence that someone else was on the sixth floor and that witnesses who said then in 1963 they saw someone other than Oswald are

**Employees Counted** As though in answer to Governor-elect Clements' recommendation to reduce the state employee work force by 25,000 over a four year period, Comptroller Bob Bullock said Texas government ranks below the national average in employees per 10,000 residents.

Bullock said there are 83,917 non-academic employees, 62,058 university and college employees and 22,944 part-time and seasonal workers.

That comes to 129 employees per 10,000 residents. The 1977 national average was 134 fulltime equivalent state employees per 10,000 population.
