# Iran Oil Production Ceases

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Oil production ceased in Iran today, the state radio announced, as violent demonstrations against Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi boiled on.

The broadcast also said 18 of Tehran's 108 gasoline stations closed after running out of fuel, and that the Senate will hold a

special session Saturday "to review the situation" in the country.

The radio had been broadcasting appeals to oil workers and religious leaders every 30 minutes, urging them to permit the nation's strike-crippled oil industry to produce at least enough fuel for domestic needs.

Iran had been the world's No. 2 oil exporter after Saudi Arabia. But production Wednesday hit a record low of 300,000 barrels, compared to a normal daily average of 6 million barrels, before trickling to a halt.

## To Finance State's Education

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - After 14 months of study, a legislator-citizen commission on school finance has recommended only that lawmakers consider four options based on the present way of doing things.

The Legislative Commission on Public School Finance, created in 1977 and given a \$200,000 budget, signed its report to the 66th Legislature on Wednesday.

Rep. Tom Massey, D-San Angelo, the chairman, said he felt the commission had done its duty.

"I have to say I am a little disappointed, for I feel we ought to take a more definitive approach and point in the direction where we ought to go," he added.

The Legislature had instructed the commission to "explore and develop a revised method for financing state programs of public school education."

But the commission presented these four options, none departing greatly from the current method of basing state aid on the taxable wealth of each school district:

-Exclude intangible property from the measurement of a local wealth. Use a "meaningful" method for evaluating rural land on productivity instead of market value. A district's "local fund assignment" for the Foundation School Program would be 15 cents per \$100

-Include intangibles and evaluate ati real property at full market value. The rate for determining local fund assignment would be 8.5 cents per \$100

-Include intangibles and let districts choose between full market value or an "index value" representing a mix of productive value on agricultural land and market value on non-rural property. Rate would be 9 cents per \$100 of full value or 10.25 cents on index value.

-Exclude intangibles. Apply a "meaningful" agricultural production value to rural land. And - here's the one innovation - include a factor for county personal income to recognize the fact that an area can be land rich but dollar poor.

Legislators will receive computer printouts showing the impact of each option on their districts.

The commission said if the 1979 Legislature does not change the present school finance law, "the local school districts' share of the Foundation School Program would increase 59 percent statewide by the 1980-81 school years."

That would mean higher local property

## **Davis Points to Call** From 'FBI Agent'

HOUSTON (AP) - Texas millionaire Cullen Davis goes before the jury again today to deny involvement in an alleged summertime scheme to kill his divorce judge and others.

The dark-haired defendant said he was acting on orders from a purported FBI agent when he discussed mass murder last August with informant David McCrory.

He said in effect he was framed by his estranged wife Priscilla. Davis told the jury Wednesday his

entanglement in the murder conspiracy case stems from an Aug. 10 telephone call by a man who identified himself as Special Agent James Acree.

"We think that you are the victim of an extortion plot by David McCrory" Davis quote Acree as saying. "We want you to play along. That's the only way to catch

"I want you to play along with him. Whatever he suggests, try to do it."

The Fort Worth industrialist said he was following those instructions when he met McCrory, 40, the state's key witness, and discussed guns, money and murder.

The FBI wired McCrory for sound and collected the recordings of the Aug. 18 and 20 meetings, and the recordings lie at the heart of the state's case against

Looking relaxed and confident, Davis, 45, took the stand Wednesday morning and attempted to explain to the jury seemingly incriminating statements on the FBI tapes. He told of his relationship with McCrory and gave his version of the

events leading up to his Aug. 20 arrest.

Davis said he spurned numerous attempts by McCrory to talk with him by phone earlier this year, but agreed to meet him at a restaurant parking lot May

'He said he was broke and didn't have a job and he discussed the fact that he'd been pimping for his wife," Davis testified.

"His wife was a prostitute. He started crying. He wanted to know if he could help me...He wanted to be friends...He volunteered to help with my divorce case if I'd give him a job."

Davis said he put McCrory to work as a salesman in one of his companies and that he occasionally called on his one time pool-shooting crony for assistance in the multimillion dollar divorce case.

He said McCrory contacted him one day in June and "said there was going to (See DAVIS, Page 2)

### Hamburger Prices To Soar, Officials Say

#### Administrator Indicted In Dimmitt

DIMMITT (AP) - Charging failure to provide emergency medical assistance to an infant who died, a Castro County grand jury today indicted the administrator of a hospital where the infant was taken.

Castro County District Attorney Jimmy Davis said the grand jury returned the Class C misdemeanor indictment after midnight today. The West Texas probe began last week after Isidro Aguinagas said his 11-month-old son died after he was not admitted to Plains Memorial Hospital Dec. 8.

Speaking through a police interpreter. Aguinagas said hospital administrators said his son. Isidro Jr., could not be admitted unless Aguinagas paid a deposit of \$400 or \$450. The child was seriously ill with a respiratory infection and a high fever, according to his physician.

Indicted hospital administrator Jack Newsom said the entire incident was a "misunderstanding." but the hospital did change its admission policies to prevent a re-occurence.

"They (the parents) were told the baby could be admitted, but they didn't speak English and I think that was the cause of the whole problem." Newsom said at the

"We have instructed our hospital personnel that in cases involving children they be processed directly to the nurses station prior to any mention of any financial requirements." he said.

Dr. B.D. Murphy, who originally ordered the child admitted to the hospital, said "the baby might have died even with intensive treatment, but the family should have been ushered in quickly and admitted."

WASHINGTON (AP) - Hamburger prices will continue to go up next year. but a meat industry leader says consumers may take only so much of an increase before switching to pork and chicken for next summer's barbecues.

Even so, hamburger is expected to go up another 40 to 50 cents a pound in 1979. making it cost about as much as round steak did last winter.

Steak also will go up but not proportionally as much as hamburger. Richard E. Lyng, president of the American Meat Institute, said Wednes-

For example, he said, steak prices may rise 20 to 25 cents a pound in 1979. Depending on the kind of steak, that is

not nearly as large a percentage jump as the one in store for hamburger.

Lyng said retail hamburger prices rose about 40 cents a pound in 1978 and now are around \$1.30 a pound, on the average. Next year, those could go to \$1.70 to \$1.80 a pound.

According to Agriculture Department statistics, that would about match the average retail price of bone-in round steak last February when it was \$1.77 a

One department official, who asked not to be identified, said that Lyng's 1979 hamburger price estimate seemed to be "a very pessimistic forecast" because there is a good chance more pork and chicken will dampen the increases next

Steak prices in October, the most recent month calculated by USDA. averaged \$2.98 a pound for porterhouse, up from \$2.42 a pound for the same month in 1977. However, indications are that beef prices gained further in November and December.

Ground beef averaged \$1.18 a pound in October, according to the department, compared to 81 cents a year earlier.

Lyng and the department agree on why beef prices - particularly hamburger - are going up: There are fewer cattle on farms and ranches, reduced 21 million head from a peak of 132 million Jan. 1, 1975.

So cattle prices have risen, roughly 30 percent this year, and that makes beef cost more at retail counters.

Hamburger is going up more rapidly because it is made mostly from leaner animals which have been sent to slaughter rapidly the past few years as inventories were trimmed.

# Milwaukee CETA Works, Cuts Costs

MILWAUKEE (AP) - Operating within a federal jobs and training system plagued by thievery, patronage and waste. Milwaukee has fashioned a CETA program that works. Quietly. Without

In this work-conscious industrial center, the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act programs create thousands of jobs, teach new skills and help the unemployed find work, and perform needed community services.

There is innovation - a controversial 18-month-old "no-work, no-welfare" program that has cut local assistance costs from \$10 million a year to \$1.5 million. And there are side benefits; local companies are working with CETA to find the people they need - exactly the partnership the federal program seeks.

One example, Harnischfeger Corp., a manufacturer of heavy mining equipment. runs the largest on-the-job training program in the city. A panel of foundry managers set up another skill-training say that programs like Milwaukee's prove that federal manpower efforts can be worth the taxpayers' money.

On the Department of Labor's recommendation. The Associated Press examined the Milwaukee program to see what the county is doing right, to test Jones' opinion that, "When CETA works, it is terrific."

CETA is a relatively new program established in 1973, and its capacities were strained to the hilt by the big build-up in public jobs during the past four years. "If the system is allowed to mature. Milwaukee will be the rule. not the exception." says Jones.

Milwaukee's control of CETA money has been so tight that two local scandals, including one that resulted in a fraud conviction last month, were uncovered during the county's routine annual

Also, patronage - using government jobs to reward political allies - is not much of a factor in Milwaukee, which lacks the rich patronage tradition of. say. Chicago.

The county is "prime sponsor" bureaucratese for administrator of the \$28 million local CETA program. City and suburban governments also hire CETA workers, as do non-profit groups. Professional manpower agencies, such as one organized by the Urban League and another run by the Jewish Vocational Service, provide training and jobs with money from CETA.

County officials say CETA helped more than 20.000 persons in the past year. including 6,000 youths who landed summer jobs, 4,000 CETA public service workers, and 10,000 people enrolled in training or job counseling programs.

It is difficult to measure the success of any city's manpower effort because the programs are so varied and the yardsticks are so vague. But in Milwaukee, CETA offers a range of accomplishments:

-CETA creates jobs, thousands of

Over the past four years, CETA has created more than 10,000 jobs in Milwaukee County, with more than two-thirds going to residents of the city. An increasing percentage of the jobs is going into the inner city where black and

youth unemployment is especially high. ·Training programs provide skills for those who need them most.

Many prime sponsors, harrassed by the demands of filling so many public service positions, have allowed job training programs to suffer. In (See CETA, Page 2)

#### **Husband Acquitted** In Oregon Rape Trial

SALEM. Ore. (AP) - John and Greta Rideout's intimate lives and marital troubles were exposed in a rape trial that ended with his acquittal, a trial Rideout says they will both be "a long, long while" getting over.

But his 23-year-old wife says she does not regret bringing the charge. "I was right what I did. but whether it was worth it or not. I'm not sure." Mrs. Rideout said.

The case was believed to be the first prosecution of a husband charged with raping his wife while they lived together.

Rideout. 21, was found innocent Wednesday of raping his wife by the unanimous vote of a four-man, eight-woman jury that deliberated for three hours before returning its verdict.

He said both he and his estranged wife "have been hurt pretty deeply" by the trial. "I'm so nervous I can't say anything but that I'm happy." Rideout said. "I'm just going home and going back to work. .

"It will be a long, long while before either of us gets over it."

Asked if he felt bitter toward his wife, Rideout said, "I don't know how I feel

Mrs. Rideout, who has filed for divorce and custody of the couple's 21/2-year-old daughter, said she feels "no hostility" toward her husband. But she said: "I think men who are probably a lot worse then John will be sitting back and snickering. . . "

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Michael Morris, a Texas Tech football player who went into a coma after elective surgery earlier this month, died before midnight Wednesday.

A Methodist Hospital spokesman said an autopsy would be performed today to determine the cause of death.

Morris, a graduate of Dallas' Wilmer-Hutchins High School, had been comatose in the hospital's intensive care unit since complications developed after he underwent a thyroid operation Dec.

The Lubbock Avalanche Journal had reported Morris' heart stopped while on the operating table that day. He was revived but it stopped again while he was in the recovery unit, the newspaper said.

Morris was a sophomore split end for Tech. He played a prominent role in his team's upset of Southwest Conference champion Houston.

Bob Johnson, the hospital's night area manager, said Morris died at 10:50 p.m. Funeral arrangements were pending.

#### FAA To Tighten

#### Controls At Airports

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Federal Aviation Administration plan to tighten traffic controls around the nation's airports faces strong opposition from a powerful private pilots' group.

John L. Baker, president of the 220,000-member Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association, contended after the FAA announcement Wednesday that the new policies would restrict private pilots' freedom of access to many airports.

He said his organization "will call on the more than three-quarters of a million pilots and their families and their business associates to form a massive attack on the FAA's programs."

Baker said AOPA will take its case to Congress and the public, but did not elaborate.

There were other indications, however, that the opposition might take the form of an organized "fly-in" in which hundreds of planes would be flown to Washington.

It is expected that the private pilots will state their case during public hearings on the FAA plan to upgrade 44 airports to terminal controls areas, the agency's highest safety rating.

In announcing the plan, FAA administrator Langhorne Bond said he did not feel it would result in a dislocation

of the private general aviation sector. But he said some small user groups, such as non-licensed student pilots, might be affected at some airports during certain

#### Warranties Extended

**DETROIT (AP) - Ford Motor** Co., criticized by the Federal Trade Commission for so-called "secret warranties," now plans to notify owners of 3.5 million cars and trucks that warranties on their V-8 engines are being extended.

A Ford statement attributed C.V. Barion, general manager of the parts and service division, said the repairs were a "goodwill adjustment."

The FTC and some state consumer groups have attacked the "secret warranties" - notice to dealers to make certain repairs free after the normal warranty expires if a customer complained vigorously enough because customers, not knowing of the existence of the extension, were likely to pay for work for which they should not have been charged.

Ford earlier had told owners of 1.8 million four-and sixcylinder engines certain problems would be fixed free after the normal warranty expired. The latest fix involves 2.4

million cars and light trucks from the 1974-77 model years with 351 and 400 cubic inch engines and 1.1 million light trucks and motor homes of the 1974-76 model years with 360 and 90 cubic inch engines.

The blocks of about 2 percent of the 2.4 million engines may crack, causing loss of coolant, overheating and consequent damage, Ford said.

Damage caused by cracked blocks will be fixed free if it shows up in the first 36 months or 36,000 miles of use.

## **Organization Renews** Freedom Struggle

NEW YORK (AP) - A new transdenominational organization of U.S. Christians has been formed to fight for religious freedoms which it sees as increasingly suppressed in the world by all sorts of regimes;

left, right and in between. The trend includes subtle; but rising assaults on religious liberty in this country, leaders of the organization said, particularly in recent government regulations that seek to define

limits of "religious activities." Protestant, Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox leaders joined in launching the new unit, "Freedom of Faith: A Christian Committee for Religious Rights," specifically to

The Americans may have left the strife-torn country just in time, as rumors of anti-American sentiment have grown noticeably in past weeks, and at least one American has lost his life as a result of the strife.

'We left not because we were particularly scared, and not because we were concerned that we were in any danger, but we felt like there was a definite potential for it, and if I didn't come out with the boys and something happened to them, I couldn't live with myself," replied Mrs. Smith.

The Smith's had planned on living in Iran for three years. Before leaving, they resided in an American compound outside a small town. They felt they had a home there and an accord with the Iranian people. Yet, the Smiths did have to watch themselves carefully.

"You were just plain dumb if you went into town, and you were just plain dumb if you didn't do what you were asked to do. The whole idea while we were there from August on, was not to be conspicuous or offensive in 'any way," she emphasized.

While her husband remained in Iran, Mrs. Smith and her two sons departed from Tehran by a company-chartered Pan-Ameri-

They made stops in London and Bangor, Maine, prior to

their arrival in Dallas on Friday. As she and her sons were leaving Iran, huge anti-Shah demonstrations were growing in

consequence. "The destruction is tremendous. It's a good country, but the conditions have deteriorated

a lot," stated Mrs. Smith. She pointed an accusing finger at outside agitation in the Iranian turmoil.

'We believe the events in Iran have been instigated by the Soviet Union. The Iranians share a border of almost 2,000 miles with the Soviet Union. Russia needs Iran badly, and they need access to the Pursian Gulf, so Iran was surrounded. We believe this is not a religious war, per se. We believe that if the Shah can be strong, then this will all blow over. After all, the Shah is a Moslem himself," the local visitor opined.

Commenting on Iran, Mrs. Smith said, "It's like the forest and trees; you're too close to see it, you can only observe what you personally see with your


own eyes, and certainly the attitude of our Iranian friends never changed toward us. They were horrified at the violence and at what was happening to

their country." Her own experience and that of her family fails to confirm reports of strong anti-American feelings apparently held by the fundamentalist Moslems bent

on ousting the Shah. The schools in Iran were excellent Mrs. Smith said. The schools are American run by a company based in New Jersey in association with Grumman Aircraft.

English is the second required language taught in Iran, and the children love to practice their English on Americans, according to Mrs.

When asked by The Brand if he planned on returning to Iran, Mrs. Smith replied, "Yes, if the conditions allow us to return my sons and I will. But if not, there's always Egypt or Saudi Arabia."

Right To Die



#### Problem For Falcons Pokes A

ATLANTA (AP) - Problems. Hill and Newhouse and Dupree. Problems. Everyone has some. But on Saturday the Atlanta Falcons will be confronted with 11 - the entire Dallas Cowboys offensive team.

In pulling off Miracle 5 last Sunday in their first ever National Football League playoff, a last minute 14-13 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles, Falcons' Coach Leeman Bennett figured his club of no-names would have to stop running back Wilbert Montgomery and wide receiver Harold Carmichael.

Montgomery, who had 1,220 yards for the season, gained only 19 yards and Carmichael caught five balls for only 45 vards and with Steve Bartkowski pitching two touchdowns in the final five minutes, the Falcons advanced to Saturday's meeting with the defending Super Bowl

champion Cowboys. But the 14-point underdogs. who finished with a 9-7 regular season record, are confronted with a 12-4 club that has won

seven straight games. "Last week we had Montgomery and Carmichael. This week all we have are Dorsett and Staubach and Pearson and

and, well, this time we have 11 problems we will have to stop," said Bennett.

Roger Staubach was the National Football Conference's top passer while Tony Dorsett was No. 2 in rushing. Drew Pearson and tight end Billy Joe Dupree are rated among the top receivers in the league.

"They have everything. Obviously, they're way ahead of us when it comes to athletes,' said Bennett who took over the Falcons two years ago and turned them into a playoff team for the first time in their 13 years of existence.

"They have the experience at the key positions, tremendous speed, excellent depth. They are a great team," he said "but I still feel we're supposed to win.'

Bennett said his team doesn't have any superstars but they are the closest team he has ever been involved with.

"This is a closely knit group. It's 45 players out there all pulling for one another. There's no friction or bickering. They all seem to like each other and get

along real well." But that may not matter if the

Falcons make mistakes like they did in turning the ball over five times to the Eagles.

"We can't make that many mistakes and figure to win. Dallas does not allow you to escape your errors," said Bennett.

Defensively, the Falcons will not change what has been successful and will continue to blitz more than any other NFL

"That's our game," said Bennett. "We've won 17 games over the past two years playing our game and we're going to try and win another with it. If we can't beat Dallas with that game, then we can't win."

Bennett said running back Ray Strong, who injured a knee against the Eagles, will be the only player who will not play against the Cowboys. Strong underwent surgery Wednesday.

#### **Jefferies New** Coach At WSU

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) - Willie Jeffries, head football coach at South Carolina State for the past six years, is the new gridiron boss at Wichita State, the Wichita Eagle said in today's edition.

The newspaper, quoting sources close to the selection committee, said the 39-year-old Jeffries would be named the WSU football coach at an 11 a.m. news conference today.

The move would make Jeffries the first black football coach at the predominantly white NCAA Division I school.

Jeffries, contacted by telephone at his Orangeburg, S.C., home, declined comment.

"I am not at liberty to make any remarks at this time," he said. "I hope maybe I will be soon, and I may be in Wichita

Jeffries' South Carolina State team was 8-2-1 in all games this past season and 5-0-1 in the all-black Mideast Athletic Conference. His six-year record is 50-13-4.

### Pats Plan-Stop Pastorini

FOXBORO, Mass. (AP) - The New England Patriots' game plan has emerged for Sunday's National Football League showdown with the Houston Oilers-stop quarterback Dan Pastorini.

"The key to the game is Pastorini," said Patriots' defensive safety Tim Fox Wednesday. "The big guy has been pretty consistent all year, but Pastorini has been hot."

The "big guy" is Houston's Earl Campbell, the NFL rushing leader, who the Patriots feel will get his share of yardage in the American Conference semifinal matchup.

Patriots Coach Chuck Fairbanks, along with New England's defensive unit, calls Pastorini "the key guy" for the Oilers, who came from a 23-0 deficit in a regular season game last month for a 26-23 upset here. That began Houston's playoff charge.

"You are not going to stop Campbell," said Fairbanks. "You try to contain him. He's going to get his share. You try to prevent him from getting a home run."

The playoff game shapes up as a confrontation between running quarterback Steve Grogan and Pastorini, who was razor sharp in last weekend's victory over the Dolphins in Miami in the playoffs' first

"You can't put everything into stopping him," said New

England's defensive co-ordina-tor Hank Bullough. "but every time he gets the ball, you hold your breath."

Houston Coach Bum Phillips figures the Patriots will key on Campbell, but adds. "If you want to stop one man, you can. It depends on what you want to give up to stop him."

Fairbanks is confident, however, that the Patriots will be ready to play one of their best games.

"There's electricity around here," said the coach. "The players are loose. I feel the excitement."

Fairbanks felt excitement of another sort a week ago when he returned from a two-day suspension imposed by Patriots owner William H. Sullivan for accepting the coaching job at the University of Colorado. Fairbanks temporarily put aside his college plans to handle the NFL team in the playoffs.

Questioned about his readiness to resume control of the Patriots, Fairbanks said Wednesday that his future plans "aren't going to affect the team at all."

"I can't work harder than I am now and I'm pleased with the team," he said. "It will be a very difficult game. We haven't played as well recently as we did earlier in the year and I'm not sure whether we'll regain it."

Phillips added in a telephone interview. "If Santa Claus is coaching them, the money is on

the line now and the Patriots are going to play. Whoever wins this game is going to carn it.



# Budget Cuts May Victimize Conservation Work

WASHINGTON (AP), - Some farm groups are almost as upset over talk of sharp cuts in favorite programs administered by the Agriculture Department as they are about still-secret plans that President Carter may consider to reorganize the

The National Farmers Union, for instance, says if Carter's goal for "fiscal austerity" is achieved in his new budget "there'll be blood on the carpet" at USDA.

As the farmers union sees it, programs that are costing the food stamps and farm stabiliza-

current fiscal year "would presumably cost \$19.5 billion" next year because of inflation.

Speculating further, the farm union says in a recent newsletter that the agriculture department's share of the total reduction Carter wants would be about \$400 million for the 1979-80 fiscal year.

Thus, it said, the total reduction - allowing for inflated dollars - would be about \$1.6 billion for USDA programs.

## Soviets Buying Soybeans; Wheat Purchases Lagging

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Soviet Union is buying U.S. soybeans but still is lagging in purchasing wheat and corn for the coming year:

Orders totaling 700,000 metric tons of soybeans for delivery in the 1978-79 marketing year were reported by the Agriculture Department.

Officials said 312,000 metric tons were new sales reported by private exporting companies and 388,000 metric tons had been reported previously as a tons of coarse grains such as going to "unknown" overseas corn and 12 million metric tons of "miscellaneous" grains

Soybeans are not covered by a long-term agreeemnt, now in its third year, but requires the Soviet Union to buy a specified minimum amount of U.S. wheat and corn annually.

In the year that ended Sept. 30. Russia bought around 14.8 million metric tons of the two grains. So far in the third year it has bought 280,000 metric tons of wheat and slightly more than one million metric tons of corn.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Production of red meat was about 3.34 billion pounds last month, down 2 percent from November of last year, says the Agriculture Department.

Beef output, at 2.04 billion pounds, declined 2 percent from a year earlier, and pork output held about steady at 1.24 billion pounds, the department said.

Production of veal, lamb and mutton also was down from a year ago, officials said.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's hens continued to shell out last month, producing 5.62 billion eggs, up 1 percent from November 1977, says the Agriculture Department.



DALLAS (AP) - Let Roger Harris get his hands on your shiny, new \$15,000 autor and he'll probably take a saw to it - cut that thing right in half. Then he'll charge you a pretty good hunk of change to put it ogether again.

By that time, your shiny, new \$15,000 automobile will be a genuine limousine, complete with fur rugs, color television and anything else you feel you just can't do without.

Harris says his Phaeton Coach Corp. can stretch the length of any car and is the only company he knows of that will deliver a truly custom limo.

If car salesmen make you a little leery, Harris has some pretty good references, like the royal family over in Saudi Arabia. They've bought 18 (at last count) limos from the Dallas

specialty shop.
"We're negotiating to build a Cadillac station wagon for one of the princesses," he said. "She wants a refrigerator, bar and all kinds of toys on it." Harris said.

"They don't put liquor into the bars," Harris explains.

When you do business. whether it's in an office or a home or a car, it's customary for the Saudis to start things off with some tea or juice and some fresh fruit. And these are the things that are put into the bars

The Saudis buy Cadillacs. Ford Motor Co. products are forbidden by embargo in the country but Harris says Lincolns make the best limousines because of the way they're built.

When Harris says custommade, he really means it. In his plant sits an auto in the process of conversion, destined for a dealer who won't tell Harris who is buying it. Included in the specifications are four hidden gun compartments and a safe. The gun compartments range in size from .45 caliber pistol to automatic rifle

Manufacturers maintain warranties on the front half of the car, and Harris warrants the rear end and drive train, which must be adapted to the car's new length. The car's additional length, usually around two feet, is added in the center.

### **Automobile Association** Fights Highway Litter

HOUSTON (AP) - The sengers to wear helments. American Automobile Association says highway littler caused by uncovered trucks is costing Texas taxpayers millions of

dollars each year. A tougher state statute requiring a tarpaulin or similar cover be placed over vehicle loads that can litter is the No. 1 item among 1979 legislative objectives adopted by the state's three AAA motor clubs in Houston, Dallas, and

Other top priority items call for mandatory liability insurance for all Texas motorists, mandatory 90-day driver's license suspension for any person convicted for driving while intoxicated, and reenactment of a law requiring motorcycle operators and pas-

The legislative program was developed after a survey of AAA

members indicated 96 percent favor tarpaulin covers on truck loads, 89 percent favor the 90-day driver's license suspensions, 94 percent favor mandatory liability insurance, and 71 percent favor re-enactment of the motorcycle helmet

Because of a loophole in the current law, the AAA said, uncovered trucks with loads piled high operate routinely all over the state, "littering the highways and causing damage to other vehicles and occasional injuries to their occupants."

'Aside from the enormous highway safety problems caused by uncovered trucks, the cost of cleaning up litter which they

blem," the AAA said.

"The Department of Highways and Public Transportation spent \$2.85 million in picking up trash in the first half of the 1978 fiscal year, compared to \$3.95 million in all of the 1977 fiscal year. The cities and counties of Texas spend milions more, yet our highways are blighted with

The statute requiring motorcyclists 18 years of age and over to wear safety beimets was repealed by the state legislature in 1977

The AAA said a DPS analysis of motorcycle accidents indicates that deaths of riders without belmets rose from 12 in 1976 to 89 in 1977.

The AAA also called for a thorough review of the state's highway financing program, saying gasoline tax receipts are expected to level off and then decline as a result of smaller and more fuel-efficient cars mandated by federal law.




