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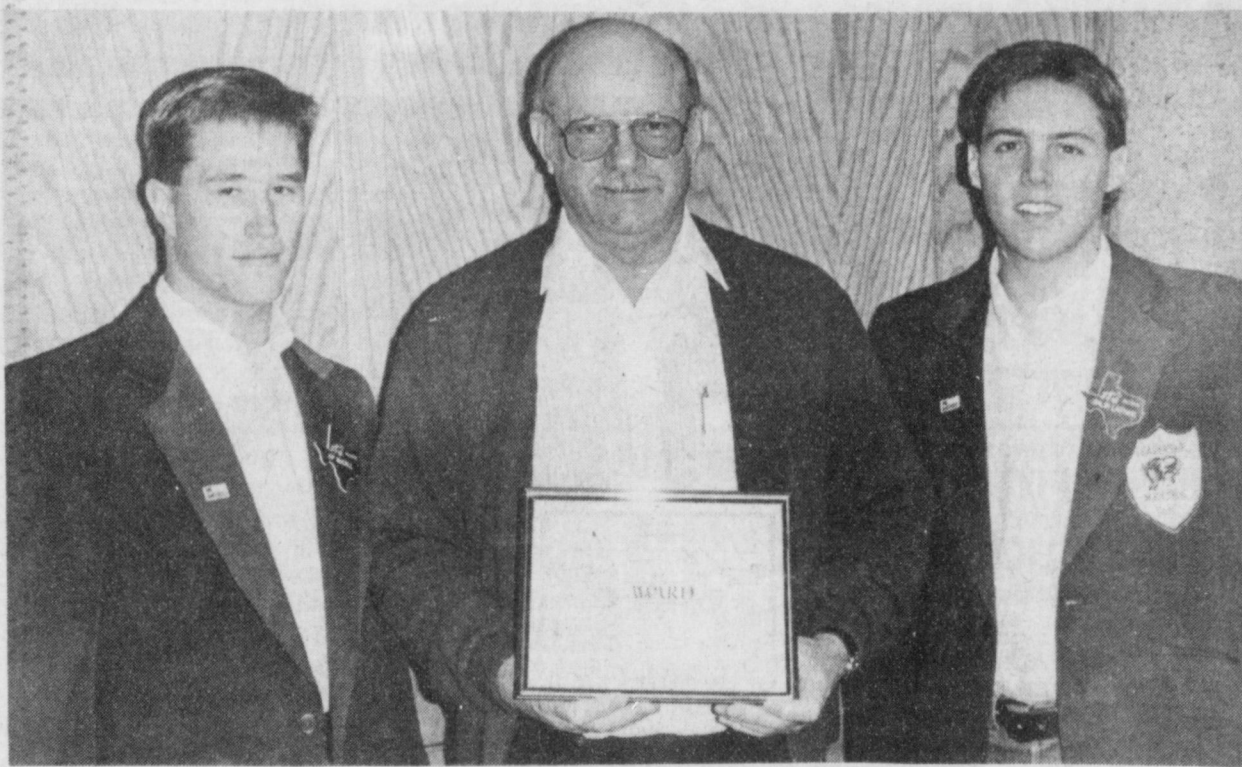

## Texas Assessment Of Academic Skills Test Scheduled

Muleshoe High School will be administering the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills Test on March 31, April 1 and 2. Students in the 11th and 12th grade needing to test or retest will be involved in this administration. The test will include reading, writing, and mathematics. Students that are absent on any test day are not allowed, because of Texas Education Agency regulations, to make-up the test.

Students, if at all possible, need to be in school on the designated testing days. Students that are well rested and eat breakfast generally achieve better test results.

Parents are encouraged to discuss the importance of these test with their students and help Muleshoe High School teachers and adminis-

## Fire Burning Forecast Predicts Bumper Crop

In these tough economic times, people in this area are looking for anything that might point to better conditions ahead. Weldon Crim has just the answer for that.

"The hard north - northeast wind is calling for a bumper crop this year," says the weather forecaster.

Using his annual Indian-style forecasting system, Crim is predicting a bumper crop for the area this year. And the local farmers should not take this news lightly considering the past history.

Crim has been conducting the "fire burnings" for ten years and the custom has been in his family since 1910. And the record book will show that the prediction is correct around eighty percent of the time.

The "burning" is done by stacking wood in a tepee-type shape, and the direction in which the wind blows the smoke predicts the weather for the coming season. The custom is always carried out at sunrise on March 22.

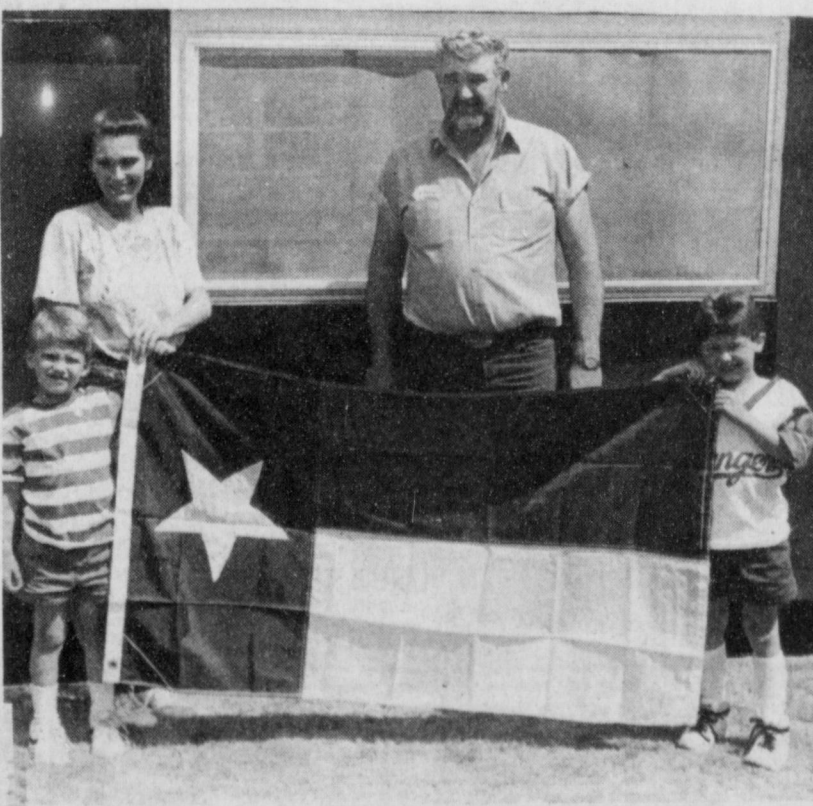
Crim is calling for good crop conditions after watching the wind blow out of the best direction possible. The bumper crop will come on the heels of a tough year last year, which Crim also correctly called as he forecasted a dry spring at last year's "Burning."

Crim's grandfather, Taylor Crim,

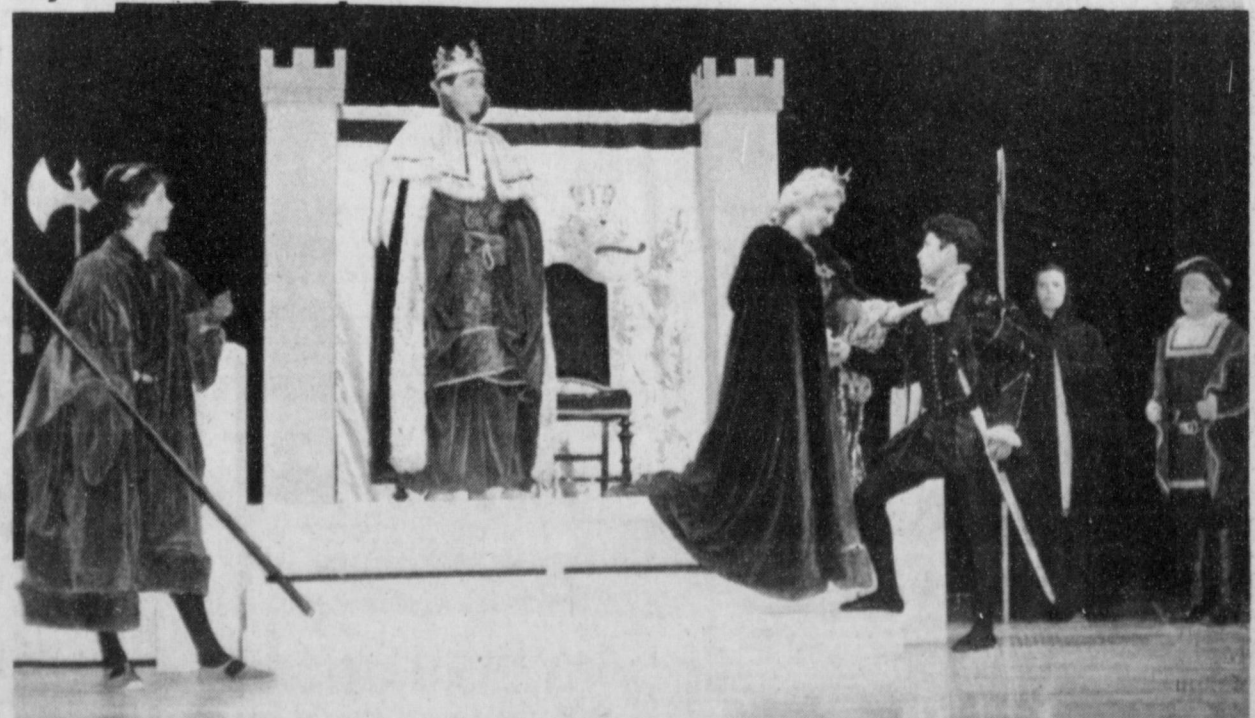
worked on the railroads near Van Horn, Texas, in his early years. He observed the Indians and their rituals during this time, and actually began the forecasting when he later went into farming.

Taylor Crim died in 1937, and

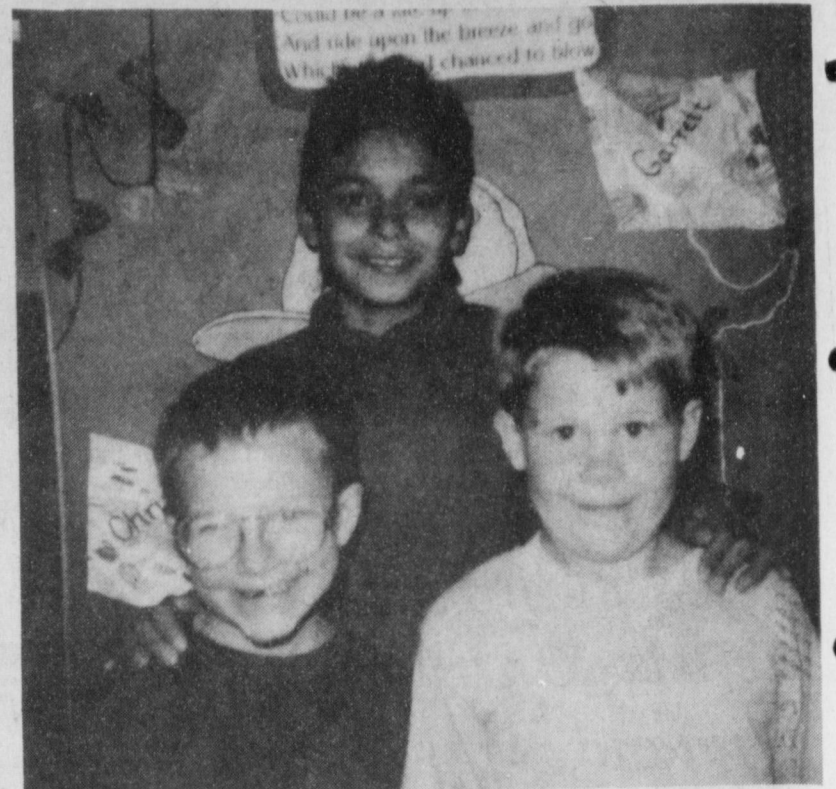

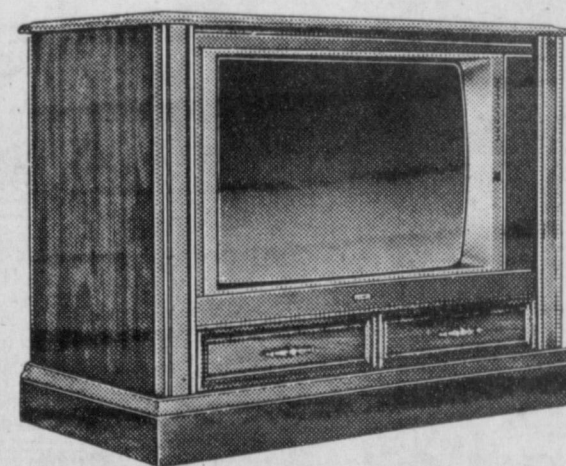

## Task Force for Managing Cotton Aphids

A task force for scientists has formulated 10 suggestions to help the state's cotton farmers combat the cotton aphid.

The aphid cost growers in West Texas alone more than \$25 million in treatment costs and yield losses exceeding 283,000 bales last year.

While the cotton aphid has been most serious in West Texas, it is a threat across the state. Because of the massive buildup of the pest in western counties last year, a Cotton Aphid Task Force was formed last September to help coordinate research and education efforts.

Scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service comprise the task force.

Although aphids have infested fields across the region for several years, infestations generally developed during August, late in the growing season. Such infestations were easily controlled with inexpensive, low rates of

many organophosphate insecticides. But by 1989, there were numerous instances of control problems with many common aphicides.

The problem reached epic proportions last year, with some 3.5 million acres treated for the pest. In spite of the costly control efforts, resistance and rapid reinfestation occurred, resulting in heavy yield losses in many fields.

The task force, using current knowledge of aphid biology and ecology, cultural management practices and insecticide resistance management, developed these 10 suggestions:

1. Adhere to preferred planting dates of April 20-May 15 in the High Plains, May 15-June 7 in the Rolling Plains, and April 25-May 15 in the Trans-Pecos.
2. Plant to insure an adequate and uniform stand.
3. Avoid excessive nitrogen by fertilizing based on a soil test.
4. Minimize the use of

insecticides early in the season.

5. Avoid using known effective aphicides against thrips and cotton fleahoppers.

6. Delay insecticidal control of aphids until infestations exceed 50 aphids per leaf.

7. Use higher labeled rates of effective insecticides for aphid control.

8. When pyrethroids are applied for bollworm control, an aphicide can be added.

9. Maximize insecticide coverage on lower plant parts.

10. Consult your local Extension Service entomologist or county agent for the latest list of effective insecticides.

Additional details on these 10 suggestions are available at local county Extension Service offices.

## Nutri/System, Inc. Wins Trial

The U.S. Court for the Eastern District of Virginia in Alexandria has found for Nutri/System on all claims in a suit filed by John Gullette incorrectly alleging that Nutri/System's weight loss program was responsible for gallbladder disease.

In his decision in favor of Nutri/System, Judge Albert V. Bryan, Jr. found that Mr. Gullette failed to show any connection between developing gallstones and participating in the Nutri/System diet plan.

The plaintiff had argued that Nutri/System had not provided a professionally-supervised weight loss program. In denying this claim, Judge Bryan noted that Mr. Gullette's medical witness, Dr. Wayne Calloway, was not qualified as an expert on gallstone problems and had limited credibility in the area because of publishing a weight loss book that competes with the Nutri/System diet program.

"It is significant that Judge Bryan discounted the testimony of Dr. Calloway, who has attempted for the past two years to discredit the Nutri/System program through irresponsible attacks. We can hope that as a result of this court decision, reporters will take a closer look at charges made by those who claim, but do not possess, expertise in this field", said Reef C. Ivey, II, Principal and General Counsel for Nutri/System, Inc.

Judge Bryan's decision is the second federal court victory by Nutri/System in suits wrongfully alleging that the company's program causes gallbladder disease. A federal judge in the Eastern District of Louisiana granted summary judgment in the only other case to go to court in a ruling last August.

"We are gratified that Nutri/System has been vindicated from false and irresponsible allegations made regarding our weight loss program. We have stated from the beginning that

being overweight, as well as other factors including heredity, sex and age, put a person at risk for gallstones. As Judge Bryan's ruling bears out, the Nutri/System program was not responsible for the plaintiff's gallstone problems", Mr. Ivey said.

Nutri/System, Inc. is headquartered in Blue Bell, PA. There are more than 17--Nutri/System Weight Loss Centers throughout North America, Australia and the United Kingdom.

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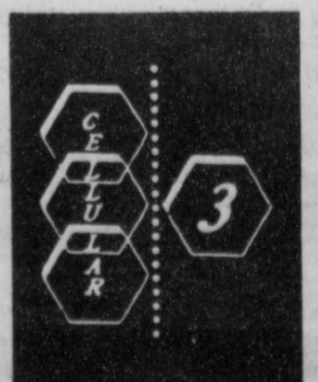

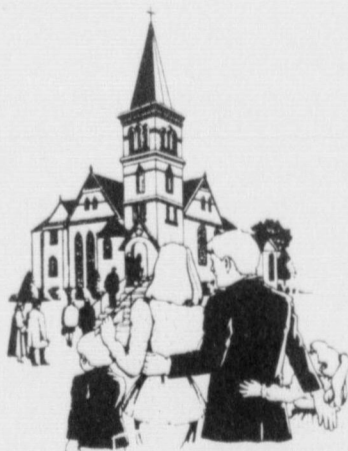
