By Scott Robinson In these tough economic times, people in this area are looking for anything that might point to better conditions ahead. Weldon Crim has just the answer for that.

'The hard north - northeast wind is calling for a bumper crop this year," says the weather forecaster.


Using his annual Indian-style forecasting system, Crim is predicting a bumper crop for the area this year. And the local farmers should not take this news lightly considering the past history.

Crim has been conducting the "fire burnings" for ten years and the custom has been in his family since 1910. And the record book will show that the prediction is correct around eighty percent of the

The "burning" is done by stacking wood in a tepee-type shape, and the direction in which the wind blows the smoke predicts the weather for the coming season. The custom is always carried out at sunrise on March 22.

Crim is calling for good crop conditions after watching the wind blow out of the best direction possible. The bumper crop will come on the heals of a tough year last year, which Crim also correctly called as he forecasted a dry spring at last year's "Burning."

Crim's grandfather, Taylor Crim,





Rev. Edwards Reflects On **England**

Richard Edwards, minister of Muleshoe's First United Methodist Church has recently returned from a trip to England. His wife JoBeth went also.

"A highlight of our trip was going to see the play "Beckett" at the Haymarket Theatre in London," notes Edwards. The theatre was built in 1700 so it was quite interesting for the Edwards to be in a place with such ancient architecture. The play "Beckett" is the story of one of the kings of England and his "sidekick" who were interested only in promoting themselves. However, after Beckett became archbishop he began to take his religious experience seriously.

"It was an entertaining play and especially interesting to those of us visiting England because of our church affiliation," says Edwards.

Another significant part of the trip for the minister was the fact that the Edwards' were afforded the opportunity of learning from 20 British Methodist ministers who serve in the London area. They discussed their experiences with the ministry in London.

"We have a need to look at what's gone on in Britain. Our history is 200 years behind that of Britain's."

The church in the U.S., especially in the rural areas, has been the center of a community's Many people in activity. Muleshoe, for example, are familiar with or tied to a church. However, in England the churches are not at the center of the community. The church is not as prominent as a social, religious worship center," notes Edwards.

"It is important for us to realize that we need to make sure that the church remains vital and occupies a significant place in the life of the people of a community.'

"Our history here in the U.S. is such a small speck in the history of the the world," he said.

The Edwards travelled to London's West End where they visited Trafalgar Square and Nelson's Column. They saw Big Ben and the Houses of Parliament, visited Westminister Abbey, burial place of England's most famous men and women. Buckingham Palace and London's Royal Parks was part of the tour.

City Road Chapel and the Museum, John Wesley's House, St. Paul Cathedral, Wesley's conversion Place Memorial and Susanna Wesley's grave in Bunhill Fields were all on the itinerary.

The Edwards travelled to Bath by way of Coventry where they saw the old cathedral which was bombed during the war and the new cathedral which is built alongside

They toured Bristol where the first outdoor Methodist preaching took place. Stonehenge was another

The Edwards and their tour group visited Salisbury Cathedral with its elegant 404 foot spire. There they saw beautiful and ornate tombs and very extensive library of old manuscripts.

After visiting several sites in the history of John Wesley's life the group went to Oxford before returning to London and their return to the U.S.

Protect your rights! "Render" your property by March 31st.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income--such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are: You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher. It must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1991. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1992.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing or postmarking 1992 renditions is Tuesday, March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing by the March 31 deadline.





Task Force for Managing Cotton Aphids

A task force for scientists has formulated 10 suggestions to help the state's cotton farmers combat the cotton aphid.

The aphid cost growers in West Texas alone more than \$25 million in treatment costs and yield losses exceeding 283,000 bales last year.

While the cotton aphid has been most serious in West Texas, it is a threat across the state. Because of the massive buildup of the pest in western counties last year, a Cotton Aphid Task Force was formed last September to help coordinate research and education efforts.

Scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension

Service comprise the task force. Although aphids have infested fields across the region for several years, infestations generally developed during August, late in the growing season. infestations were easily controlled with inexpensive, low rates of

many organophosphate insecticides. But by 1989, there were numerous instances of control problems with many common aphicides.

The problem reached epic proportions last year, with some 3.5 million acres treated for the pest. In spite of the costly control efforts, resistance and rapid reinfestation occurred, resulting in heavy yield losses in many fields.

The task force, using current knowledge of aphid biology and ecology, cultural management practices and insecticide resistance management, developed these 10 suggestions:

1. Adhere to preferred planting dates of April 20-May 15 in the High Plains, Mary 15-June 7 in the Rolling Plains, and April 25-May

The U.S. Court for the Eastern District of Virginia in Alexandria has found for Nutri/System on all claims in a suit filed by John Gullette incorrectly alleging that Nutri/System's weight loss program was responsible for gallbladder disease.

Ivey, II, Principal and General Counsel for Nutri/System, Inc.

Judge Bryan's decision is the second federal court victory by Nutri/System in suits wrongfully alleging that the company's program causes gallbladder disease. A federal judge in the Eastern District of Louisiana granted summary judgment in the only other case to go to court in a ruling last August.

'We are gratified that Nutri/System has been vindicated from false and irresponsible allegations made regarding our weight loss program. We have stated from the beginning that

being overweight, as well as other factors including heredity, sex and age, put a person at risk for gallstones. As Judge Bryan's ruling bears out, the Nutri/System program was not responsible for the plaintiff's gallstone problems", Mr. Ivey said.





News From Bob Bullock

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock, Speaker Gib Lewis and members of the state's budget writing committee today alerted state agencies to stay within existing revenues when preparing budgets for the 1994-95 budget period.

The warning came in a letter signed by Bullock, Lewis and members of the Legislative Budget Board and distributed to state agency heads and their oversight

"Usually lawmakers get an agency's wish list at budget time," Bullock said. "This time we must have their can't-do-without-list.

"And agencies shouldn't just be making plans for September 1, 1993. To prepare for tomorrow, agencies start implementing costsaving measures today," Bullock added.

"Writing a budget that stays within our current income will require some tough decisions and the sooner we begin planning the better prepared we will be to make those decisions," Lewis said. Every agency in state government needs to understand from the start where we are headed and what our goal is."

In the letter, the state officials predict "revenues for the 1994-95 budget period will be insufficient to fund the expected demand for state

They go on to say agencies must make their operations more efficient, but caution that efficiency alone probably won't be enough. The letter says, agencies should be prepared to "identify programs...

which can be cut back or eliminated to live within the revenue constraints."

Bullock, who has said he will fight any attempts to raise taxes, said the letter should serve as an early warning to agencies, allowing them time to plan reductions and out backs.

'We simply can't afford to start the 1993 regular legislative session with state agencies asking for billions of dollars in new state money as they did in 1991, Büllöck added.
