Taxpayer's Do's, Don'ts

Some payments received by a taxpayer on account of illness or personal injury are not taxable income for Federal tax purposes, Arthur E. Fogle, Jr., Administrative Officer of Internal Revenue for the Abilene office, said today.

The law allows (subject to certain limitations) a taxpayer to exclude from income amounts received under a wage continuation plan financed by his employer, when he is absent from his job due to injury or sickness. In this case the taxpayer must attach a statement to his return showing computation of the amount excluded, the dates of absence, and whether or not he was hos-

Other types of payments that are not taxable are those made:

1. For damages under a duit or in settlement of a claim under Workman's Compensation Acts, and under an accident or health insurance policy on which the taxpayer pays the premiums.

2. On account of a taxpay er's contribution to an accident or health plan jointly financed by him and his employer.

3. Under an employer-financed plan covering sickness or injury to the taxpayer or his dependents, if received as reimbursement for medical care, or as compensation for day. the permanent loss or loss of use of a member or function of the body, or for permanent disfigurement.

4. As pension, annuities, or similar allowance to an individual for injury or sickness resulting from active service in the armed forces of any country, or in the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, or in the U.S. Public beneficiaries by reason of

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

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Farm Bureau Federation to buy out one of the nation's major corporative food chains is a most provocative topic.

It is reported that the farmers, disenchanted with the re-sults of the long years of gov-

ernmen farm programs, fee that by own ing a major food outlet, they can se cure for the farmer a larger share of the con-sumer dollar

being spent C. W. Harder for food.

This, of course, is a laudable ambition. The question is whether or not this is logical. After all, the nation's biggest chain, doing some \$5 billion per

year in sales, only ends up with a profit of about 1%. It is difficult to see how an additional \$50 million spread around among the nation's farmers would substantially benefit them, even if the change of ownership resulted in no loss of volume, or profit margin.

* * *

But it is perhaps well farmers are studying the wide disparity between what they re-ceive for their products, and what the public pays for them.

* * *

A deep study of the situa-tion could well lead them to the conclusion that they have sold their birthright for a mess of pottage. In other words, they have been kept pacified up to now by subsidies, while organ-

The drive launched by the ized labor has been permitted to create artificial costs in food distribution and marketing.

> Bread and milk are just a few of the items they could well study, learning how the cost of moving the product from the processing plant to the retail outlet is often the biggest item of cost.

They could also well study the affect of many of the labor contracts such as those pro-viding for birthdays off with full pay, for clauses requiring employers to pay for free psychiatric care as well as the added costs to the consumer created by many other so-called fringe benefits.

They could also well study just who absorbs the costs involved in giving special "un-der-the-counter deals" to some

But above all, they could well study the great impact on food marketing that has been at-tained by the virtual labor monopoly in many areas, and they would then understand why there is so great a difference between what they get and the consumer pays.

In fact, if they dig deep enough into the situation, it is not inconceivable that sometime in the distant future, somewhere in America, there would stand a monument in front of some grocery store.

And inscribed in the granite would be;

"'Twas here the embattled farmers stood When they routed the last Hoffa hood."
