The Powell Feed Yard is owned and operated by Bass Powell, who lives in Haskell. He has been feeding cattle since 1951 in western Kansas and Texas. He came to this area from Houston, where he had been manager for 21/2 years, of United Feed Lots,

owned by United Industries. The feed lot was started in 1963 and about 1500 head of cattle have been on feed the past summer. Construction is being completed on feeding pens that will give the feed yard capacity for about 3,000 head of cattle. The feed yard will be operating at full ca-
