





to boost passenger fares. Hanlon said Santa Fe was Mother Dies In Ark. one of the railroads that remained within the Texas statutory passenger fare limits of 3c per mile when other roads were permitted to increase

rates to 3.183c per mile. "Actually the Santa Fe Railway, instead of raising fares at this time, has instituted a bargain traffic fare reiuction for both first class and coaches which started January 10, and will be continued through April 30, of this year," he declared.

This reduction, he said, provides a fare cost of 140 percent of a one-way ticket for a round trip fare between two points on the Santa Fe with a limit of 30 days.
