nation's youngsters, the official closing of summer will be signaled by the ringing of the first school bell.

In days past, that bell often rang in the typical one room schoolhouse calling youngsters from the dusty lanes, the fields, the swimming holes where they worked and played, learned and grew during the days of sum-

Answering its call, they came to resume, often with consid-

erable reluctance, the regimentation of school hours and the traditional pursuit of at least a passing proficiency in the 3 R's. For most people, an education was something you got through "when you were a kid" so that you could get on about the business of making your way in the world.

The school bells of today carry a far different message and challenge to the nation's present generation of young people. The store of man's knowledge is increasing sorapidly that no one can estimate what it may hold 10 or 20 years from now. ## **PUBLIC NOTICE** Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so

as to read as follows:
"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legisla-ture under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public

schools colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for re-

maid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

SENATE JOINT RESOLU-TION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution such retirement fund shall not not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any en-

abling legislation passed pursuant thereto." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed there-

on the following words: "FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the Vasis of full salary of menuoers of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST to amendment to Section 48s of Article III allowing cont butions to be made on the basis of full salary of m mbers of the Teacher Retivement System

of Texas." Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

(Course must begin in time to finish it in 8 years); 9 years to complete Vocational Rehabilitation, (9 years from discharge except certain cases of serious disability or delay in establishing eligibility); 10 years to obtain GI loan, (plus 1 year for each 90 days active duty); all can be seen about at any VA

Office. Other benefits which have no time limit on them and can be seen about at any VA Office are, to file compensation claim for injury or disease; To file pension claim, non-serviceconnected; to obtain VA hospital care; to convert Term Insurance. Also there is no limit on obtaining assistance in finding employment or job training program. This information is obtained at the Local

Office or State Employment Service. There are many rights that the veteran can obtain through the Veteran Administration. Any Veteran wishing information should contact their local

"FOR the amendment of Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the con-struction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, grav eled or paved roads and turn-pikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of fur-ther or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds hereto-

included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the quali-fied electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall
