We have allowed the laws of this country to become such a maze that a person can literally get away with murder. We guard the freedom to rebel and overlook the freedom of quiet perserverance. Speech is no longer free when our leaders must speak behind armed must speak behind armed

When there are two parents in each home, when the parents love their children more than themselves, when the children are made to respect their parents, when the children are expected to prove their abilities, when laws are changed to protect the guileless instead of the crafty, when the Supreme Court is un-hypnotized, when the American people get off their flabby, apathetic carcasses and shout "No more" THEN will we begin to see the America where freedom walks in the dark un-

PUBLISHER'S NOTE: I agree that we people who live in these United States should concentrate on being more like our forefathers who fought proudly for their rights and be proud enough to fight literally if necessary to protect what we have materially. And revive our spiritual attitudes to be "doers of the Word and not hearers" only.

Mr. Cappleman said that the Farmers Home Administration will loan about \$1.3 billion during the coming year to create jobs in rural America, improve rural housing, strengthen family farms, develop needed rural community facilities.

"The main drive in all Farmers Home Administration programs is to stengthen the economy of rural America, to make it a place that will attract rather than repel people," Mr.

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




