



The grades of the cotton classed last week declined somewhat. According to A. D. Peebles of the USDA Cotton Classing Office; the spotted grades increased from 12 to 22 percent, and the cotton reduced in grade because of bark increased from 4 to 9 percent.

A complete grade breakdown on the 6,597 samples classed last week at the Agricultural Marketing Service, Cotton Division in Munday shows: Two percent Middling, 9 percent Strict Low Middling and 2 percent Low Middling. The Light Spotted grades accounted for 63 percent of the classing, and there were 28 percent Middling Light Spotted, 29 percent Strict Low Middling Light Spotted and 6 percent Low Middling Light Spotted. The Spotted grades made up 22 percent of the classing and included 1 percent Strict

Middling Spotted, 11 percent higher. Strict Low Middling Spotted and 2 percent Low Middling Spotted.







Funeral for Cecil T. Hutchinson, 56, of Jayton, former Haskell resident killed in a head-on auto collision near Aspermont, Friday night, was held at the Haskell Church of Christ at 2 p.m. Monday, Dec.

Officiating was David Brock, minister of the Jayton Church of Christ, assisted by T. J. Finley, minister of the Church of Christ, Weinert. Burial was in Willow Cemetery, under direction of Holden Funeral Home.

Mr. Hutchinson, a retired farmer, moved to Jayton from Haskell in 1960, when his wife became a teacher there. He had lived and farmed in Haskell and Knox Counties most of his life, prior to that time.

Born July 17, 1908, at Richmond, Ky., he moved to Haskell County at the age of seven, with his parents, settling south of Knox City.

He married Grace Hutchens, Oct. 3, 1934 in Munday. He was a longtime member of the Church of Christ.



When building a new farm structure or a home, it is relatively easy to build in good wiring. However, to improve wiring later is expensive, reports F. W. Martin, County Agricultural Agent.

Here are some steps toward good wiring that can be ta-

1. Evaluate the present electric power needs. A good electrical contractor or power supplier representative can help with the planning.

2. Wattage requirements for lighting, built-in equipment and portable appliances should be figured. Have the electrical contractor arrange reasonable loads for each circuit so that there will be ample spare capacity.

3. Keep the use of extension cords to a minimum by having outlets where needed. Extencion cords do not increase power capacity but can cut down considerably on power delivered if the size of wire is too small for the electrical load or for the length of the

4. Frequent blackouts caused by blown fuses or tripped circuit breakers are warnings that wiring is inadequate. Heed these warnings because they forecast trouble. Prevent such trouble in now or remodeled wiring by following good wiring practices.





It is only a bundle of papers, as John and Mary discovered, which summarizes the state of the title. Its possession does not in any way assure good title.

Thus while one may be able to get possession and peacefully occupy a property with unsalable title, difficulties will arise when the property is to be sold or mortaged. To do so is only to postpone and perhaps increase the trouble and expense of clearing the title. It makes good sense to correct any title defects of clearing when you buy property.

It seems that research has i come up with a tool in coyote control which comes near to pleasing everyone. Groups of people who objected to other that they were cruel or caused suffering to the animal can find no objection to the reproduction inhibitor which causes no pain, no suffering - no change at all - except no pups are born that spring.

Those who feared coyote control programs because of alleged harmful effects on other species can now rest easier. The breeding season of coyotes coincides with the breeding season of very few other mammals. Hence, only the coyote is affected.

Dog lovers who objected to poisons, traps, and cyanide getters because they feared for Old Rover's safety, can relax when the method of control is the reproduction inhibitor. If a dog takes one of the stilbestrol baits, the only result is that it cannot be bred that particular season.

As coyotes come into season only once a year — and If initial results of 1963 are dogs more often - there can be no loss to the dog lover.
