Soil Conservat'n

Winter rain have brought much needed moisture to the county but soil blowing may be expected this spring where crops failed last year or where fields are without sufficient protection from crop stubble and trash, warns E. R. Steen, Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

Past experience shows that to stop soil blowing is before it starts or as soon thereafter as possible rather than waiting until a large area has been damaged he points out.

"Emergency or timely tillage is perhaps the only practical control measure against soil blowing that can be used at this season of the year," Steen says. "The purpose of such tillage operations is to check soil blowing after all other methods have failed."

"Listing or other types of tillage to stop soil blowing always should be done when the soil is moist," he coutinued. "When the soil is moist and deep plowing is practiced clods can be brought to the surface which will not determined very rapidly under severe blowing conditions and hence will aid greatly in stopping wind erosion." The Conservationist advises that where possible tillage opeations should be done on the contour. Not only is the soil blowing hecked, but the land also is placed in a condition to catch and hold moisture from spring rains which otherwise might be lost from runoff. He recommends the lister or other tillage implements which will go deep into the ground and bring clods to the sur-

Tall stubbles that are thick and bristle like, as the stubbles left when milo, hegari, or kafir are harvest with a combine, is proving to be a real aid in preventing soil blowing.
