

Inflation? A depressed economy? Low prices for local and area grown commodities? Well, all of this may be true, but according to figures for the third quarter of 1988 from area bank statements show the banks are staying strong, steady, and gaining still on deposits and loans.

For the most recent reporting data from the third quarter, ending September 30, 1988, deposits at local and area banks totaled \$232,395,535.

When compared with September 30, 1987 figures of \$219,334,-081, it shows a gain in deposits in the last year of \$13,061,454.

For the same period of time, during the past year, the local and area banks saw an increase in loans of \$6,363,930. Loans at the banks were \$108,702,165 ending September last year, and for the same time this year, were \$115,066,095.

At the same time, their loans increased by \$6,413,000. Loans were \$15,716,000 closing out September last year, and on the same date this year were \$22,129,000.

# **Retired Teacher Remembers A Full, Active Life**

(Editor's note: It's time for another In Profile, and we are sure you will enjoy just a little of the story of this remarkable woman, who, although not a local person, has been well known in Muleshoe for many years. Come along and meet Mariet Lamb, and enjoy a few of her adventures.)

Mariet Lamb, who was born in the year before the 'turn of the century,' in Hazel, Kentucky, is modest, retiring and every inch the 'lady.' For many years, she has made her home in Los Angeles, California, and the 89 year old sister of Gil Lamb, had many adventures while teaching school and all during her lifetime.

Her one concession to age is not coming to Muleshoe during the wintertime, preferring to stay in the warmer climate of Los Angeles, where she now makes her home in a retirement village -- and to take up pact of her time, "takes care of some of her older friends," both of whom are 91 years of age.

Miss Lamb drove her own vehicle until October, 1987, when she voluntarily stopped driving, although her driver's license doesn't expire until 1990. "I stopped driving on October 1 last year," she said, "I won't ever forget it because it was the day called 'Earthquake Day' in Los Angeles."

Now, she gets around on the bus, by taxi, and by air. An accomplished world traveler, she still travels to Muleshoe, although she hasn't traveled overseas for the past few years.

To celebrate her 80th birthday, she flew to London, to meet with friends she had made while living in London for three months in the 1960's after retiring from teaching. From there they flew to the Greek Islands to celebrate her birthday.

She has also traveled all over Europe and in the Orient.

Although Miss Lamb started out in Kentucky, when she was around 10 years old, she and her family traveled, by train, to New Mexico, as her mother had health problems.

After spending the first year in Alamogordo, the family moved to Roswell, where she graduated from Roswell High School.

It took more than one attempt for Mariet Lamb to complete her college education. Periodically, she would take off for a year to help when her mother was very ill.

She became a teacher at an elementary school in the country before she completed her college work. After teaching English there for a year, she moved to California.

But, one of the great adventures of her life was becoming the teacher in the small school in New Mexico.

"My very first teaching job was in 1920, after I got a letter from a friend in Lovington, N.M. telling me they needed a teacher at a little school," she remem- the seat and she was seated on bered.



### **Teens Eat Poorly, Most Know Better**

Most teenagers know what consitiutes a healthy diet, but still tend to make food choices that may lead to a lifetime of poor eating habits.

According to a recent Gallup poll of 375 12-17-year-olds, 87 percent of teens surveyed said they put "a lot" or "some" effort into a healthy diet.

However, the teenagers listed potato chips, corn chips, cookies, candies and ice cream among their top snack food choices. Hamburgers, cheeseburgers, pizza and luncheon meats ranked among their top lunch choices.

About 63 percent of the teenagers said they learned about cholesterol in school, but less than a third were able to identify cholesterol-rich foods, such as butter and eggs.

"Skipping meals, snach

nutritional status of teenagers as a group is good, except for a few problem nutrients. For example, adolescents have higher requirements from iron and calcium, but many teens, especially girls, don't get enough.

"Teenage girls tend to drink soft drinks instead of milk which may contribute to low calcium status. Yet they need the calcium to build bone mass which will help prevent osteoporosis late in day." life," she said.







At the postmistress's house, they asked where the school teacher was supposed to stay. She was told with Mr. I. A. Willis. She said the men told her he was 'cranky, and complained all the time. He was 75, and his wife, 65. They told her he was 'awful' to get along with.

"I was just 20 years old, and didn't know what to expect," she said.


"Mr. and Mrs. Willis were just darling to me," she said. For lunch each day, Mrs. Willis prepared ham and biscuit for her to take to school. They only bought ham and salt pork for meat, and did not eat the ham, saying, "the ham's for the teacher."

Miss Lamb said that each Saturday, Mrs. Willis would cook a huge pot of 'frijole beans' which would be warmed over every day until the next Saturday, when she would start over and cook another pot of fnjole beans.

The retired teacher said all of her clothes were ordered from Montgomery Ward.

The new teacher had 14 students, with many of the boys the school room until midnight,

After consultation with the superintendent, the local school board, and parent meetings, the students came back to school.

At the end of the school year, the students all had to pass a state exam. Miss Lamb said she drilled and drilled the students, and they all passed. As the school year was concluding, the school had a party, including a program, and all families came. They had sandwiches, other food and coffee. A dance was held in around her own age, and with all of two musical instru-

ments for the dance. They told her, "Nothing is too

good for Miss Lamb." Although she could have stayed, she elected to move on to California.

After Mariet Lamb attended the University of New Mexico for two semesters, her mother died of her lingering illness, and Miss Lamb enrolled at the University of Wisconsin. In Wisconsin, she stayed in a house with several other students.

One of the students from the house went on a date with a man who called her and told her he remembered her from Chicago, her home town.

Miss Lamb, who answered the telephone, told the man she was not in school anymore, and asked for his name. She recognized his name as that of the rapist. He then asked for a date with her.

Miss Lamb agreed and accepted a date. After that, she

A former student, who worked as a reporter for the Los Angeles Times, was doing a review of the movie, "Up The Down Staircase" and compared the movie to the "best teacher he ever had, Mariet Lamb.'

To this day, Miss Lamb and the student are very good friends.

As a resident of Kingsley Manor Retirement Home in Los Angeles, Miss Lamb was delighted to find among the more than 200 residents, a former neighbor from Roswell, N.M.

"I check on Prue several times a day," she said, "and help give her medicine, check her windows, make sure she is comfortable, and get her ready to see her family.

"I also have another elderly friend. She's 91 and lives in an Alhambra Convalescent Home. She doesn't have any family left, so I take the bus to help take care of her," added the retired teacher.

Until a year ago, Miss Lamb drove the freeways to Alhambra to check on her friend, but now, takes the bus, and has to change, before she gets to the convalescent home.

She attributes a lot of her agility to walking a lot, at least a mile or two a day. "I am very fortunate," she added, "that I can walk unaided, so many can't anymore."

Although she has had a heart attack, has conquered cancer and phlebitis, she still counts herself as a very fortunate person.

"As you get older, your memory fails, and you aren't as sharp as when you were younger," she added. "One of the worst things that can happen is to reach for a word you know well, and can't remember what it is.' As a deaconess in the Christian





Producers must use only those veterinary drugs, chemicals or feed additives approved by the Food and Drug Administration, Tanksley said. The substances must be used at the approved dosage rate, and for the specific purpose or treatment of conditions issued on the label.

The use of any drug or chemical within the established withdrawal time prior to marketing is illegal, he said.

"Extra-label usage must be in accordance with a veterinarian/ client/patient relationship; a careful medical diagnosis; and a determination by the attending veterinarian that available labelled products have been found clinically ineffective," Tanksley added.

There must be assurances that treated animals have been adequately identified and that extended withdrawal periods have been established before marketing," he said.

Tanksley concluded that the Food and Drug Administration and the Food Safety and Inspection Service of the USDA have the authority to enforce regulatory laws concerning drug and chemical use on animals.
