## Teens Eat Poorly, Most Know Better

 eating habits.consitiutes a healthy diet, but
still tend to still tend to make food choices According to a recent Gallup poll of 375 12-17-year-olds, 87 percent of teens surveyed said they put "a lot" or "some effort into a healthy diet.
However, the teenagers listed potato chips, corn chips, cookies, cataties and ice cream among their top snack food choices. Hamburgers, cheeseburgers, pizza and luncteon meats ranked among their top lunch choices. About 63 percent of the
teenagers said they learned teenagers said they learned
about cholesterol in school, but less than a third were able to identify cholesterol-rich foods, such as butter and eggs. "Skipping meals, snacking, eating away from home, eating are common going on fad diet patterns," said Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, a nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural
Extension Service at Texas A\&M Extension Service at Texas A\&M University.
In spite of their eating
$\qquad$ nutritional status of teenagers as a group is good, except for a few
problem nutrients. For example problem nutrients. For example, quirements from iron and calcium, but many teens, especially girls, don't get enough. Likewise, failing agricultural policies during the past eight years have resulted in hundreds of thousands of farm failures,
taking with them hundreds thousands of service and supply comparies and the productive, tax-paying related jobs no longer needed by this giant industry. It is easy to see that the huge budget deficits of the past few years and the increasing problem of balancing the budget is a
direct result of the loss of tax-paying jobs in the energy and agricultural sectors.
Certainly we have waste,
excess spending, graft and excess spending, graft and corruption in our federal government and we must demand
honesty and efficiency .- but we honesty and efficiency -- but we
must also demand that these failing economic policies be reversed. We must implement trade and tax policies which will encourage industry to move back
to the U.S. from foreign to the U.S. from foreign
countries; implement a tariff on countries; implement a tariff on imported oil which will remove
the O.P.E.C. stranglehold on our domestic oil industry; and implement agricultural policies which will balance supply with demand and return a profit to our nation's farmers at the marketplace.

Such changes in policies will re-create miilions of tax-paying
jobs for American workers, jobs for American workers, re-
lieve some of the tax-burden on those who have been forced to carry more than their fair share of the tax load, and have ample funds to balance the budget. Again I say, we don't need
more taxes ... we need more more taxe
taxpayers.
