Sublett said in 1972, "I know the jail is old, hot in the summer and cold in the winter, but members of my staff, including Cheif Deputy J.D. Clements, office deputy Ott Irvin and jailer Bobby Todd, will continue to try and treat the prisoners as human beings.'

For example, in July 1972, Sublett and his wife, Ann, took over the chores of keeping the jail for awhile. A note they received from one of the inmates read: "We want to thank you and Mrs. Sublett for the extra trouble you go to in preparing our meals...Please give your wife our compliments on the supper tonight...Thanks, The Prisoners."

After marrying Ann Edwards on Thanksgiving Day 1932 in Cisco, Sublett began 16 years of work for

#### **CONSERVING WATER AT** HOME

**COLLEGE STATION--**Water conservation begins at home, says Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Water becomes a precious commodity when it is scarce.

However, when water supplies are abundant, less thought is given to water-use habits, the specialist points out.

The American Water Works Association estimates over-all residential water use at 60 gallons per person per day, so even a 10 percent per capita reduction would result in daily savings of a billion gallons.

A water-use studyconservation project revealed that water use was significantly reduced by 25.6 percent in households sampled, Mrs. Granovsky reports.

The reduction was attributed to the installation of toilet tank mechanisms designed to conserve water and to simple water-use changes adopted by households.

Eighty percent of the households reported making changes in their water-use habits. They mentioned the following changes:

-reduced amount of running water in sinks

-reduced lawn and garden watering

-used dishwasher only when full

-washed only full loads in clothes washer

-took shorter showers -repaired leaks and drips -flushed toilets less often

-turned off faucet when brushing teeth

--used less water in bathtub





Law Changes Right of Way

# **On Ramps And Frontage Roads**

need to know about an important new law which will seriously affect how they drive on freeway frontage roads.

The change is so important that ignoring it could literally become a matter of life or death.

The law, passed in the recent session of the Texas Legislature, gives traffic entering or leaving freeway ramps the right of way over frontage road traffic.

It was signed by the governor on June 11, and becomes effective August 27

It reads in part:

"The driver of a vehicle proceeding on an access or feeder road of a controlled access highway shall yield the right of way to a vehicle entering or about to enter or leaving or about to leave the road to enter the highway

Many ramps on Texas highways already are arranged that way, and YIELD and other signs are in place on the frontage roads for this kind of operation.

Other places where ramps and frontage roads meet, however, are not. There, the signs presently are arranged to require the ramp traffic to yield.

The situation is especially critical where the frontage road carries traffic in both directions. Ramp traffic both entering and leaving the freeway crosses opposing streams of traffic on the frontage road.
