The period during which you may qualify as a voter in Texas during 1968 is dwindling. It will end on January 31 and if you have not filled out the required application or your certificate and filed with the County tax assesfor-collector either at the county office or at a subtation by that time, you will bt be eligible to vote in the important elections that will be held this year including not only local, district and state elections, but an election to chose a president of the United States.

There will be little excuse for not registering except that a person simply may not wish to. The election efficials have made it as convenient as it is possible to do. Blanks for applications have been left at chambers of commerce, banks, newspaper offices and other places much frequented, and appeals and detailed jinstructions have been and continue to be pub-

For the further convenience of the public, registration deputies have been appointed in outlying communities. A. D. Jenkins, chamber of commerce manager has been named special deputy for the registration of voters in the Rising Star area. You may secure your certificate at his cice if you do not wish to go to Eastland or to mail it. But whether you register at a substation or at the county seat of your county, the important thing is to register. Of course you must register in the county in which you live and vote. If you live at May you must register in Brown county. Similarly if you live in Comanche county you must register in that county even though you may get your mail on a route out of the Rising Star post office.

Registration will not cost you a cent-just the trouble of making the application. That should be a pretty good bargain.

Of all the conditions of existence to which a human being can be condemned, none, I am tempted to say, is worse than loneliness. I used to think, reading Robinson Crusoe when I was a kid, that it would be a wonderful experience to have an island all to myself. That was only revolt against parental discipline and the competing demands of several brothers and sisters.

The tragedy of loneliness was very sharply set out for me in an experience with which I became acquainted during the Great Depression. man whose name I do not now recall had wandered down from some northern state—I believe it was Ohio and took work with the WPA in my town. He was a good worker and he soon rose to a foremanship.

But after a time he became sick, and and at length he was placed in the county Hospital at Ranger where he lay until he died. No one called on him, except a Methodist minister who discovered him alone and dying and tried to bring some solace and comradeship into barren life. No friends sent lowers, there were no cards or letters to cheer his doomed and lonely hours. Members of tis family sought out back in his nome state showed not the slightest concern. hey left his body to the county for burial. He was not an immoral man, he was not a

- Slice bread lengthwise into 3

layers. Spread with butter. Mix cream cheese and olives; spread on first layer. Mix ham, cucumber, salt and mayonnaise; spread on second layer. Put three layers together and wrap loaf in plastic wrap. Chill. Just before serving, cut diagonally into 1-inch slices. 6 servings.



Early Detection Will Help Defeat Cancer

cancer is a serious health problem, one of the major killers. But how many of us really know what

cancer is? A pamphlet of the American Medical Association explains that during the process of cell division -the basis of normal body growth and repair-cells become differentiated into the specific kinds needed for each organ or body

function. Each kind of cell divides into its own kind, equipped to do the job it was designed to do. Under certain conditions not yet completely understood, some cells do not differentiate in this way. They multiply in irregular and disorderly fashion and compete with normal cells for nutrition and space. These cell masses are called tumors.

Tumors that remain localized are benign tumors and may not be troublesome unless they mechanically interfere with some body function. Tumors that grow rapidly and destroy tissue are known as malignant tumors. These are called cancers.

Cancers may affect any part of the human body. They also attack animals and even plants.

In man (and most animals) the All of us are well aware that unrestrained growth of cancer cells will infiltrate vital organs and destroy them if not checked.



Cancers spread by infiltrating adjacent tissue, by traveling through the circulatory system and lymphatic system, or by any combination of these.

The cause of cancer in man is not known. If treated promptly and properly, some cancers are highly curable. One-third of all cancers in the United States are being cured today. Cancers are most readily curable before they have spread from their original locations. To be cured, they must be found early.

More than 300,000 persons will die of cancer in this country this year. About one-third of these might have been saved through earlier detection and treatment.



Soil Survey of Eastland County Long Term Job

EASTLAND - On schedule ing in a prototions, irrigation and about a fourth complete is recomn and allowing, rangeland, pas-made of Eastland County through tions. the Soil Conservation Service, USDA, in cooperation with Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, reports Survey Chief Joe Moore.

Started about three years ago by the late Ed Harris, the suvvey of this county's soil is scheduled to be completed by the end of 1971, Moore says. About 50 per cent of the counties in Texas are currently working on soil surveys and approximately 20 per cent have been completed, he said.

Assisting with the local project is Freddy Coburn, who has been on the job here for the past three years. Moore, a Comanche County native who has been with SCS for nine years, came to Eastland in October of 1966, when Mr. Harris, who was in charge of the survey, became

The survey will be invaluable to farmers, those who work with farmers, game managers, sportsmen and others concerned with wild-life, ranchers, engineers and builders, scientists, students, teachers, newcomers, and all others who may have a need or an interest in what makes up the terra firma of Eastland County.

Eastland County soils differ just as people differ. The soil in one field may be deep, fertile and highly productive while that just across the fence may be shallow, eroded or too steep for cultivation. These differences, along with others, such as texture, structure, pH and color, are being recorded on aerial photographs by soil scientists with the Soil Conservation Service preparing a Standard Soil Survey of Eastland County.

Soils that are similar in characteristics are called soil series. These soil series are named and fit into a national classification system. 's cup butter

teaspoon salt 3 tablespoons power

6 egg yolks

1 cup granulated sugar

1 cup chopped toast-Diamond Wal Rum Sauce

3 teaspoons vanilla 1% cups sifted all-purp

Melt butter; let cool. Beat egg whites with salt till soit : 3 form; gradually add powdered sugar and beat till stiff but not dry. In separate bowl, beat yolks slightly; add sugar and vanilla; beat till thick and creamy. Sprinkle flour over whites, pour in yolks; gently fold till mixture is half blended. Add butter and 34 cup walnuts; fold till barely mixed. Pour into buttered and floured 2½ or 3-quart mold (or 10-inch tube pan); top with remaining 4 cup walnuts. Bake at 350 degrees 40 minutes or till done when tested with pick. Cool 10 minutes; add Rum Sauce. To make sauce, combine 1½ cups granulated sugar, 1¼ cups water, dash salt, grated peel of ½ orange and ½ lemon. Bring mixture to boil; boil 10 minutes. Cool. Stir in ¼ to ½ cup rum or 2 to 3 teaspoons rum extract. Make holes in cake with skewer; spoon sauce over cake. When sauce is absorbed (about 10 minutes), turn out on serving plate. Makes 10 servings.
