

The first TEXAS MONTHLY POLL, 1,000 telephone interviews of registered voters conducted between September 29 and October 7, 1978, reveals that the Democratic Party candidates were leading in each of the five statewide races surveyed. Planned to be run quarterly, the POLL will survey attitudes on a wide range of topics and current events. It will be distributed to newspapers and radio and television stations throughout the state and nation.

The most surprising result of the first TEXAS MONTHLY POLL is in the hotly contested race for U.S. Senator. In that race Congressman Bob Krueger (D-New Braunfels) holds a slight statewide lead--42.7 to 38.9 percent--over the incumbent. Republican cent of those surveyed seat. JORDON

The weather has been almost perfect for peanut harvest. Producers are wasting little time getting the crop of the ground and to the dryers. From most reports the yeilds are good.

Pecan harvest is also in full swing. Many people seem to think there are no pecans this year and this is probably true of the native pecans. However, the well managed orchards do have pecans. The crop is only fair in terms of production, but the nuts are well filled and high in quality. We saw some very good pecan crops on the fall pecan tour in the Pioneer area Oct. 17.

The annual county pecan show is scheduled for December 8 and 9 in the Eastland County Courthouse. We expect an exhibit of good quality pecans in each variety class.

The fall weather is causing tree leaves to fall. Rather than burning leaves or hauling them to the dump this fall, why not use them for a compost pile? The resulting compost will provide a good source of organic matter for potted plants, for topdressing the lawn, and for building up the soil in flower beds, shrub borders and vegetable gardens.

A simple method of composting leaves and other vegetable matter is to alternate four-to-six-inch , of vegetable matter

such as leves or grass with two-to-four-inches of good garden soil. If available, add manure to the soil layer. Make the compost pile fourto-six feet wide and any desired length depending on material and space avaiable.

Sprinkle a commercial fertilizer on each layer of vegetable matter to hasten decomposition. Use about one-half pound, or one cupful, of any good commercial fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per 10 square feet.

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and the surface of the pile should be dish-shaped, forming a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter thoroughly before adding the soil layer. This is especially true when composting leaves as they can be extremely slow to decompose if too dry. Water the pile thoroughly when completed and add additional water as needed to keep the material moist but

Turn or mix the compost with a garden fork or shovel every three or four months. This aerates the material and speeds up the composting process. Most compost should be ready to use in six months to a year. The use of commercially available compost activators will reduce the time required for decomposition only if

used according to directions. Well prepared compost can be used anywhere peat moss is used is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and other organic material.

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State Tax Relief Amendment

"Nearly everyone would benefit from the proposed state tax relief Amendment," according to Roy Johnson of Desdemona, Texas, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau. "Passage of this

amendment on November 7 would also send a message to Austin that Texas are concerned about state and local taxes," Mr. Johnson

Farm Bureau on both the state and county levels supports the amendment and urges all concerned citizens to vote "yes" on the amendment, the farm leader

Mr. Johnson listed the following ways Texas would benefit:

(1) Homeowners--The \$5,000 homestead exemption would reduce school taxes paid by homeowners.

(2) Elderly--The Legislature can exempt up to \$10,000 of the school tax value of homesteads of persons over 65 whose taxes may be stabilized.

(3) Disabled--Persons on fixed or reduced incomes may be given an exemption up to \$10,000 based on economic need.

(4) Farmers and ranchers--Valuation of agricultural land for tax purposes would be limited to producti-

(5) City dwellers--They would receive an unlimited exemption on household goods and personal effects. (6) School systems-The

Legislature has appropriated \$450 million to reimburse school districts losing revenue because of the homestead and agricultural use reduction.

(7) All property taxpayers--The appraisal of property would be left up to local districts where market values can be better established.
