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Poll Shows Democrats Leading In Five State Wide Races

The first TEXAS MONTHLY POLL, 1,000 telephone interviews of registered voters conducted between September 29 and October 7, 1978, reveals that the Democratic Party candidates were leading in each of the five statewide races surveyed. Planned to be run quarterly, the POLL will survey attitudes on a wide range of topics and current events. It will be distributed to newspapers and radio and television stations throughout the state and nation.

The most surprising result of the first TEXAS MONTHLY POLL is in the hotly contested race for U.S. Senator. In that race Congressman Bob Krueger (D-New Braunfels) holds a slight statewide lead—42.7 to 38.9 percent—over the incumbent, Republican Senator John Tower. The POLL also asked voters to indicate which candidates they preferred in the race for Railroad Commissioner.

Attorney General, Lieutenant Governor, and Governor.

In the Railroad Commissioner race, indecision was a significant finding with over 45 percent of those surveyed preferring neither Democrat John Poerner, 46, nor his Republican opponent Jim Lacy. Nevertheless, three-term state representative Poerner, who was appointed to the Commission earlier this year, leads 54-year-old Midland oilman Lacy by 36.5 to 18.2 percent statewide.

In the race for Lieutenant Governor, incumbent Billy Hobby, 46, enjoys a decisive 50.8 to 14.4 percent lead over his Republican challenger, 43-year-old Dallas commodities Gaylor Marshal. A significant 34.4 percent of those surveyed expressed no preference for either candidate.

The campaign for Attorney General pits two Houston lawyers, Democrat Mark

White and Republican Jim Baker, against each other. White, 38-year-old former Texas Secretary of State, fought an uphill battle last spring to win the Democratic nomination from former Texas House Speaker Price Daniel, Jr. He currently leads Baker, a 48-year-old great-grandson of the founder of Houston's prestigious Baker and Botts law firm, by a wide 38.6 to 22.5 percent margin. A sizeable 38.9 percent of those polled were undecided.

In one of the costliest and hottest contested races of the campaign year, Democratic nominee Bob Krueger, 43, has gained a slight statewide lead over incumbent Republican John Tower in his bid for the U.S. Senate seat. Tower, 53, who was the first Republican Senator elected from Texas since 1870 when he won a special election in 1961, faces his first serious challenge for

re-election this year from the two-term U.S. Representative from New Braunfels. The POLL shows Krueger leading Tower by a 42.7 to 38.9 percent edge, with a critical 17.3 percent reported undecided. About 1.1 percent of the voters questioned expressed support for Raza Unida candidate Luis Diaz de Leon. Both Tower and Krueger are waging extensive media campaigns in October making this race too close to call.

In the race for Governor of Texas Democrat John Hill, 55, holds a solid lead over Republican contender Bill Clements. Texas Attorney General Hill won the Democratic nomination from incumbent Governor Dolph Briscoe without a runoff in a lively primary battle last spring. He now enjoys a 44.8 to 33.7 percent margin over 61-year-old Dallas oil drilling executive and former Deputy Secretary of Defense Clements. Of those surveyed, however, 21 percent say they have not decided on either

candidate.

The TEXAS MONTHLY POLL indicates which candidates are leading in each race as of the time the POLL was conducted—September 29 through October 7—and does not predict the outcome of the elections. In each race the undecided vote can play a significant role in the final outcome on November 7. Campaign spending will accelerate rapidly in October and voters may be swayed from their original positions. This year's campaigns are projected to be the most costly in Texas history.

Most newspapers pick Hill over Clements

"John Hill may be the best candidate for governor in decades. Judging from his record, he should win easily over his Republican opponent, whose chief qualification is money. Unlike his opponent, Hill is not given to outrageous promises, intemperate personal attack or underhanded tactics. He will work hard for the best interests of the state and its people."

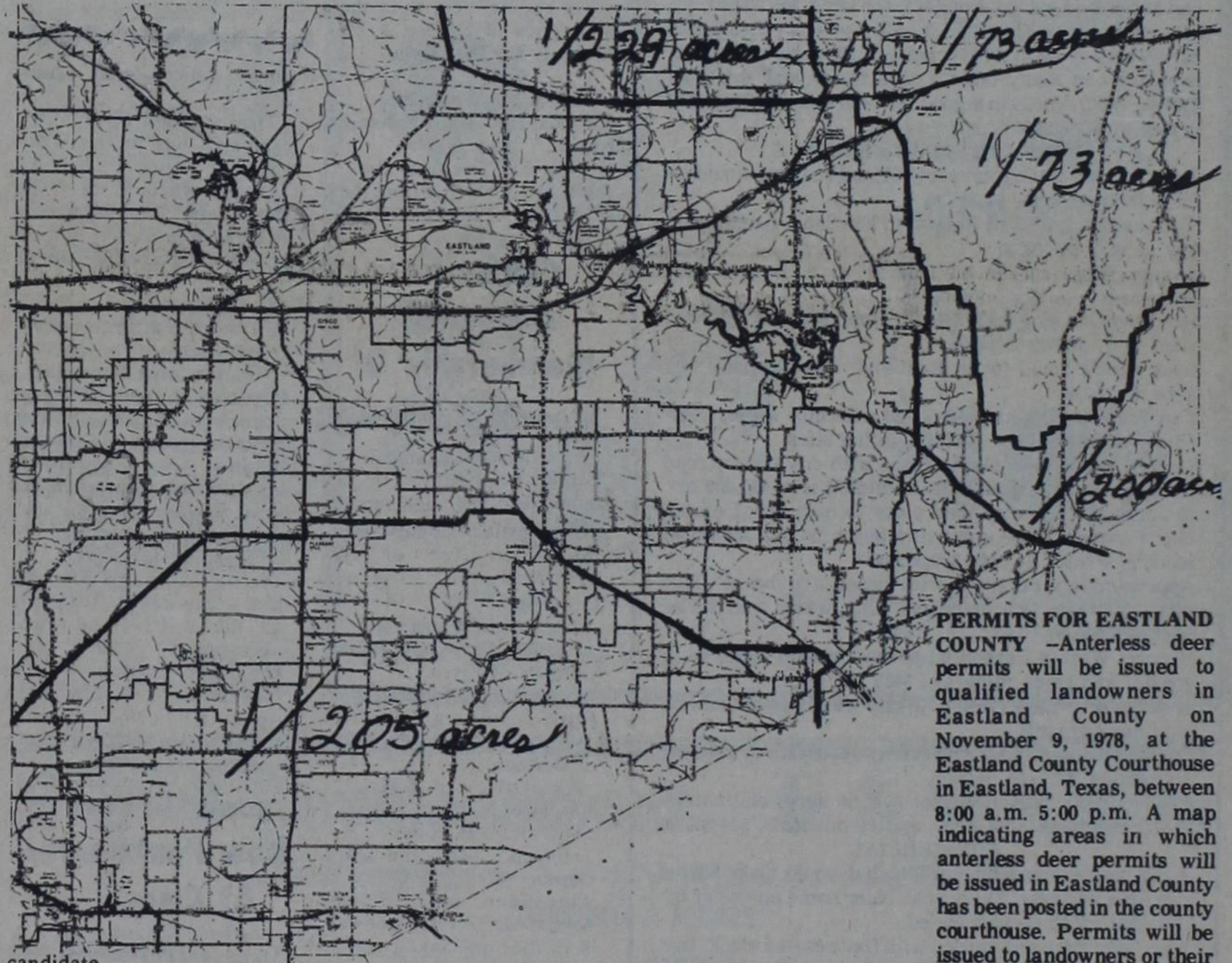

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Antlerless Deer Permits To Be Issued Nov. 9 For 5 Areas in County



PERMITS FOR EASTLAND COUNTY —Antlerless deer permits will be issued to qualified landowners in Eastland County on November 9, 1978, at the Eastland County Courthouse in Eastland, Texas, between 8:00 a.m. 5:00 p.m. A map indicating areas in which antlerless deer permits will be issued in Eastland County has been posted in the county courthouse. Permits will be issued to landowners or their authorized agents. Information necessary to obtain antlerless deer permits includes location of property, number of acres, and name and address of landowner. Permits will be issued on an acreage basis and a landowner must have the minimum acreage to obtain each permit. Antlerless deer permits may be used only on the tract of land for which the permit is issued. Acreage from adjoining tracts may be combined to obtain permits.
