T.F.B. Urges **Investigation** Of **Beef Price Situation**

WACO--The president of the Texas Farm Bureau said beef producers are in a crisis situation now that may affect future beef supplies.

"There'll never be a better time for housewives to fill their freezers with bargain beef," the Dalhart grain and beef producer said.

"Many cattlemen will be forced out of business unless there is an upturn in cattle prices soon," said the farm leader.

"There's been a gradual decrease in cattle prices all summer, but the situation in the past three or four weeks has become disastrous," he said. Chaloupka said there is a disappointing lag in the pressthrough of lower prices at the retail level.

'However, beef is selling in the stores for about 13 percent less than a year ago. This is a real bargain, and we want to let the housewives know about it so we can move some of the present glut of beef off the market," he said.

The president of the 190,000member general farm organiz-

unions are blocking the movement of boxed beef into markets and if so, what effect is the blockage having on beef prices," the farm leader said. Boxed beef involves the

breakdown of beef carcasses at the packing plant and packaging the meat cuts for shipment to retail outlets. It means a savings over shipping whole carcasses and reduces labor costs.

Labor contracts with meat cutter unions either prohibit or severely limit the movement of boxed beef into at least 12 major cities, including Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City and

Houston. Another issue relating to labor unions involves labor contracts with meat cutter unions which prohibit the sale of meat after 6 p.m. in some large cities.

The Farm Bureau is also asking the U.S. Department of Agriculture to find out what can be done about the lag in prices at the retail level.

The Wildcats started their rampage as flanker Ken Hounsel capped a 67 yard drive with a 3 yard spurt. The PAT failed and the 'Cats lead 6-0. Richland Springs came back as the Wildcats forced a Covote fumble and Maurice Lusty alertly took the loose pigskin full stride on a perfect bounce 48 yards to paydirt. 6-6. Two minutes later, fullback Johnny Childers raced 20 yards for the TD with Hounsel getting the EP. Wildcats lead 14-6. On a third down situation following the kickoff, the Coyotes attempted to pass but a strong rush lead by Glenn Dennard forced the Coyote QB to throw the ball away. The 'Cats raised their lead again on the next series of downs as QB Nicky Newbury went the final 8 yards on a sneak.

Elliott scored once more before halftime as he went 15 yards and then passed to Tight end Kevin Rust, who made several fine catches that night, for the 2 pointer. 'Cats ruled 42-6.

The Coyotes came back to score with 2 seconds left on the clock before intermission as Coyote QB Wayne Reynolds hit flanker Robert Burleson from 35 yards out with Lasty getting the PAT and that made it 42-14 at Halftime.

The Coyotes scored on the 60 same conbination in the third quarter from 70 yards out with

Such an article as "Educator Explains Constitution Week" by Edward Kirk, Associate Professor of Dept. Of Education, Abilene Christian Uni, in Friday Morning, Sept. 17, issue of Abilene Reporter News, merits more than casual attention. It is a brief Summary of our U. S. Constitution It is timely for Constitution Week which began Sept. 17. His timely comments give the article more interest.

The four paragraphs on the "Bill of Rights" present a new and healthy attitude toward these first ten Amendments. The following lines are e xcer ts from that article:

"Bill of Rights is a misleading title You do not get....freedom of speech and religion from the first Amendment. All people are born with these rights They (these rights) were ours as a people by virtue of centuries of struggle for them The Bill of Rights does not guarantee us the right to do as we please. It is a compact or agreement in the name of "We the people" This means that we agree to work together, and to stand: together to see that the least man among us gets just as good treatment from the government as anyone else. Our Constitution is the best plan ever made to assure freedom and to release the creative powers of men.""







Florida to Charleston, S.C. What does all this mean? Of course charts and statistics will never provide direct answers. They do, however, provide clues for researchers to interpret and hopefully find answers concerning high risk communities, causal factors and ultimately prevention of the disease.

Many experts already feel such geographical studies provide sufficient evidence to show that environmental factors such as diet, occupational exposure to chemicals, radiation, sunlight and viruses are definitely involved in the development of certain cancers.

The problem that continues to complicate all cancer research is the very nature of the disease itself - a large, diversified group of diseases that develop over a long period of time, up to 20 years in some cases.

To further complicate interpreting the patterns of cancer, it is commonly believed that for many cancers, no one cause is responsible but often combinations of several factors including environment, heredity, age, sex and race to name a few.



WASHINGTON, D.C.--THE **CONGRESS FINALLY ENA-**CTED A NEW TAX BILL this past week. It has been in the making for more than two vears. It is called "reform" but it depends on who is defining

the term. A PART OF REFORM CERTAINLY SHOULD BE a greater simplification of the tax code. Starting with this premise, it is not reform at all but a further complication of our tax laws. It will doubtless be welcome by tax attorneys and accountants. It will take years to have full interpretation and to know the effects. As a matter of fact, the Internal Revenue Service has not yet completed. rules and regulations applying to the revision in the tax laws of

EVEN THE SOPHISTICA TED WALL-STREET JOUR-NAL gave up last week in efforts to write an editorial on the bill. It finally editorialized to the effect that because of the complexities and technicalities involved, the measure should be rejected. The report accompanying the bill contained 646 pages of explanation but about every section is subject to interpretation and application to the taxpayer.

IN LEGISLATION OF THIS KIND, it becomes a matter of trying to balance the good against the bad. In other words, it is not all one or the other. In legislation of this sort and, as for the matter in other major legislation, seldom is it found to be a matter of clear choices. The acceptable and the objectionable must be sorted and weighed on its merits. How does it affect people? How does it affect our overall economy and does it bring about fairness insofar as possible? These are the things looked for in reaching
