



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Women Are Returning to School

The adage that "a woman's place is in the home" has become more outmoded in our contemporary society than many persons realize. Of the 12 million new jobs added to the work force during the past decade, women have filled two-thirds.

New job opportunities for women in expanding occupations, advances in the educational attainment of women and the trend toward smaller families are among the signs pointing to the continued increase in the number of women in the labor force.

The trend for increasing numbers of married women to become wage earners outside the home has created new job training demands. Many women are acquiring this training at vocational schools and community colleges. According to U.S. Office of Education figures, about half of all students enrolled in public school vocational education in 1975 were female, and an increasing number of women are enrolled in industrial trades courses.

Likewise, correspondence schooleducators report significant increases in female enrollments. Many of these students are housewives who are preparing themselves to return to work and are either taking "refresher" courses or are mastering new job skills, the National Home Study Council of Washington, D.C., reports.

Melted butter Glaze (recipe follows)

Scald milk; stir in sugar, shortening, salt, orange peel and cardamom. Cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into warm bowl. Sprinkle in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, egg and 1½ cups flour. Beat until smooth. Add raisins, cherries and remaining flour. Mix to moderately stiff dough. Cover and let rise in warm place about 14 hours until doubled in bulk. Punch down. Divide into thirds. Shape each third into 15-inch rope. Place on greased baking sheet and braid together loosely, pinching ends firmly together to seal. Brush with melted butter and let rise about 45 minutes until doubled. Bake in 350 degree oven 30 to 35 minutes, until browned. Brush again with butter. Cool slightly, then spread Glaze over top. Decorate with halved candied cherries, sliced almonds and raisins as desired. Makes 1 stollen.

GLAZE: Combine 11/4 cups sifted powdered sugar, 1/4 teaspoon vanilla and 3 to 4 teaspoons hot water.

One of the important questions facing the new administration, Knutson contended, will be the role kof the USDA in food and fiber policy decisions and in the administration of food and fiber programs.
