SPS's residential, commercial, SPS's residential, commercial,
industrial and other retail customers in Texas receiving a
decrease of $4.3 \%$ or $\$ 20.6$

In the El Paso area, the program is coordinated by the El Pas City-County Health District.
Oscar G. Garza, Immunizat Program Director for TDH Region 8 (Harlingen), explaine that the colonias have a high rate of enemployment. The average family income annually is les hat $\$ 6,000$, with many families year through farm labor
In operation for nine months,
the prograin conducts temporary
clinics in each neighborhood, usually in the evenings, when most of the patients are not a work, at convenient sites such as churches. The types of services upon the community's needs as determined by surveys.

stated that non-recourse loans would be reduced to a "Disaster Price" level for feed grains and wheat and to zero for all other commodities. It also stated that eliminating the parity ratio would be a major improvement. The
report further stated that given these condition, agriculture cannot and should not be expected to provide employment opportunities sufficient to preserve the nations rural towns and commun ities. When this report was made
in 1972, no one ever thaght the in 1972, no one ever thought that
the plans would ever be followed or implemented. The under secretary of agriculture served as chairman to the committee that made and recommended this report. His name was Richard Lypg. Today, as Richard Lyng serves as the secretary of agricul
ture in 1988, he must feel very successful in watching the 1985 farm bill reach the goals of the U.S.D.A. young executives committee of 1972.
